One of the problems in Iran is that we are facing an alien system of values. On our part we are now calling the Ayatollah a "madman." On his part he calls the United States "brainless."

From the respective standpoints each side feels theirs is the correct moral viewpoint. Our long standing problem in dealing with the Eastern mind is the concept with which we in the United States value life. We have no quarrel with the Western concept of such value. However, we do feel that this "Value of Life" in the United States has gone awry in the last 20 years or so and that to preserve our society we must reappraise our present concept.

A thoughtful article on this comes from Mike Swickard's column in the Lincoln County News. Says Publisher Swickard:

The nation that values life, will not tolerate the crime of murder. The nation that values life uses the death penalty to insure the value of life.

The nation that does not value life will allow murder to go unpunished.

Alas, we are the second. We allow our justice to be tempered by laws and rules that are harder on the lawmen than on the criminals.

It is my suggestion that if evidence shows that a criminal is insane, why that is normal. What I mean is that to commit a crime is an insane act. To murder, rape, or shoot someone is not what I would call a rational act, hence the person is insane. But one thing is missing.

My uncle always says, "I pays for what I breaks."

This must sooner or later be done to the criminal justice system. People have to pay for what they do. Right now, that is not the case.

We have had two executions of criminals in the last ten years, how many murders have we had?

We have a problem in this country. Do you remember the kid in school that always had an excuse for whatever happened. He always came up with an excuse for whatever happened. He always came up with an excuse for why he couldn't do something. The more you found ways of taking care of his excuses, he found more excuses.

We Americans have allowed a minority of lawyers and humanitarians to change our basic lifestyle. We are no longer able to deal with criminals because these humanitarians and lawyers have come up with excuses for every sort of crime.

The two biggies of the excuses are, insanity and technicality.

Now to my way of thinking that if you commit a felony, you must be insane, most of us would not usually consider doing a crime.

So I believe criminals are insane to begin with.

And technicalities play a big role in convictions. Everyone in the courtroom knows that the party is guilty, but due to some technicality the guilty go free.

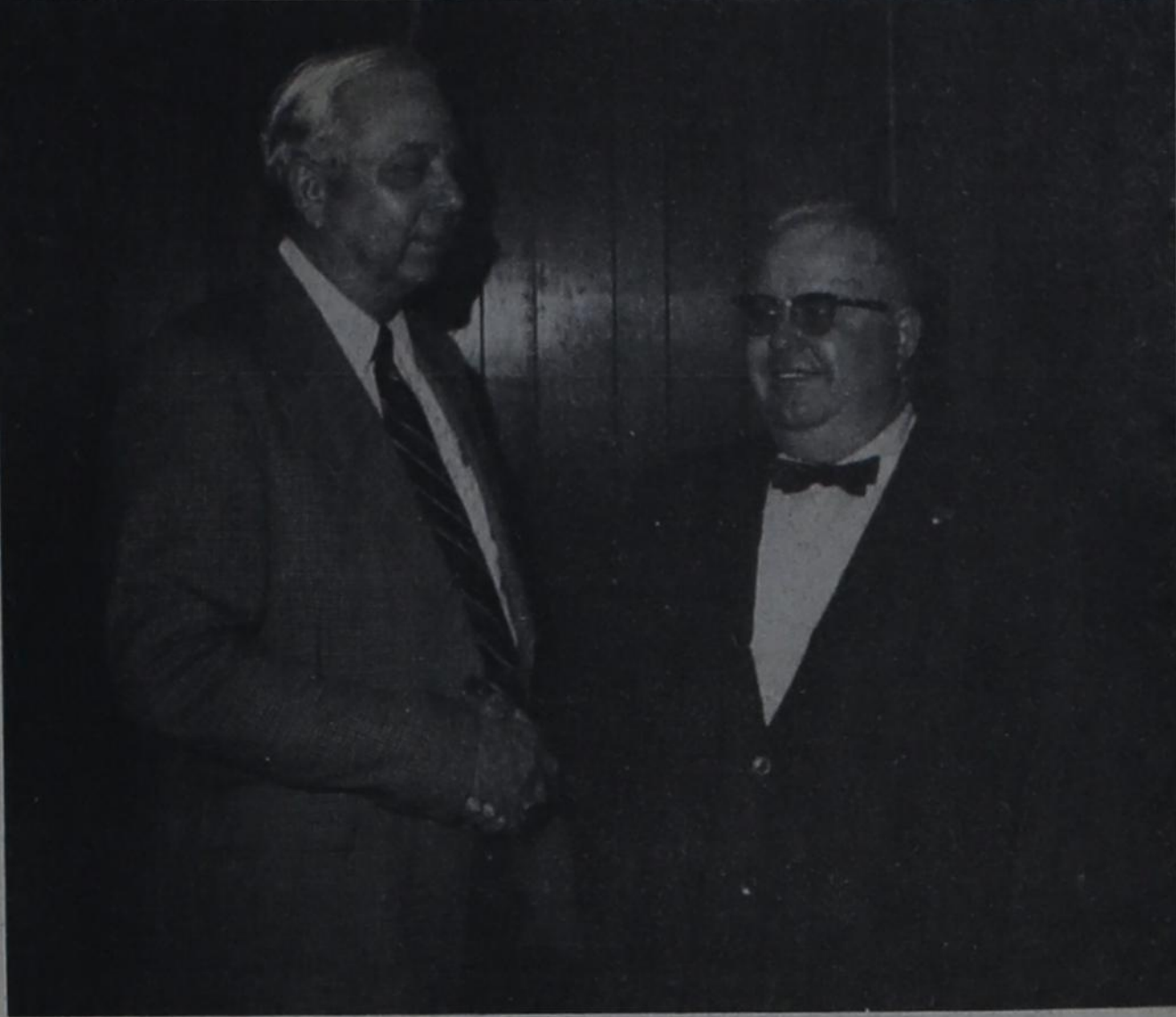
This is not in keeping with the "I pays for what I breaks" theory.

If a man is known guilty, but the method of catching him is wrong, that is no reason to let him go. You need to punish him for his action, and then punish the other party for breaking the law in the method of catching the wrong-doing.

If a man is sane enough to walk around free, he is sane enough to face the music for what he does.

And in keeping with the pays theory, we need in this country a cruel and unusual punishment for some of our cruel and unusual crimes.

Purchase Of Farwell System --

E.N.M.R., Ma Bell Reach Agreement

"We have a tentative agreement to purchase the existing cable, key systems, poles and other equipment in Farwell from Mountain Bell," Robert Harris, a representative of Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative (E.N.M.R.), told the Tribune during a recent telephone interview.

"Although a tentative agreement has been reached to purchase Mountain Bell in Farwell, we are waiting for approval of our application by the Rural Electrification Administration and for the final paperwork from the Texas Public Utility Commission," Harris added.

"In our application we have proposed that there be no increase and in some instances the monthly telephone bill will be lower. For example, installation of a phone in a home or a business will be \$12.50 and I'd doubt that a business could beat that price anywhere," he said.

Because there is no central office or switching equipment in Farwell, E.N.M.R. plans to construct a building here at a cost of between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Installation and purchase of switching equipment would run in the neighborhood of \$300,000, while clean up around the plant, replacing and burying cables would cost approximately a half million dollars, Harris pointed out.

"We plan to be a part of the community, consequently we will establish an account with a bank in Farwell and continue to patronize that bank. We would transfer a combination man to work out of the telephone station in Farwell and he would be able to perform all necessary duties such as installation, repairs and extensions," he explained.

"There will not be a person in the telephone office to be constructed in Farwell to accept phone bill payments,

but arrangements would probably be made with a local bank so that our customers could deposit their bills with it," he said.

The equipment to be installed in the office will have the capability of offering several conveniences to telephone customers. Some of these features are as follows:

1. CALL WAITING FEATURE - With this system, if you are talking with someone on the phone a beeping sound is transmitted through the ear-piece if someone else is trying to call you.
2. CALL FORWARDING FEATURE - This feature enables the customer to dial a code via his telephone which will transfer all incoming phone calls to another phone number at a place where he could be located.

A Meaningful Tradition --

Oklahoma Lane Community Sets 63rd Annual Christmas Tree

This Christmas season will be no different for Oklahoma Lane residents as they prepare for their annual Christmas Tree celebration. As in years past the community will gather for a program which will be presented by various members of the community. There will be the traditional tree and Santa will be there with treats and gifts for everyone.

And, of course, the oneness of spirit for the residents of this unique little community will prevail as in years past. The 63rd annual celebration will take place on Christmas eve night at 7:30 in the Community Center.

Oklahoma Lane, Texas, named for scores of settlers who moved in from Oklahoma many years ago is a small community east of Farwell that has a closeness among its residents that distinguishes it from any other part of the country.

Although the school consolidated with Farwell and Bovina in 1949, there are two fine churches and a spirit of oneness among those who still live there.

Oklahoma Lane's most colorful tradition is still very much

alive. It is the annual Christmas Tree which on the 24th of this month will be observed for the 63rd time.

The Christmas Tree has been traditional ever since 1916, and since there is no school now, alternates between the Baptist and Methodist church buildings. It amounts to a "home-coming" for Oklahoma Laners. The religious aspects of Christmas are stressed at the celebration and programs are presented from members of each of the churches. Funds for the tree, its decorations and treats are raised by donations.

Several years ago residents of Oklahoma Lane pieced together the history of the tradition. Mr. and Mrs. E.W. McGuire, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Christian, Vashti Fowler and Avis Carpenter, along with others, came up with the following rendition of the Christmas tree story some 20 or more years ago.

The first community Christmas Tree celebration was in the home of John Schriber. The date was December 24, 1916. Because neighbors were few and far between and

communication slow, only four families were present.

Old settlers questioned did not recall a similar celebration in 1917, but a party was planned for 1918. However, a flu epidemic and heavy snows cancelled the plans. By that time World War I was coming to an end and new families were beginning to drift into the area.

In 1919 the Christmas Tree was in the old Knox school. This is the year, as the old settlers recalled, that a peach tree was used instead of a traditional Christmas cedar. Green crepe paper was tightly wrapped around each limb so

Parmer County Commissioners Court appointed Porter Roberts of Friona to replace Judge Paul Fortenberry as county judge effective January 1, 1980. The appointment was made during the regular commissioners court meeting in Farwell, Monday, Dec. 10.

"It was a real hard decision as far as deciding who to appoint as county judge," Fortenberry, who as county judge presides over the commissioners court, said prior to announcing Roberts as the person selected by the court for the position.

Three other persons were considered for the position. They were Mrs. Elsie Jo Buchanan of Friona, Gil Patschke and Albert Smith, both of Farwell.

Fortenberry's resignation which takes effect at the end of December necessitated appointing an interim county

judge until the general election in November, 1980. At this time a judge will be elected by the voters of Parmer County.

In November Roberts and anyone else who is interested in the position can put his or her name on the docket and run for the position of county judge with the winner serving the remainder of Judge Fortenberry's term.

"Yes, I'm planning on running for the office of county judge come November and I hope that I win," Roberts said.

"I think it will be a challenge to serve as county judge and I'm looking forward to it because it is interesting to interpret the law in such a way that everybody is treated fairly," he said.

"I enjoy working with people and look at this appointment as my way of helping the

community to run a little smoother. I received some orientation to Texas laws during my work as a tax assessor-collector for the Friona Independent School District and given some instruction I feel I can perform the duties of the county judge in a very satisfactory manner," Roberts added.

Roberts will assume the interim position of county judge January 1, 1980.

He was born in Alluwe, Nowata County, Okla., on November 4, 1923. He has lived in Friona since March 1960. He resides there at 1208 Virginia with his wife, Jean, and has a daughter, Patricia, who lives in Houston, and a son, Mike of Childress.

Roberts' past work experience includes a number of positions such as a draftsman for Southwestern Public Service Company at Levelland,

for Service Pipeline Company at Levelland, and for the Gary Cook Oil Company, Inc., in Friona.

Roberts' education consists of three years of undergraduate study with a major in business administration at East Central State College in Ada, Okla.

He is a member of the Friona Lions Club (evening), a member of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department, director of the Hi-Plains Eye Bank, member of the First Baptist Church of Friona, member of the American Legion Post #206 of Friona, and is part-time manager of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Texico Volunteer Deputy Gets Tentative Approval

The Texico City Council gave tentative approval at their meeting Tuesday, Dec. 11, to allow a Texico man to serve in the unpaid capacity of deputy marshal.

Dave Panter of Texico was approved as deputy marshal by the council unanimously and will begin riding with Marshal Mickey Fenn on a part-time basis. Panter will volunteer some of his time for this work, but will not be put

on the city's payroll.

Permanent approval is pending further review of Panter's qualifications by the city council.

In other business, the council voted unanimously to update Ordinance #127 to cover any new laws passed by the state legislature. It was indicated that the city's attorney would be consulted concerning this matter and compliance to it. Also passed by the council

was adoption of the New Mexico Municipal League Manual for police departments. The city's bills were approved for payment as was the judge's report.

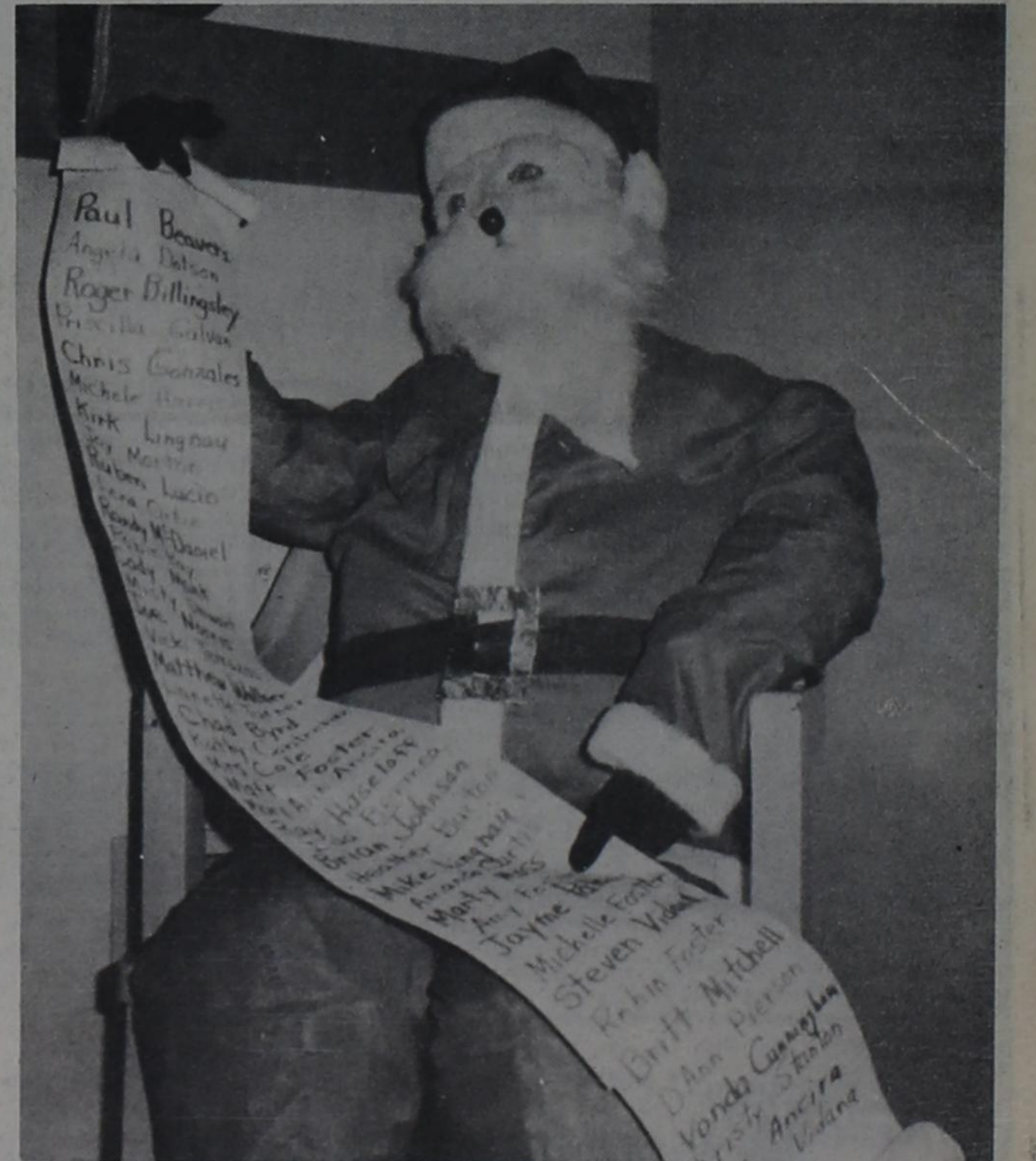

Mrs. Schwarz was born February 13, 1929 in Dobie Springs, Tex., and came to Texico from Stevens, Ark.,


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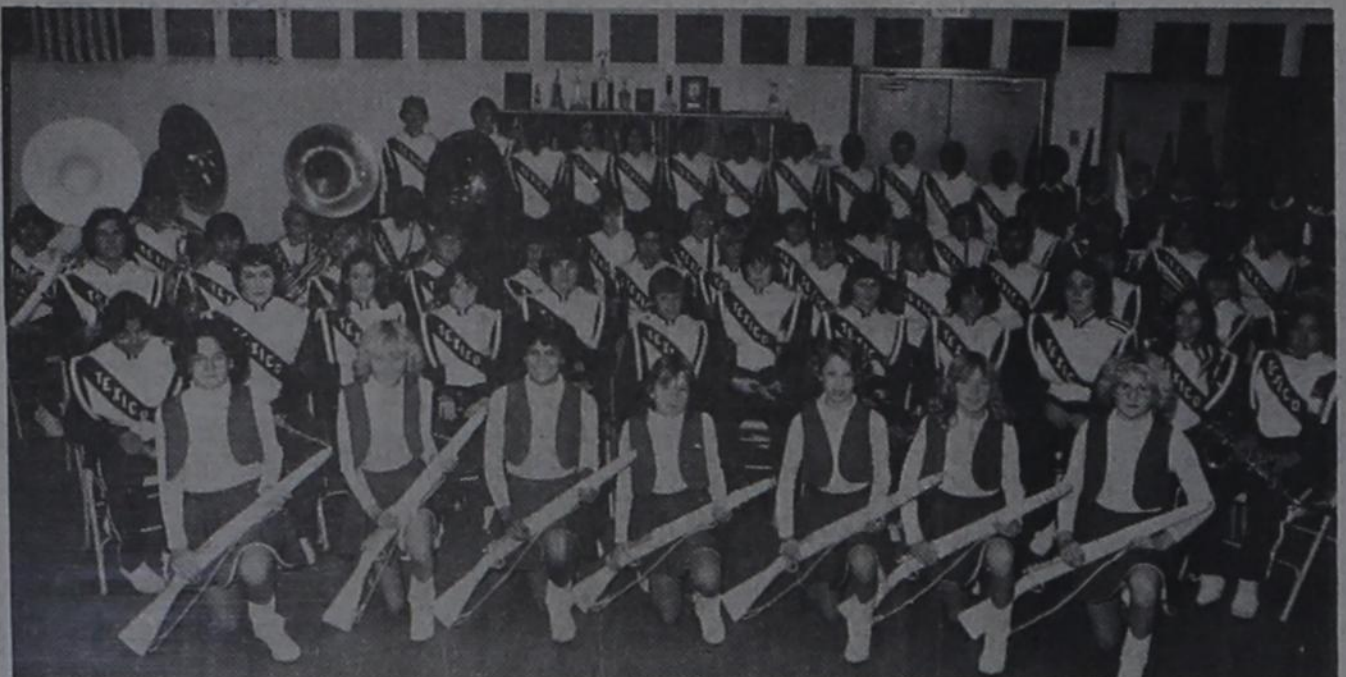
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Texico Concert Band

FEATURE - This feature would enable five or six people to all remain on the same telephone line and thus conduct a conference on the phone.

"Although the equipment would have the capability to provide these functions and features, we will need to see what the marketing demand will be for them in the area," Harris said.

"Also, because of the hour's difference in Farwell and New Mexico we would put 806 as the area code and directing the calls back to Amarillo," he added.

He explained that after implementation of this new equipment that there would no longer be a backlog of phone calls which usually results in a situation where all circuits are flooded inconveniencing the customer.

"The local calling pattern will remain the same, and what has been considered a local call (for example: to Clovis, Texico, and Ranchvale) will continue to be so and those calls that have been considered long distance from Farwell will also remain in that category," Harris said.

"We use a flat rate, not a mileage one, for charging our customers. For example, it would be \$13 a month for a one party line regardless of the mileage involved. This will lower phone bills for some rural users," he noted.

E.N.M.R. is a cooperative and thus all persons who have telephone service from them are members of the cooperative. Currently it serves about one quarter of the state of New Mexico.

"One change will be that Texico and Farwell will have separate pages of their own in the telephone book after we come in, but everyone will keep the same telephone they currently have," Harris said.

"You shouldn't be able to know the difference after we switch from Mountain Bell to E.N.M.R. except that the dial tone will sound a little different," he pointed out.

"We're not trying to build an empire or take over anything. Mountain Bell wanted to sell their Farwell system to us. It was their only one in Texas. We are already licensed in the

In 1921 a real cedar tree was furnished by some of the local men who cut it and brought it in from the breaks. The celebration was at the Methodist church.

Another big snowstorm covered the High Plains in 1922 and prevented a trip to the breaks for a cedar tree so the old peach tree covered with crepe paper was again put in use.

The next year residents brought a tree in before the big snow and Christmas shopping trips were made with wagons and teams, but the annual celebration went on as scheduled in spite of the bad weather.

In 1924 a traveling Christmas tree salesman came through Farwell with a giant tree he intended to cut up into several smaller trees. Carl Fowler happened to see him before he cut it up and bid on the tree. The salesman was happy to take the bid and Carl took the tree to Oklahoma Lane.

The ever-faithful peach tree was again used in 1925 when another storm hit the area. Residents had to come to the celebration in wagons, but come they did. Many of the people heated bricks to keep their feet warm in order to make it to the school house that night.

Many new settlers moved to the area in 1926 but the depression of the 30's saw many families become discouraged and move on. A church and Union Sunday School was in operation in the old school house for several years. The old Methodist Church was built in 1928 and the old Baptist Church was built in 1935.

On Monday, Dec. 10, a spokesman for Texico High School reported the breaking

and entering of this school to the sheriff's office.

Officials at the Bovina school system reported the burglary of its bus barn to the sheriff's office on Monday, Dec. 10. Sheriff's reports indicate that a number of hand tools were stolen.

A spokesman for Lazbuddie School reported the breaking

and entering of this school to the sheriff's office on Thursday, Dec. 6. Reports indicate that someone broke into the principal's and superintendent's offices. According to Sheriff Lovelace, the suspect(s) stole an undetermined amount of money from the principal's office, but did not break into the floor safe in the superintendent's office. Farwell Board Authorizes Loan

GRANNY'S SUGAR COOKIES

Cream together:
 1/2 cup butter
 1 cup sugar
 Blend in:
 1 medium whole egg or
 2 small egg yolks
 Sift together and add to mixture:
 1/2 tsp. salt
 2 tsp. baking powder
 2 cups sifted flour
 Blend into mixture:
 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Cut with cookie cutters and bake on lightly greased cookie sheet in 400 degree preheated oven for 8 to 10 minutes. Best to refrigerate dough first.

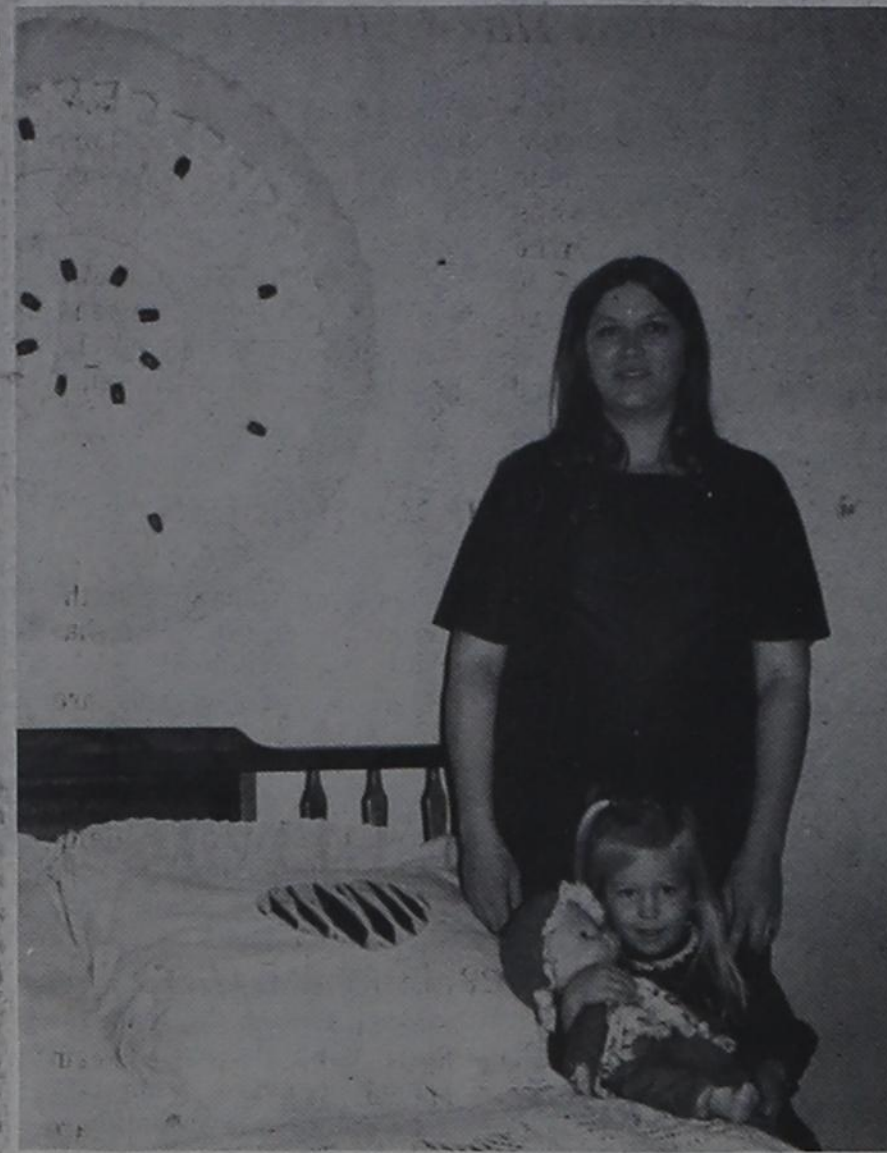
DECORATOR ICING

Cream together:
 1 cup Crisco shortening
 3/4 cup (minus 2 Tbsp.) water
 Add:
 3/4 cup sifted flour
 1 tsp. vanilla

Blend in:
 2 lbs. confectioners sugar (slowly)
 Blend until shine is gone. Color and decorate.

Sift sugar and spices three times. Spread half of mixture 1/4 inch thick on baking sheet. Beat egg white, honey and salt until mixed, but not foamy. Add nuts and stir until well coated. Place nuts on sugar mixture one at a time; cover with remaining sugar mixture. Set in another pan; bake at 225 degrees for 1 hour and 30 minutes. Remove nuts; brush off excess sugar. Cool and store in covered jar. Yield: 1 pound.

 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
 1 Tbsp. minced onion
 1/2 cup sour cream
 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese
 1 Tbsp. parsley flakes

Conventional method: Cut beef into small pieces. Boil in water 4 minutes. Drain and add all remaining ingredients. Stir and beat in sauce pan over low heat until warm.

Microwave Method: Cut beef into small pieces. Combine beef and water in 4 cup glass measure. Microwave 4 minutes, drain well. Mix in remaining ingredients. Microwave 4-5 minutes or until hot, stirring once. Serve with crackers, vegetable dippers or chunks of french bread.

 4 cups pecans, chopped
 1/2 oz. almond flavoring
 1/2 oz. pure vanilla

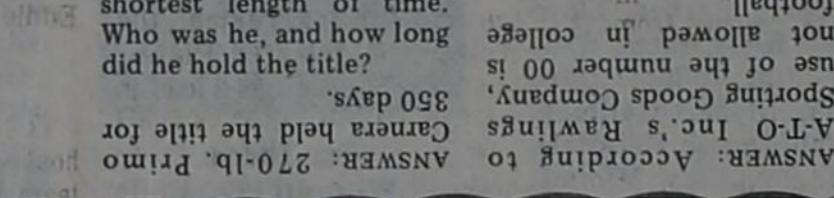

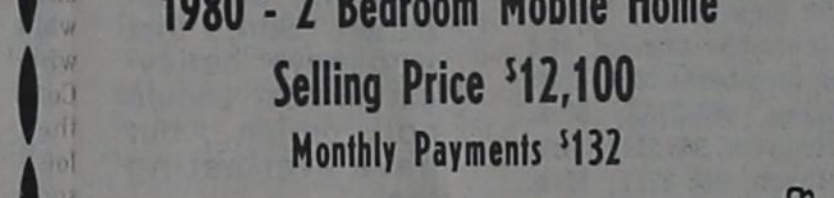

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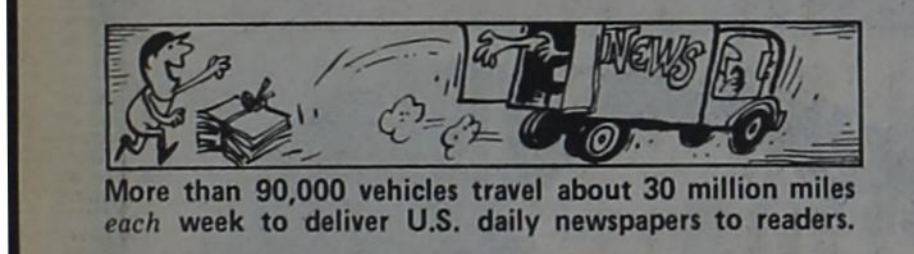

TIPS FOR HOMEOWNERS

Winter Days: Time For The Yard And Garden

The weeks of winter are "nature's time" for planting shade and flowering trees, for putting in perennial root-type plants, for moving rose bushes if you wish, and for doing all sorts of other things in the yard.



That's the advice given from the Green Survival professionals in the American Association of Nurserymen. They list a number of reasons for their recommendation.

Living plants during winter periods establish root systems for a hardy spring. At times when the growing is mostly in the root system, not above ground, maintenance requirements are at a minimum.

Homeowners who enjoy doing things in the yard can use winter months to expand their time for yard activities, rather than concentrating them all in the spring.

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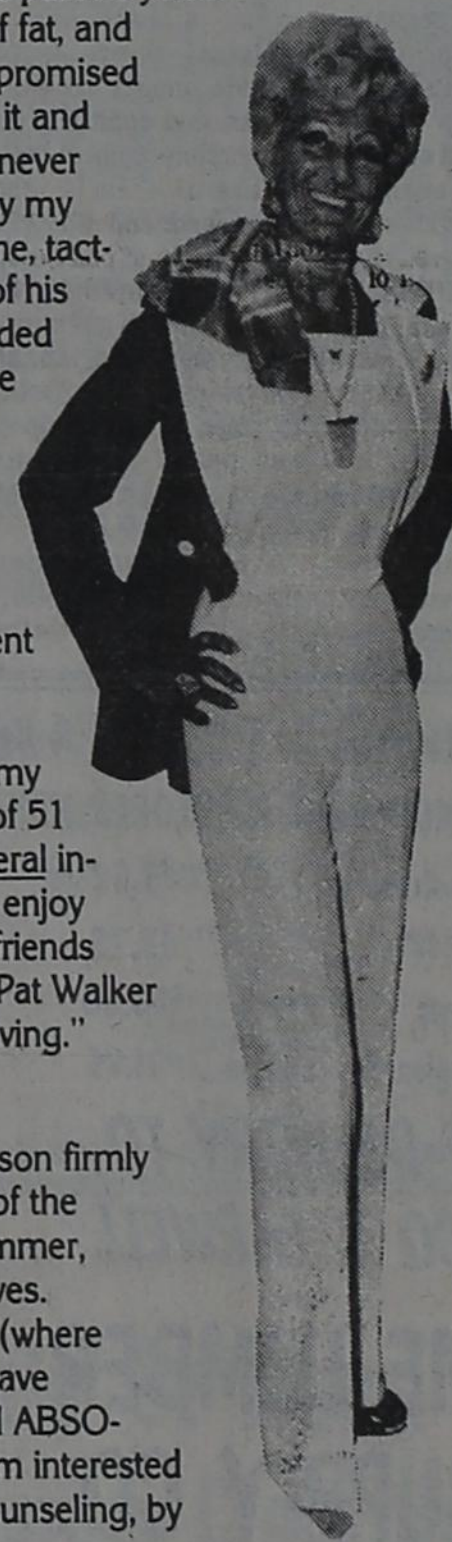
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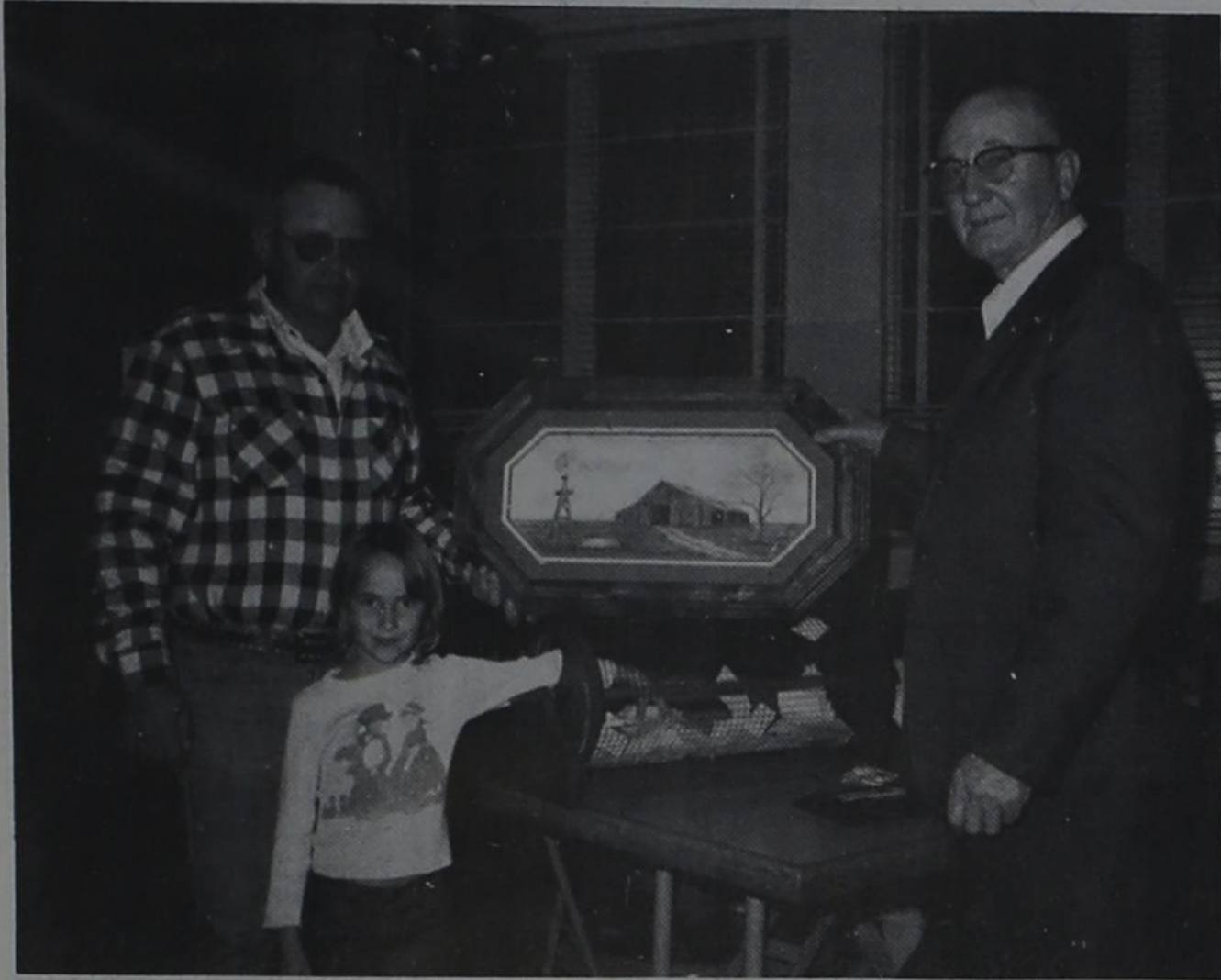

Texico School Board To Purchase Equipment

At its Tuesday meeting Texico School Board passed several motions which will result in new items and equipment being purchased for the school system. The board approved a motion to apply for Title IV Part B funding to purchase a piano for the music department and a small computer for the math and special education departments. Also approved was a bid by Sol Frank of San Antonio for 12 band uniforms at \$261.75 each. The board voted to approve the purchase of two 1980 model

school buses to replace two 1971 model buses. Funds for their purchase will be forthcoming from the state, according to Jim Pierce, school superintendent. In other business, the school board voted to hire Janice Jenkins to fill the position of kindergarten teacher. Her appointment will be effective January 10, 1980. A policy for staff professional and personal leave was adopted with the following guidelines put into effect: PROFESSIONAL: Two days per year will be provided for

this purpose, and the school system will pay the substitute's salary. A written request submitted in advance is required. Permission is subject to the superintendent's approval. The individual's pay will not be docked. PERSONAL: A written request submitted to the principal is required and a full day's pay will be docked for each day absent. Permission is granted, subject to approval of the superintendent. The school system will pay for the substitute's salary. The board also adopted a

new nondiscriminatory policy which in essence states, "The Texico Board of Education will not discriminate against otherwise qualified handicapped persons solely by reason of their handicap, nor will they be excluded from participating in any activities or programs." The sum of school bus liability insurance was voted to be increased by the board in order to comply with state laws. It was approved that when a school employee is called to serve on the grand jury that the school system pay the difference between what their jury pay is and what their pay as a school employee is.

Texico Chamber Hears Report

During the Monday meeting of the Texico Chamber of Commerce A.D. McDonald reported on the work of the Seven County Task Force which serves to represent retired persons over the age of 55 and their interests. McDonald, who is the chamber's representative on the task force, indicated that the task force would have a lobbyist to represent them at the legislature in Santa Fe. The lobbyist and members of the task force donate their time as there are no funds for expenses at the present time, according to Louise Engram, chamber secretary. In other business discussed by the chamber it was mentioned that water drainage problems in Texico need to be corrected before paving work begins in about a year. No resolutions were made. Marie Christian, a visitor to the chamber meeting, reported that the K.K. Runnell's Park would be receiving four new spring-type animals and a "whirl" fairly soon and also that a Geobesice Climber (a

balloon-shaped structure for climbing) and a slide are expected to be here in the near future. The chamber decided to keep the idea of obtaining picnic tables for the park under consideration. Chamber members also decided to begin making definite plans in February for the upcoming chamber banquet.

It was noted that chamber dues are due in January 1980 and that anyone interested in joining may contact the chamber president, Bill Christian, or any chamber member. 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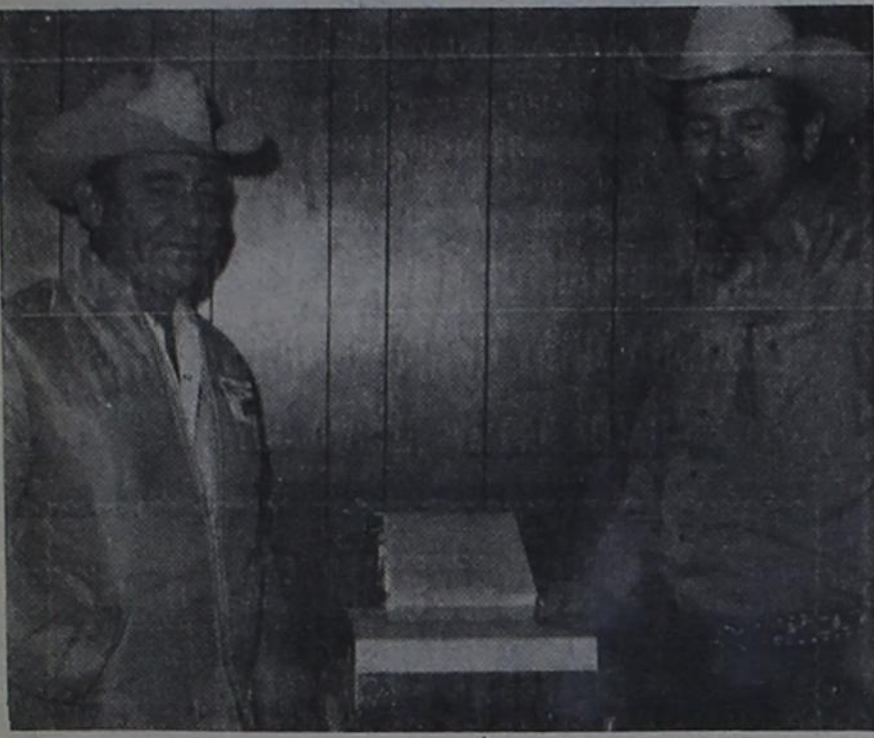

He will conduct himself as a servant of God and will trust God to use him for His glory.
