

A total of 1096 Parmer County voters who went to the polls in the Primary runoff elections Saturday was termed an excellent turnout for a runoff.

Even though the voter turnout was only 27.3 percent of the registered voters, it beat the 15 percent average voter turnout in previous runoffs, according to Bonnie Warren, county clerk. But it was not enough to put

Osteoporosis Concerns Women pregnant. Recent publicity about osteo-

porosis has left many women with questions about calcium in their diets.

Osteoporosis is a degenerative disease that involves an abnormal loss of bone tissue. It's a serious problem because it has been linked to more than 200,000 hip fractures suffered by older women each year.

Exercise is equally important since reduced physical activity can hasten bone loss. Almost any form of exercise, and especially walking, can help. Healthy women should exercise regularly and as vigorously as possible to maintain their bone mass.

Once osteoporosis is diagnosed, a physician may treat the disease in several ways. These include increasing calcium and vitamin D intake, recommending an exercise program, or prescribing certain drugs.

Any woman who thinks she has osteoporosis should, of course, consult her doctor.

Hopefully, more women will make sure they are getting a nutritious diet, including plenty Leafy green vegetables, canned of calcium-rich foods and sardines, and kidney beans are enough exercise so this will be also good sources of calcium, less of a health problem in the future.







# **California Grandmother Walks For Disabled Vets**

Jennifer Roy and Walter are on their way to see the President. Not by car, not by plane, not by train. By foot.

Mrs. Roy is a 59-year-old grandmother from Lone Pine, Calif., who is very well-known there for her work and support of the disabled veterans.


