Placement Of Dentist Okayed - -

## Grant Awarded For Physicians

Official confirmation was received Tuesday, Dec. 16, from the office of United States Congressman George Mahon that the congressman has been notified by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that a grant from the National Health Services Corps (NHSC) was awarded to the Farwell Hospital District for the assignment of two NHSC physicians and one dentist to the district.

Claude Rose, Jr. of Farwell was designated the authorized person to take the lead with the grant. Rose, along with members of the Farwell Hospital District Board, will be responsible for determining uses of the grant in bringing a dentist and doctors to Farwell.

During the regular meeting of the Hospital District Board held Tuesday, Dec. 16, Rose reported that the grant means NHSC will place two physi-

cians and a dentist here and certain equipment will also be allocated for use locally. "We don't know exactly what type equipment yet, but the grant involves a considerable amount of money," he explained.

The grant from NHSC means that the override instituted to disclaim objections by the Texas Dental Society and Panhandle Dental Society concerning placement of a dentist in Farwell was successful. "It also means that our application to NHSC for the doctors was approved."

Recruiting for these positions has already begun and it is expected that the physicians and dentist will be placed in Farwell and begin services around the first of July, 1976.

The grant is one more step along the way to bringing adequate medical aid and facilities into the city of Farwell. Members of the Hospital District had applied to NHSC for physicians under a plan to bring the doctors to the city on a "repayment of debt" basis.

This means that the Hospital District will be, and is currently, aiding one medical

student with the expense of his studies in the field of medicine. Upon completion of his studies, David Prickett, a student at Guadalajara, Mexico, will come to Farwell and work for a designated period to repay the aid given him with his study expenses.

Officials are currently seeking a second physician to contract under the same arrangement to guarantee two medical doctors for Farwell. A dentist is also being sought.

### Programming Grant To Include County

Congressman George Mahon has announced an administration and general community programming grant in the amount of \$93,468 from the Community Services Administration to the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation.

The grant will serve 25 counties including Deaf Smith and Parmer beginning January 1, 1976.

The purpose of the grant is to allow the agency to continue its program of basic outreach and to maintain its system of comprehensive neighborhood centers.

### On Highway 70-84 - -

## Railroad Crossing Gets Face Lifting

Residents of the Twin Cities and Highway 70-84 travelers passing through Texico and Farwell this week have suffered a slight inconvenience as they have encountered a detour around the railroad highway crossing.

The Santa Fe Railway, in cooperation with city, county and state authorities of the states of Texas and New Mexico, are in the process of rebuilding the crossing facilities on the highway at the Texas-New Mexico state line between Farwell and Texico.

Work on the project began Monday, Dec. 15, and was expected to be completed by the end of the week, weather permitting. The work involves the installation of new ballasts, new rails, new ties, new planking and new paving.

A crew of 11, consisting of a foreman, two machine operators and eight trackmen, have been working on the crossing. Approximately 400 ties were expected to be used and new

rails were to be placed in each of the tracks at the crossing. Seven or eight carloads of ballasts were used to replace those now in service. After the track work has been completed, new planking and paving will be put down to provide a smooth crossing.

Automatic gates with flashing signals have recently been put into operation at this crossing and with the completion of the "smoothing out of the crossing," the facility is expected to be in the best possible condition for the motoring public.

### Texico School Trustees Discuss Gym, Insurance

During a meeting of the Texico School Board of Education conducted Tuesday, Dec. 9, Trustees discussed making the old gymnasium available to outsiders.

They reached the decision that the gymnasium is to be open one night each week for practice by outsiders teams. The "once-a-week" was agreed upon due to the increase in the cost of gas and electricity.

Should the gym be used by outsiders, they will be responsible for paying someone, such as a janitor, for opening the facility and closing it after checking the electric and gas facilities.

Trustees then conducted a discussion regarding liability insurance for School Board members, faculty and staff. The insurance currently in force is to expire soon, but no decision was reached during the meeting.

It was brought to the attention of School Board members that a representative of the State Department of Education was to be visiting Texico

School Tuesday, Dec. 16. Purpose of the visit was to review the educational program at Texico and to meet with persons interested in the school or needing information regarding the school system.

Trustees also reviewed and discussed the statewide testing program for eighth graders (achievement tests). It was reported that state officials use these test results to compile a statewide comparison table.

Board members attending the meeting were David Turner, Roy Richardson and Ronnie Curry. Also present for the session was Jim Pierce, superintendent of Texico Schools.

## Three Tagged All Tourney - -

# Steerettes Take Title At Tourney

The stunning Steerettes of Farwell High School walked over two opponents and wrestled with a third to take the top slot in competition in the play-offs of the Springlake-Earth Varsity Tournament last weekend with three Steerettes named to the All-Tournament team. They were Estelle Embry, Kathy White and Kathy Booth.

The Steerettes earned the right to compete for the championship when they dropped their first opponent, Silverton, 66-30, and handed their second opponent, Hale Center, a 64-32 loss.

In their final game of the tournament, the championship tilt, the Steerettes battled the Springlake-Earth Wolverettes for the top slot and dropped their hosts 38-31.

Springlake was not to be embarrassed before the home-town crowd and took a 12-10 lead at the end of the first period. During the second quarter, the Steerettes were not to be denied the victory and went ahead of the host team to lead 21-17 at the halfway mark.

The Steerettes revamped their forces and came back to up their lead to 30-21. Springlake pumped 10 points through the hoop in the fourth period but it was not enough to overtake the Steerettes. When the final seconds ticked off the clock, Farwell was declared tournament champs by taking a 38-31 victory.

Steerette Kathy Booth earned honors as high scorer for the local roundballers as she slugged a total of 24 individual points through the hoop. Also scoring in double figures was Kathy White with 10 and Sherri McCully also added to the Steerettes' final tally.

Steerette guard Estelle Embry was tagged leading rebounder with a total of 9 rebounds pulled from the backboards. Lori Norton led in the stolen ball department with 4 steals.

In reference to the championship game, Coach Joe Allen said, "The Springlake-Earth game was not a good one for us. We had some people who were not feeling well, but mostly we were just not mentally ready to play."

"Estelle Embry did play a good game (9 rebounds, 3 steals, 4 blocked shots, and 6 of 6 assists across the half line) and was the top choice for the All-Tournament team. Kathy Booth (64 total points for three games) and Kathy

White (48 total points) were also among the six players selected from the eight teams entered.

"The three games still average out to be excellent play for us in the tournament," he concluded.

In their first clash of the tournament the Steerettes faced Silverton and smeared the team 66-30.

Farwell took a definite lead and was ahead 15-2 at the end of the first period. The Steerettes were able to raise their lead to 27-8 at the half.

During the third period, Farwell further expanded its lead to 52-20. The Steerettes had dropped their first contenders for the title 66-30 when the game had ended.

Booth led in the scoring department for Farwell with 22

points. Two other Steerettes also scored in double figures when White hit for 18 and Missy Taylor hit for 10. Also adding to the score were Bonnie Foster, Sheryl Woods and McCully.

Guard Embry led in the rebounding department with 7 rebounds with Norton leading in stolen balls with 7.

The coach said, "We jumped on Silverton early and shook their talented but young team up. The result was a relatively easy victory over a team that has four girls in the neighborhood of six feet tall or over. A victory for talented experience over talented inexperience."

The Steerettes' final game prior to the championship clash was with Hale Center. Farwell stepped out to a 16-6 lead in the first period and

upped that lead to 32-10 at the half.

The Steerettes were able to advance their leading margin to 40 points, 52-12, in the third stanza and rolled over Hale Center 64-32 at the end of regulation play.

White was recognized as Farwell's leading scorer as she hit for 20 individual points followed by Booth with 16 and Foster with 11. Other Steerettes scoring were McCully, Taylor and Woods.

Gaye Coffman led with rebounds for the Steerette guards with five and Embry was top man in assists with six.

"This was the finest game we have played all year," stated Coach Allen. "Both forward and guard defense were terrific. Of special note were the 13 steals on the guard end led by Embry with six, and three by Coffman."

"Hale Center had a good ball club (defeated Springlake by 16 earlier), but they could manage only 12 points against us until the fourth quarter."

"White was outstanding with 10 of 15 field goal attempts and five offensive rebounds. Booth had a good night with eight of 17 field goal attempts. Foster chipped in 11 quick points, McCully and Woods, six each, and Taylor, four. All were tough on the press."

"It was a great night for us - an embarrassing night for Hale Center," the coach concluded.

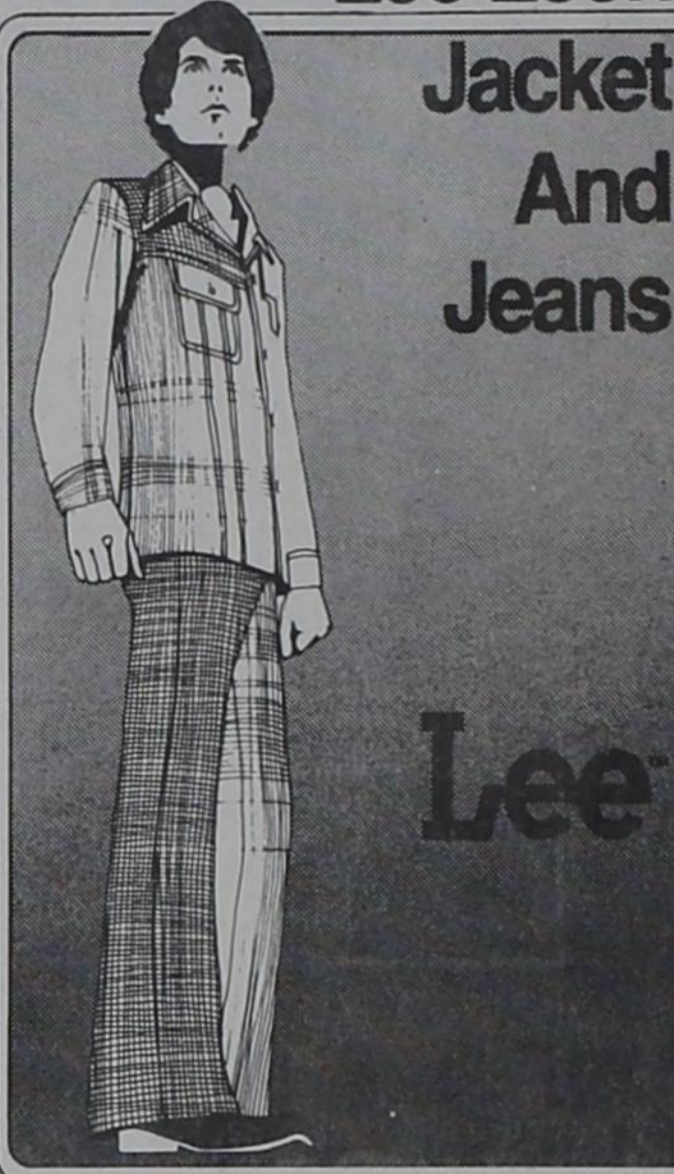

**WHERE DO YOU STAND?**

## Farwell JH Girls Win, Boys Lose

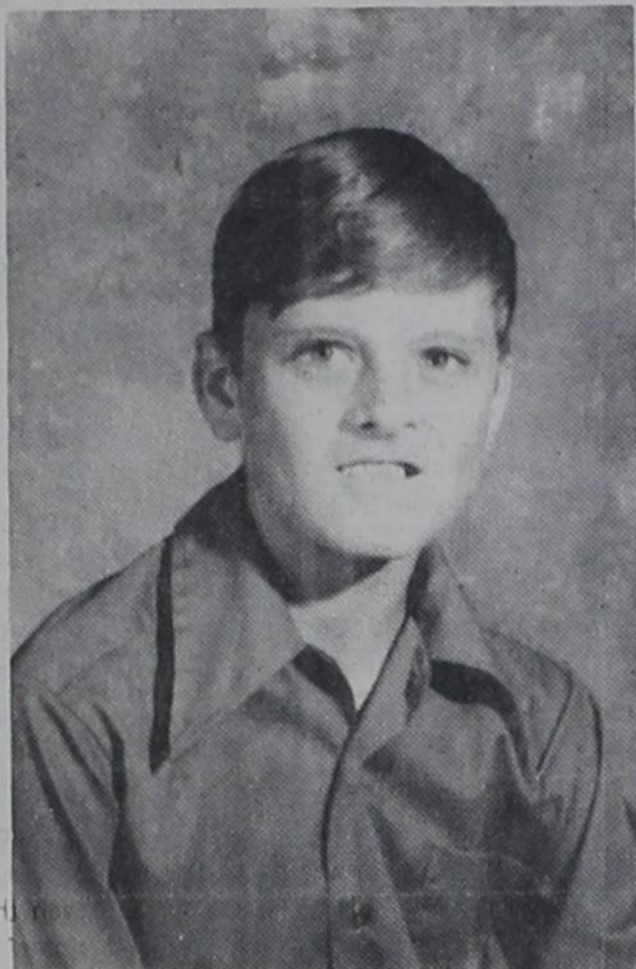

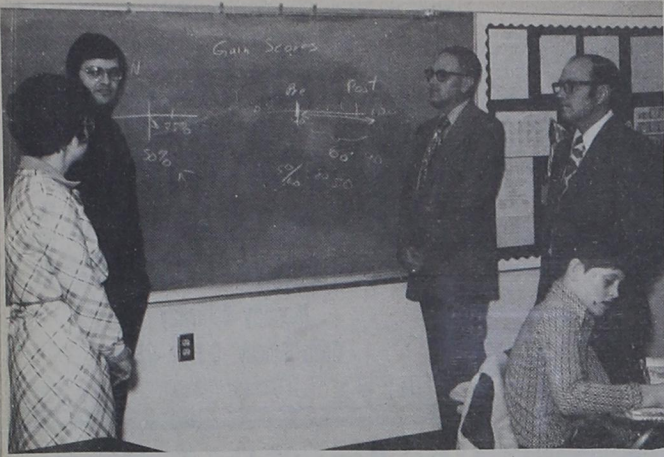
