After the special music, several children presented their rendition of the traditional Christmas story.

Members of the cast were Christy Corn as Mary; Jeremy Skaggs as Joseph; Robin Foster as the angel Gabriel; Clay Corn as the narrator; playing angels were Charla Corn, Julie Franse, and Ashley Carpenter; Shepherds were Jackie Sides, Angela Skaggs, Kirk Gober and Melody Montgomery; Wisemen were Jim Bob Sides, Jerrod Franse and Nathan Skaggs; Reace Bennett as the Innkeeper; Rosalyn Bennett as the Star; Ramsey Bennett as the donkey; Sarah Montgomery as the camel and Ginger Sides as the sheep; children were played by Clint Corn, Karissa Foster, Megan Foster and Paul Franse.

The Christmas program was written and directed by Tina Sides, program chairman of the Community Christmas.

Special music was presented by Lynn Blankenship of North Dallas.

Wendol Christian, of Oklahoma Lane, told about the history of the Oklahoma Lane Community Christmas. He pointed out the three different Christmas trees that were decorated especially for that night.

One was a box crate with three rows of string that were strung across the corner of the wall above the crate. The string was decorated with Christmas cards and knickknacks and the crate had some antique looking toys sitting in each of its shelves. This tree was set up to look like the very first Christmas tree that the first settlers to the Oklahoma Lane Community had.

The second tree was a limb that had been wrapped in green crepe paper and decorated with popcorn and cranberries. This tree depicted the second tree at the Oklahoma Lane gathering, which was originally a peach tree wrapped with green paper and decorated the same.

The third tree was a 13 foot tree donated by Billy Whitecotton of the Bovina Supermarket. This was the traditional Christmas tree and was beautifully decorated by members of the community.

It was noted that in 70 years only one Oklahoma Lane Christmas program was ever called off, due to a bad snow storm.

the history of the community Christmas by Carrie Foster Christian. Carrie said that in 1921 it was held in the "Sunny Side School," west of the old Foster place, now Junior Pool's place. The school was located on what is now the Earl Routon farm. Carrie recalls traveling to the community Christmas in a wagon and carrying bricks, which had been heated and wrapped in cloth in their pockets to keep their hands warm for the half-mile ride to the school.

Carrie said, that in 1923 Carrie Foster, Clarence Christian, Tom Foster, Lucille Magness, Buck Ellison and Mable Ayers were sent by their parents to decorate the tree. Carrie said that her parents were away due to an illness in the family.

After they had finished decorating the tree they went ice skating out on the playa lake. Carrie said that this was an absolute "no-no" for them to skate on a Sunday and when they arrived home they had to "face the music."

Several generations of relatives from the Foster families, the Rundell families, the Billingsley family, the McGuire family and the Jenkins family were among the relatives of the early families present.

Four generations of the Christian family were there.

A short business meeting was held after the program. Wendol Christian was elected the new community treasurer and Kanetha Foster was elected program chairman for next year.

Christmas carols were then sung and "Jingle Bells" hastened the arrival of Santa Claus.

Santa handed out gifts and at the end of the program sacks filled with goodies were distributed to everyone.

Combest: No cuts in '87 gov't farm checks

Congressman Larry Combest visited Farwell Jan. 14 and fielded questions posed by his constituents. Some of the questions and his answers follow:

How can we justify an authorization of \$312 billion on defense?

"The president won't get \$312 billion, but he will get quite a bit of the money he requested. The \$312 billion represents only a 3% real growth in defense spending this year. There are several areas in the defense department which need revitalization.

"The percent spent on defense has remained at about 16% of the national budget for the past 20 years. The big increases have been in the entitlement programs like social security.

"I see a strong national defense as critical to the nation. I defend the defense budget because there are certain long range investment plans like the B-1 bomber that we are locked into.

"Just because we spend money on defense does not mean that we take away from other programs. In the past 15 years the defense budget increased 138%, but the agriculture budget has increased 708%."

What is your opinion of Iran-Scam?

"I don't want to make a judgement till I get all the facts. Most of the real facts will be presented in closed session."

What is happening on the proposed nuclear waste site near Hereford?

"The Department of Energy has moved 10 people and their families to Vega to do a site characterization study which may lead to the purchase of land. The study may last five years.

"We have two options: the courts (where suits have been filed), and a legislative hold until the entire process can be reviewed.

"Some of us think the Department of Energy violated a law when they dropped the second site from consideration at the point they did, but there are too many unanswered questions on the site.

"There are not too many members of Congress who will come to our aid. We now have a six-state coalition made of members whose states use the Ogallala aquifer and the transportation routes to this site."

"Would nuclear wastes pass through Farwell on their way to the proposed site? And if so, would the rail crossings be kept in good repair to avert an accident?"

Combest answered: "If we do get the site in this district, we will try to get what benefits we can - economic benefits and safety benefits."

Should we reduce foreign aid? "Gramm Rudman calls for a 4.3% reduction in foreign aid."

Will there be cuts in government checks for farmers?

"There was a 4.3% cut in the 1986 budget. There will be no cut in government checks for farmers in 1987."

What percent of foreign aid is given in cash, and what percent is given in commodities?

"I don't know. Some is given in commodities, some in weapons, and some in cash. I'm not sure that I have ever seen statistics on this, but I'll see if I can find out."

Why do we give direct loans for foreign agricultural programs when our agriculture is depressed?

"There are several bills before Congress which oppose this. There are also bills against loans which prop up foreign industries which compete against ours.

"Why prop up Continental Illinois and not the First State Bank of Midland?"

Should the Fed devalue the dollar?

"It is a good idea for Congress to stay out of the Federal Reserve's area.

"The dollar has fallen over the last 12 months. It takes time for the system to work. Congress tends to overreact. An artificial devaluation of the dollar is not a good idea in the long haul. Stability is better for us. We need to allow the true market-

place to work."

Why haven't the costs of Japanese products risen if the marketplace is operating as it should?

"The Japanese are eating the costs. What we seek is fair trade. We want as much access in Japan's market as they have in ours."

Why can't the farmer ship directly to foreign nations?

"I'd like to see it. I'd like to see a change in the cargo preference laws so that we could let shippers use foreign ships if they are cheaper.

"I favor things which lower the total base cost of production for American goods. We can still out-

produce any country in the world except Argentina on low cost agriculture products."

How do you feel about the proposed increases in federal wages?

"I sponsored a bill to prevent congressional pay raises, but I favor the increased wages for the judicial branch and for government workers. If we want the best, we must offer competitive wages."

What will happen to agriculture under the 1988 budget?

"There is no way that Reagan's proposal will stand. I would like to re-open the farm program and change some things."

Will there be any changes in the FHA bankruptcy sales?

"The tax burden on farmers whose equipment is sold at farm auction is tremendous. Forgiveness is treated as income which is ridiculous. Bankrupt small businesses have the same problem.

"But the new tax code aims at a balance of the budget. Proposed changes must be offset. So I'm not sure how this could be done."

Will the grading system be changed for cotton?

"We won't throw the whole system out. Some changes can be made, but we won't change all of it."

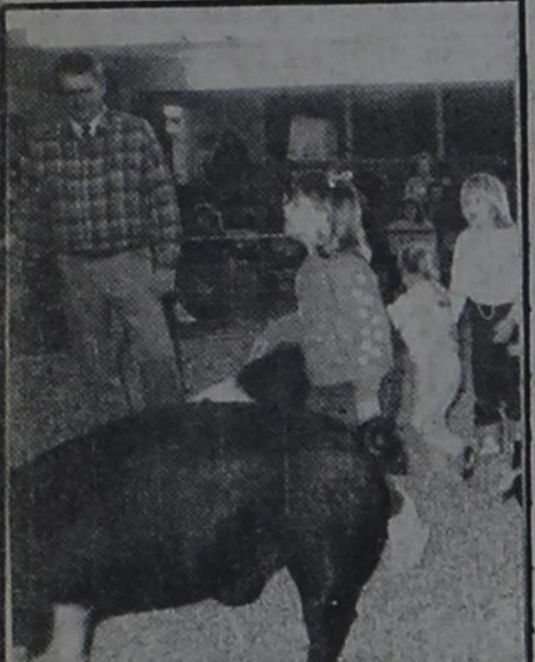
Childers picked to 'Who's Who'

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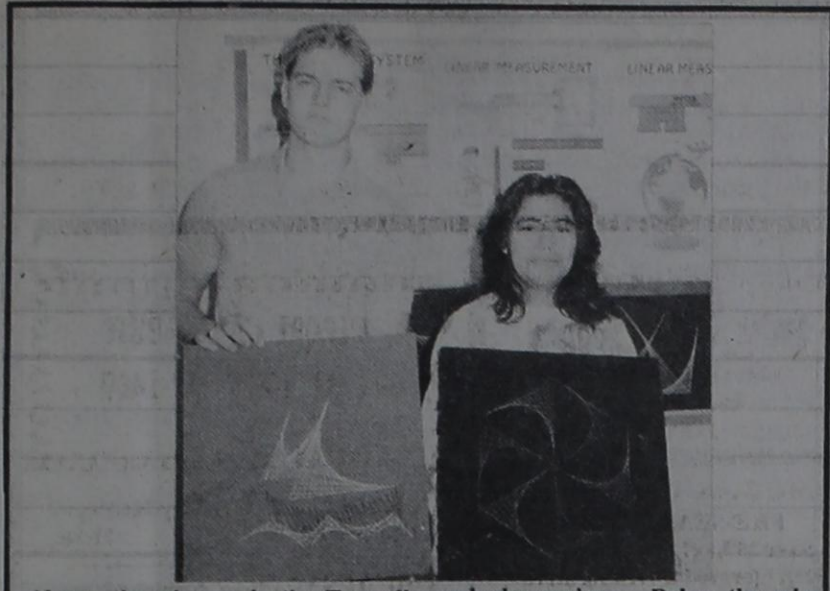
