## This tale has no moral


That golf is sure a strange game. I finally got back out on the links last week after a lengthy layoff due to that difficult situation facing many of us -- work.

Pike successful in his roping career

Stewart Pike, 28, of Lariat, has been following the rodeo circuits for about 18 years and has spent much of his time roping as the heeler part of several roping teams.

Pike has been riding horses since he was about three and started competing in rodeos when he was 10. He won the all-around roping when he was in Junior Rodeo.

Pike says that his father, Bruce, taught him the basics of horseback riding. Bruce is a livestock broker from Albuquerque.

Pike has won around 100 belt buckles and 19 saddles so far in his roping career. He has entered rodeos in 10 different states. He attends 40 to 60 rodeos a year, and at one time in his life, attended 104 rodeos.

Although he is the heeler of the team roping team, he used to be the header in 1978.

Last June, Pike won the ninth annual Bob Fiest Invitational Team Roping Classic at Reno, Nev. He and Garcia captured the first place prize of \$14,000 per person. They roped six steers in a time of 54.89. Eighty-three teams were entered in the contest, including the 1985 world champions. Pike also won a horse trailer, belt buckle and other items. The events at Reno are part of the world's richest team roping events and the only competition that beats it is the "Gold Buckle for the Year" competition. Pike is semi-seriously considering entering the Gold Buckle competition. One of Pike's more embarassing moments was in Albuquerque this year, when his reliable horse bucked him off in front of everybody at a rodeo event that had him roping to win the go around. Pike says that he had never bucked before or after that time. This has been a standing joke with his roping budies. Pike has been married to his wife, Luann, for four years. They have a daughter, Tara, 3. Pike has lived in the Farwell area for 10 years and Luann was raised in Texico. Pike says his wife is his moral support and his daughter is learning to ride horses a little bit by mostly riding with him.

The rest was easy and I ended with a birdie on the hole. Thus, for the first three holes I was playing "par" golf. I was in seventh -- make that eighth -- heaven.

By now, I was feeling pretty cocky. In golf, that's the first step in gong downhill fast. But when you're strutting your stuff, it's hard to think that far ahead.

No. 4 was a piece of cake. I had to take a bogey because of the wind. the sun, air, bugs, falling leaves, a speck in my eye, all of the above (take your pick). But that was okay. It sure beat the "9s" and "10s" I was taking when I first started playing this crazy game a year ago. Then came No. 5, the hole that hates me. It's long, over 500 yards and sometimes you think you will never get to the green.

Well, I got there. But it took 7 strokes to put the ball in the hole. Okay, no problem, I said to myself. I'm still in good shape; time to pull yourself together.

Next was No. 6. This is my favorite hole because it doglegs to the right. That means you can slice (hook? I forget) the ball to the right and even though you're in the rough, you're close to the green.

That was my strategy all the way. I sliced (hooked?) it but my second shot was a smidgin off the green. Mark down another bogey.

No. 7 is another 3-par (to some folks, that is). The hurricane-force wind took my ball far to one side of the green so I had to settle for another bogey. I can accept that: a bogey golfer isn't that bad.

I smiled as I approached the t-box at No. 8. This is a difficult hole since your ball tends to go right -- out of bounds. But with the winds coming from that direction, I had no fear.

True to my thinking, my ball curved one way, then the other, finally settling in the middle of the fairway. A second shot put me near the green and I would have parred the hole except that my putt lipped the hole, spinning out.

As I approached No. 9, my mind was whirring away with awesome thoughts. With a 38 for 8 holes, I could take a bogey or double-bogey, then be in good shape for the back nine and my quest of an under-90 score, something I had only achieved once in my entire life about a month back).

Y'see, that's the problem with

Mark Fanning, previous 1985 winner of the Bob Fiest Invitational, was the first to help Pike with his roping. He simply told Pike about timing and Pike took it from there. Pike says that he took a little bit of knowledge from everyone who could rope well. From there he taught himself and developed his own roping style. Pke says, "You've got to take what you can from other ropers and put it with your own style.'

Pike says that he and his 11-yearold horse, Raffles, who he has owned for eight years, learned together in six months to head and heel. He spent most of his time across from the Clovis Livestock Auction with about eight steers, eight hours a day, only stopping to eat, and let the livestock rest.

One of Pike's best learning experiences was when he got to where he thought he could rope better than the big boys or the "Wolves" (real good team ropers) and tried to beat them at their game -- and ended up beating himself.

Pike later roped with Jake Barnes, current World Champion team roper. Together they went for the "Five to Fifty" (Five steers for \$50), with 10 of the top 15 of the Rodeo Cowboys Association. He and Jake beat out 150 teams in the team roping events.

This gave Pike the confidence that he needed. "This gave me the confidence to do my own roping, no matter who was there, because if you don't get that confidence, you just end up beating yourself."

When Pike was in high school, he won in the big 1975 National High School Rodeo Finals. He and Clay Means won the finals in team roping.

In 1981, he and sister Sabrina won the Mixed Roping at the XIT and in 1982, he won the open roping events at the XIT with his partner since high school, Danny Garcia of Clay-

Mrs. Pike is interested in working with ceramics and helps around their place by feeding bottle calves. She says that she was brought up living and working around feedlots. One project Pike is very proud of

is the roping arena that he and Lee Plummer built by his home in Lariat. It measures about 170 by 300 square feet and was built so that he would have better access to an area to practice his roping skills.

Pike says that he would like to do more with his rodeo career, but his job ties him down now.

Although Pike used to work with a custom branding crew, in Clovis, he now is assistant manager at the Farwell Feeds Yards.

# **Office** opening suspended

**1837: SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER** 30. President Sam Houston today approved a joint resolution of Congress suspending the opening of the General Land Office scheduled for tomorrow, October 1. The resolution was passed by a special session of Congress, called by the President on September 25 specifically to consider this matter. The reason for the action is that the official boundary line between Texas and the United States still has not been formally surveyed. He blames delays by the United States. He stated, therefore, that "the land law which was passed by the last Congress of the Republic of Texas, and which was designed to take effect on the first day of October next, could not go into operation."

The land law he refers to was passed last June 12, over his veto. In pursuance of this law, he appointed John P. Borden as Commissioner of the General Land Office on June 21. Borden has been at work organizing the documents previously on file. His commission is now suspended

### **Texico** wins sportsmanship award

as of tomorrow, but this may be only temporary.

The Texas land offices which existed under Mexican law were ordered closed by the Consultation in November, 1835. However, the Republic's Constitution recognizes the validity of land ownership acquired under Mexican and Spanish law, stating: "All orders of survey legally obtained by any citizen of the Republic, from any legally authorized commissioner, prior to the act of the late Consultation closing the land offices, shall be valid."

The Constitution goes on to say that "the whole land system shall be suspended until persons serving in the army can have a fair and equal chance with those remaining at home to select and locate their lands." It also requires a General Land Office to be set up, stating:


"And with a view to the simplification of the land system, and the protection of the people and the government from litigation and fraud, a general land office shall be established, where all the land titles of the Republic shall be registered, and the whole territory of the Republic shall be sectionized in a manner hereafter to be prescribed by law, which shall enable the officers of the government or any citizen to acertain with certainty the lands that are vacant, and those lands which may be covered by valid titles.'

It has been generally assumed that the sectionalization would be in square miles, according to the practice adopted in the United States. However, the land law of June 12 sectionized the country by a base line and four meridian lines. This was one of the reasons Presi-

dent Houston vetoed it. The previous December Congress also passed a land law which the President vetoed as being too vague, and this law, too, was passed over his veto.

The President has insisted that a proper land law must provide protection to Texas citizens against outsiders, who "would be found coming, by hundreds and thousands, to procure their leagues and labors in this land of promise, knowing that they could do it at no other expense than the breath which would enable them to say amen to a false oath administered, as it might be, within the walls of a grog shop or brothel," the President wrote in his veto message.

## **Boy's** death accidental

The death of a 4-year-old Bovina boy who was run over by a grain truck his father was driving will be ruled an accident, according to Friona Highway Patrol Trey Ellis.

Bruce Cavazos, 4, was pronounced dead Sunday evening on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital. He was struck by a 1955 Ford grain truck around 7 p.m., Ellis said.

The accident occurred approximmately 2 miles east of Bovina on **Texas Highway 86.** 

Ellis said the boy's father, Jose, had backed the grain truck up to chain it to another automobile. The boys apparently wandered in front of the grain truck and was struck by the right front tire as Cavazos began to pull forward, Ellis said. According to Ellis, no charges have been filed, and the death is being treated as an accident.

President Houston fears that unless proper safeguards are taken, there will be widespread fraud by "mock citizens" who could repeatedly enter Texas and each time take the oath of citizenship and receive a headright, which they can then sell to speculators, who "now have their plots in their pockets, ready to enter them the moment the land offices are opened." He has therefore consistently opposed the opening of a General Land Office until all procedures have been completely clarified, which so far Congress has failed to do.

The Republic estimates that it has more than 251 million acres of land within its borders, of which about 26 million has been disposed of through grants by Spain and Mexico, leaving more than 225 million in public domain. This land is looked upon as the Republic's chief source of future revenue.

### Drug abuse prevention stressed at Lazbuddie

On Sept. 23, ENMU basketball oach Larry Riley presented a drug wareness program to the Lazbuddie junior high and high school students.

He cited the problems of peer pressure and psychological and physical addiction. He talked about the Presidential Drug Awareness Program, which is publicizing America's drug problem and is emphasizing prevention.

-Riley said that there are three steps in the effective control of drug abuse: strick law enforcement, rehabilitation and prevention. He emphasized that prevention is America's best chance at control of this rampant calamity that threatens to cripple the nation.

Riley told the students that drugs can cause death or severe personality disorders. He said that many drugs are residual and build up in the vital organs of the body, including the brain. Riley stated, "Each person is reponsible for his own decision. The use of drugs hinders the normal attainment of natural happiness in life." \*\*\*

**Portales blanks Texico** gridders


Texico Junior High's football team was defeated by Portales eighth grade at Portales, 6-0, last week.
