The work must continue

Just as you were, I was stunned by the tragedy that occurred when the Space Shuttle Challenger exploded following liftoff at Cape Canaveral.

It was the kind of thing you know is inevitable, a mishap with all that volatile gaseous material. But you hope it won't occur, anyway. Our space program is the pride of the world.

I remember when the space program was initiated during the Kennedy years. (Actually, the program began in the late 1950s under Eisenhower but it didn't get a real boost until Kennedy opened the federal coffers to underwrite it.)

At first, I was against it. It was difficult for me to justify how our government could spend billions and billions of dollars on sending a few folks into outer space when we had so many needy people right here at home.

Well, two things got me to change my mind.

The first was Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty. LBJ spent about as much money as is possible on trying to end poverty in our nation. I won't say the War on Poverty was a complete failure but I don't think many folks will call it a success. The fact is that just throwing dollars at poverty won't cure it; and in some cases it unfortunately helps expand it.

The second item that changed my feelings toward the space program was the knowledge of the "spinoffs" from the program that helped our economy's private sector - namely the computer industry.

Today, our computer industry is second to none. Our country has an excellent trade balance when it comes to computers. You probably take it for granted, like I do; just chalk it up to good, old American know-how, right? Well, the fact is that the space program gave a mighty boost to this fledgling industry. And we can all see the results in our everyday jobs: the computer revolution is well under way.

Thus, I'm a backer of our space programs, especially what is termed the "Star Wars" defensive system proposed by President Reagan.

As I've written, I bemoan the fact that we give so much money to the defense industry when I know that so much is wasted. That amount of waste, though, cannot compare to the value that a workable Space Wars network would have if it eliminated the threat of nuclear weapons.

I know there are some folks who believe that if the U.S. and USSR simply sign a treaty banning the use of nuclear weapons forever the problem would cease. I call that wishful thinking. And dangerous thinking.

History shows us that totalitarian nations fear only one thing: might. As long as the U.S. stays militarily strong, we have nothing to fear from the Soviet Union. But when we let our defensive posture become slack, that's when we should worry.

President Reagan, by strengthening the military during his tenure, has placed the U.S. in excellent shape for a meaningful treaty controlling nuclear weapons. Now, along comes the Gramm-Rudman Amendment which, if it takes place, will cause deep cuts in defense spending.

If that occurs, then the U.S. should dismiss any and all thoughts of any pacts with Russia. The Soviets would see that we are cutting back and becoming weaker; thus, their aims would be bolder. Never, never seek any type of treaty at such a time.

As I wrote in one of last year's columns, I expect our Cold War with Russia to continue for quite some time, maybe another 50 years. Time is on our side because eventually the repressive regime in the USSR will have to lighten.

So I back the Star Wars program 100 percent. I know some scientists don't feel it's feasible but that's normal. There are only some skeptics; just look around you. What is important is that we try to make it work. The end result could well be worth it: peace of mind for our citizens.

Let us now mourn the astronauts who died while doing their duty for their nation. It is a time to grieve. But let us not lose sight of our space program's goals and let us strive to continue the work that has been done.

Depression taught youths to stay busy

The late W.E. Martin and Lantie Hankins were married Dec. 27, 1916 in Petersburg, Texas.

"We had gone to school together. I actually thought he was a pest. He was always bothering me. He asked me for a date and I was stunned. He kept bothering me for about four years until we were married," Mrs. Martin recalled.

After they were married they moved to Grady and farmed with his grandparents. The house had two rooms. They used kerosene lights as they didn't have electricity. She washed her clothes on a rub board. They would place their milk in the window to keep it fresh. She said a lot of times it would ruin.

While living in Grady five of their 11 children were born.

Later, they moved closer to Clovis, where they sowed wheat on the land.

Then they moved to Farwell, living about three miles out of town. They sold butter and Martin started selling Watkins Products. He started selling the products when the other representative retired. He sold Watkins until he died in 1981,

traveling Parmer and Curry counties for about 25 years.

"His customers would be waiting dinner for him. A lot of times his customers would talk about the Bible. He always carried his Bible. He probably enjoyed reading the scriptures as much as selling his products," said Mrs. Martin.

The products he carried were laundry products, household products, salves, liniments, vitamins, personal care, spices and vanilla.

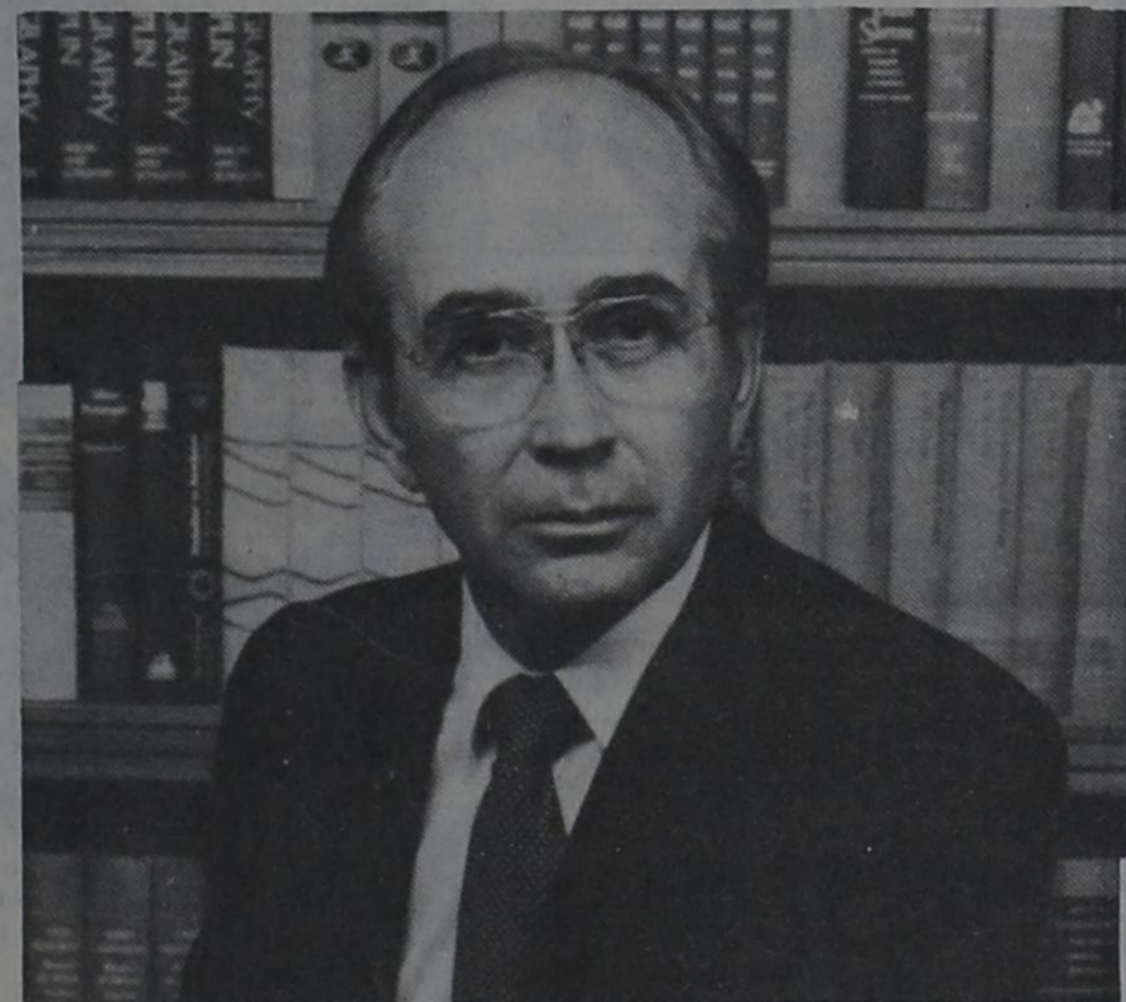
All of their children finished high school in New Mexico and Farwell.

Mrs. Martin gave birth to all her children at home. She had her husband and one lady there.

"The Depression and the Dust Bowl made a lot of work. It taught the kids to stay busy and learn to help," said Mrs. Martin.

She is an active member of the Church of Christ of Farwell. She does some crocheting and hand work. She has been active in PTA and Home Demonstration.

Mrs. Martin has a total of 70 grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

FARWELL, TEXAS

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Kaltwasser resigning Farwell mayoral post

Walter Kaltwasser, mayor of Farwell since 1977, told the Farwell City Council last Friday he would be resigning his post, effective April 5.

April 5 is the date for the city election.

According to City Clerk Janie Bowery, there are two options available for filling the mayoral post:

--The City Council, when it meets Feb. 10, can add the post to the election ballot. In that case, the deadline for persons filing for the mayoral post is Feb. 19 at City Hall.

--The City Council can appoint one of its own members to fill out the unexpired term. The term ends in 1987.

Kaltwasser, who retired from farming last year, has been dividing his time between his Farwell home and a place he owns in Colorado.

He was elected mayor over Jerry Yows by a 234-76 margin in 1977. He

was then unopposed for mayor (except for a few write-in votes) in 1979, 1981, 1983 and 1985.

In his message to the council, Kaltwasser said:

"It is with deep regret that I wish to announce my resignation from the office of mayor of the City of Farwell. I feel when I was elected to

the City Commission that I should give my full time and attention to this office.

"Since my retirement from farming, we now plan to be out of town quite often and I feel this would be unfair to my town and all of you if I wasn't here to uphold this office fully. So I submit my resignation to become effective as of April 5, 1986. This will allow time for potential candidates to file before the Feb. 19 deadline for them to serve out my term.

"I wish to express my deepest appreciation to each and everyone that has worked with me for the good of the City of Farwell and tried to do it to the best of our abilities and for the city's best welfare.

"I also thank each friend and person in Farwell who has made these years of service rewarding."

An effective windbreak may be provided protection from the hot, dry winds of summer to the icy winds and snow of winter. A windbreak can reduce wind speed to 1/3 its normal velocity thus saving up to 30 percent on home heating and cooling costs. A windbreak will also be helpful in preventing wind damage by protecting homes, gardens, lawns and livestock.

The S.W.C.D. can assist you in planning and designing your windbreak. This free technical assistance provides you with a design and cost estimate. To keep your windbreak growing healthy, full, and beautiful, a trickle watering system may be installed. The trickle watering system is easily installed and can be used for flowerbeds, garden, and lawns as well as windbreaks. Why not blue corn?

If your breakfast just sort of sits there, try brightening your day with a blue pancake or waffle, urges George W. Dickerson, farm demonstration specialist with the New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service. Finish the day with a plate of pinto beans and blue cornbread or tortillas, he suggests.

That's right. Blue. If you're tired of traditional yellow cornmeal, your palate may find blue cornmeal to be a pleasant change. Besides having a distinct course, nutty taste that gives blue cornmeal products character, blue cornmeal is generally higher in protein than yellow cornmeal, Dickerson says.

Blue corn, like its yellow cousin, is truly an American crop. Early Spanish explorers of the West Indies called corn - panizo, a term they used for various grains found in Spain. Later, the name maize, a native American term for corn, caught on. The Latin form, maizium, first appeared in print in one of the early publications of Peter

Martyr in 1516. Scientifically, blue corn and other flour corns are known as Zea mays amylacea. The kernels of flour corn are made up of almost all soft starch.

Dickerson has been working with some New Mexico farmers who are growing blue corn in New Mexico. An effort is being made to develop new strains of blue corn for areas of the state that have not traditionally grown the crop.

"One of the things you should be thinking of when you have that blue corn pancake or waffle is that you will probably be eating a New Mexico grown product," notes Dickerson.

There will also be conferences nightly, beginning at 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Everyone is welcome to come and hear the Bible

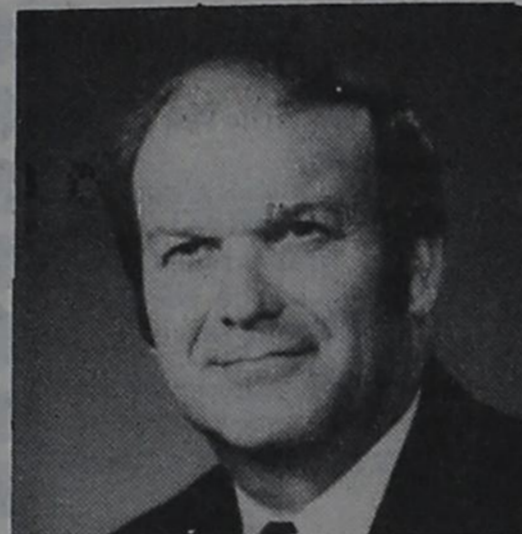
teachings.

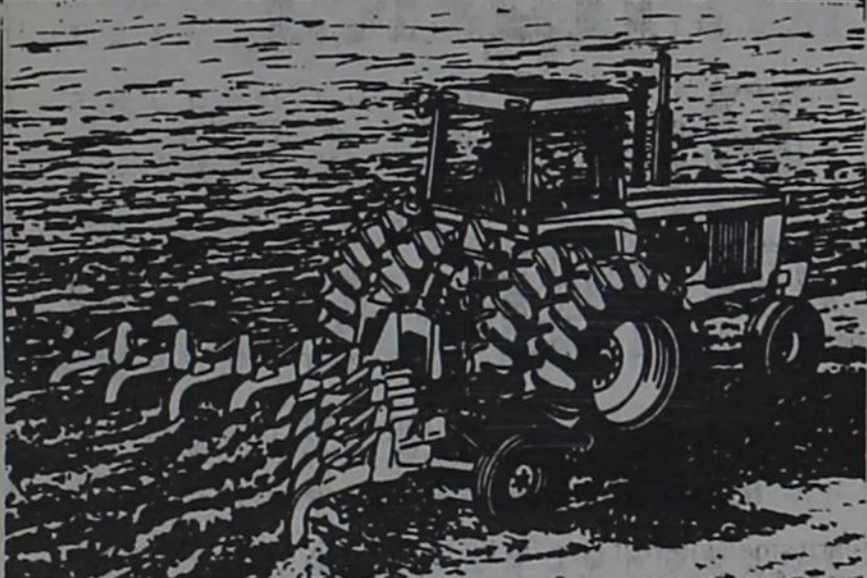

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Gen. Johnston wounded in duel with Huston

1836: SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 7. Colonel J.W. Fannin, commander of the Texas Forces for the invasion of Matamoros, Mexico, today informed Lieutenant Governor James Robinson of the Texas Provisional Government that he has received intelligence of a large Mexican force marching northward from Matamoros. He has ordered Dr. James Grant, commanding a small unit encamped near San Patricio, to join him at La Bahia fort in Goliad. Colonel Fannin is strengthening the fort and has renamed it Fort De-fiance. However, Dr. Grant has declined to obey the order, stating that the authority given him by the Provisional Council is equal to that of Colonel Fannin.

Colonel Fannin recently returned from the port town of Copano, where he was unable to obtain ships to transport his army to attack Matamoros. He has some 400 to 500 men in his command, organized into two units, the Lafayette Battalion under Major Benjamin C. Wallace, and the Georgia Battalion under Major Warren Mitchell.

The capture of Matamoros would be of tremendous value to the Texas cause. It was first proposed last December by Captain Philip Dimitt, then commandant at Goliad, in a letter to the Provisional Council. Taking the war to Matamoros might spare Texas from an invasion. Moreover, the town itself is a valuable prize. It is an important port for trade with the United States, England and other nations. Port revenues are thought to be as much as \$100,000 per month. It is also a point of transshipment to the interior, especially northward. Imported goods are carried by mule as far north as Santa Fe and even beyond. In return, the town receives furs, provisions, and other valuables, such as gold and silver. It currently has a population of 6,000 to 8,000, including a considerable number of American and English traders.

Dr. Grant has only 97 men with him at San Patricio, including Colonel Frank W. Johnson, who recently joined him with 20 men. Most of the original volunteers from Bexar have left, coming to the conclusion that Dr. Grant's main object is eventually to regain his own lands near Parras, Coahuila.

1837: SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 5. General Albert Sidney Johnston, who only last week was named commander-in-chief of the Texas Army, this morning was severely wounded in a duel with General Felix Huston. Huston had been selected commander-in-chief by the army itself, and was being relegated to second in command by Johnston's appointment. Four or five shots were exchanged. The specific reason for the duel is not known, but it is thought that the underlying cause is General Huston's resentment at being replaced.

General Huston, confirmed in the rank of Junior Brigadier General by Congress last December 21, has been urging an invasion of Mexico through Matamoros. It is well known that President Sam Houston is opposed to this, and the day after Huston was confirmed, Johnston was appointed and confirmed as Major Brigadier General. He is a graduate of West Point, and is considered a capable and dependable officer. His wound now forces him to abandon active command.

Huston is highly popular with the army. He is a former Mississippian who entered Texas last July with some 200 volunteers under his command. Tall and slender, always dressed in an impeccable uniform, the general makes an imposing

figure. With the army to support him, it is feared by some that he may some day be a problem to the Texas civil government.

1840: TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 4. Alphonse de Saligny, charge d'affaires of His Majesty the King of France, was presented today to the Texas Senate, meeting in Austin. He was accorded the honor of a national salute, since Texas is attempting to negotiate a large loan from the French government or from French banking houses. General James Hamilton, a former governor of South Carolina, is currently in Paris for this purpose, and news from him is expected with the next ship from France.

De Saligny was appointed to his post last October, but did not arrive in Texas until last month. He first visited Texas in February, 1839. At that time he was one of the secretaries of the French legation in Washington City, D.C., and his mission was to determine whether France should negotiate with the new Republic. He spent two months in Houston, and was cordially received by President Mirabeau Buonaparte Lamar, who is of French descent. His favorable report was considered a factor in the recognition of Texas by France through the Franco-Texian treaty of September 25, 1839, signed by King Louis Phillipe on October 2.

1840: WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 5. The Fifth Texas Congress adjourned today after enacting a law prohibiting the immigration of free Negroes into Texas. Other laws approved during this session include an improvement of the postal system and a prohibition of dueling, a practice which has been all too common in Texas.

The law entitled "Concerning Free Persons of Color" enacted today sets up a fine of \$1,000 for any free Negro apprehended entering Texas. If it is not paid, the free Negro may be sold into slavery. It also requires that any free Negroes already in the Republic must leave within two years, by the end of 1841.

The institution of slavery is considered of great importance to the economy of Texas, since other help is difficult to obtain. Cotton is the major Texas crop for export. Its staple is considered preferable for length and fineness to any grown in the United States. The average crop per acre is one 500-pound bale, but many areas produce more. It sells for 10 to 15 cents per pound. It is estimated that a good working hand can pick 1,000 pounds of cotton per week, with Saturday afternoon and Sunday off.

when the law was passed, it applied to Texas also. However, Stephen F. Austin was able to get special dispensation for slaves already in Texas to remain. Actually, the law was not enforced in Texas, and new slaves were frequently brought in. With the establishment of the Republic, the number of slaveholders has increased rapidly. It is currently estimated that at least 20 per cent of Texas farmers are slave owners, and the number is growing rapidly each year.

The law on postal reform, passed earlier this session, is greatly needed, but it is questionable how much a new law can accomplish. The delivery of mail has been erratic, hampered by inadequate roads, floods, and high waters, to say nothing of mail robberies and other difficulties. A major and chronic problem is lack of funding. Postal officials and employees are inadequately paid, and when they are paid, it is with devalued currency that is almost worthless. Unfortunately this difficulty cannot be overcome in the near future.

1841: WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 3. Congress today authorized the highly respected firm of McKinney, Williams and Company of Galveston to issue \$30,000 in notes to circulate as money. They are the major mercantile and commission merchants in Texas, and greatly aided the financing of the Texas government during the period of the war with Mexico and after the establishment of the Republic.

The firm was founded in 1834 at Quintana, on the right bank of the Brazos River near its mouth, by Thomas M. McKinney and Samuel M. Williams. McKinney was one of the original colonists brought in by

Stephen F. Austin, having come to Texas in 1824. William also arrived that same year, to serve as Austin's secretary, and to help manage the affairs of the colony. He continued in that capacity until shortly after his partnership with McKinney was established.

The firm moved to Galveston three years ago, and is said to own more than one-fifth of the city. They previously were in Houston, and still own the Tremont House there. In addition to land and banking, they handle most of the cotton trade

of Houston and Galveston. They also operate the small steamer Yellow Stone on the Brazos River, the Laura on the Buffalo Bayou, and have recently added the Lafitte.

The notes which Congress authorized today are secured by mortgages, real estate, Negroes and a sawmill valued at \$60,000. The law provides that the firm is not permitted to issue "more than \$2 of their own notes for every \$1 of their actual monied capital on hand." The firm is considered conservative and careful in its operations,

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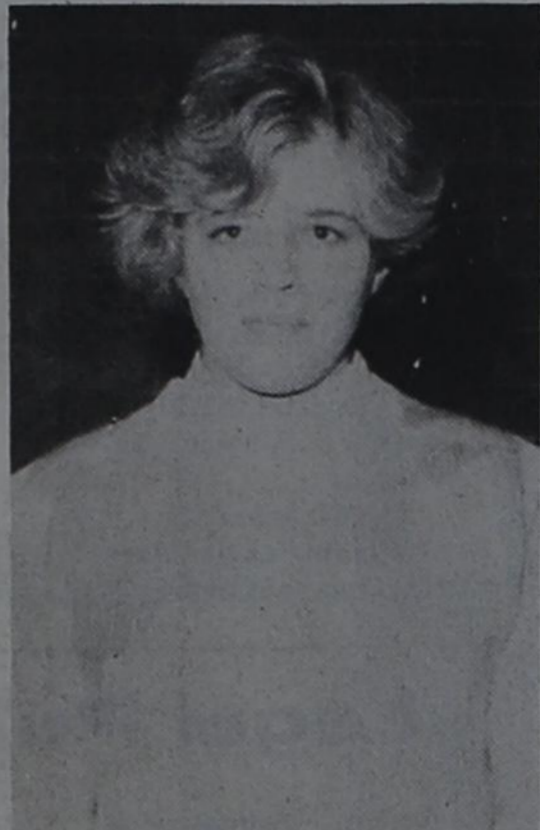

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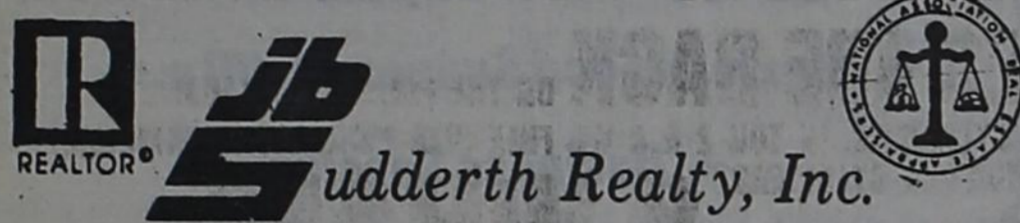

Parts of Highway 86 to be rebuilt here

A 21.4 mile section of State Highway 86 from south of Bovina to the East Parmer County Line will be rebuilt soon, and U.S. 84 through the southwest part of the county will be resurfaced, under contracts approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The commission approved spending \$4.7 million for the work on S.H. 86 which will be done by Amarillo Road Co. of Amarillo. The project will be paid for out of the state highway fund.

to make this project a reality." Pope said the highway department will soon hold a meeting with Amarillo Road, and construction should begin shortly after that meeting.

The resurfacing of U.S. 84 in Parmer County is part of a \$3.7 million project to improve 190 miles of highway in the 17-county Lubbock District of the highway department.

The resurfacing work is also a direct result of improved funding, said Pope.

"A few years ago, the amount of this type resurfacing work was next to nothing due to lack of funds," said Pope. "Now we hope to be able to resurface 264 miles in our 17-county area during 1986."

The resurfacing, known as a seal coat, protects the road from water and ice damage, and also improves skid resistance. The work on U.S. 84 is scheduled to be done this summer.

"Being able to get this project under contract is a direct result of the increase in state highway funding," said William M. Pope, highway district engineer in Lubbock.

"We had plans for this project finished, but they were sitting on the shelf because of lack of funds. Thanks to increases in motor vehicle fuel taxes and in vehicle registration, we now have the funds
