

Texico's Wolverines, knocked out of the District 6-B title Saturday night by underdog Dora, are still alive in the state playoffs and will go for broke against San Jon Friday night.

The Wolverines take on the classy Coyotes, who have compiled a 24-2 record this season, in the first round of the regional tournament at Melrose at 8 p.m. (CST),

Winner of the contest will automatically gain a berth in the state tournament at Albuquerque next week, and will meet the victor of the Dora-Mosquero game for the regional title Saturday night.

San Jon, champion of 7-B, will be heavily favored in the game, having taken Texico on two previous occasions, once in the finals of the East Plains Conference tournament, 47-37, and just recently at Texico, 60-47.

The coyotes have balance and depth, and some boys who can consistently hit the basket. The Wolverines can't be counted out, however, and are given an outside chance of springing a major upset.

They demonstrated this against Ft. Sumner in a district semi-final game last Friday night. The Foxes were an up-andcoming team and were primed for an upset, but the Wolverines managed to come through in the clutches for a 41-39 decision.

Texico started off like a house afire, hitting 7 of its first 9 shots, for a 14-6 lead, but then cooled off and had to stave off a determined effort on the part of the Foxes.

The Wolverines held on to a 14-8 lead after one quarter, but saw the margin narrowed to 22-20 at halftime. Ft. Sumner took the lead in the third period, bus saw it fade away when Texico's Bill Reid connected on a shot from the center of the court just as the third quarter ended.

This gave the Wolverines a 29-28 lead going into the final frame, and it was Reid's timely long shots throughout the contest that kept the Wolverines out front most of the way.

The senior guard paced the Texico scoring with 15 points, while teammate Kenneth Murdick hit 10 and Dwight Turner hit 8.

Texico was ahead 40-35 with only 40 seconds remaining on the clock, but had to fight for its life as the seconds ticked away and the Foxes started stealing the ball.

That was the big win for Texico, and the finals Saturday were an anti-climax since both teams had already qualified for the regional.

Orion Strickland hit two free throws in the final seconds of the game to give Dora the 39-36 upset win. It was the second upset in two nights for Coyotes, who were seeded third in the district. They had thrashed second-seeded Causey in the semi-finals, 50-37.

The teams were tied 10-10 after the first quarter and Texico forged to a 21-16 lead at the half. The Wolverines managed to hold on for a 29-28 margin in the third period but fell by the wayside in a nip-and-tuck fourth period.

The lead changed hands five times in the last quarter before Dora took the advantage to stay 37-33 just before time ran out. Dwight Turner, in a determined effort in the closing seconds, hit for three points with a basket and a free throw, to narrow the count to 36-37, but Strickland then iced the game with his two last-second free throws.

Should Texico upset San Jon Friday night, they will be making their second straight trip to the state tourney, which starts March 10 at Albuquerque.

Farmers Must Sign Up For Feed Program

To be eligible to participate in any feed grain sorghum that may be forthcoming from Congress this year, Parmer County farmers must sign up at the county ASC office before March 16, it was announced Wednesday by Prentice Mills, ASC manager.

Letters are being mailed to all farm operators and/or owners this week, and each of them will be given a certain time at which they can appear at the ASC office in Farwell, Mills said.

The purpose of the "signing up" will be to record a history of a farmer's land during the years 1959 and 1960, so that a base can be set on grain sorghum, barley, oats and corn.

Currently pending in Congress is a bill that will provide farmers with a price support on these grains, provided they will lay out 20 per cent of their acreage for some soil conservation practice.



Steers Bow Out In Region Finals

Farwell's Steers had what it took to knock off the Plains Cowboys early Saturday morning, but ran.out of gas in the final quarter of the Region 1-A championship game Saturday night against White Deer, and had to settle for second place in the big tournament at Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum.

White Deer made good use of the fast break in the fourth quarter of the final game to break the back of a tired, bewildered Farwell team that had pushed the talented Bucks to the hilt until that point.

The Bucks, in winning the game 60-41, qualified for the state tournament which gets under way this week at Austin.

"We just gave out," was one comment of Coach Calvin Murray following the game, and he cited several factors which contributed to Steers' defeat.

For one thing, it was an aggressive, wellbalanced White Deer team that had a better eye for the basket than did Farwell, and a combination of mistakes, shooting ineptness, inability to take advantage of the breaks, and fatigue that aided Farwell's downfall. From the opening whistle, it was a different game than Farwell had played all year. The Steers surprisingly jumped to a 6-0

lead (something they've done on few occasions this year) and then turned ice cold

and fell behind 17-8 early in the second period.

It was at this point that Coach Murray sent his charges into a full-court press to try to stop the Bucks, and a press is something that Farwell has used only sparingly in the past. They used it the rest of the way.

The press did work to the extent that it slowed the fast moving Bucks down, and the Steers closed the gap to 23-19 at the half. However, had they been able to connect on a fair percentage of their shots, they could easily have taken the lead.

Throughout the contest the Steers could never quite find the range and hit only' 17 of 69 attempts from the field for a 24.6 percentage. White Deer hit 24 of 63 attempts for 38 per cent.

On free throws, the Farwell team could only connect on 7 of 16 shots for a percentage of 43.8 and the Bucks hit 12 of 22 for a percentage of 54.5.

Despite the difference in shooting percentages, however, the Steers were right on the heels of the Bucks and trailed by only six points, 43-37 at the end of the third quarter.




