You be the judge

An open letter to U.S. Cong. Larry Combest, who represents the Farwell area:

Dear Larry,
Normally, I have little problem with your stands. I think you do the best you can in representing Parmer County and that's fine with me. But when you voiced your responses at that recent town hall meeting in Farwell, you made one statement that really riles me.

When asked how you felt about proposed increases in federal wages, you responded: "I sponsored a bill to prevent congressional pay raises, but I favor the increased wages for the judicial branch and for government workers. If we want the best, we must offer competitive wages."

Wrong, wrong, wrong.

Extra pay for government workers will not bring them to a "competitive wage." The fact is that their pay is much, much higher than similar wages in private industry. I should know. I had to hire people in that Washington, D.C., suburb for five years, when they could double and triple their salaries by working for the federal government.

That's a fact, Larry. I think I know where the discrepancy in our views is. You may be looking at the top end of the GS (government workers) scale. I'm sure that if you view the top managers and compare what they earn to similar managers in private industry, then higher pay may well be in order.

But I am not looking at that 1 percent. I'm looking at the 99 percent of middle-and low-management personnel plus the regular workers, whether they be receptionist, clerks, janitors, whatever. Those folks earn far more than what they would get in private industry.

I will never forget that when I arrived in Washington in 1979 I was startled to find that the starting wage for a janitor was more than \$18,000 a year. Now, c'mon Larry, are you going to tell me that that's "not competitive" with private industry. If you find a janitorial post available in Parmer County for more than \$18,000, please let me know so I can apply for it.

The fact is, Larry, that my ex-neighbors, all of whom were federal employees, would tell me how they were stuck in their jobs because there was no way they could earn anything approaching their current salaries if they left government service.

That's a pure and simple fact. Now, let's get on to the real reason why our congressmen favor pay raises for federal employees. It's quite simplistic: they work together.

Let's face it, isn't it true that a good employer always is concerned about his employees? Aren't those employees around their employer every day? Don't good employers wish to show their appreciation for work well done?

How? By giving them more money. Back in 1963 - a quarter-century ago - 60,000 government employees in Washington earned more than \$50,000 a year.

Larry, how many Parmer workers in 1987 earn that amount? And if you want to figure it on a per capita basis, be my guest.

And forget that baloney you will hear about the higher cost of living in the District of Columbia? The fact is that a new car in West Texas costs the same as one in D.C. The same goes for insurance costs. For most foods, etc., etc.

And if you want to get right down to it. The main reason why items cost more in D.C. is because the federal government is paying salaries higher than they ought to be. In other words, Congress is the culprit (please don't say that to your peers, they won't appreciate the logic therein).

Pierce explains bond issue need

On Feb. 3, the residents of the Texico School District will go to the polls to elect two board members and vote on a bond issue to build four classrooms for the elementary school.

The Texico Elementary School has 11 classrooms at the present time. One room is used for kindergarten, one for Chapter I, half a room for speech, and half a room for special education plus eight classrooms for grades 1-4. Next school year with our present enrollment, we will need two rooms for first grade, two rooms for second grade, two rooms for third grade, two rooms for fourth grade, two rooms for fifth grade, one room for Chapter I, one room for kindergarten, one room for speech, and one room for special education.

As you can see, beginning with the school year 1987-88 the Texico Elementary will be short three classrooms. The average class size will range from 17 to approximately 20 students per class in grades one through five.

Presently we have only one fifth grade and it is housed in the junior high building. Next year with our present enrollment we will need five classrooms for grades six through eight plus one classroom for the computer lab which is located in the junior high building. This means the

fifth grade will need to be housed in the elementary school again.

Our high school enrollment grades nine through 12 will increase from 133 for the present year to a projected enrollment of 147 for the 1987-88 school year. The reason for the big increase in high school is because we will graduate 19 seniors which is the smallest senior class in several years and we will be moving up 33 eighth graders into the high school.

With the new addition to the elementary school, all elementary classes can be housed in the elementary school plus the nurse will have an office with hot and cold water and our elementary part-time counselor will have an office to use when he is working with elementary students.

This school year, Texico School was required by law to provide services to four-year-old developmentally disabled children. Next year the law requires we provide services for both three and four-year-old developmentally disabled children. This program itself could require an additional classroom.

The patrons of our community have been very supportive of our school and the Board of Education has not asked for classrooms unless it was absolutely necessary. Again, we ask for your support for this project in that education for our children is the best investment we can make.

Texico bond election set

The \$410,000 bond issue for improving Texico Schools will be voted on by Texico School District residents Tuesday.

Voters will go to the Texico Community Building between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. to cast their ballots. Planned are a building housing four classrooms, a nurse's office and counselor's office (see adjacent article from School Supt. James

Pierce). It would be added between the old elementary and intermediate buildings. Also, the hallway on the old elementary building would be enclosed.

Also on the ballot are two School Board posts. Terry Winkles and incumbent Arlye Crooks are seeking one post. And write-in candidates Ronnie Curry and Greg Martin are seeking the other.

He currently is president of the Texico School Board, having served on the board for 13 years. He is employed by the New Mexico American Water Co.

Terry Winkles, 413 College, was born and raised in Texico. He moved away for awhile then returned in 1983. He and his wife Julie have two sons, Joey and Josh.

Winkles is a deacon of the Clovis Advent Christian Church, coach of the Little League basketball team (the Badgers) and a member of the Texico Booster Club.

He is an electrical contractor, owning Beacon Electric.

The banquet will be at 7:30 p.m. March 14 at the Farwell Community

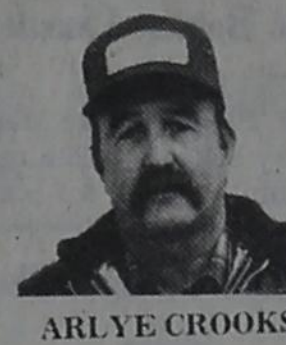
Center. The McCain Brothers from Bovina, a humorous duo which has appeared on many TV shows, will provide entertainment.

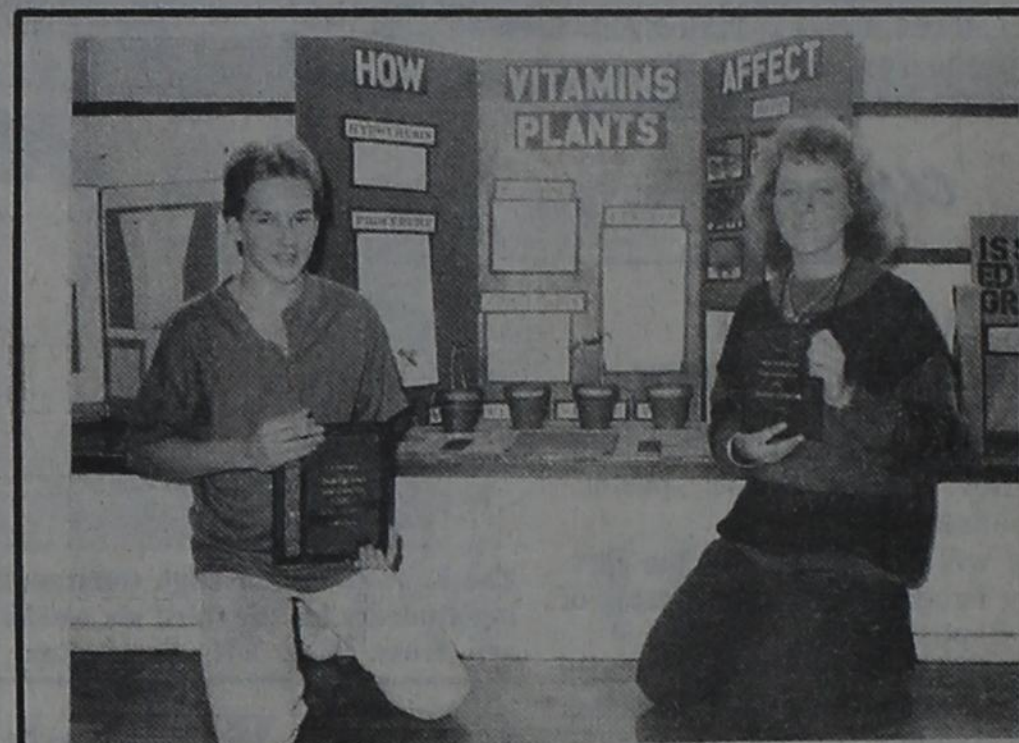

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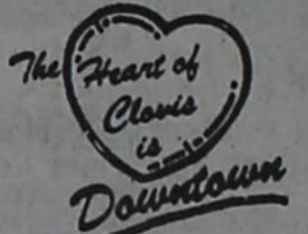
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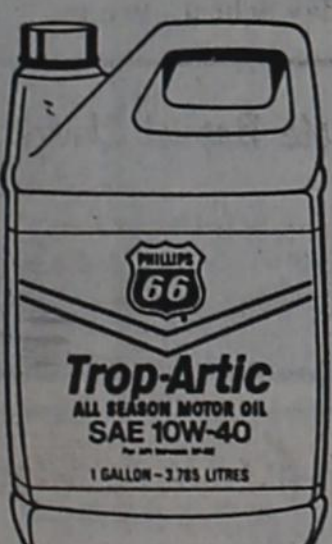


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Recipe of Week

TEXAS PECAN PIE

1½ cups brown sugar firmly packed
½ cup granulated sugar
¼ cup water
2 Tbsp. flour
½ tsp. salt
2 eggs
½ cup evaporated milk
½ cup pecan halves
¾ tsp. vanilla
1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell

Combine first five ingredients in small bowl and mix well. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add evaporated milk and mix well. Stir in pecan halves and vanilla. Mix well and turn into unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Cook in preheated 400° oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350° and cook an additional 35 to 40 minutes, or until filling is puffed in center and well browned. Let pie cool before cutting.

HONEY PECAN TREATS

½ cup butter
2 Tbs. honey
1 cup sifted flour
½ tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup finely chopped pecans

Cream butter, stirring in honey gradually. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Chill 1 hour. Form into 1-inch balls. Place well apart on greased baking sheets and bake in a 300° oven about 35 to 40 minutes or until light brown. Makes 2 dozen.

Emergency farm loan applications accepted

Application for emergency farm loans for losses caused by hail and rain are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Farwell, FmHA County Supervisor Weldon Rainey said.

Parmer County is one of 33 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting

from the hail and rain. Rainey said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less at 4½% interest.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Rainey said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Aug. 12, 1987 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Rainey said.

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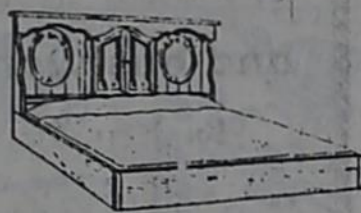

Loans tied to crop insurance

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for 1987 losses will need to have crop insurance if it is available, FmHA State Director, J. Lynn Futch said today.

"All family-size farmers should be aware that a newly-effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits our making emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril

crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)," said Futch.

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus an additional 35

specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program costs by about 50 percent, Futch said, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the newly-required tie-in with emergency loan eligibility.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value of his crop loss is still 30 percent or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective in January, the new requirement will affect crops planted in 1987, and thus will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple-peril, covering most forms of disaster, rather than hail-only.

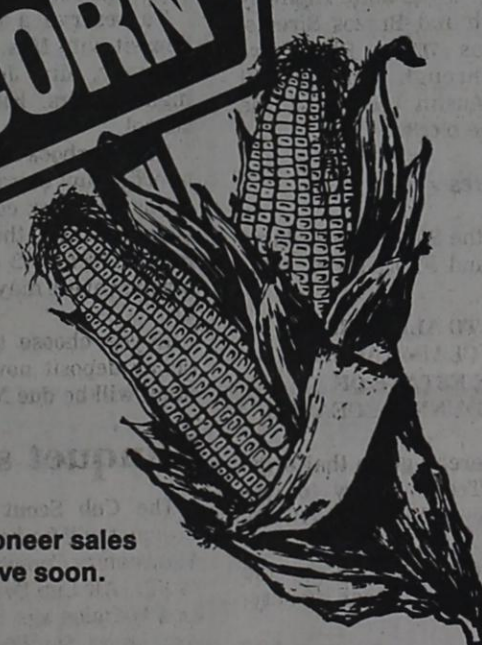
