While at the same time the elevators are paying extraordinarily high interest rates on the money they borrowed to purchase that

This combination may soon drive many elevators out of business. As with any business, competition makes for better deals to the public. In this case our local area has enjoyed higher markets than other places simply because more elevators were bidding for the

The upper limits of coverage permit 20 percent more protection for corn and 40 percent more protection for soybeans than was available a year ago, the FCIC says. By selecting and paying for less than the maximum coverage, however, a farmer can now purchase guaranteed and how much he insurance to cover specific financial obligations.

> "For example," Johnson points out, "a policyholder may want to carry only enough insurance to guarantee the repayment of his current production loans plus interest. Or he may want insurance to cover all his debt repayment obligations for the year. Or if he is cash renting land, he may want insurance equal to his rent payments. The point is that the policies this year give him the flexibility to buy the level of insurance protection that he decides he wants.'

Johnson urges that all Parmer County farmers take the time to find out what protection is available to them on their 1980 crops and what it would cost. "With production costs and interest rates now at the highest levels in history, an uninsured crop disaster could have a devastating financial impact for most farmers," he

brucellosis eradication for US-DA's Animal and Plant Inspection Service, said the proposal would put indemnity payments on a sliding scale that would change according to the current market prices of replacement animals.

"This would greatly reduce the possibility of farmers or cattlemen receiving much less in total compensation than the replacement costs," he said.

Becton noted that the proposal is based on recommendations of the Brucellosis Technical Commission. These recommendations were also endorsed by the U.S. Animal Health Association, representing state animal health agencies and the livestock industry

Cattle that react to brucellosis blood tests must be branded with the letter "B" and sold to slaughter within 15 days. In addition to the slaughter price. owners currently can receive federal indemnity payments up to the following fixed rates: \$250 for registered cattle, \$150 for grade dairy cattle, and \$50 for grade beef animals. 

HOW TO TAKE A SOIL SAMPLE ... STEP BY STEP

Taking a soil sample is not a difficult or complicated job if a few basic "do's and don'ts" are followed. Soil tests can be "Market prices are subject only as accurate as the samples on which they are made. Proper collection of soil samples is extremely important. Chemical tests of poorly taken samples may be actually misleading.

Here are three basic steps in the selection of site and actually taking the sample:

1. Take one soil sample from the lawn and one from the

2. The sample should be taken from over all the area. This can be done by taking a small amount of soil from 5 to 10 different places. Place these in a clean container (plastic bucket, paper sack, etc.). Mix thoroughly and take approxi-

3. When taking the small views, or comments. These samples, use a spade, soil should be sent to the Deputy auger or soil sampling tube. Scrape the litter from the surface. To use an auger or tube, make the boring six inches deep in the soil. To use

a spade, dig a V-shaped hole and take a one-half inch slice of soil from the smooth side of the hole. Repeat in 5 to 10

different places. When the sample has been placed in the sample box, the box should be numbered to correspond with the number on the soil sampling sheet. Be sure to keep a record of sample numbers and where they were taken.

The sample, along with the information sheet, should be mailed to the Soil Testing Lab, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Route 3, Box 213AA, Lubbock, Texas 79401.

A few precautions are important in taking the sample:

1. Avoid sampling spots such as small gullies, slight field depressions, and unusual spots. 2. Do not use old vegetable cans, match boxes, etc. to

submit samples. 3. Do not use heat to dry

4. Be sure to keep a record for yourself as to the area represented by each sample.

5. Be sure sample numbers on the boxes correspond with sample numbers on the information sheet
