Rose's hunting dog, Duke, like many other Parmer County residents are preparing to take their share of pheasants when the first day of hunting opens. Highlighting this year's hunt

as usual will be a pancake breakfast in the Farwell School cafeteria between 5 and 8 a.m. (CST) Saturday. Pheasant season is different this year in that it lasts almost a month.

Marked By Increase --

Pheasant Season Opens Saturday

"There are more pheasants here this year than we've ever seen before," Seth Ralston, Parmer County agricultural agent, told the Tribune during a recent interview.

"The rain we got last spring helped in providing a good pheasant hatch this year. The month-long pheasant season combined with the fact that there is little ground cover is causing some concern over the future survival of the game birds," Ralston said.

"They (game wardens) are checking people pretty closely and I've already heard of some people being fined for hunting before pheasant season begins," Ralston added.

This is the 16th year for pheasant season to be observed

in Parmer County.

The 1979 hunting season officially begins Saturday, Dec. 8, and ends on Sunday, Jan. 6, 1980 which incidentally is longer than it has been traditionally. In the past, pheasant season usually spanned three weekends.

The bag limit is the same this year - two cocks per day and four in possession at any one time. Dates of the pheasant season and the rules are set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The Game Association released more than 2,000 pheasants in Parmer County in 1962 and 1963 with the bird population steadily increasing since that time.

A hunting license or com-

bination hunting/fishing license is all that is required to hunt during pheasant season. Licenses can be obtained from the county clerk's office or Rose Drug.

Farwell, Bovina and Friona will conduct a tail feather contest with three cash prizes to be offered for the longest tail feather brought in. The hunter netting the longest tail feather in each city will receive \$15 for first place, \$10 for second place and \$5 for third place. The person bringing in the longest tail feather in Parmer County will receive a plaque courtesy of the Parmer County Game Management Association.

Farwell area hunters are to bring tail feathers to Farwell

Hardware to have them measured. Sponsoring the cash prizes are Security State Bank, first place; Sherley-Anderson-Pitman, second place; and Farwell Hardware, third.

Last year's winner of the plaque for the longest feather in Parmer County was Darrell Hawkins of Bovina with a tail feather measuring 24.25 inches, according to Ralston.

Ralston cautions hunters to obtain permission prior to hunting on private land because trespassers will be prosecuted. He added that it is illegal to kill a hen anytime. A hen is easily distinguished by her brown coloration, whereas the cock is noted for its colorful appearance.

Parmer County --

Commissioners To Appoint New County Judge Monday

At their regular meeting Monday, Dec. 10, Parmer County commissioners are scheduled to appoint a person to fill the position of county judge which will be vacated by Judge James P. Fortenberry on December 31.

"I have not received any applications from persons wishing to apply for the position of county judge yet. Anyone wanting to be considered for the position can see me and fill out an application or speak with one of the county commissioners," Fortenberry said.

Any man or woman can apply for the position which currently carries with it a yearly salary of \$13,000. Deadline for applying is 11 a.m. Monday.

"Requirements for the job are that the person be versed in the laws of the state and that he or she be elected. The person appointed by the county commissioners will serve through November 1980 at which time general elections

will be conducted and a county judge elected to serve the balance of my term, about 26 months," Fortenberry said.

"Whoever is elected to replace me this month will need to file with his political party chairman by February 1980 to be eligible to run in the May primaries for the position of county judge," he said.

"I hope to train the new person in before I leave the last of this month," the judge said.

The duties and responsibilities of county judge for Parmer County are as follows:

1. Presides as judge on criminal trials for all misdemeanors.
2. Presides as judge in civil cases where the amount sued for is under \$500.
3. Serves as probate judge and handles such items as wills that require probate.
4. Serves as juvenile judge and listens to cases involving children under 16

5. Serves as commitment judge for the purpose of institutionalizing the mentally retarded.
6. If the judge is a veteran of the military for more than four months he is a veteran service officer for the county.
7. Serves on the county commission as presiding officer.
8. Serves as the emergency welfare officer for the county.
9. Serves as "go between"

for the county and such organizations as the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Amarillo who apportion use of CETA funds.

10. Serves as liaison between the county and Mental Health & Mental Retardation organization in Plainview.

In short, the county judge is in a position to steer a county resident towards the proper agency when various needs arise, Fortenberry said.

 "Concerning the duties of county judge, for example, there are about 250 to 300 misdemeanors filed each year which the judge has the responsibility of hearing. Misdemeanors include items ranging from possession of marijuana under two ounces all the way to theft under \$200," he explained.

The three classes of misdemeanors are as follows:

Class A: Includes offenses with a penalty not to exceed a fine of \$2,000 and/or a jail term not to exceed one year.

Class B: Includes offenses with a penalty not to exceed a fine of \$1,000 and/or a jail term not to exceed six months.

Class C: Includes traffic offenses mainly with a penalty not to exceed a fine of \$200. No jail term allowable.

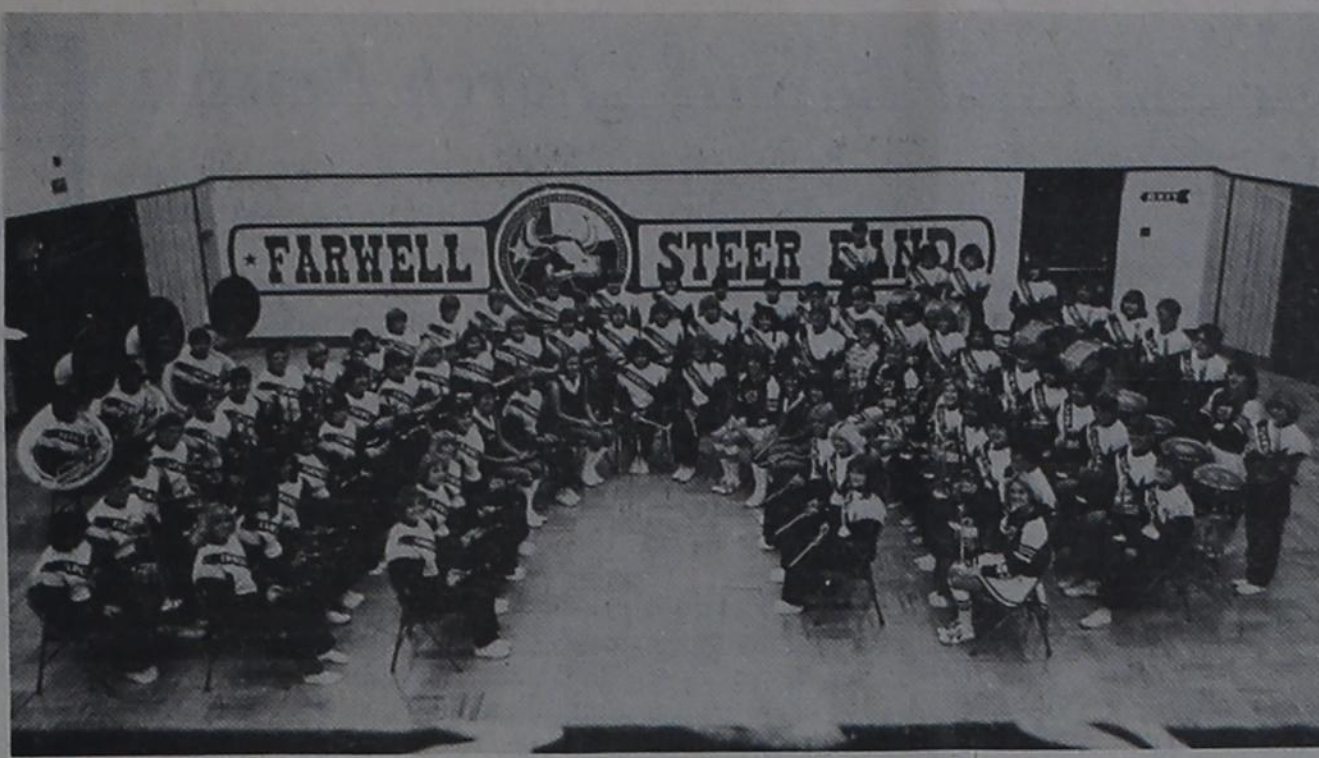

Hance Announces Opinion Poll Results

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance announced recently the results of the district-wide opinion poll conducted at the beginning of the Fall. More than 31,000 responses were received from residents of the 19th Congressional District concerning their opinions on major legislative issues. Results of the poll are being mailed to respondents this week after the tabulation process was concluded last week. "We felt we had an excellent sampling of opinion in the 19th District," said Hance. "We received a wide range of opinion on all the subjects and it helped reaffirm our beliefs about what people want their government to do."

reinforced by this opinion poll -- and that was that people are interested in their government," said Hance. "People do care about what laws are passed and how those laws will affect them." The major areas cited in the poll included inflation, energy, defense, taxes and agriculture. With the quick-changing of events on the international level in recent weeks Hance added he felt international relations would also be included if the poll were taken today. The majority of 19th District residents agreed in their opinions of most of the issues on the poll. Only in areas of military draft, gas rationing and changing the length of the President's term were opinions more evenly divided.

Please publish the following query in your journal. Thank you for your consideration. I am seeking information about the introduction of highway cattle guards onto the roads of range country. My research thus far shows that railroad cattle guards were in use as early as 1836, and that a wooden-board guard for horse-drawn vehicles was in use near Medicine Lodge, Kansas, in the 1890s. The earliest cattle guards intended for automotive traffic seem to date from Texas in 1913 and North Dakota in 1914. I would like to receive information on any cattle guard built before 1925. I would also be interested in receiving stories of readers' experiences with cattle guards, of methods used to make cattle guards work more efficiently, of other kinds of devices used to replace gates, of other names by which cattle guards are known, etc. The results of my study will be published in book form, probably in 1981. 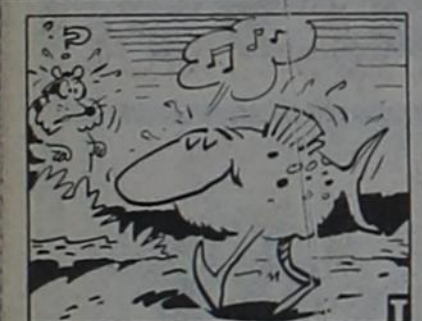

KARYN BLAIN - 5'7", senior - Karyn is a returning starter from last year. She has improved in her shooting and is a team player. She will pass the ball to someone with a

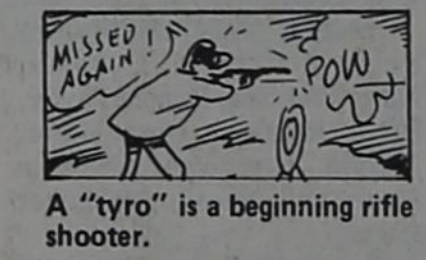
better shot. Karyn is a good hustler and a team captain.

Eight members of the Farwell Steers football squad received All-District honors in recent balloting by the District 3-A coaches. Steer coach Randy Adrian gave the following statistics and comments on the selections:

MAX LONSDALE - Max made first team all district at running back and first team all district at defensive back also. Max finished the year with 1013 yards rushing in 198 attempts for an average of 5.1 yards every time he touched the football.

Going into the last game against Vega, Max had 829 yards. It seemed almost impossible for him to reach the 1000 yard mark against a defensive team with the strength of Vega, a team that held district champion Kress to only 7 points.

During that game Max proved everyone wrong as he rushed for 184 yards putting him over the 1000 yard mark. Max scored six TD's and two 2-point conversions for a total of 40 points. He was also the leading tackler in the secondary with 87 tackles for the year. Max is a 5'8", 147 lb. senior.

JAMES CASTLEBERRY - James made first team all district at offensive receiver, and honorable mention at defensive back. On offense this year, James carried the ball 49 times for 301 yards for a 6.1 average per carry.

James was also our leading receiver with 12 receptions for

245 yards, a 20.4 yards per catch average. James scored 4 TD's for 24 points. James is a 5'8", 145 lb. senior.

BYRON MAYFIELD - Byron, a 6'1" 190 lb. junior, made first team all district at linebacker. Byron was the leading Steer tackler with 130 tackles for the year. Byron did a super job for the Steers this season at offensive tackle as well as linebacker.

You will be seeing a lot of Byron next year also as he will be one of three starting linebackers we will have back.

RICHARD CARPENTER - Richard, a 6'1" 185 lb. junior made first team all district at tight end. Richard was probably our most improved player this year starting from the time we first put on our pads.

Richard caught six passes for 87 yards for an average of 14.5 yards per catch. Richard also played defensive end and was one of our starters at that position. You will also be seeing a lot more of Richard as he is only a junior and will be returning for next year's season.

MARK OWEN - Mark received honorable mention honors for all district at two positions, quarterback and punter. Mark, a senior, completed 27 passes this year for 444 yards. Mark also carried the ball 30 times for 174 yards, a 5.8 yard per carry average. Mark was the second leading scorer for Steers with five TD's for 30 points. Mark

carried a 35 yard punting average for the season.

LEONEL JAIME - Leonel, a senior, received honorable mention honors as offensive guard. I felt this was quite an achievement for someone that only played in three district ball games. Leonel dislocated his shoulder twice during the season coming back to finish out the season both times. Leonel also played defensive tackle for the Steers. As they say, "You can't keep a good man down."

WILLIE MARTIN - Willie, a senior, received honorable mention all district honors at defensive tackle. Willie was one of the leading tacklers for the Steers this season. Willie played the first part of the season with a bad ankle. Willie also played offensive tackle, a two-way starter.

MAC LANGFORD - Mac, a 6'0" 185 lb. junior, received honorable mention all district

honors as kicker. At the beginning of the year we didn't have a kicker. I went to Mac and asked him if he would like to try to kick for us this year. For someone who had never kicked before, I'd say this was quite an accomplishment. Mac kicked 12 extra points and scored one TD for a total of 18 points. Mac was also a starter at center and one of our leading tacklers at the linebacker position. Mac is one of our top juniors so be looking for him in the limelight of our 1980 season.

this group of men on receiving their honors. Each and every one of them deserved this award. To me, each and every one of our players were all-district players.

"I would also like to thank

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CABLE TV UPDATE

We at Midwest Video are happy to have KVII-TV back on the cable. And we apologize to our viewers for any inconvenience the several changes in cable channels may have caused. We knew that you were watching us, but it is always nice to be reminded that we are an important part of our community.

We don't want our subscribers to think that our action in taking KVII off the cable was thoughtless. We did not want to take KVII-TV off the cable. We are confident that all our channels are appreciated. The decision to take it off was locally initiated, and based on several somewhat complex factors.

In April, the management of KAMC/KMCC requested protection in accordance with FCC rules against the simultaneous duplication of its programs. Midwest Video Corp. through its law firm in Washington, D.C., entered a petition for waiver of the FCC rules which require us to honor this request for protection.

We went through this same procedure several years ago when the Amarillo CBS station owned the local station, and this was finally resolved with Midwest Video providing protection from the Roswell CBS station.

When we commenced modification of the cable system to carry Pay-TV we were obliged to move KFDDA to another channel. We considered it to be in our best interest to make all imminent channel changes at one time. In light of the possible loss of most of the KVII network programs to non-duplication protection we thought that all of our subscribers would be better served with the alignment we selected.

Subsequently, we learned that we might be able to put our local weather channel on 12 and put KMCC on 6. We had long regarded 12 as not usable because of interference from the channel 12 transmitter. New equipment and some modification now makes it appear that we can use Channel 12 for our in-house weather channel.

With this change we have KVII back on the cable and can await the outcome of the case at the FCC. We know we can't please all the people all the time, but we do try.

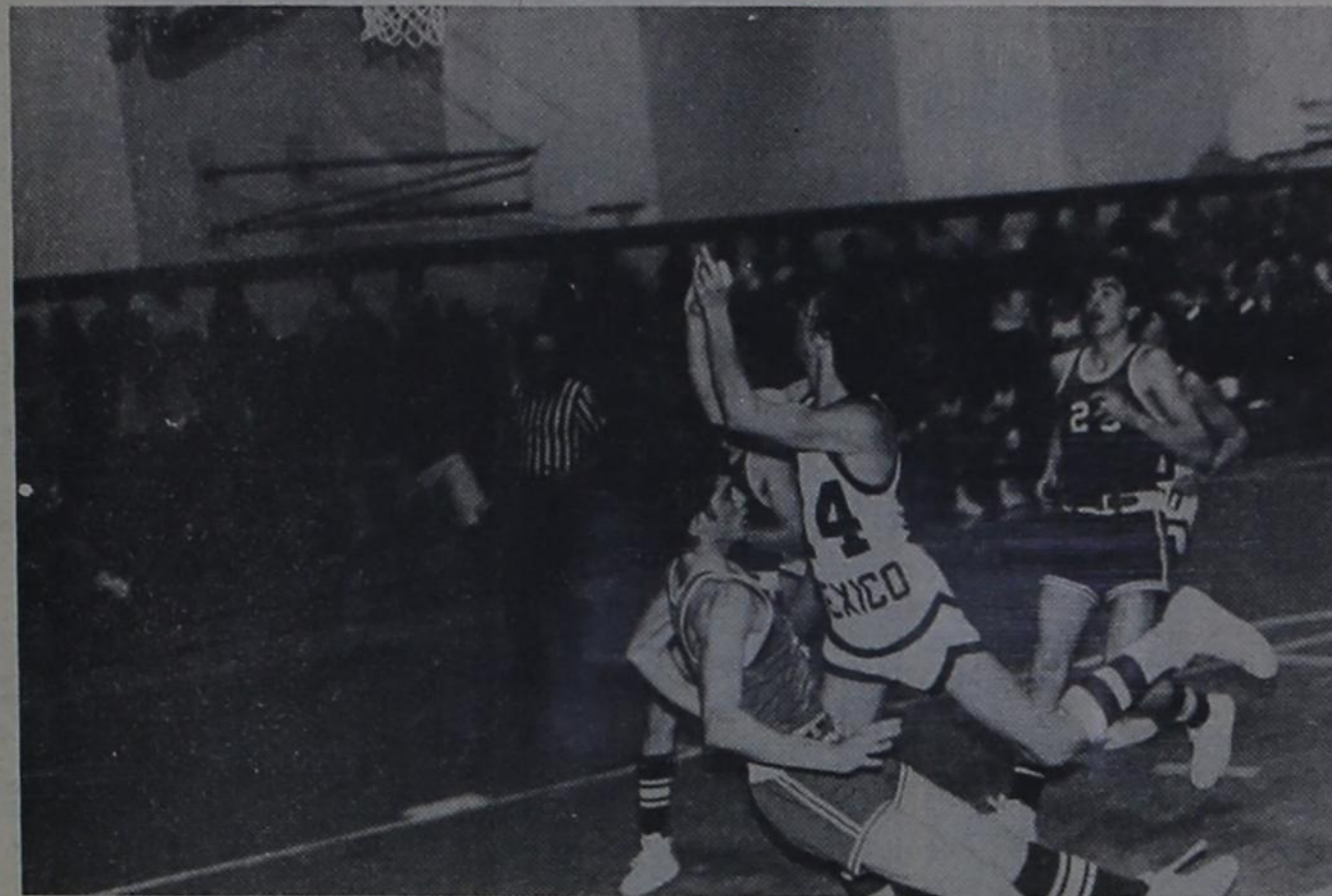

of play and the Cowboys were not able to take the lead from them throughout the game.

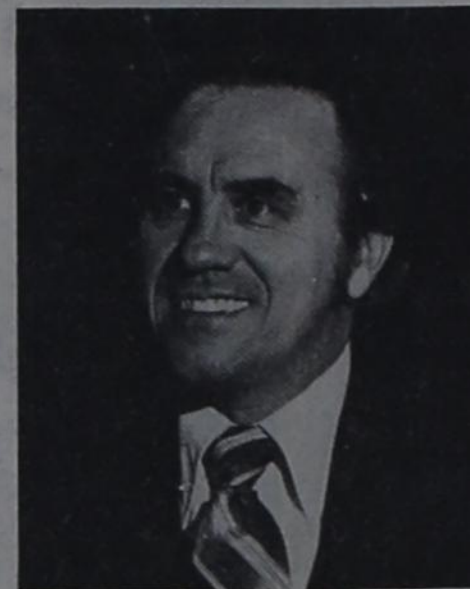

Other scorers for Farwell were Manuel Cantu with 9, Alan Eubank with 6, and Johnny Daniel and Paul Fulcher with 4 each.

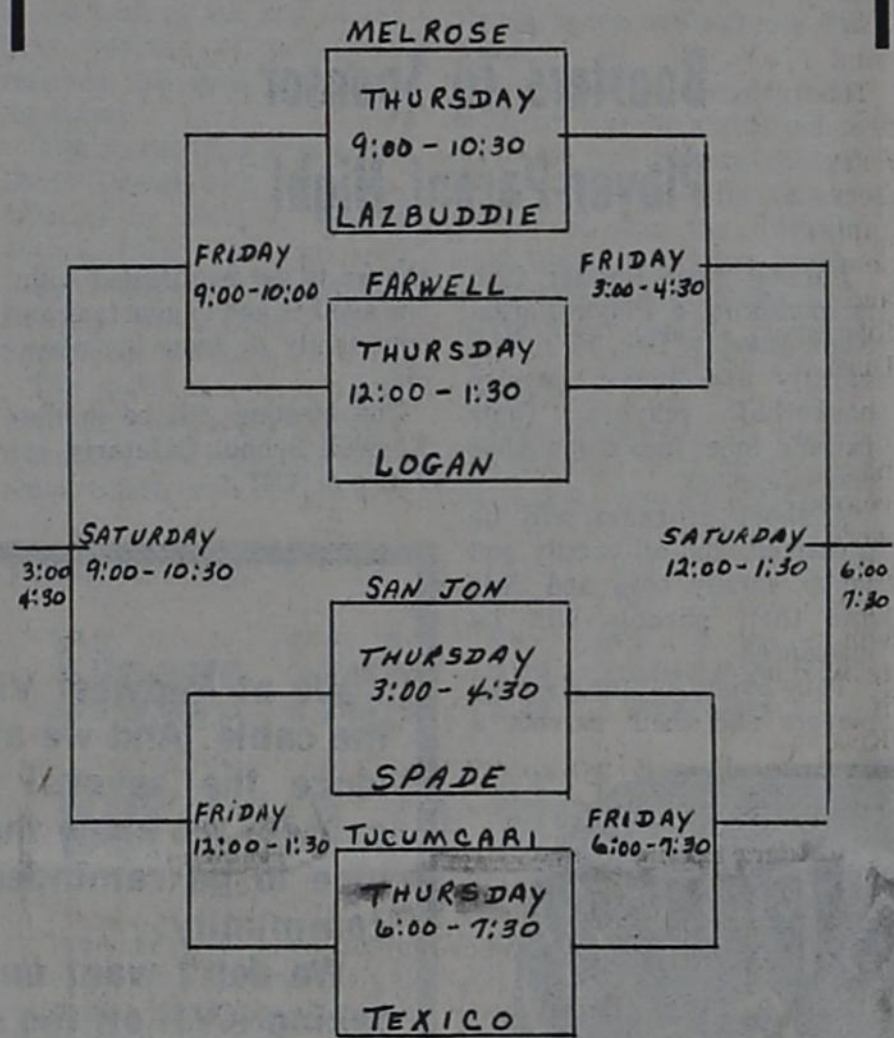
Coach Baker said the boys did an excellent job, especially in the second half of the game.

The eighth grade team will also travel to Vega to play December 10.

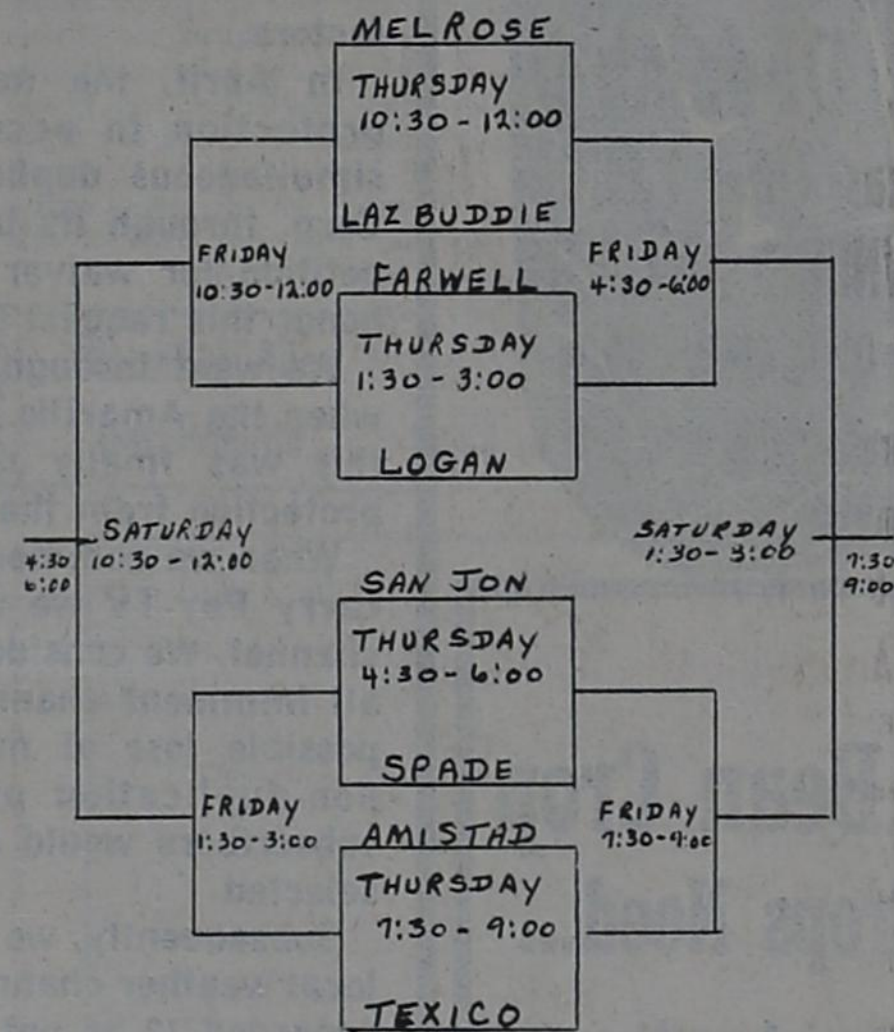

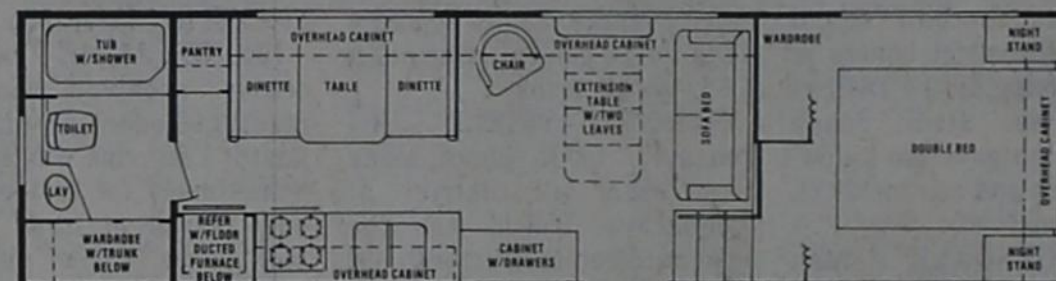


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Farwell JV Boys Fall To Muleshoe 46-64

Clothing Keeps Hunters Alive

Deer hunting season adds another threatened species to the woods, a species endangered by its own kind. Hunters, often shot by other hunters who mistake them for game, do not have to be part of this threatened species if they wear bright orange clothing, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says.

The TMA advises hunters to wear vests, hats, pants or other clothes that are the bright orange often called "blaze orange," "fluorescent orange" or "hunter orange." Deer do not notice this color since they are colorblind. But blaze orange, which is not found in nature, helps humans distinguish a hunter from a game animal.

One estimate shows this important distinction could help eliminate at least a fourth of all hunting accidents. In Texas last year firearms injured 83 people and killed 19 in hunting accidents, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department statistics show.

With that much risk around, hunters need to do as much as possible to protect themselves,

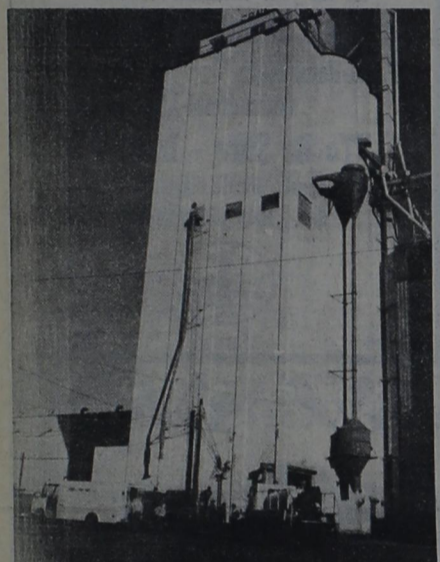
which means wearing at least 400 square inches of blaze orange clothing. Louisiana requires deer hunters using rifles to wear that much in many cases.

Texas also requires the same amount if the hunters are on state wildlife management areas. Colorado and Oklahoma have varied rules but both require 500 square inches. Check with state game and wildlife departments for full regulations.
