my mind.
The first was Lyndon Johnson's The first was Lyndon Johnson's
War on Poverty. LBJ spent about as
much money as is possible on trying much money as is possible on trying
to end poverty in our nation. I won't say the War on Poverty was a com-
plete failure but I don't think many folks will call it a success. The fact is that just throwing dollars at poverty won't cure it; and in some
cases it unfortunately helps expand The second item that changed my
feelings toward the space program was the knowledge of the "spinoffs" from the program that helped our
economy's private sector - namely the computer industry.
Today, our computer industry is second to none. Our country has an excellent trade balance when it
comes to computers. You probably take it for granted, like I do; just
chalk it up to good, old American know-how, right? Well, the fact is
that the space program that the space program gave a
mighty boost to this fledgling in-
dustry. And we can all see the dustry. And we can all see the
results in our everyday jobs: the
computer revolution is well under way.
Thus, I'm a backer of our space
programs, especially what is termed the "Star Wars" defensive
system proposed by President Reagan.
As I've written, I bemoan the fact
that we give so much money to the defense industry when I know that
so much is wasted. That amount of waste, though, cannot compare to
the value that a workable the value that a workable Space
Wars network would have if it eliminated the threat of nuclear eliminated
weapons.
I know believe that if the U.S. and USSR simply signa treaty banning the use
of nuclear weapons forever the
problem would cease. I call that wishful thinking. And dangerous
thinking. thinking.
History shows us that totalitarian nations fear only one thing: might.
As long as the U.S. stays militarily As lrong, we have nothing to fear from
the Soviet Union. But when we let the Soviet Union. But when we let
our defensive posture become slack, that's when we should worr
President President Reagan, by strength-
ening the military during his tenure, has placed the U.S. in excellent
shape for a meaningful treaty con trolling nuclear weapons. No along comes the Gramm-Rudman
Amendment which, if it takes place, will cause deep cuts in defense spending.
If that should dismiss any and all thoughts of any pacts with Russia. The
Soviets would see that we are cutting back and becoming weaker;
thus, their aims would be bolder. Never, never seek any type of treaty at such a time.
As I wrote in one of last year's
columns, Iexpect our Cold War with
Russia to Russia to continue for quite some
time, maybe another 50 years. Time is on our side because eventually the
repressive regime in the USSR will repressive regin
have to lighten.

So I back the Star Wars program
100 percent. I 100 percent. I know some scientists
don't feel it's feasible but that's normal. There are only some skep-
tics; just look around you. What is ims; just look around you. What is
important is that we try to make it
work. The end result could well be work. The end result could well be

Let us now mourn the astronauts their nation. It is a time to grieve. But let us not lose sight of our space
program's goals and let us strive to program's goals and let us strive to

within two years, by the end of 1841 . within two years, by the end of 1841 .
The institution of slavery is considered of great importance to the economy of Texas, since other help

staple is considered preferable for length and fineness to any grown in the United States. The average crop

## Water District agenda

New rules governing the permitting of water wells, waste of water,
water well drilling, and the closing water well drilling, and the closing
of abandoned or unused irrigation wells are to be considered by the Board of Directors of the High vation District No. 1 .
Consideration of ame of the District's existing rules is required in order for the District to 69th Texas Legislature regarding underground water conservation districts.
The most notable change required
in the District's the permitting of wells designed to produce and which will produce more than 25,000 gallons of wate per day. Previously, state laws and
the District's rules required permitting only those wells which were designed to produce in excess of 100,000 gallons per day. will, however, be exempted from the permitting process. For in stance, domestic wells which supply
water for ten or fewer households, gas wells, and jet wells for domestic needs are exempted under the provisions of the new law. The Disan option in the Directors is given provide water for livestock and poultry connected with farming, ranching or dairy operations. Under the law, individual boards may consider the applicability of ex-
empting livestock wells within their empting livestock wells within their
jurisdiction. urisuction. Provisions for the automatic per-
mitting of wells which produce from 25,000 (17.4 gallons per minute) to 100,000 gallons of water per day (69.5 gallons per minute) that
existed at the time the law was existed at the time the law was

tion. The permitting of these wells is automatic upon application for and completion of a water well permit. This registration process is neces-
