The Twin Cities enjoyed, if that's the word, some hot weather last week. This has taken a toll on the appearances of the many lovely lawns. The sharp crisp green has faded to a dull and lackluster finish. This will probably help recoup the water department coffers.

Over the weekend we attended the annual State Lions Club Convention in Alamogordo. Mother Nature turned up the burner in that area also. We noted that for two days in a row that city's heat record was broken for those particular days of the year.

We don't know what the water rates are there but they must be pretty steep. They aqueduct their water from Lake Bonito up by Ruidoso. Probably as a result of this, the use of rock interspersed with cactus and other desert plants accounted for the major yard motif. Grass by a house was at a premium.

We're watering our yard right now, but are giving thought to going back to a native landscape, as the price of a grass lawn keeps climbing. Probably from both a cost standpoint and as a conservation measure we will see more and more of this landscaping even on these irrigated High Plains.

At today's prices for lawn-mowing, fertilizing, watering and the cost and upkeep on a power mower and an edger, we could save at least several hundred bucks a year. The native landscape looks better all the time.

One of our local young ladies, Ruth Ann Whitesides, was chosen as a member of the New Mexico State Lions Clubs Band. Each year, 35 to 40 outstanding band members in the State are chosen to represent all the New Mexico Lions Club at their International Convention. This year the convention will be held in Chicago the first week of July.

As the reconstruction of U.S. Highway 70-84 through Farwell continues into the ninth week it has moved from the south to the north side of the highway. At this point it is posing serious financial problems for businesses on the north side. Local businessmen

and residents are concerned over the lack of communication between Texas Highway Department and the construction company with the people who have been inconvenienced by the project. The local service station

pictured above is obviously suffering severe business losses from the construction. The projected completion date of the project varies greatly from the original date of June 30 to somewhere in mid-August.

Tarter Wins County Commissioner Runoff

In disappointingly small numbers, Parmer County voters went to the polls Saturday, June 7, to cast their ballots in the Texas Democratic primary runoff election.

In the only county race, Farwell and Oklahoma Lane voters elected incumbent Archie Tarter to another term as Parmer County Commissioner for precinct three.

In the total county-wide tally, Tarter defeated his opponent Max Crim with 180 votes over 146. Tarter received 155 from the Farwell precinct, 20 from the Oklahoma Lane precinct and five absentee votes; while Crim

received 67 from Farwell, 73 from Oklahoma Lane and six absentee votes.

This runoff primary was a result of the May 3 Texas Democratic primary. In the May 3 primary the results for County Commissioner, precinct three, were as follows: Crim, 194 votes; Tarter, 140 votes; and Cecil Atchley, 65 votes. In the original primary, Crim lacked only 12 votes having a majority, which would have eliminated the need for a runoff.

In other runoff results, for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, place one, John C. Phillips received 158 Parmer

County votes over James (Jim) Wallace with 131.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, place two, Mike McCormick received 148 Parmer County votes and W.T. Phillips received 133.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, place three, Tom Davis, received 169 votes in Parmer County and Edith Roberts received 121.

According to Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren of the 4010 registered voters in the county, only 399 cast their ballots in the runoff election, making the turnout less than 10 percent.

Businesses Hurt - -

Highway Construction Poses Many Problems

Road construction, underway for about nine weeks along U.S. Highway 70-84, which is also Farwell's main street, is the subject of much local consternation.

Many area farmers and Farwell merchants are most concerned with the question of how much longer the road will be torn up. The matter is not merely one of inconvenience for, like Mayor Walter Kaltwasser said, most people "hate the inconvenience," but know "it has to be done." Instead, most local residents are worried about the long-range financial impact.

Businesses along the north side of the street are, in many cases, virtually cut off from their customers. Access to those businesses is possible, but not usually easy. At this time, there are only one or two places where vehicles may cross the north half of the street.

Some local businesses have as of yet not suffered financially. Tri-County Tire company is one of the lucky ones.

According to owner Danny Koenig, there has been a cut in drop-in business such as flats, but such major work as brake jobs is still coming in, with customers employing the alley behind Kelley Green Seed company or the entry way in front of Worley Grain to reach his place of business.

Koenig commented that he did not know what would happen to business in the future when guttering and curbing are being installed, possibly removing all points of entry to his business.

When the original survey of the proposed construction was done last fall, Koenig spoke with the engineer in charge. At that time he was told that work on both sides of the street would be done a couple of blocks at a time.

Also not really hurting right now is Worley Mills grain elevator, which has one of a few true points of access to

the street. Bill Thigpen, manager, noted that so far even the semi-trucks have been able to enter and exit Worley with no difficulty.

But with the commencing of wheat harvest just a week or ten days away, Thigpen is concerned about the problem grain trucks will experience. At the height of the harvest season, trucks are often lined up for one or more city blocks waiting to dump their loads. With two-lane traffic, the practice may not prove feasible this summer.

K. Barnett, contractor, has assured Thigpen that through-out harvest grain trucks will have access to the elevator. Concerning that problem, Thigpen commented that "K. Barnett is really trying to work with us."

However, as noted, access may not be the most serious difficulty.

Although some of the businesses along the north side of main street are weathering the financial storm, at least one is facing disaster unless the construction is completed quickly.

Dale Bentley, owner of the Exxon service station, said that his business has practically stopped, with sales being down approximately 75 percent. Gasoline sales for an average month around this time last year were about \$2000. For the same time span this year, sales have been about \$700.

Due to the inaccessibility of his station, Bentley has lost almost all tourist trade, and even local patrons find it easier to stop at any one of a number of other service stations rather than cross over to his.

When asked if he planned to close his station, he answered, "I have to stay open. It's the only income I've got."

Also according to Bentley, at no time did anyone from the Texas Highway Department or the construction company tell him anything about inconvenience or access. "They just came in and plowed up the road," he added.

Another facet of the problem does not deal with the financial angle, but with the Border Town Days Parade, upcoming on July 26.

The parade route, which starts in Texico, has in past years continued along Farwell's main street to Fifth Avenue, then veered south past the Convalescent Center to the City Park.

A complete halt to through traffic has never been allowed since the parade travels down a national highway. However, the north lane has remained open with the south side of the street being used for the parade.

Unless work on the highway is completed by then, an alternate plan for this year's parade will have to be found.

Another bone in the craw of the local citizenry is the continual discrepancy among statements made by those individuals involved in the construction project.

For example, the statement made by the surveying engineer that work would be completed a couple of blocks at a time has certainly proved to be inaccurate.

A second discrepancy came

when the members of the Texas Highway Department changed their original and then long-standing claim that the north lane of the highway would be reworked first. City fathers were informed of the decision to tear up the south side first approximately one week before initial work began.

The promise of access is another sore point. Business people were assured that the public would have access to businesses on both sides of the street. While side streets did allow customers to reach the firms on the south side, those businesses have also reported a slow down in sales. North side businesses have suffered more severely due to the lack of any side

street entrances. Perhaps the greatest credibility gap is found in the projected completion date. The first date given was June 30. As one Farwell resident said, "Of course, nobody believed them."

Since that first proposed date, a bevy of others have followed. Earlier this week, K. Barnett estimated that all work would be finished by mid-July. He did note that any one rain causes a week's delay, so the final date depends completely on the weather.

For the residents and business people of Farwell, the day the highway construction is finally finished will be one of jubilant celebration throughout the city.

Texico Council Grants Variance

In a regular session Tuesday night, members of the Texico City Council voted to grant to Roger Jesko a one-year variance to ordinance 146. The ordinance deals with the keeping of livestock within the city limits.

It was also decided that Mayor John Hadley and any other available trustees would attend the Wednesday Curry County Commissioners meeting in Clovis regarding the paving project for the city of Texico.

A different rear end for the police car was agreed to, but the group tabled discussion of a new radar system until the next meeting.

It was also agreed to have the blades for the city's shredder sharpened if possible, but otherwise to have them replaced.

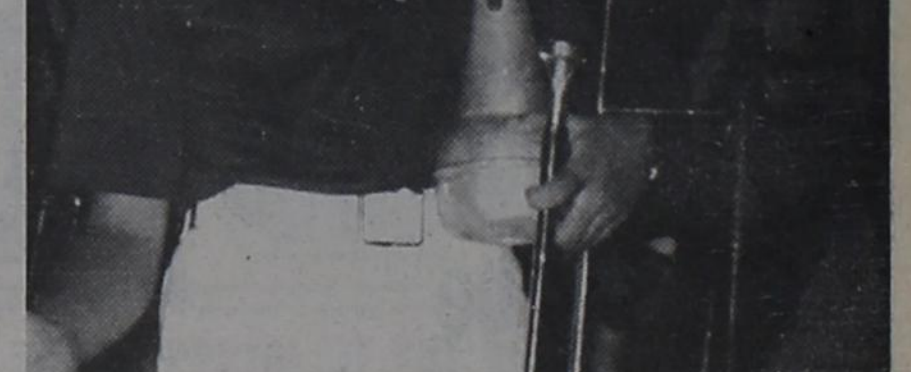
Two representatives from the Environmental Improvement Agency were present to make recommendations concerning the control of mosquitoes. The two also reported that funds for the water project are progressing.

The project, which will provide approximately 32 blocks of new water lines, 320,000 gallons of ground storage and booster station, and additional fire plugs for the city, is to be funded through two grants, one for \$100,000 from the Environmental Improvement Division in Santa Fe, and the other for \$25,500 from Farmers Home Administration. The \$129,500 balance will be in the form of an FHA loan.

The Council members were told that both grants have been approved and that they are simply waiting for the loan to go through.

Max Carter's bid for the repair of hot water pipes at the city swimming pool was accepted contingent on agreement with state codes.

Hadley and trustee Truman Kittrell agreed to attend the East Plains Council of Governments meeting to be held in Tucumcari.

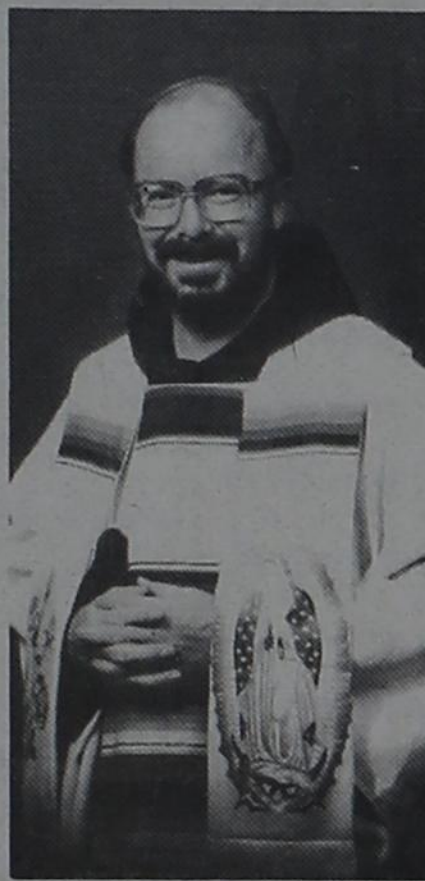
In February, 1980, he completed his studies and received his Master of Divinity degree in Boston.

On May 10, 1980, he was ordained a Franciscan Priest in Albuquerque.

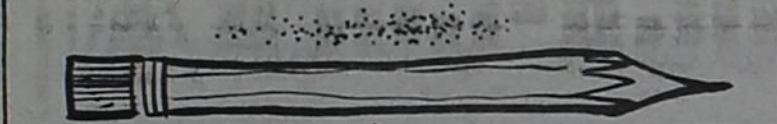
Fr. Juan loves painting, bowling, movies and playing

In other routine business, it was approved that an electric typewriter be replaced this year in the county tax office, as requested by Hugh Moseley.

It was agreed by the Court and announced that the County Board of Equalization will meet on July 28 from 5 to 7 p.m. in the county courtroom.

A bill was presented by Horn-Clayton Insurance and approved for payment in the amount of \$11,784 for Workman's Compensation covering county employees.

Payment of a bill from Doyle Curtis of Collard and Curtis for representing a juvenile in the amount of \$395 was also approved.

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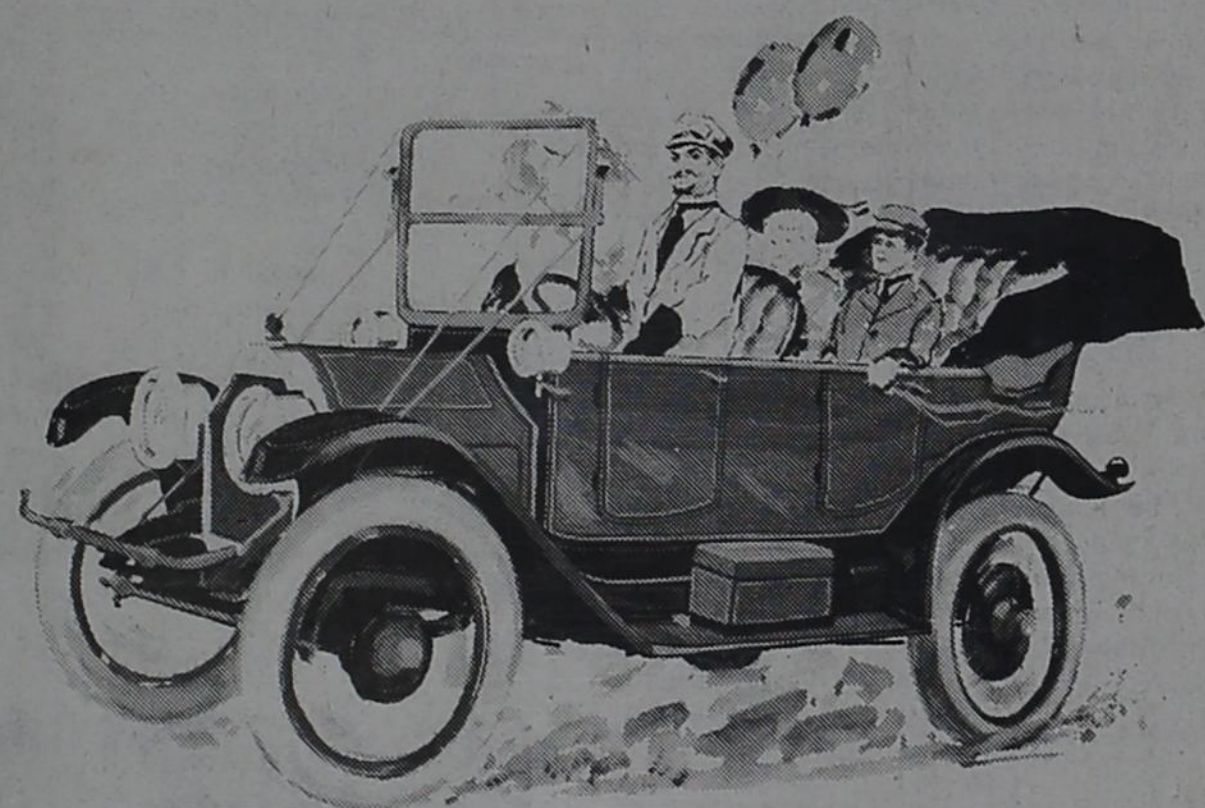
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Texico Seniors Return From California Trip

In Los Angeles, the group visited Knotts Berry Farm and Disneyland.

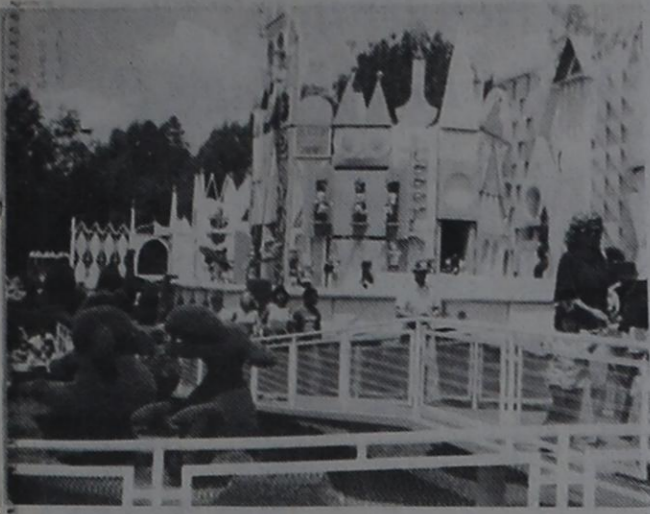
In San Diego, they toured the San Diego Zoo, visited

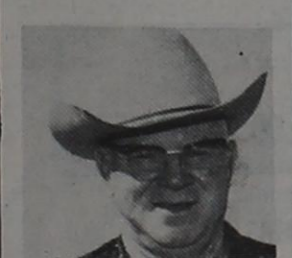
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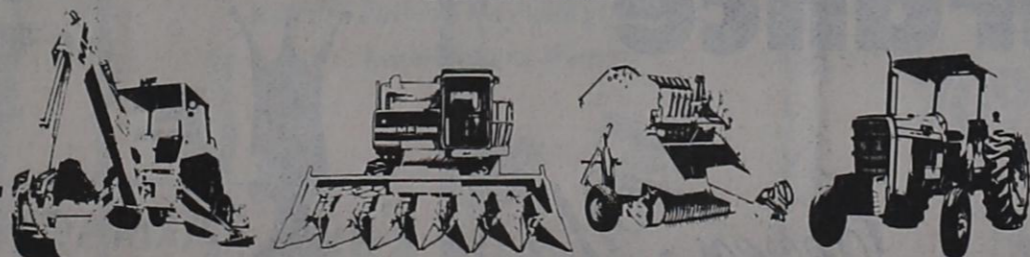
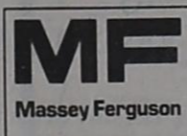
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1960 Texico Class Gathers For Reunion

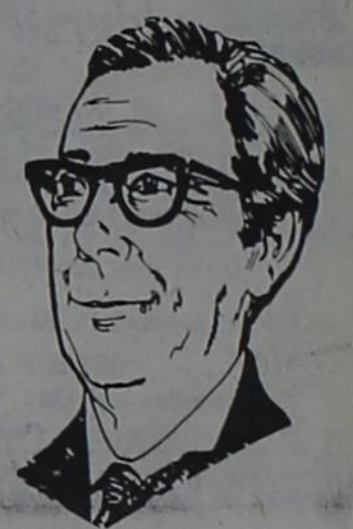

TRUE PRAYER

Let us suppose that I have just had the joy of leading a soul to Christ. He was a godless, wicked creature until lately, but now a great transformation has taken place in his life. He is overwhelmed with the joy of sins forgiven. Nevertheless a few things still trouble him.

As he stands there, touched by the love of Christ, he says: "I don't look very much like a Christian. Look at my clothes. And I ought to get a job and work like other people do. Then, too, I've been a wicked blasphemer. Swearing seems to be part of my nature. I don't know how I'll ever stop it."

I suggest that we pray about it, but he says that he has never prayed in his life and doesn't know how, so I teach him. I tell him how simple prayer is—that he should simply talk to God and say, "Lord, I need a decent suit of clothes and a job, and oh, wilt Thou not help me to stop swearing? I ask it in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ."

We arise from prayer and, feeling for the man, I myself get him a suit of clothes and a job, and he goes on his way rejoicing.

Now, let us suppose that I return ten years later to find that he is

happily married, has three children and is living a consistent Christian life. Calling at his home, however, I find that one of his children is dangerously ill. We get on our knees to pray for the child and he begins: "Lord, I need a decent suit of clothes and a job, and oh, wilt Thou not help me to stop swearing."

Ridiculous! you say. No man would be so foolish. Yes, ridiculous indeed, yet many people simply repeat prayers in the same way. The so-called "Lord's Prayer" is, of course, a perfect prayer, but is it not significant that in the giving of this very prayer, our Lord cautioned His disciples: "When ye pray, use not vain repetitions as the heathen do... Be not like unto them... After this manner therefore pray ye..." (Matthew 6:7-9). Yet this very prayer is repeated word for word at funerals and weddings, in storms at sea, before meals and at church services—on practically any occasion, whether it applies or not.

Thank God for those who truly know God through the Lord Jesus Christ and can truly enter into His presence in prayer "to obtain mercy and to find grace to help in time of need." (Hebrews 4:16).

Boys State is sponsored by the American Legion.

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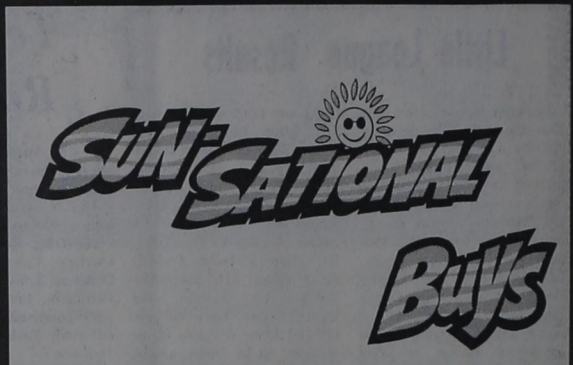
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
