More Burglaries Occur

Two additional burglaries have been reported to Parmer County Sheriff's Department since last week, according to Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

In the first occurrence, Mike Chaney of Chaney Fertilizer, located four miles east of Friona on Highway 60, reported that a new small safe was taken from the office and that a three-inch centrifugal pump was taken from the back of a pickup which was parked outside of the building. Approximate value of the items stolen was listed as \$639.

Twin City Machine Works of Farwell was broken into sometime during the night prior to March 6. The break-in was reported to the sheriff's department by Vane Doshier on March 6.

Taken in that robbery was an electric drill and accessories, an extension cord, and brass bushings for an irrigation well shaft. Approximate value of the items was reported at \$684.

Lovelace stated that apparently entry was made into the building by slipping a pipe through the door and door facing, thereby knocking a board out of slots on each side.

"I believe that there were three people involved in the break-in," stated Lovelace. "All the evidence points to that. The burglars were evidently not acquainted with the building or surroundings. There were tire tracks and foot prints all around the place,

leading me to think that they had to look around to find something to steal," he added.

Lovelace made the statement that evidence shows that the persons involved in the Farwell robbery are the same ones who hit Gregory Produce of Lariat three times last week, taking valuables with them each time they broke in. "There is just too much evidence pointing to that conclusion to ignore it," Lovelace commented.

Open bids for insurance coverage on the elementary school was received by the Burns Agency of Clovis.

The Open Meeting Law was adopted by the board as required yearly to create legality for the meetings.

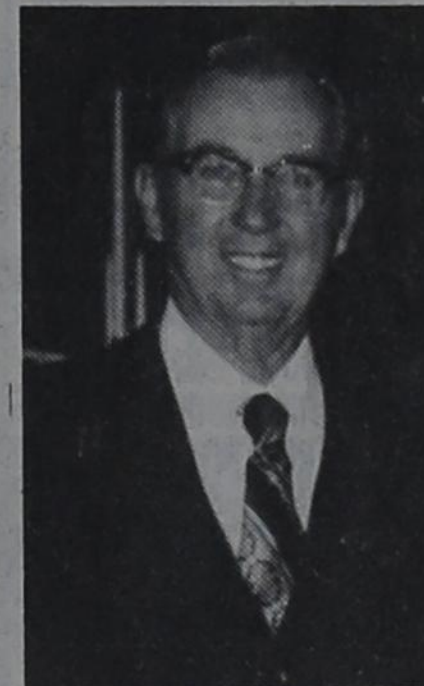
A resolution to adopt a three percent increase in salaries for a cost of living increase was approved by the board.

An increased budget of \$38,469 above yearly budget was requested by the board to the State Department of Finance. Reasons for the request was from having more students in school this year than had been projected and from investments drawing more interest than had been anticipated.

The District School Board meeting, which will be held on April 15 at 6:30 p.m. (MST) in the Texico High School Cafeteria, was discussed by board members.

The budget for 1980-81 was worked on by the group, and work on it will continue in a special meeting by the board on March 25 at 7 p.m.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday morning, Mar. 11, at First Baptist Church of Farwell for Joe Willis Magness, 66, longtime resident of Farwell. Mr. Magness died early Saturday afternoon at Farwell Convalescent Center.

Interment was in Sunset Terrace Memorial Gardens at Farwell with Steed-Todd Funeral Home of Clovis in charge.

Officiating at final rites were Rev. W.T. Perry, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Jai, N.M.; Rev. Dudley Bristow, pastor of First Baptist Church, Farwell; and Rev. Duane Knowlton, pastor of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

Pallbearers were Clark Billingsley, Carl Davis, A.T. Watts, Joel White, Jimmy Curtis and Gerald Curtis.

Mr. Magness was born August 8, 1913, in Vernon, Tex., and moved at an early age to Happy where he attended school until a young man. He then moved to the Rio Grande Valley where he was married to Flora Mae Wortham on December 13, 1933. In 1934 they moved to Farwell where he started farming. He continued to farm southeast of Farwell until 1974 when he suffered a heart attack and was forced to retire from active farm operations.

He became ill again in June of 1979 and had been a patient at Farwell Convalescent Center since January 10. Mr. Magness was a Baptist and had served as a school trustee for Farwell Schools while his

children were growing up.

Survivors include his wife, Mae of the home; two sons, Ted of Farwell and Fred of Ventura, Calif.; one daughter, Jo Elaine Lackey of Amarillo; eight grandchildren; three brothers, W.T. Magness of Farwell, Jack Magness of Edinburg and S.E. "Mutt" Magness of Waco; and three sisters, Essie Green of Clifton, Bessie Clements of Corpus Christi, and Esther Dean of Edinburg.

Commissioners Court Okays Expenditures

Parmer County Commissioners Court had several short orders of business to attend to during its regular meeting when the Court convened Monday, March 10.

Members received a treasurer's report from Parmer County Treasurer Benna Fells, and voted to pay the county bills after reviewing them.

It was also decided to re-invest \$100,000 in Certificates of Deposit for another 90 days, and the okay was given to pay the lease contract on a radar unit purchased for the Department of Public Safety car in Friona.

A request was made by the DPS in Farwell for the

purchase of a like radar unit for use in the Farwell area because of the efficiency of such a unit. The commissioners took the request under consideration and gave their nod of approval for the purchase.

In the matter of payment of Parmer County's part of the property damage insurance for the Bookmobile, the Court voted to pay the \$172.15 for that purpose.

Two estimates on carpet for the county treasurer's office were given consideration by the court, and the bid of \$225 by White's Auto of Friona was accepted.

Soil conservation work done

on 14 places in precincts one, two and three was approved and ratified by the commissioners.

Final business by the Court were reports given by County Extension Agents Seth Ralston and Laura Jacobs.

Miss Jacobs reported that 4-H clubs in the county as well as all the women's groups are all active and busy with various projects.

Ralston reported that 14 Parmer County youths went to Houston and exhibited animals in the Houston Livestock Show. They brought home over \$11,000 from the sale, according to Ralston.

If the world community is to function as an orderly society under recognized law, then law breakers must be punished or the world order will collapse in a welter of terrorism.

President Carter should understand that he is spitting into the wind with his vaunted "Human Rights" crusade if he cannot enforce international respect for international law. This country cannot have an effective and coherent foreign policy if there are no rules for others to live by and respect.

After every war the United States has shirked its responsibilities and the world has been the poorer, we must not fail this time.

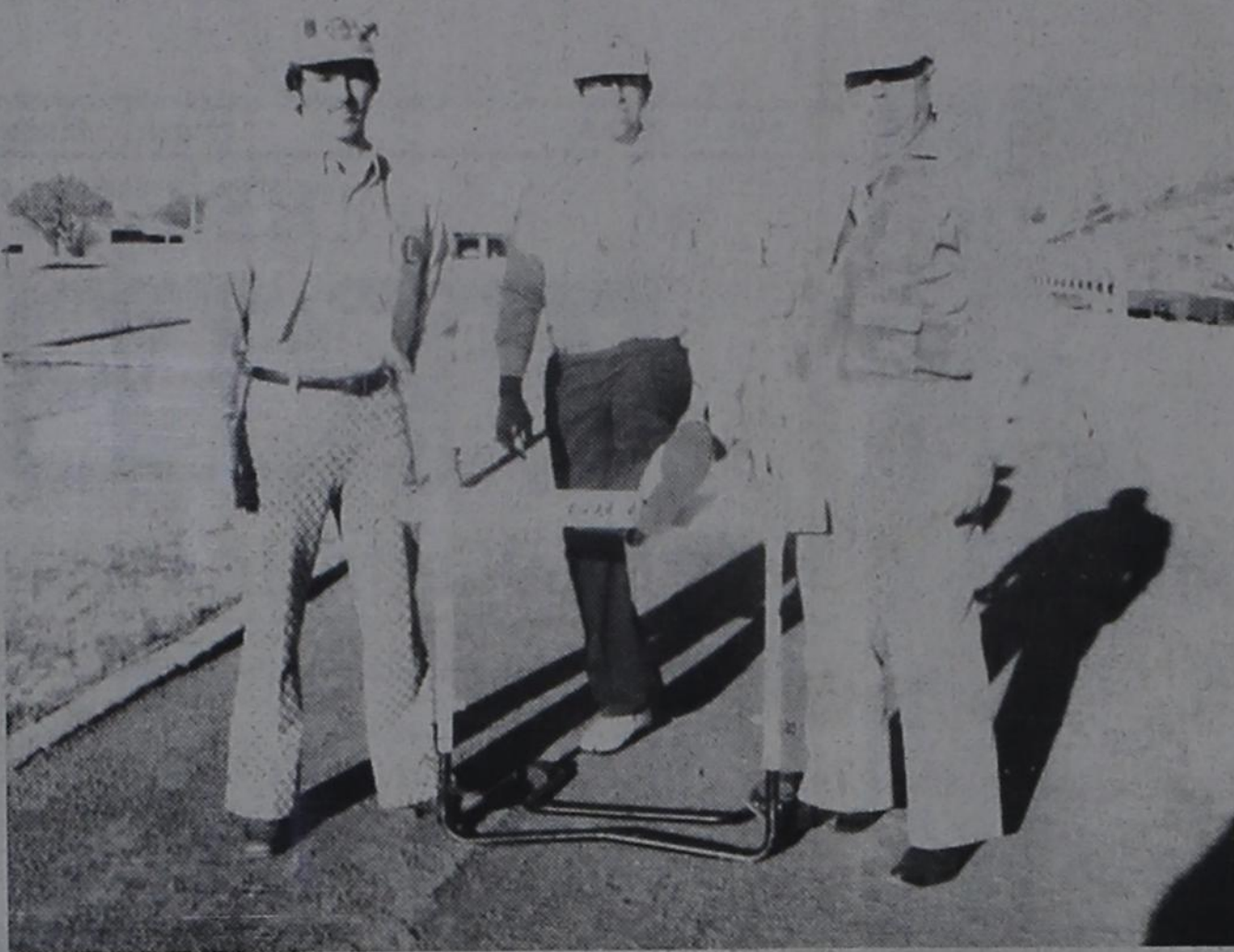

The council re-adopted a bond ordinance for \$80,000 for the new fire department construction after Patton explained certain changes that had to be made because of a request by the State Attorney General.

A unanimous vote to go ahead with the application to Farmer's Home Administration for a water construction project for the city at a cost of \$255,000 was passed by the council. This construction, to be partially funded by federal monies and partially by state monies, is to add fire protection and update the water supply system for the city.

A park committee was formed with Mickey Fenn selected to head up the committee. Others named to the committee were Donnie Morris and Bill Christian. Members of other civic groups in the town will be contacted and asked to place a member on the committee.

Billy Hammit stated that now was the time to contact EIA for a swimming pool

inspection so that any work that needed to be done could be started and completed before time for the pool to open. He was instructed by the council to make that contact and get things in working order at the pool.

Final action by the Council was approval and payment of bills and hearing the municipal judge's report before the meeting was adjourned.

New Campaign Launched Against Drug Problems

Bill Clements and the Drug Abuse Prevention Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs has launched a new campaign against the state's drug problems that aims to involve people at all levels of society in well and all across Texas. Drug Abuse Prevention Division Director Richard T. Spence says, "we want to end scapegoating ... Drug use is not just the problem of the user or the fault of his family. It is a problem to employers who may be losing valuable work hours and income, to friends who see their relationships suffer, to children who see other family members abusing drugs or alcohol, to parents who see their children suffering the effects of drug usage, and to society as a whole in the cost of lost productivity of its member. If an individual will ask himself or herself what he or she does, then real progress will be made."

Drug abuse figures show that the pattern of drug abuse in Texas is changing in some ways. Heroin has increased in use, become less readily available and the quality is very poor. As this has happened, narcotic addicts are turned to legally or illegally obtained synthetic narcotics, such as diazepam. In connection with the shift in these patterns, law enforcement agencies have noted a sharp increase in the theft of synthetic narcotics during the last two years. As price and availability of these drugs increase, so does theft and drug use.

The Drug Abuse Prevention Division. Young people are the most susceptible to the introduction of drugs through their peer group networks. They spend many hours a day outside their homes in the company of their peers. Parents are not always quickly aware that their children may be using drugs, and, all too often, the problem becomes serious before it is recognized. The abuse of inhalants has become a real concern here in Texas. Spence feels "young people are probably sniffing because it is not difficult to obtain inhalants; they are inexpensive and they are accessible." Most inhalant abusers are young males. Inhalant abuse can produce permanent physical damage. The use of marijuana has become increasingly common among Texas youth. It is also important to note that marijuana use can interfere with normal growth and adolescent experiences in the person who uses this drug. "Young people who stay high on marijuana cannot fully develop socially, academically or psychologically during these crucial teenage years," says Spence. "Again, this is a drug which is easily available and peer group pressure is a major factor in its use. This is an area where parents, police, and school administrators must band together in a team effort to have any meaningful impact."

A major thrust of this year's drug abuse prevention program is aimed at family

members. Families are encouraged to talk with one another, to bring real or potential problems out into the open where they can be dealt with, and to assist one another in obtaining help when necessary. Posters will reflect the alternatives to getting high on drugs which families and groups can develop to help promote active and rewarding living patterns among young people.

The Drug Abuse Prevention Division has provided funds for the treatment of drug abusers and addicts. The division also funds prevention programs throughout the state of Texas. These programs are designed to educate, intervene and offer alternatives to drugs. Additionally, programs designed for women, the elderly and other groups are either being piloted or developed as the DAPD attempts to ensure that the needs of all the citizens of Texas are being met.

"Obviously, the key is co-operation," says Spence. "If law enforcement, prevention and treatment can all work together, and the community at large recognizes that 'you don't have to use drugs to have a drug abuse problem,' then drug abuse can be better understood and prevented."

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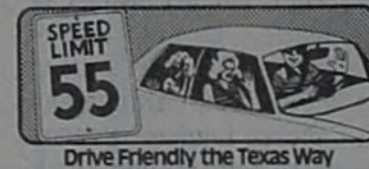

It is not that way in nature and, at the moment, it's not the way it will emerge from the laboratories, either.

The best advice for getting a nutritious diet is still: Eat a variety of foods... unprocessed as well as processed... and go easy on fatty, sugary, salty foods and alcohol.

Is the time just around-the-corner when Americans will be consuming a synthetic diet? It should not be, according to Mack Hegsted, Administrator of the Human Nutrition Center, USDA He says...

"Of particular concern to us, with the advent of nutrition labeling, is that the consumer may be led to feel that all he or she needs to do is consume something that provides '100%' of daily recommended levels' of nutrients and forget about nutrition."

Hegsted was referring to the fact that food manufacturers can "fortify" a food such as cereal - which may consist mainly of sugar and flour (in that order) - with "100%" of an adult's daily recommended dietary allowances (RDA) for

minerals and vitamins. Fortification is the addition of certain nutrients to food products that contain low levels of them.

This sounds great, making low nutrient foods into high nutrient foods. The problem is that a person may cut calories the rest of the day, and keeping the "100%" in mind, might fail to select foods to provide essential nutrients such as calcium or some vitamins and trace minerals

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

Students To Take State Basic Skills Test

All fifth and ninth grade students from the Farwell Independent School District will participate in the first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for March 1980.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, will be scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

The Farwell ISD students will be among 500,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 25-March 12 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

Farwell ISD will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to W.M. Roberts, district superintendent. However, individual stu-

dent scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved, Roberts adds.

"This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement," Roberts points out. "For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective."

Third grade students will be added to the annual sequence during the 1980-81 school year, according to plans announced by the Texas Education Agency. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services, Roberts says.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

Westinghouse DataScore

Systems of Iowa City, Ia., will both help administer the 1980 test program and develop and field test new items for the 1980-81 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The Iowa firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade, Roberts points out.

"We use the term 'criterion-referenced' simply because it is a short way of saying the answer to each question must lead back to a specific objective," Roberts explains.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than

once. Later attempts to improve their scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

The annual test program will be administered by specially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.

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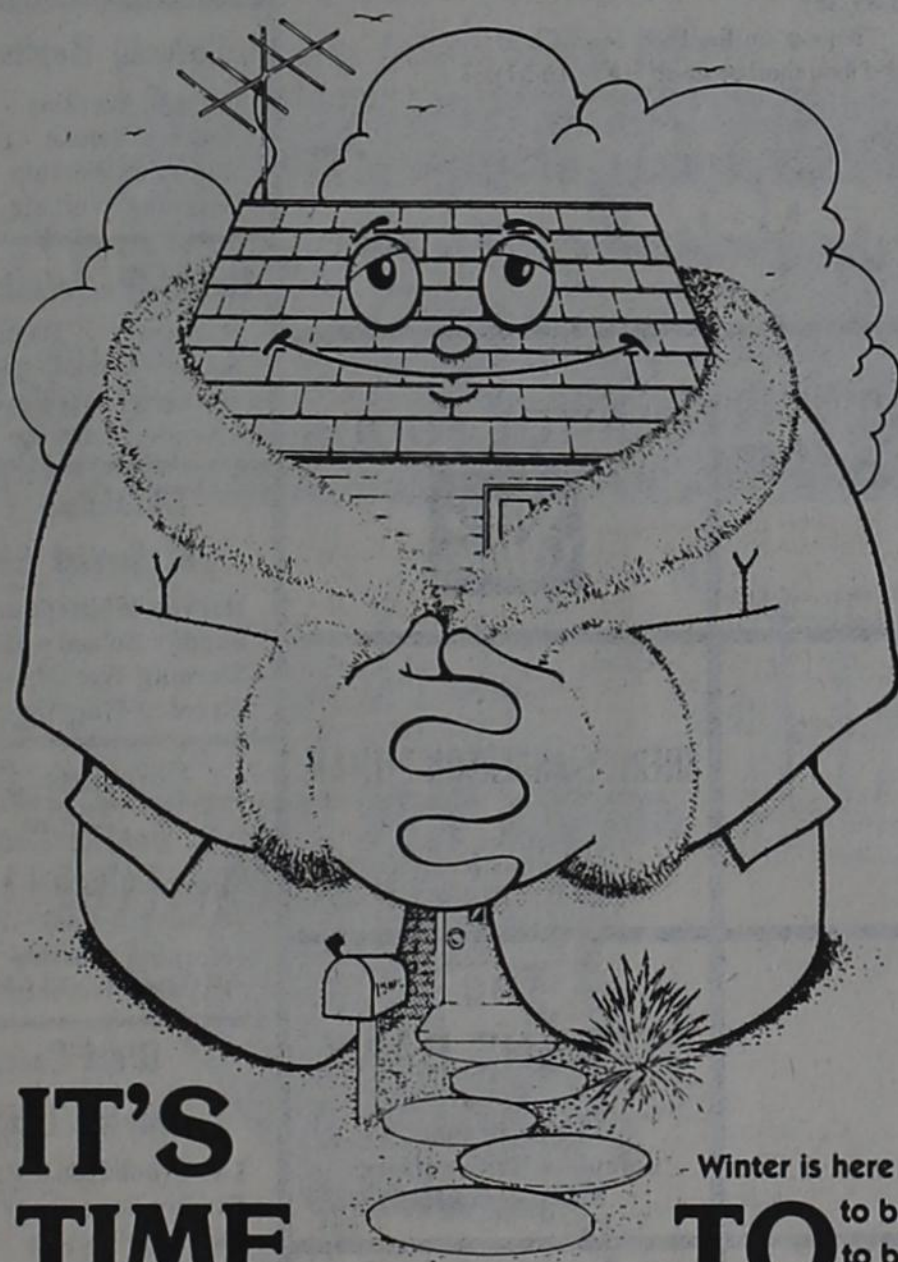

That accident left her unable to work directly with horses, said officials at Tarleton State, part of The Texas A&M University System.

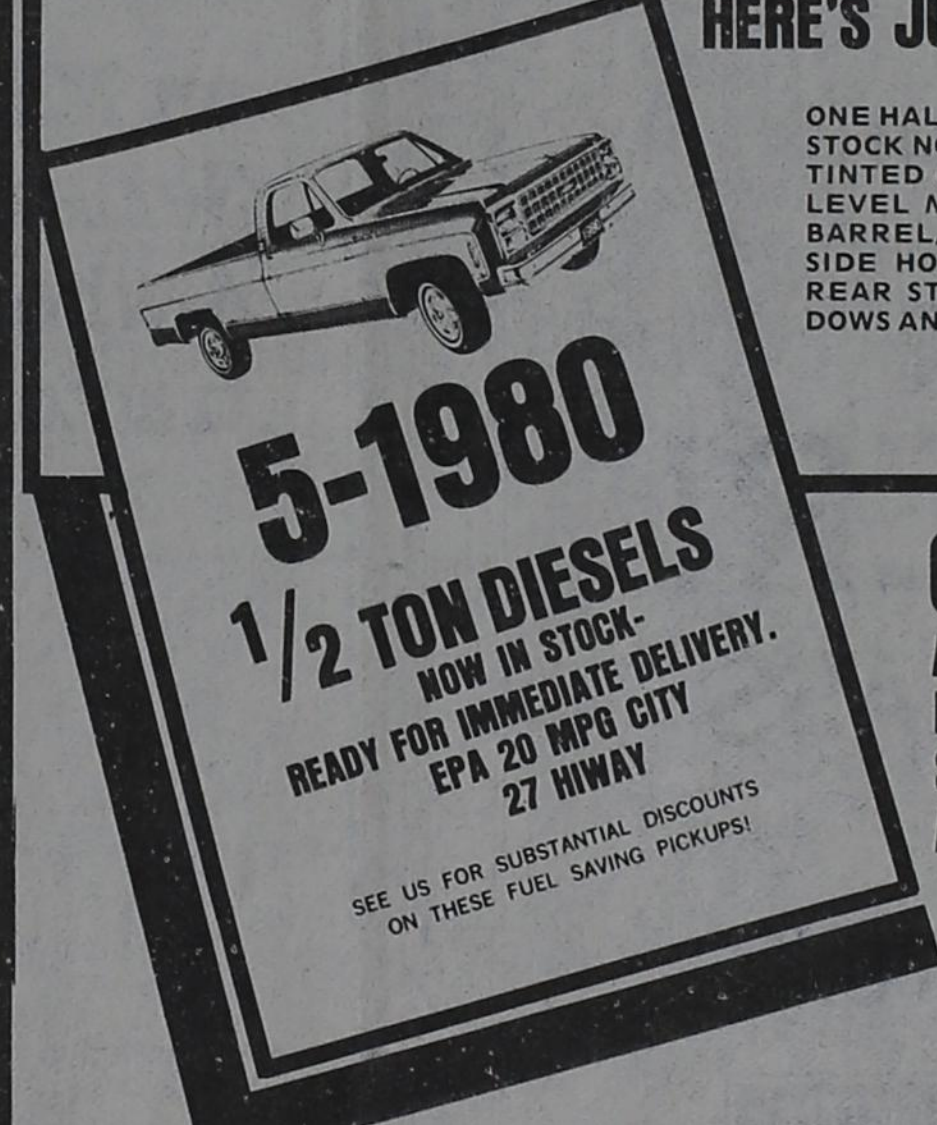
Tarleton's horse program is the only professional management-type program in Texas and is one of a few nationwide. It was established in 1976 and now has about 80 students.

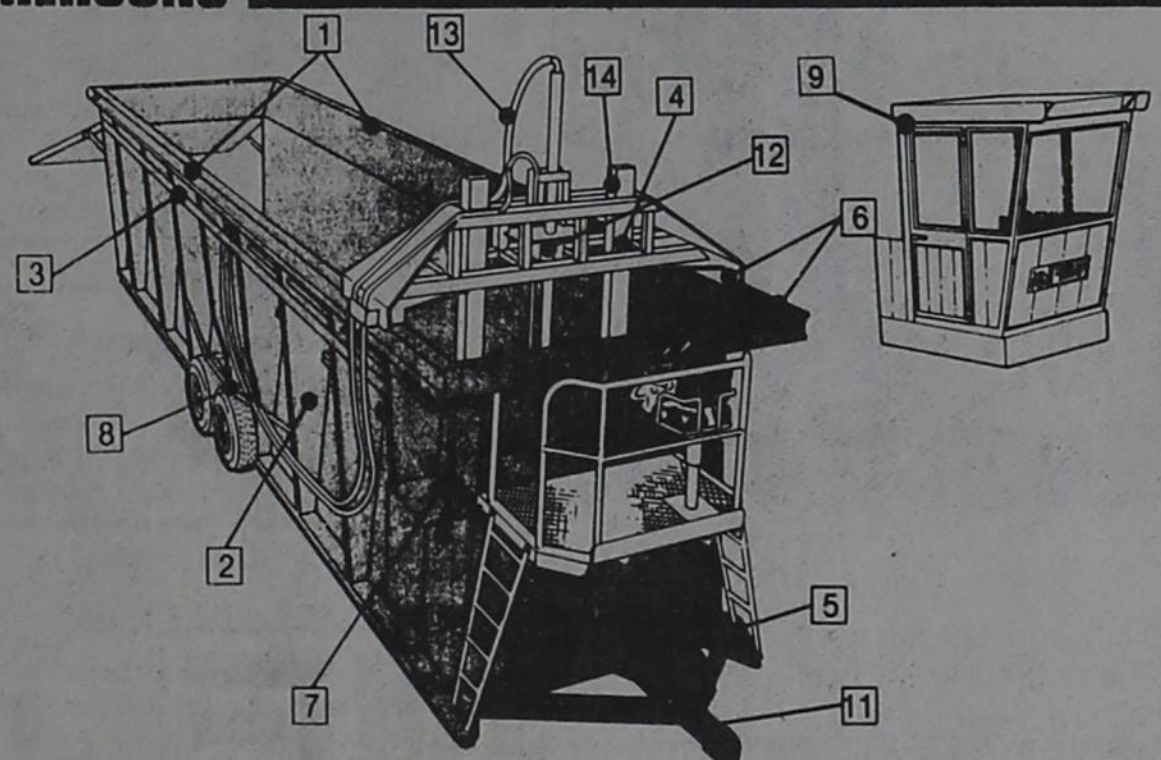

Farwell Home Damaged In Two-Car Collision

Two automobiles and a Farwell home were damaged in a two-car collision in which two women, one from Farwell and one from Amarillo, were involved. The incident was investigated by Texas DPS officer, Jim Bishop, shortly after the mishap was reported to his office last Thursday morning, March 6.

Involved in the accident was a 1970 Chevrolet, driven by Jaynee Kathryn Burchard of Amarillo, and a 1977 Mercury, driven by Gladys Black of Farwell. The collision was reported to Bishop at 10:55 a.m. on the 6th.

The report made by Bishop stated that Mrs. Burchard was driving north on Sixth Street in Farwell and Mrs. Black was driving west on Avenue B. Mrs. Burchard had stopped at a stop sign and had begun to proceed when she allegedly hit the left rear of Mrs. Black's car. Mrs. Burchard reportedly stated that she did not see the Black car in time to avoid the accident.

Upon impact of the cars, Mrs. Black allegedly lost control of her car and it careened up into a yard, traveled through some low-hanging evergreen limbs and hit the corner of a house belonging to Mrs. E.F. Billingsley of 201 Sixth St.

Minor damage was suffered by the Black car and the

garage portion of the Billingsley home.

Mrs. Black was transported to the Clovis hospital by the Farwell ambulance with minor abrasions, but was treated and released.

Mrs. Burchard was issued a citation for failure to yield right-of-way, according to Bishop.

The Farwell home of Mrs. E.F. Billingsley at 201 Sixth St. in Farwell was damaged when two cars collided at the corner of Sixth Street and Avenue B. Two women, Jaynee Burchard of Amarillo and Gladys Black

of Farwell, were drivers of the two cars involved in the mishap. The car driven by Mrs. Black careened into the Billingsley yard after impact, coming to rest after hitting the garage portion of the home.

Extensive damage was suffered by the house and the Black car. The Burchard car suffered less serious damage. A citation was issued to the Amarillo woman as a result of the accident.

Twin Cities Rabies Clinic Set Mar. 20

A rabies clinic is scheduled for the Twin Cities on Thursday, March 20, between the hours of 1-4 p.m. MST at Texico City Hall. In cooperation with the Health and Environment Department, Dr. G.H. Kendall, Clovis veterinarian, is sponsoring the reduced-fee rabies vaccination clinic for area residents.

A fee of \$4 will be charged for the rabies vaccination, and \$7 will be charged for distemper shots, which are optional.

Pet owners are reminded that ordinances in both communities require pets to be registered and vaccinated. In Farwell, cats and dogs must wear registration tags which are available for \$2 from the city. Texico requires that dogs must be registered and these tags are \$1 at City Hall.

State law in both Texas and New Mexico requires that dog and cat owners have their pets immunized annually against rabies.

Rabies is always a fatal viral disease. The disease is usually transmitted by the bite of an infected animal or through infected saliva in contact with an open sore or wound. Animals most commonly attributed with transmitting rabies in this area include the skunk, bat, dog, cat, fox and coyote. Rodents and rabbits are not normally considered carriers of the disease.

Incidence of rabies has increased in each state the past several years. Skunks account for more than 50 percent of all rabies reported in the United States. Pet

skunks frequently expose humans to rabies. Since there is no approved vaccine for skunks, state laws require a permit to keep a skunk as a pet.

The most effective method for rabies control is to vaccinate dogs and cats. Other control measures include confinement of dogs and cats to the property of the owner and the destruction of stray animals.

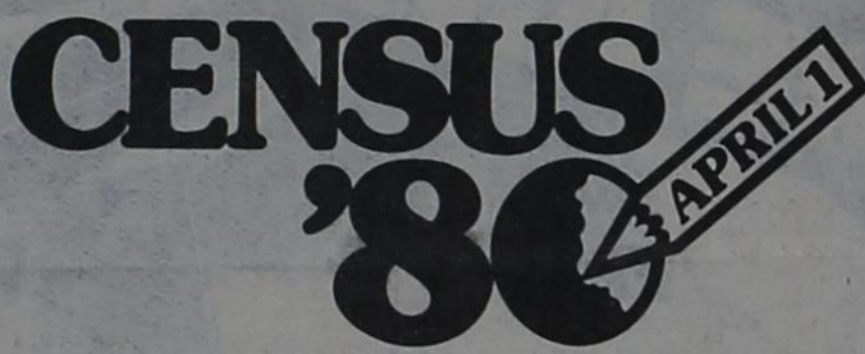
