Texico man charged in local burglaries

Benny Kingston, 22, of 221 Anderson in Texico, was arrested March 6 by the Curry County Sheriff's Department after approximately \$5,000 in stolen merchandise was found at his residence, police said.

A Texico man had spotted a jacket belonging to the owner of a local trucking firm being worn by Kingston. The jacket was one of a set of five that belonged to the employees of the firm.

The man then called City Hall to report that he had spotted the jacket and was referred to the Curry County Sheriff's Department because the Texico marshal was out of town.

Deputy Randy Johnson said Kingston said that he had bought the jacket. Kingston gave them permission to search the premises, he

coffee maker, saddle, television sets and numerous other items stored in the closet, bathroom, dresser drawers and under the bed in Kingston's apartment.

It had been incorrectly reported that Kingston was working with his neighbors to help form a Neighborhood Watch. Ann Cooper, chairman of the Neighborhood Watch program in Texico, said that she had never seen the man and he wasn't involved.

"He had nothing to do with the Neighborhood Watch," said Mrs. Cooper. "This was just an understanding between him and one of his neighbors that they would watch each other's homes when one or the other was away."

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said Kingston had been accused of involvement in burglaries in the Parmer County area. "Approximately eight of the burglary cases have been cleared up," said Morgan, "including merchandise taken from Loomix, Spears Trucking and several homes."

Kingston was charged with five counts of auto burglary over \$100; two counts of residential burglaries under \$100; four counts of larcency over \$100; one count of possession of stolen property under \$100, and one count of possession of a controlled substance.

He was arraigned March 9 and his bond was set at \$40,500. Johnson said the investigation will continue to try and locate any other stolen merchandise that Kingston allege-

Here are some statistics from the annual performance report of Farwell Schools that you might find interesting:

Of the 466 students, 65.5 percent are white; 35.5 percent Hispanic, and 1.1 percent black. On the free and reduced lunch program are 37.6 percent of the total enrollment.

The combined average experience of the teachers is 11.0 years. Forty-five percent of the teachers have taught from 11 to 20 years, a statistic much higher than the state average (31.3).

Nineteen percent of the teachers are now on career ladder status, meaning they receive an extra \$1,560 a year.

The school personnel total breaks down this way: teachers, 79.8 percent; support staff, 13.5 percent, and campus administration, 6.7 percent. Also, 52.9 percent are female and 47.1 percent are male.

The average actual salaries are: teachers, \$20,545; support staff, \$22,433; and campus administration, \$33,760.

Barrow is Joe Tartar of Farwell. This was 12-year-old Melissa's first championship banner at the Houston Show. A Potter County 4-H member, Melissa is the daughter of Danny and Theresa O'Donald of Amarillo, Texas.

Breeder of the Reserve Grand Champion is Rick Seaton of Parmer County.

After two days of marathon judging a total of 1358 hogs, Parrish admitted to being tired. But he said he enjoyed the caliber of the show and complimented the exhibitors on their pride and the excellent way they presented their animals.

He also congratulated show officials on a tremendously organized show. Parrish summed up his comments with a few pointers for the exhibitors.

Gikas, Farwell council move on vacant city buildings

Mayor Chris Gikas discussed the Farwell City Council's vote last month to attempt to purchase the McDorman property down the block from city hall.

It contains the former laundry building. Criticism had been voiced of the purchase. No one attended the Tuesday meeting to voice their views pro or con.

Gikas said that the building, if purchased, would be torn down by city employees free of charge. If the property were cleaned up, he said, someone could buy it and the city would make a profit on the transaction.

The city has voted to spend \$3,000 from federal revenue sharing funds to buy the property if legal obstacles were removed.

Gikas said Farwell residents have stressed two major problems since he took office as mayor last year: dogs running loose and the unsightly appearance of the McDorman building.

"We don't have to buy any," he said in reply to this question. "But there are some we might."

After further discussion, the council voted to have city officials write to property owners whose vacant buildings could be considered safety hazards, urging they be upgraded.





The second best part of being back still lies ahead, and that, of course, is getting to work on the issues. We've still got the budget and taxes to deal with, more prison legislation, sunset bills and a variety of other exciting measures.

There was one last major bill, though, that passed the Senate before our return, and it's a bill we strongly support. We refer to Sen. Carl Parker's bill to eliminate the scheduled subject-area testing for our state's teachers.

Subject-area testing, like all teacher testing, was a questionable idea from the start. It was included in the now famous (or infamous) House Bill 72 of 1984 because taxpayers were demanding more accountablility for their education tax dollars. Poll after poll showed Texans would support a tax increase to raise teacher pay if they could guarantee the money was going to well-qualified teachers. Scheduled for the near future was

the second, subject-area test. The idea was that once a teacher's basic competency was tested, their knowledge of the subject area they teach should be measured. This test naturally applied primarily to secondary school teachers.

Subject-area testing, as it turned out, was full of problems. For one thing, our budget crisis had left us without the funding necessary to develop a top-notch test. Also, there were serious concerns as to whether the subject-area tests would reveal any more about teacher com-

petency than the first test. All subject-area testing seemed to be doing for sure was cause morale problems among teachers, who viewed the proposed test as little more than a TECAT II.

Senator Parker argued successfully that it would be best for all involved to forget about the subjectarea tests and concentrate on our primary goal of making Texas' public schools the best in the nation. The Senate agreed, passing his bill unanimously.

We would add only that our teachers have paid their dues. We took the TECAT, and we know how little it did to help our school systems. Our teachers have been through a lot the last three years: it's only fitting the Senate recognize the fact.

finances separate

In these difficult economic times, keeping family finances separate from those of the farming or ranching operation can help with money and stress management.

Household expenses may seem small compared to business expenses. However, relatively small amounts, when added together, can become a drain on family resources.

Good records are a special help in the effort to control living expenses. Many families simply don't know where their money goes each month. But if they wrote down each expenditure - in a notebook, a checkbook register, or even on a piece of paper taped to the refrigerator door - the family spending patterns would become clear.

At the end of the month, the expenses can be divided into budget categories. That can help family members see where expenses might be trimmed. It also forms the basis for planning the next month's spending so you can live within your income.

It's not advisable to mix family and business accounts.


FHA members attend convention

The Farwell FHA/Hero Chapter traveled to Midland, Texas, March 6 and 7 to attend the Region I FHA Convention.



Phone policy on agenda

Legislation designed to alter the state's long distance telecommunications regulatory policy is now before the Texas Legislature.

Senate Bill 229 sponsored by Senator John Montford, D-Lubbock, and House Bill 468 by Representative Bill Haley, D-Center, would reduce the regulatory restrictions placed on AT&T and encourage direct competition among the more than 160 long distance companies now doing business in Texas.

"The legislation ensures that all Texans, not just those in major metropolitan areas, receive the benefits of an extensively competitive long distance market place," said Pres Sheppard, AT&T vice president external affairs. "Only an economically sound communications industry can provide Texans with the latest technology and attractively priced services and options."

Today, AT&T is the only long distance company that must endure prolonged regulatory proceedings

by the Texas Public Utility Commission before changing its prices, or offering new products and services.

Sheppard said the legislation contains strong safeguards for rural Texans. It assures that all customers in the state have access to the latest technology and that no one is left without reasonably priced long distance service.

Some 26 other states already have approved forward-looking long distance telecommunications policies and are positioned to use those policies in their guests to broaden local economies and attrack hightech industry.
