If the valid total is

signatures, an election would be signatures, an election would be
held after the third Saturday in January (the earliest date it can be held). Then, if approved, five coun-
cilmen would be elected in April cilmen would be elected in April
1985.
Councilmen's terms would be for
2 years and staggered 2 years and staggered. There would
be city elections every year. If the special election is held, and

ment, an election for the current two council posts and mayoral posi-
