Barnes resigns as athletic director

Monte Barnes resigned Tuesday as Farwell Schools athletic director. He has taken the posts of track coach and freshman football coach at Sweetwater High School, a Class 4A school just west of Abilene,

"I've been working on my administration certificate and several administrative openings are coming up at Sweetwater in the next few years," said Barnes. "The Sweetwater superintendent has suggested that I might return there and have an opportunity for one of those administrative posts later."

Barnes was head track coach at Sweetwater for four years before coming to Farwell two years ago.

Barnes, 34, is a native of Lazbuddie. During his two years at Farwell, he was athletic director, head football coach and world history teacher. His football teams posted 6-4 records both years, and

made the state playoffs in 1984. Even though his resignation is coming later than normal, it ap-

pears the School Board will have a chance to find a successor before football practice begins the second week of August.


Barnes' wife, Delayne, also has resigned as a fifth grade teacher at Farwell Schools.

Barnes thanked the community

"Farwell lost some key players last year due to the graduation of Kevin Owen, Eric Williams, Jesse Anzaldua and Blake Kelley. But defensively, Farwell can be real strong. The Steers will need to pass more to make up for the lack of experience at running back. If the offense comes around, they can be tough.

"There's a goodly number of seniors on the squad but only a few juniors. A lot of freshmen and sophomores are coming up so the future looks good."

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved adding 14 street lights. Five will go on Hereford, 4 on Craig, 1 on Kindred, 1 on Highway 108, 2 on South Garwood and 1 on State Line Road.

In other business, the council: -Called an executive session to discuss applicants for the city marshal's job.

-- Noted the mosquito problem. The state EID has been asked to spray the sanitation plant area. Also, weeds are a problem at the plant, it was noted.

--Three potholes will be fixed -one at the southeast corner of the swimming pool parking lot, one in the alley between Lamar and Anderson, near Eunice, and one on Hereford between State and Turner.

-- A mobile home variance was approved at Catherine and State Line Road. Since the zoning ordinance hasn't been approved yet, the council had to act on the matter.

Once the ordinance is passed, a variance request first would go to the planning and zoning commis-

--Jim Burrows received permission to build his subdivision in two stages, the first being along Garri-

-- Passed a resolution declaring an emergency concerning the water situation. This is necessary for a grant the city is seeking toward building a new water well.

--Discussed some property owners keeping calves and sheep on their property. Under a 1970 ordinance, up to 10 calves or sheep are allowed but they can't be nearer than 250 feet from other homes. So letters will be written the property owners asking them to remove the animals.

-Agreed to sell some surplus city property, such as a sweeper and grader. Sealed bids will be taken and the bids will be opened in July.

Area basketball team wins state crown

An area girls' basketball team won a New Mexico AAU State Tournament last weekend in Clovis.

The 12-and-under team won five games to win the title. The team, co-coached by Larry Gregory and Patsy Camp of Farwell, plans to compete in the National AAU Tournament in Roanoke, Va., July

The team plans to seek sponsors and hold fund-raisers to bear the \$10,000 cost of going to Virginia, said Gregory. "We have the time to raise funds and we definitely are going," he said.

The team consists of players from six schools - Texico, Farwell, Happy, Kress, Nazareth and Three-Way. Among its members are three from Farwell - Amy Murray, Becky Barnes and Misty Stewart, and two from Texico - Amy Chadwick and Denise Gonzales.

The team, called the South Plains Justers, never nad a close game until the finals. They defeated Roosevelt County, 76-38; Clovis Red Raiders, 76-12; Socorro, 55-42; Lubback Lady Raiders, 58-48, and, in the finals, the Four-Corner Warriors, 41-38.

In addition to the Dusters, two others teams coached by Gregory placed second in their respective divisions in the tournament.

The Wes-Tex Stars, consisting of 14-and-under girls, lost to the Clovis Blue Diamonds, 42-32, in the finals.

But first, the Stars had defeated Melrose and Farmington, then losing to Clovis. In the losers bracket, the Stars beat Lubbock, the Navajo Academy and Farmington a second time before facing the Clovis team again in the finals.

The Stars had players from Texico, Muleshoe, Nazareth, Morton and Lazbuddie. Its Texico members were Andria Chadwick and Leslie Steward, who was named to the All-Tournament team. Its Lazbuddie member was Mia Jennings.

Gregory said Mia was awarded a special honor when the Clovis Blue Diamonds, who also are headed for the national tourney in Roanoke, picked her to join their team. A team heading to nationals is allowed to add three members, said Gregory, and Mia was one of the three Clovis picked.

Gregory's 16-and-under girls team, the Wes-Tex Sandies, was defeated in its final by Four Corners, 40-37.

Earlier this team had defeated Portales and Clayton before losing to Four Corners. In the losers bracket, the Sandies beat Window Rock, San Jon and Santa Fe before getting another crack at Four

Corners. The Sandies beat Four Corners, thus setting up the final game two hours later, which Four Corners won.

The Sandies included players from Texico, Morton, Muleshoe, Sudan, Nazareth and Lazbuddie. From Texico was Twilla Longo and from Lazbuddie was Amy McGehee. Gary Cates helped coach.

Gregory pointed out that he was unable to have any Farwell players on his 14-year-old and 16-year-old teams because at the high school level in Farwell and Texas UIL regulations don't allow him to coach youths from his own school in a non-UIL event, such as an AAU tourney.

Gregory was able to get the three basically-Texas teams into the New Mexico tournament by petitioning last year. Since there is no AAU Association in West Texas, his teams were allowed into the New Mexico tourney. Gregory is in the process of setting up a West Texas AAU Association.

Gregory said the victorious Dusters had been practicing since April, The 14-year-old Stars had all 8th graders and only two 9th graders. And the 16-year-old Sandies had only practiced one week before the tourney, again due to the Texas UIL rules.

Shrine to be dedicated at San Jose Church

A fiesta in honor of St. Joseph will be held at San Jose Catholic Church in Texico June 22 at 9 a.m. (MDT).

After the services, which are held every Sunday at 9 a.m., a procession will form in the church and proceed to the location of the Shrine.

The master of ceremonies for this dedication will be Isidro Ortega, a member of the Knights of Columbus of the Council in Texico.

Music will be provided by the San Jose Choir and the Mariachi Group from Our Lady of Guadalupe, Clovis. Local children will perform Spanish dances. After the dedication a noon meal will be served to all attending, parishoners and friends.

"Members of the parish of San Jose extend a cordial invitation to all to celebrate with us for the occasion," said Fr. Godfrey Blank. The Statue of San Jose was brought from Mexico to the United States by the family of Pedro Arguelles, who donated it to the San

Jose Parish on March 10, 1986. This beautiful statue was made by a sculptor in a small town close to San Lois Potosi, Mexico. The material of this statue is a hard natural-colored rock called "Cantera" which is found in the high parts of the mountains from which it is then brought down by physical labor, to the small house shops, where sculptors begin to make use of their chisel and hammer and create the beautiful figures they discover within this big rock.

Gifted, talented program approved

The Farwell School Board Tuesday approved a program for gifted and talented students.

Starting in September, it will encompass about a dozen elementary students. School officials hope to add the program at the high school levels next year.

The program will be totally distinct from regular classes and probably involve two 75-minute sessions a week, said Supt. John Grigsby. Current school personnel will be used to teach it.

In other business, the board: -Hired two elementary teachers - Candace Dyer and Steven Hudson. There still are three vacancies: special education, librarian and athletic director.

-- Turned down a request from the local AAU basketball group to use a school bus for its travel to games. There was a question of liability.

-Decided to deed the arena to the Farwell Arena Association, due to a question of liability.

-- Hiked the salary schedule for para-professionals \$400 a year. -Called a special meeting for June 26.

-- Decided to seek bids on a school bus.

-Received a report on the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) results. Grigsby said the lower writing averages were in line with national averages. The report said:

Of the 38 students taking the math, in the third grade, 36 showed mastery or 95%. Of the 37 taking the reading test, 33 showed mastery or 89%. Of the 37 taking the writing, 23 showed mastery or 62%.

In the 5th grade, of the 34 taking the TEAMS, 29 showed mastery on the math or 85%. Thirty four showed mastery on the reading or 100%. Nine showed mastery on the writing or 26%.

In the 7th grade, of the 27 taking the math, 27 showed mastery or 100%. Of 29 taking the reading, 25 showed mastery or 86%. Of 25 taking the writing, 22 showed mastery or 88%.

In the 9th grade, of the 38 taking the TEAMS test, 31 showed mastery on the math or 82%. Thirty four showed mastery on the reading or 89%. Thirty four showed mastery on the reading or 89%. Twenty nine showed mastery on the writing or

On the writing test it is possible to have a perfect score on the written composition and still not show mastery in writing. Each grade has a cut-off score on the objective portion of the test and if at least a certain number of the objective questions were not answered correctly, a student cannot show that he demonstrated mastery regardless of his written composition score.

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
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Snodgrass qualifies for national rodeo finals







Official figures released May 30 to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service (TCLRS) show 1985 cotton production from the 25 PCG counties on the High Plains totaling 1,893,850 bales of 480-pounds net weight.

That is over 400,000 bales short of the 2,324,250 bale 1984 crop. It compares to the respective five and ten-year averages for the Plains through 1984 of 2,106,260 and 2,195,330. Record production for the 25-county area remains at 3,522,000 bales, produced in 1981.

TCLRS reported 3,051,800 planted acres for the Plains, 2,781,900 of which remained for harvest after an 8.8 percent abandonment. Blame for the loss of almost 270,000 acres, as usual, is shared by drought, wind and hail. Abandonment in 1984 was 7.7 percent. Ten year average loss from planting to harvest on the Plains through 1984 was 12.1 percent, including the huge 35.4 percent loss of 1.3 million acres in 1982.

Average yield in 1985 was 326.8 pounds per acre, a hefty decrease from the 359.6-pound average of the previous year. Five and ten-year average yields per harvested acre for the area through 1985 come to 325.7 and 328.8 pounds, respectively. All-time record yield was set 20 years ago in 1965 at 513 pounds per

Cotton totals released

Parmer's totals: 43,100 acres planted; 41,500 acres harvested; 496, yield per harvested acre; and 42,900 480 pound Nt. Wt. bales.

SPS seeks rate decrease

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) June 4 asked the New Mexico Public Service Commission for a \$3.48 million decrease in retail electric rates paid by industrial and large commercial customers, and for a slight reduction in rates paid by residential customers.

Residential rates would drop by \$90,733, or 0.25%, under the utility's proposal. SPS residential rates by May 1986 already had dropped 7.64%, compared to 1983 rates.

The utility requested the decreased rates be effective July 4, SPS New Mexico Division manager Lloyd Davis said.


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Texas Congress authorizes mounted corps

1837: MONDAY, JUNE 12. An act of the Second Texas Congress approved today authorizes the formation of a corps of 600 mounted men for the protection of the northern frontier, primarily against Indian raids. The corps will consist of volunteers for a six-month term. Each must provide "a substantial horse, well shod all around, and extra shoeing nails, a good gun, 200 rounds of amunition." They must also provide their own provisions, except for beef, which the government will furnish. In addition, each six men are required to furnish themselves with a pack horse.

Officers will receive the same pay as those of like rank in the ranging service, and privates will receive a bounty of 640 acres of land. The crops will be divided into three divisions, and it is hoped that each division will have attached to it a company of friendly Indians to serve as scouts and spies. They will probably come from the Shawnees, Cherokees or Delawares.

President Sam Houston has been granted a 30-day leave of absence by Congress to organize and "set on foot the corps of mounted men." The Texas government has always been keenly aware of the need for rangers to guard the frontier. The day after the Declaration of Independence was declared on March 2, 1836, the Convention received a motion from Robert Potter, delegate from Nacogdoches, "that a regiment of rangers be raised." It bassed, and Potter then moved that Colonel Jesse Benton and Lieutenant Griffin Banes be assigned the task of raising the regiment. This too passed, but because of the fastmoving events of that time, the motion was never implemented.

Last December 5 President Houston signed a Congressional act requiring him to raise a battalion of 280 mounted riflemen to protect the frontier. As with the law approved today, the men were required to furnish their own horse and rifle, and a brace of pistols if they could be procured. It also authorized the President to make treaties with the Indians and to appoint agents to reside among them, with authority to distribute presents among them not to exceed a total of \$20,000 in

Indians have been especially troublesome this year, despite a number of ranging forces, which are located on the Trinity, at the falls of the Brazos, at the freeforks of Little River, on the Colorado, and near the mouth of Walnut Creek. There have been engagements recently near Cameron in Milam County, in Fannin County, in Colorado County, in Fayette County, and on the upper Colorado near the site where the new capital of Texas is being built. More than 30 Texas citizens have been killed since the beginning of this year.

1838: MONDAY, JUNE 11. 1843: TUESDAY, JUNE 13. An armistice with Mexico, to become effective June 15, was proclaimed today by Texas President Sam Houston, "until due notice of in-

tention to resume hostilities." It is to expire on May 1, 1844, unless there are prospects of a permanent treaty of peace.

Diplomatic negotiations for the armistice were handled by the British Minister to Mexico Percy Doyle, and their charge d'affaires in Texas, Captain Charles Elliot. They transmitted a message from Mexican President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna to President Houston which offered an armistice with a total cessation of hostilities if Texas would agree to the same. If the armistice was concluded, Santa Anna stated that he would agree to accept commissioners from Texas to treat with Mexico.

The events leading to the present armistice go back to January 9 of this year, when Judge James W. Robinson addressed a letter to Santa Anna. Lawyer Robinson, as he is often called, was at that time a prisoner of war in Mexico, after his capture at San Antonio by General Adrian Woll in September, 1842.

In his letter, Robinson stated that he believed that Texians, after seven and a half years, were anxious for peace and would gladly accept it upon terms of reuniting with Mexico. He asked for a meeting with Santa Anna, who granted it, remarking to an associate, "Nothing can be lost by hearing him." Judge Robinson has been prominent in Texas affairs, having been vice president of the provisional government in 1835-36, and later a judge and a member of the Texas Supreme Court.

The interview resulted in Robinson's release on February 18 with a letter from Santa Anna to the government of Texas, proposing peace on the following terms: that if Texas acknowledges the sovereignty of Mexico, it will be recognized as an independent department, with autonomy on all local laws, rules and regulations; that Texas would have representation in the Mexican

Congress; and that no Mexican troops would be stationed in Texas.

Robinson landed at Galveston, and after a short stop in Houston, reached Washington-on-the-Brazos, the current seat of government, on April 6. He delivered Santa Anna's letter to President Houston, who understood immediately that the entire matter had merely been a ploy by Lawyer Robinson to gain his release. He proposed that Robinson report to Santa Anna in a "confidential" letter which Houston himself dictated on April 10. Inclosed with the letter were newspaper clippings to show that Robinson has publicized Santa Anna's proposals to the Texians.

The letter was carefully concocted to give Santa Anna considerable pause. It stated that Robinson had found much public concern that Texians were still being held as

prisoners, and urged Santa Anna to release them, saying that "it would have a good effect on the people." It warned that many Texians "are very anxious for an invasion of Mexico," and are "ready for any action the government of this country might think it necessary for this country to take." General Rusk, the letter stated, was at that very moment raising a large expedition to march the Rio Grande.

Where the money goes from your school taxes

BY JOHN GRIGSBY Farwell School Superintendent

Because we are discussing budgets and taxes, this seems to be an appropriate time to discuss the nature of school budgets.

> 75% - Payroll 5% - Bonded Debt 17% - Other 97% Total

Payroll: Education is "laborintensive" industry. Our greatest cost factor is in personnel and salaries. Professional salaries are set by law and personnel is dictated by the program offerings (most of which are required) and student enrollment. The school payroll, on the average, determines 75% of the school budget.

Bonded Indebtedness: This takes approximately 5% of the budget. This is the amount required to pay for bonds passed for buildings. Some districts are "debt-free" but most districts have some bond debt.

Other: These "other" things comprise about 17% of the budget. They include building maintenance, food

services, utilities, transportation, program supplies, materials, equipment and extra curricular activi-

This leaves approximately 3% of the budget where any real flexibility can be exercised. But this basically means that services or programs which directly relate to students must be eliminated or reduced. Since we are in the business of serving students, these are the things we try to cut last. Cuts in this area tend to have a significant impact on minority students and participation in activites.

One of the things peculiar to our district is that the average age of our buildings is 31 years. Because older buildings cost more for upkeep than more modern ones and are not as fuel efficient, we spend a disportionate amount for building maintenance and utilities than do other districts. We have dedicated ourselves to make our existing buildings more energy efficient and try to control our significant energy

Not too long ago, utilities were a

they represent the single item where the most significant savings can be demonstrated. Unfortunately, to see these long term savings, it will require significant capital investment in materials, repair and

small portion of our budget. Now,

Most districts are fortunate to have funds which can be carried over each year. Some people call them "surplus", "carryover", "excess funds", etc. These terms tend to diminish their importance. Districts do not begin to receive state tember and receive little tax revenue until the first of November.

Because we must have payroll and operating revenue in August, throwing good money after bad.

September, and October, it is critically important to have enough funds to cover September and October, our biggest cost months. We must order our supplies during the summer or we would have to start to school without the proper materials.

We are fortunate enough to have the carryover funds to get us through the months of September and October, but because our costs are continually rising, these funds are slowly being depleted. Once that happens, the district will be forced to borrow money from lending funding until after the 25th of Sep- institutions to carry us through those early months. and, for my part, paying interest on borrowed funds, for a school district, is

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
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
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
