The Texico Chamber of Commerce met recently and decided to conduct a membership drive on Saturday, Jan. 19.

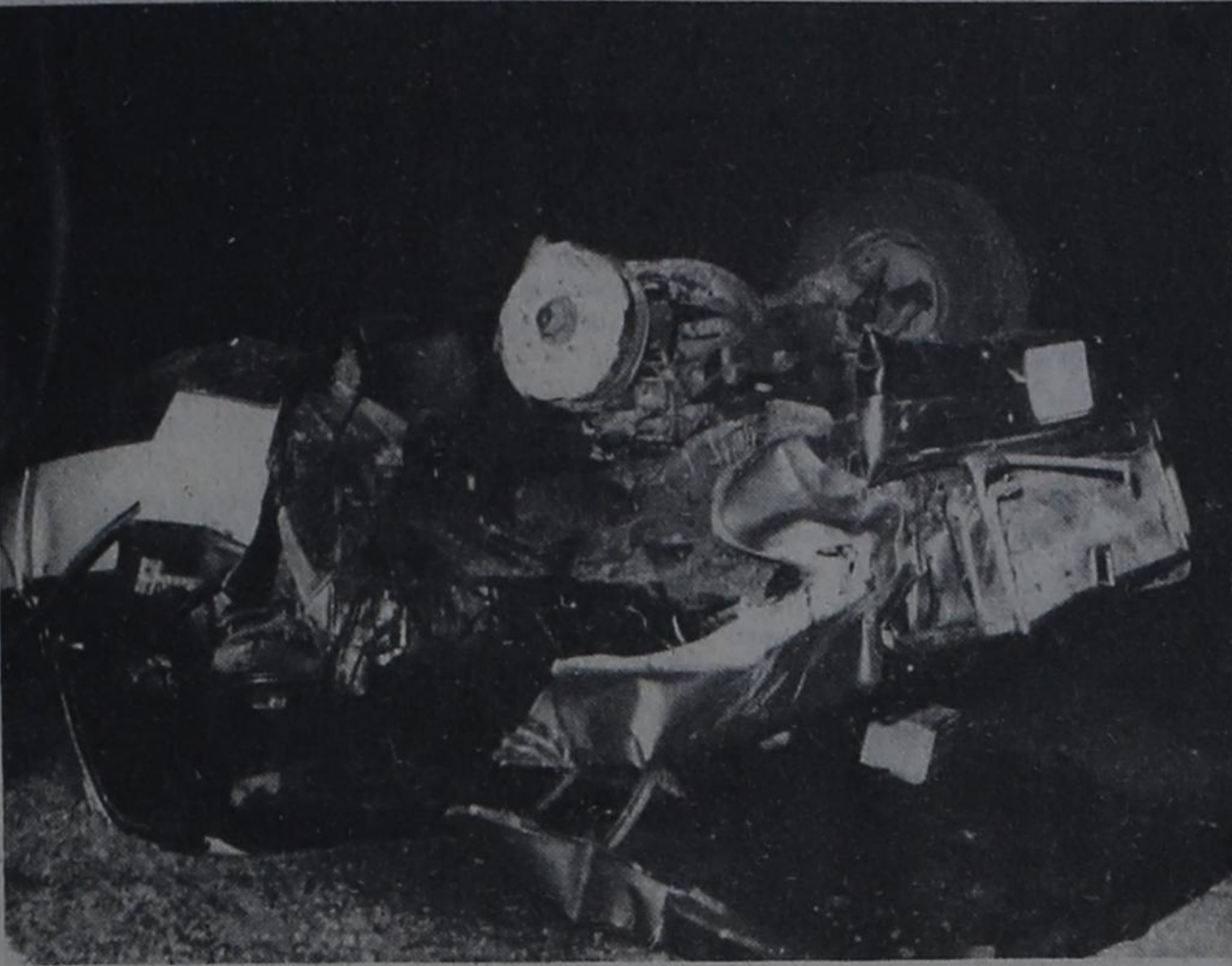
"Chamber members on this drive committee will meet together at 9 a.m. (MST) at the Citizens Bank on Saturday," Louise Ingram, chamber member said.

Vehicle Demolished --

Serious Injury Avoided In Train-Truck Crash

A Bovina couple and their granddaughter fled from their pickup truck only seconds before it was struck by a Santa Fe diesel train at a grade crossing about six miles northeast of Farwell at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 12.

The couple, Jose Hippolito Santillana, 56, and Frances Santillana, 56, both of Bovina, along with their two-year-old granddaughter, Jackie Gonzales, were northbound on County Road No. 14782G in a 1977 model pickup as they approached the railroad crossing. Santillana apparently did not see the train coming, Jim Bishop, Texas Department of Public Safety trooper, said.

This 1977 model pickup truck was struck by a Santa Fe train about six miles northeast of Farwell at a railroad crossing on Saturday, Jan. 12. The occupants, Mr. and Mrs. Jose

Hippolito Santillana of Bovina and their granddaughter, Jackie Gonzales, 2, were able to evacuate the truck before it was struck by the train and escaped serious injury.

"His wife saw the train coming and warned him after which he slammed on his brakes causing the pickup to come to rest on the railroad tracks. The trio evacuated their vehicle just before the diesel engine struck the truck. The only injury sustained was when Mrs. Santillana skinned her knees on some gravel when she was getting out of the truck," Bishop said.

"On a scale of 1 to 10, I rated the damage to the pickup at 8 and I would say that it was totaled," Bishop said.

There was no damage to the engine, No. 8022, which struck the vehicle causing it to come

to rest upside down and parallel to the railroad tracks.

"I issued Santillana a citation for failure to stop for a train," Bishop said.

"The train was approximately a city block away when Mrs. Santillana saw it coming towards them and warned her husband. The train was going slower than normal, thus giving the occupants in the pickup time to escape from the path of the train," the DPS trooper continued.

"If the train had been going 75 miles per hour these people might not have made it out of their truck in time," Bishop said.

Hubert Ellisons Hurt In Clovis Accident

A three-vehicle accident in Clovis on Saturday, Jan. 12, at about 8:46 a.m. resulted in the injury of two Farwell residents.

Hubert D. Ellison, 78, and his wife, Katie Ellison, 72, both of 708 Second Street, Farwell, were injured in the three-car mishap.

Both the Ellisons are reported to have many lacerations and fractures among their injuries. Mrs. Ellison was to undergo surgery Thursday for treatment of broken bones.

Ellison, the driver of a compact model station wagon, was westbound on Mabry Drive and attempted a left turn onto south Norris Street when the Ellison auto collided with a car driven by Darwin L.

Ingram, 59, of Clovis, according to Clovis police reports.

The Ingram auto was traveling west through the intersection when the mishap occurred, reports stated.

After impact, the right side of the Ellison auto swerved into the left side of the Ingram auto and then into a pickup truck headed north on Norris, waiting at the stop light.

The pickup truck was operated by John E. Hamilton, 54, also of Clovis.

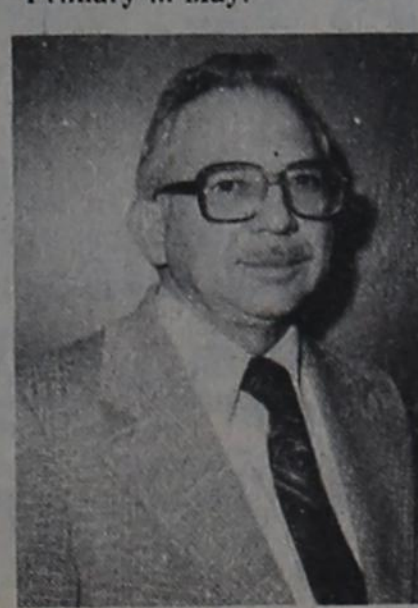
Police reports indicate that Hamilton was not injured and that Ingram complained of injuries, but did not receive hospital treatment.

Parmer County -- Commissioners Okay Pay Hike

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday and voted unanimously to approve a five percent increase for the 1980 salary schedule for county employees.

"The raise was approved because the cost of living has raised in the past year," Porter Roberts, county judge, said.

Also approved was the upcoming year's holiday schedule. Holidays approved were January 1 - New Year's Day; May 26 - Memorial Day; July 4 - Independence Day; September 1 - Labor Day; November 11 - Veteran's Day; November 27-28 - Thanksgiving; and December 24-26 - Christmas.

Reports were heard from the county extension agents, Seth Ralston and Laura Jacobs.

Ralston reported on the trip that he and two Parmer County 4-H Club members took to the National Western Stock Show in Denver, January 10-13. He told the court that Charlie Rose of Farwell captured first place with his lightweight cross barrow and fifth place in class seven with a cross breed while Scott Johnson of Bovina took third place with his middle Chester White barrow and fourth place with a pair of Hampshire barrows.

He also announced that he would be taking 16 Parmer County 4-H youths to the Hereford Stock Show, January 24-26.

Miss Jacobs told the court that "the clubs are all ready to go and that the training meeting has had dates set in Lubbock in which Texas

"On Saturday night someone burglarized my patrol car while it was parked at my house (412 First, Farwell). Approximately \$1,000 worth of radio equipment was stolen," Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace said.

"Taken were the radio equipment, several courtesy cards, two pairs of handcuffs, a microphone, two control heads, one speaker and one small billy club. This is the first time I've ever heard of anyone touching a county-owned vehicle in Parmer County," the sheriff said.

In other department action, on January 11, a spokesman for Junior Robertson's garage in Farwell reported to the sheriff's department that someone had stolen about \$1,500 worth of tools from this place of business.

An employee of the 7-11 store

in Bovina reported to the sheriff's office that a Spanish male robbed her of an undisclosed amount of money from her while she was alone and on duty the night of January 12. She told sheriff's officers that the suspect held a knife to her throat. Reports indicate that she was not

harmed and that the incident occurred around 10 p.m.

Sheriff Lovelace also reported that Jerry Ortiz, 23, of Texico was transported to the Parmer County Jail after he signed a waiver to permit his extradition from Curry County Jail on charges of passing bad checks in Parmer County.

Cotton Harvest Winding Down

"Cotton harvest is about 98 percent completed and it has been pretty much an average year," Seth Ralston, Parmer County extension agent, said. "The quality of this year's harvest is not as good as what it could be with the wet weather and hail storms that we had," he said.

There were about 10 separate hail storms in Parmer County that the area cotton farmers had to contend with.

"I'd say that the gins are about finished and that they

are probably down to skeleton crews now. In another week or so it should all be wrapped up," Ralston said.

Spring planting will take place in Parmer County anywhere between the end of April through June, he said.

"I'd like to think that May 10 or somewhere around that date is a good time to plant cotton," Ralston said.

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Closed Doors --

Farwell Council Has Executive Session

Farwell City Council regular meeting held on Monday, Jan. 14, came to a close about 7 p.m., at least to the public and the news media, when the council announced that it was going to retire behind closed doors for an executive session. Apparently the session was of a personnel nature. No advance notice of the executive session was provided the news media and it was not listed on the agenda of items to be discussed by the council. The nature of the executive session was not explained other than that it was about "litigation and Justice of the Peace Carrell Watkins."

In other business discussed at the meeting, Bennet Reaves, president of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc., an engineering firm out of Lubbock, offered his company's services to the city concerning drafting plans and filling out questionnaires in relation to a fluoride program and construction of a new sewage treatment plant. "The whole thing with the fluoride is that several years ago the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) said that it

was hazardous to your health. They said that too much of it in the water system caused mottling, brown spots, on the teeth of young children," Janie Bowery, city clerk, said.

"At that time all towns with this problem had to apply for a variance or exemption from correcting the fluoride level in their water systems. Well, the city of Farwell filed with the state department of health who in turn granted us a variance," she said.

"But the EPA said that the state department of health should not have granted us the variance and so we were given so much time to work up a study justifying why we should have the variance. In other words, we need a study complete with graphs to estimate what it would cost to remove the excess fluoride from our water system so that we can submit it to EPA who in turn will decide whether to grant us a variance or exemption," Mrs. Bowery said. "The reason we requested a variance from the department of health in the first place

because we got ahold of some figures that estimated that it would cost too much to remove fluoride from the water, and our contention was that it was not harmful except for the mottling," she said.

"The city council agreed to employ the services of the Lubbock firm to prepare cost estimates of removing fluoride from the water as well as how much it would cost to build a sewage treatment plant," Mrs. Bowery said.

In other business, the city council voted to file suit against several owners of land in Farwell who have outstanding paving liens.

These residents mentioned were: Ralph Autrey, Mary Barela, E.R. Coffman, J.E. Coleman, W.H. Graham, Leon Meeks, G.E. Nance, J.T. Stanton and Kenneth Hillfiker.

The city also took under consideration a request by Joel White, Farwell fire chief, that workman's compensation be added to the volunteer firemen's benefits. The city council voted to let bids on the insurance.

Gymnasium Addition Awaits Equipment

Although completed, the new gymnasium addition at Texico High School still awaits transfer of the weight equipment to it so that it can be utilized for that purpose.

The new addition was recently accepted by the Texico School Board. Construction of the facility was undertaken by the John Cornell Construction Company.

The addition was completed, January 4 and was part of a project that included adding additional space to the ag shop for welding and carpentry projects.

The gym addition will serve the dual purpose of being the new weight room and serving as a fourth dressing room for visiting basketball teams, according to Paul Topliff, head football coach at Texico High School. It was reported that it would be used for a training classroom for boys and girls also.

"It took approximately four months to complete this project," Jim Pierce, Texico school superintendent, said.

The new addition covers 1,840 square feet and the ag shop covers 1,440 square feet. Both projects cost \$200,000. This money was secured via a bond election held last spring.

The gym addition also sports spacious shower facilities.

"I don't know of any school the size of Texico that has a separate locker room the size

of this one. It is nice because the students do not have to go outside to get from the regular school building to here since it is connected," Topliff said.

"Approximately 38 people will be able to work out with weights as soon as the weights are transferred to the new room. Right now we are waiting to have a rubber mat of some kind installed on part of the floor in the new weight room," he pointed out.

All sports equipment will be kept in the training room for easy access.

Nellie Cook, 55, and Lokeene Hughes, 11, both of Bovina, were westbound on Highway 60 when Mrs. Cook allegedly turned left into the path of an eastbound semi-truck, driven by James C. Rose, 27, of Biloxi, Miss., DPS Officer Jim

Bishop said. Reports indicate that Mrs. Cook and Rose escaped injury while Miss Hughes sustained some slight scratches.

Mrs. Cook was cited for failure to yield right-of-way when making a left turn.

The following recipes are ones shared with our readers by Jeannie. She says that the first one will make any bird tender but is especially good for pheasant.

PHEASANT WITH WINE SAUCE

1 whole pheasant
1 medium jar sliced mushrooms
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/2 c. butter or margarine
1/2 onion - chopped fine
1 T. chopped parsley
1 clove garlic (squeezed)
1/2 c. dry white wine
salt and pepper to taste
Wild rice

Season bird to taste with salt and pepper. Sauté onion in butter and put both, along with all other ingredients except wild rice, in a crock pot. Cook on high heat for two hours, then on low for four hours. Turn the bird once during this time. Serve in ring of wild rice. The gravy which it makes is delicious poured over both the rice and bird.

STEAK AND BACON TOURNADES

1 pound (per-2 persons) beef flank steak
Instant non-seasoned meat tenderizer
1/2 pound bacon
1 T. garlic salt
1/2 t. freshly ground pepper
2 T. snipped parsley
Hollandaise sauce (1 recipe)
1/4 t. dried tarragon, crushed

Pound steak to even thickness; about 1/2 inch thick. Use meat tenderizer according to package directions. Meanwhile, cook bacon until almost done; not crisp. Sprinkle steak with garlic salt and pepper.

Score steak diagonally making diamond shaped cuts. Place bacon strips lengthwise on flank steak. Sprinkle with parsley. Roll up, jelly roll fashion, starting at narrow end. Skewer with wooden picks at one inch intervals. Cut in one inch slices with serrated knife. Grill over medium coals 15 minutes, turning once for rare. Meanwhile prepare Hollandaise Sauce and add tarragon. Serve sauce over steaks.

BLENDER HOLLANDAISE

3 egg yolks
2 T. lemon juice
Dash cayenne
1/2 c. butter or margarine
Place egg yolks, lemon juice and cayenne in blender container. Cover and quickly turn blender on and off. Heat butter until melted and almost boiling. Turn blender on high; slowly pour in butter, blending until thick and fluffy, about 30 seconds. Heat over warm, not hot, water until ready to serve.

The Steers enjoyed a sound

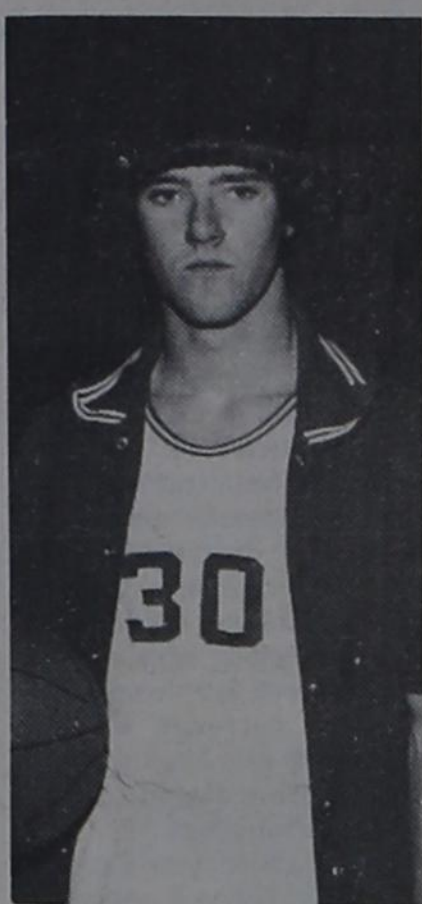
victory over the Kress Kangaroos, 62-48, when they played at Kress January 11.

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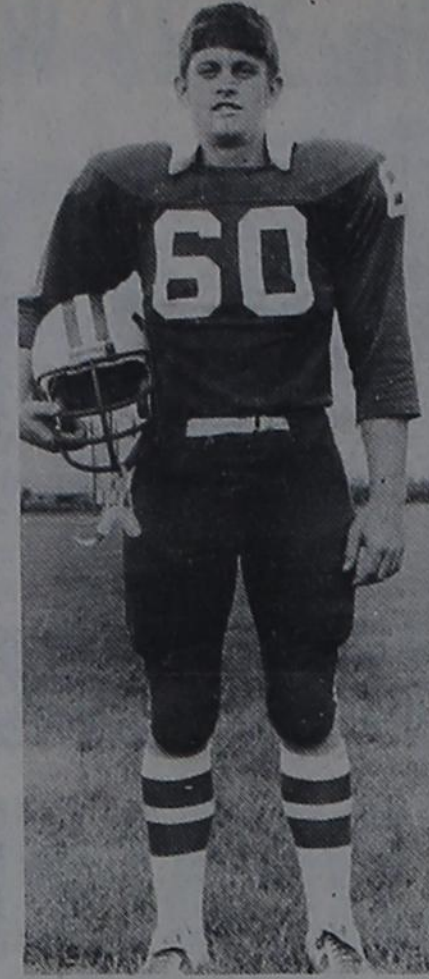

Wolverines Dominate All-State Teams

The Texico Wolverines dominated their opponents all year and now that the season is over, it seems only fitting that they also dominated the Class A Associated Press All-State teams.

Nine members of the 1979 Texico gridiron team were singled out to receive either first team, second team, or honorable mention honors.

Leading the "Mean Green" was Joe Martinez, the 6 foot, 250-pound senior who amassed a total of 75 tackles and three quarterback sacks, duplicated his 1978 effort as he was once again named to the first team offensive tackle and defensive tackle positions. Joe also received "Lineman of-the-year" in New Mexico Class A football for the second consecutive year.

James Hadley also added to Texico's cause as he gained the first team quarterback honors as well as first team free safety. Hadley, who was

an All-State wide receiver in 1978, made the transition to quarterback just this year and in doing so threw for 1,536 yards while rushing for an additional 393 yards to give him a total of 1,929 yards in total offense. Defensively, James had 41 tackles and 10 interceptions on the year.

Ron Kirby also came through with dual All-State spots as he was selected as both first team guard on offense and first team end defensively. Kirby was also selected as an All-State guard in 1978. In 1979 Ron was credited with 113 tackles including ten quarterback sacks.

Britt Crooks was selected as the All-State kicker for the second consecutive year. The 5'11", 188-pound senior was also chosen as the second team linebacker. Crooks, a three-year letterman, chalked up 139 total tackles and two interceptions during the 1979 season.

Shawn Perkins was voted to the Class A first team wide receiver position and to the

second team as a defensive cornerback. On offense Perkins caught 43 passes for 1001 yards and 23.2 yards per catch. Defensively Shawn had a total of 91 tackles and two interceptions.

Herbert Bibbs, 5'7" 140-pound junior was selected as a first team running back. Bibbs rushed for 1,938 yards and 20 touchdowns during the season and a 161 yard per game average. Herbert was the leading scorer in the entire state in all four classes with a total of 122 points.

Robert Thornton, a 5'9" 160-pound senior received second team honors as an offensive fullback and defensive back. Thornton rushed for 328 yards and a 3.4 yard average. On defense he had 103 tackles and one interception.

David Cavallero was selected as second team linebacker. David was the leading tackler for Texico for the second straight year. In 1978 Cavallero had 127 tackles and in 1979 he was credited with 143 tackles and two interceptions.

John Kelley, a 6' 180-pound junior was voted to the positions of second team defensive noseguard and honorable mention at center. Kelley tallied 83 tackles and three quarterback sacks in 1979.

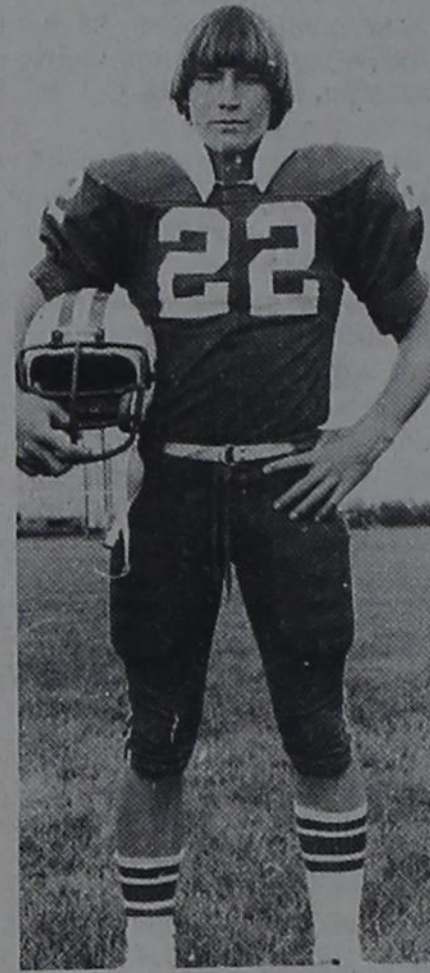

WHO CAN BE AGAINST US?

We have shown in a previous article that God is for sinners and desires their good. We have shown how He proved this by paying for their sins Himself as God the Son at Calvary. But if this is so, how much more must it be so with regard to His own children who have trusted Christ as their Savior?

How often—and how significantly—the Apostle Paul uses the words "for us" in this connection!

In Eph. 5:2 we read that "Christ... loved us, and hath given Himself for us." In Rom. 5:8 we are told that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." In II Cor. 5:21 "God hath made Him to be sin for us." And in Gal. 3:13 we read: "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us." And the love that brought Him down from heaven to die in shame and disgrace for our sins is not affected by our many failures as Christians now.

In Heb. 9:24 we read that our Lord has ascended to heaven "now to appear in the presence of God for us."

In Rom. 8:34 we learn that He is "at the right hand of God" to "make intercession for us." And in Heb. 7:25 we read that He is able to save us "unto the uttermost" because "He ever lives to make intercession for us."

Our failures now, after having trusted Christ as Savior, may—and should—trouble our conscience and thus hinder our fellowship with God. This does not change the fact that God's dear children through faith in Christ, who died for all our sins and, unworthy though we still may be, God would have us come into His presence and be spiritually renewed. Our Lord's intercession for us in time of failure is most comforting. As a boy the writer often sang an old church hymn, part of which went thus:

Five bleeding wounds He bears,
Received at Calvary,
They pour effectual prayers,
They strongly plead for me,
Forgive him, oh, forgive, they cry,
Nor let that ransomed sinner die.

"What shall we then say to these things? IF GOD BE FOR US WHO CAN BE AGAINST US?" (Rom. 8:31).
