About 230 people were on hand to mark this event in conjunction with the Texas Sesquicentennial. Those attending were from various towns in Texas and Eastern New Mexico as well as Colorado and Utah. Special guests were Judge and Mrs. Pat Boone of Littlefield, grandson of R.C. "Coke" Hopping, who built the house; former residents Lillian Aldridge of Boulder, Colo., Nancy Aldridge Mehler, also of Boulder, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and her husband Gene from Logan, Utah. The important thing is to try

You've probably been reading the new stories recently in the Tribune about an "economic development unit" and I thought this would be a good time to try and explain what is going on.

Basically, some folks believe that it's time to move forward and keep Texico-Farwell a good place to live and do business in.

I realize that some folks say "let's keep things the way they are," but realistically nothing stays static. For example, I'm told there has been a huge decrease in the number of businesses here over the past 20 years. Would you classify that as "keeping things the way they are." Also, I'm told the number of school students has declined dramatically. Would that be classified "keeping things the way they are."

No. Nothing stays the same. Nowadays there are so many pressures on a community that if you don't work to improve the situation, then you'll fall backward. That can be dangerous.

When you talk of maintaining a strong community, most topics fall into business, industry and residential.

I don't put a high priority on industry because I don't see any huge plants coming here. We don't have the capabilities of handling any large industry. Plus, I don't think our community strongly favors it.

Business and residential are another story. It's feasible to think in terms of a business which employs from 3 to 8 persons opening here. And it's feasible to think of persons wishing to live in our community, and either work here or commute to Clovis.

Businesses provide jobs, offer services and pay taxes, three good things for any community. Residences are important because they provide consumers, which help local businesses, and children, which strengthen our schools. This latter point is especially important if we want to maintain our schools.

Right now, our Twin Cities are in pretty decent shape. But when you look down the road, 5 or 10 years, it could be another story. Thus, folks here are trying to set up an economic development unit which could strengthen our communities and avoid any dilemmas that might happen down the road.

Just because Texico-Farwell has been around more than 80 years doesn't mean it will be here for another 80. Just because the two cities have their own school systems today doesn't mandate that it will be true 10 years from today.

One of the problems in a democracy is that government doesn't act, but reacts. When Congressmen, for example, know they have to face the popular vote every other year, they're more likely to support short-term measures. Government is good at reacting to a problem, but it's more difficult to get it to attack a long-range problem.

The idea for an economic development unit is to view the situation now and act - not react to a problem down the road. How it does this remains to be seen.

Last week, the Texico City Council voted unanimously to participate in the unit. The Farwell City Council is expected to discuss whether to participate Monday. The next meeting of the unit will be June 16. All interested persons are invited.

If Farwell agrees to join in, then its representatives and Texico's representatives will have many questions to answer:

1. Should the Twin Cities seek industry? Businesses? Residences? How many? What types? When? Where?
2. Should one area be targeted on? Should a shotgun approach be used?
3. What groundwork needs to be laid? What information needs to be gotten?
4. Should the communities work together from the start, or do parallel work, then interact down the road?
5. What is the goal? Goals?

I doubt we will see any major changes overnight. But I do see an important dialogue starting that might - just might - result in a strengthening of our communities

Boling wins Bell Award

This was the nomination for Frances Boling:

Frances Boling, professional educator at Farwell Junior High School for 21 years, deserves to be named "Teacher of the Year-1986." Her numerous Christian traits, her quiet, earnest ways, her readiness to help in any capacity, and her outstanding ability to show others how to succeed have earned her the respect and admiration of her co-workers and the students in the Farwell Independent School District.

Frances Boling has stated that her desire in life, since the fourth grade, was to be a school teacher. She even began practicing at home at that time on her younger brother. At the age of eighteen, she began her actual teaching career in a one-teacher school with grades one through seven in one room. She described that as "an experience of a lifetime."

After graduating from West Texas State University with a BBA degree, she married Billy R. Boling. They moved to Texline, Texas, where she was employed as a business teacher in high school. Her career was interrupted when their children began to arrive, but Mrs. Boling remained active as a substitute teacher during subsequent moves to Dalhart, Perryton, Hereford, and Texico.

As she and Mr. Boling looked to their future and to educating their four children, they decided it would be wise for Frances to return to full-time teaching. She completed the hours needed for an elementary teaching certificate, and Mr. Willie Roberts, superintendent at Farwell hired her to teach sixth grade. She said that there were 42 sixth grade boys in her first social studies class in the old school building. The fact that she stayed with that assignment alone should qualify her for some kind of award.

In the years that followed, Mrs. Boling had differing assignments in the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades, including sponsoring the sixth grade for several years and spear-heading the seventh grade bake sale several years. For the last six years she has taught Remedial Math in grades four, five, six seven and eight.

Throughout Frances Boling's lifetime, as a wife, mother, and educator, she has lived a Christian example for those around her. Neither gossiping nor complaining, but always smiling and showing

friendliness, she has quietly done the tasks that were set before her-at home, at school, and in the community. In spite of these demands, she has continued to make the time to be active in her church work.

Mr. and Mrs. Boling are exemplary parents, having raised and educated four outstanding children. They have two daughters: Cheryl Smith of Ft. Worth and Terri Boling, living in Germany. Their two sons are John Boling of Camarillo, California, and Michael Boling, attending college at College Station.

Mrs. Boling has been a truly dedicated teacher in the Farwell Schools. She is willing to take on any task asked of her. She treats children fairly and is deeply concerned about them. Her students have certainly benefited by all the extra time she so willingly spends with them. Many of the children with whom she works in Remedial Math have not simply academic problems, but also show behavioral or emotional problems, as well; Mrs. Boling appreciates these handicaps and strives to help these students succeed in spite of such disadvantages. She said, "I believe this is a gift of the Lord to me, to help people who need help, and desire help."

During all her years as a teacher, Mrs. Boling has constantly strived to improve herself professionally. She is also an active member of Delta Kappa Gamma, an international honorary teachers' society. At school, she teaches every day, taking her job very seriously, not often to be found relaxing in the teachers' lounge. As Frances Boling is retiring this year, she needs to be recognized for her accomplishments now; next year will be too late.

One of Mrs. Boling's most outstanding traits is humility, and this can be seen in part of her statement when she was asked to write about her accomplishments of the past years. Rather than dwell on what she herself had one, she said, "I believe Farwell has a faculty that you can be proud of. Our achievement tests and the U.I.L. results show that your teachers are doing a super job. It has been a joy for me to have some small part in the education of your children for the past twenty-one years."

It is a joy to nominate such a fine, humble woman, Mrs. Frances Boling, as "Teacher of the Year-1986."

Georgiana Richardson Cooper, 80, died May 29 at Clovis High Plains Hospital.

Services were Saturday at Portales' Central Christian Church with Ken Broad and Terry Fraker officiating.

She was born in Floyd County, Texas, to the home of Robert F. and Lillian Merrick Richardson. She graduated from Portales High School in 1923. After attending Texas Tech University she taught at several small rural schools along the Texas-New Mexico border. She then continued to work on a part-time basis at the newspaper for another eight years.

Mack Heald with a proclamation from the City of Farwell for his efforts in the restoration and preservation of the structure.

Johnny Actkinson, representing the law firm of Aldridge, Harding, Aycock and Actkinson, gave a response, and Elizabeth Phillips, chairman of the Farwell Sesquicentennial Committee, read a brief history of the house.

After Mack Heald introduced the special guests, Mary Bell Washington spoke a few words on behalf of the Aldridge family. Hugh Moseley then read the official proclamation and unveiled the plaque attached to the house.

Following the dedication ceremony, members of the Theta Rho Chapter of ESA gave guided tours of the house.

Refreshments were prepared and served in the dining room by members of the Alpha Rho Lambda Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. They also had a guest register table on the front porch.

The house was built at this site between 1915-1917 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County's sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

The Aldridge's two sons, Sam and John, grew up in the house.

Architecturally, the house is a two-story, foursquare design-frame structure with two coats of wire and stucco applied over the wood siding. This technique was sometimes practiced in this part of Texas, with the resulting structure of this type called a Prairie Style building. The Hopping-Aldridge house is one of the few homes of this style to be found in this part of the Texas

Panhandle.

In 1984, the house received an exterior restoration that consisted of replacing the bannisters that had previously been removed. All wood and stucco surfaces were painted in colors that were used in the era that the house was built.

The Hopping-Aldridge house is the first residence in Parmer County to receive a state medallion. Two buildings -- the Parmer County Courthouse and the old First National Bank building (currently part of the Aldridge, Harding, Aycock and Actkinson law firm office on Third Street) -- in Farwell have been designated Texas Historical Landmarks in the past.

The Lions Club voted May 26 to transfer the parks and buildings to the Little League.

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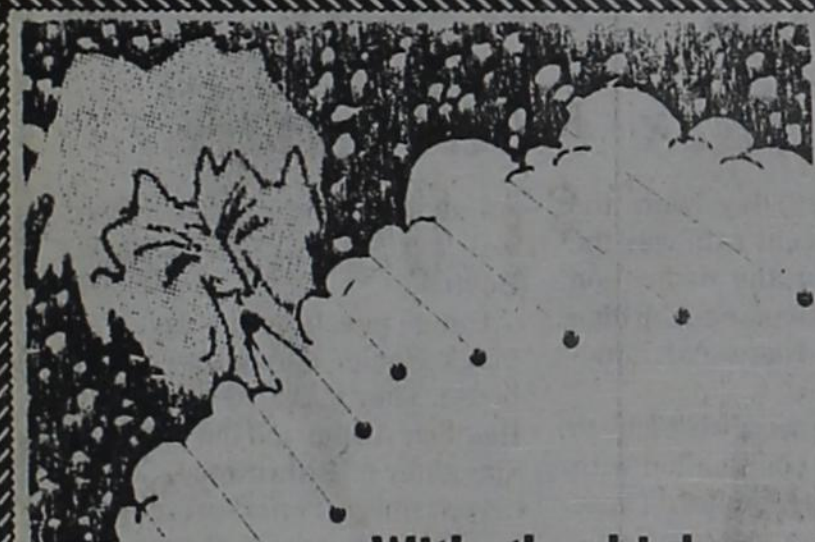
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Jackpot team roping and barrel race rescheduled June 8

Exchange student needs assistance

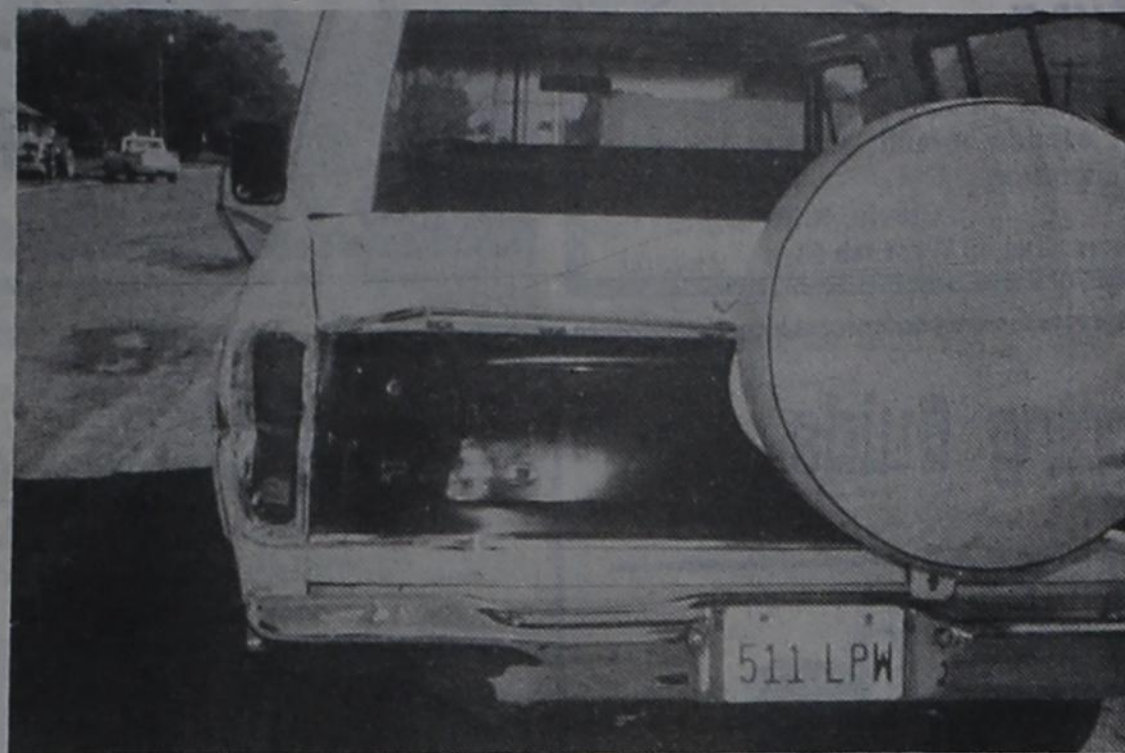
Loretta Gonzales, an exchange student who is leaving for the Philippines for a year of study, is in need of financial assistance.

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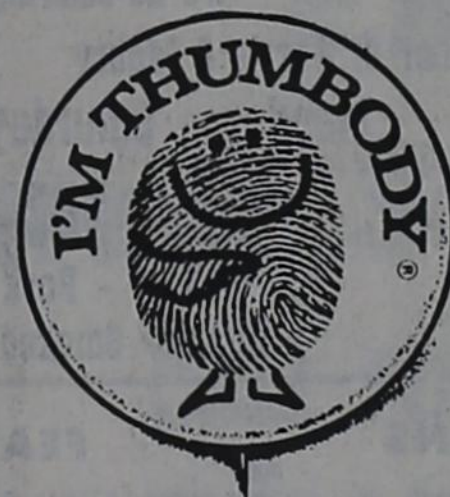
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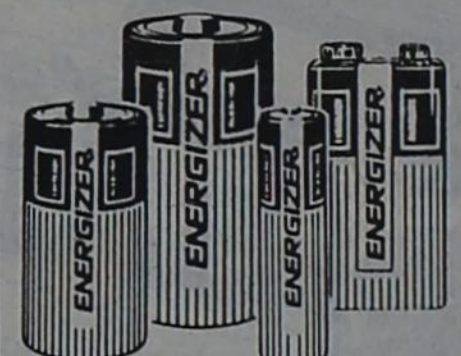
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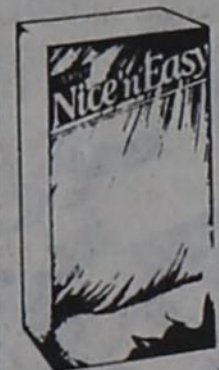
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Scouts get Arrow of Light

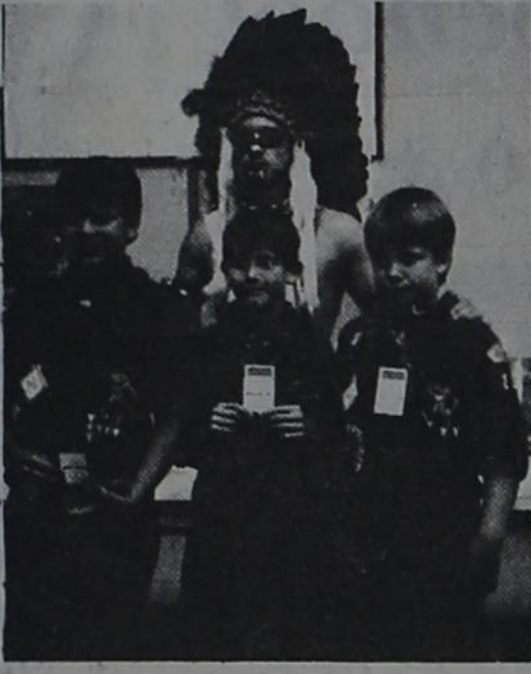

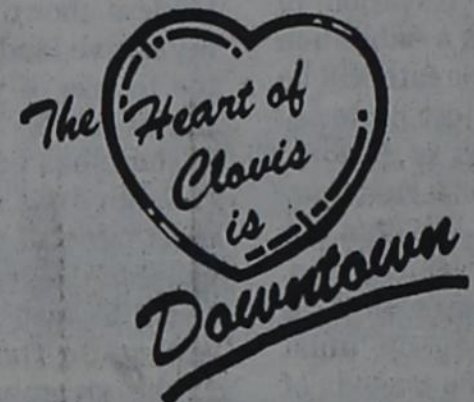
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Murdered soldiers' remains buried

1836: FRIDAY, JUNE 3. Before the walls of the La Bahia fortress at Goliad today, the remains of the 330 Texians who were brutally murdered there on March 27 were given a formal military burial. It was ordered by General Thomas J. Rusk, commander-in-chief of the Texas Army.

The site where the Texians had been killed was found without difficulty, for it was strewn with partially burned bones and some complete skeletons. The remains were placed in a common grave. The ceremony began at 8:30 this morning, with General Rusk officiating. There was a parade of the entire army to the grave site, with arms in reverse position. It was accompanied by funeral band music, and a minute gun was fired continuously. Among the chief mourners were five men who had escaped the massacre.

General Rusk had prepared a funeral oration, but was so overcome with emotion that he was unable to read it. It was read for him. It began: "Fellow Soldiers! In the order of Providence we are this day called upon to pay the last sad offices of respect to the remains of the noble and heroic band who, battling for our sacred rights, have fallen beneath the ruthless hand of a tyrant."

The orations stated that there was a consolation for the mothers, sisters and wives of those who fell: "Their murderers sank into death on the prairies of San Jacinto under the appalling cries: Remember La Bahia!" In addition, it continued, "We have another consolation to offer. While liberty has a habitation and a name, their tragic fate will be handed down to remotest posterity on the brightest pages of history. Santa Anna, the black-hearted murderer, the mock hero, is within our grasp. There he must remain, tortured by the aching pain of a corroding conscience. He must sometimes reflect on the tragedy of La Bahia! While the names of those whom he murdered shall soar to the highest pinnacle of fame, his shall sink down to the deepest depths of infamy and disgrace."

1836: SATURDAY, JUNE 4. Yesterday at Veslaco, General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna was forcibly removed by Texian volunteers from the ship which was to take him to his freedom in Veracruz, and was returned to captivity.

Santa Anna was put aboard the Texas navy's armed schooner Invincible on June 1, by order of interim President David G. Burnet, in accordance with the provisions of the Treaty of Veslaco, signed on May 14. The former Mexican president agreed in the treaty to work in Mexico for Texas independence, and there is concern that the longer he remains in captivity, the less influence he will have upon his return. Also put on the ship were his



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aides, Colonels Juan Nepomuceno Almonte and Gabriel Nunez, and his private secretary Ramon Martinez Caro. They were accompanied by Texas Vice President Lorenzo de Zavala and Secretary of the Treasury Bailey Hardeman, to serve as commissioners to negotiate a treaty of peace with the Mexican government.

Before boarding, Santa Anna wrote the following farewell to the Texas Army: "My Friends! I have been a witness of your courage in the field of battle, and know you to be generous. Relay with confidence on my sincerity, and you shall never have cause to regret the kindness shown me. In returning to my native land, I get you to receive the thanks of your grateful friend. Farewell!"

There has been strong opposition to Santa Anna's release, with public meetings and violent speeches. Because of the growing protests, President Burnet delayed the ship's sailing. On Thursday evening, June 2, the steamer Ocean arrived at Veslaco from New Orleans, carrying some 230 armed volunteers recruited by General Thomas J. Green. Yesterday, upon learning why the Invincible was in port, General Green, with Captain H.A. Hubbell, at the head of a company "equipped for service," waited on President Burnet and demanded that "in accordance with the overwhelming public will of the citizens of the country, he should remand the prisoner ashore, and await the public will to determine his fate."

The President was constrained to agree, and a party went aboard to remove the prisoners. Santa Anna resisted fiercely, thinking he was going to be shot. To avoid further incident, the ship sailed across the harbor to the small village of Quintana, where the prisoners were removed in the custody of a strong guard under Captain Hubbell. Many in the army think that Santa Anna should be marched to the spot where

the Palm Sunday massacre took place near Goliad, and there shot.

The army's mutinous stance was further evidenced in a communication from a group of officers which was handed to President Burnet today. Stating that it is presented "in the tone which should ever characterize the intercourse between the ruling parties in the country," it implies that the army considers itself of equal status with the civil government. It sets forth what it terms the army's privations and want of provisions, and continues: "And to whom are we to charge these injuries? Surely to you, as president of this Republic." It was his duty, the officers stated, "to have dropped all other matters" until the army was taken care of, and threaten that "the consequences may be serious if redress is not had."

President Burnet replied immediately, pointing out that when he took office on March 17, "the country was destitute of almost everything necessary to sustain an army in the field," and that "Texas was without funds at home or credit abroad." His government is doing everything it can, he said. He termed their communication "somewhat novel," and said: "When the civil government of a country is compelled to receive a prescription of its duties from an armed force, that government, if not virtually dissolved, is in great danger of being lost in the blazonry of military misrule."

1845: WEDNESDAY, June 4. In a proclamation issued at Washington-on-the-Brazos, the current Texas capital, President Anson Jones announced the acceptance by Mexico of a proposal for peace with Texas. He ordered the immediate cessation of all hostilities by land and sea. The order is symbolic, since no such hostilities exist at present. Mexico's agreement to recognize Texas in principle, according to Jones, now
