Gikas, Rundell seek mayoral post

Chris Gikas and Cecil Rundell have filed for the Farwell mayoral post, recently vacated by Walter Kaltwasser.

It still is to be decided, though, whether the mayoral post will be on the April 5 ballot.

Kaltwasser's resignation takes effect April 5. There would be one more year left on it. The City Council will decide at its March 10 meeting whether the mayoral post will be on the spring ballot.

If the council agrees to list the mayoral post on the ballot, then the two candidates are Gikas and Rundell. If the council decides not to, then it would pick one of its own members to serve as mayor until the 1987 mayoral election.

Rundell first arrived in Farwell with his parents in 1925. He graduated from Oklahoma Lane High School.

After living elsewhere, he returned to Farwell in 1973 and has lived here since. He is the owneroperator of Cecil's Texaco Station in Farwell.

Gikas moved to Farwell in 1984 when he married the former Peggy Snider. They are co-owners of Twin Oaks Psi Design, Farwell.

Gikas retired as chairman of the Department of Art and Art Education at Eastern New Mexico University in 1984. He has a master of arts degree from the University of New Mexico.

Gikas was a member of the ENMU Faculty Senate for 18 years, serving as vice chairman and presiding officer for three of them, and on the Board of Directors for six.

He received the New Mexico Arts Commission Award for "Outstanding Service to the State of New Mexico" in 1974. He has served as Chairman of the Artists in the Schools Committee, 1974-79, for New Mexico, and vice chairman of the New Mexico Arts Commission, 1976-79.

Gikas served in the Army Air Corps during World War II.

Leslie Lunsford received the 1986 Woman of the Year award and Walter Hughes received the 1986 Man of the Year at the annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet Saturday night at the Farwell Community Center.

Mrs. Lunsford got her award from last year's recipient Frances Kube, while Hughes was given his plaque from Benny Haney, last year's honoree. (See adjacent articles.)

J.Q. Warnick Jr., magistrate for the U.S. District Court in Lubbock, was the guest speaker. He talked of the dangers of marijuana and plugged the McGruff anti-crime program.

First, he noted that marijuana usage, according to surveys taken each year of 3,000 high school seniors by the National Institute of Drug Abuse, is falling.

In 1975, when the survey was first

said they used marijuana daily (one cigarette at least four times a week) and 17 percent said they were weekly user's (2 to 4 cigarettes a week).

The usage totals peaked in 1980. In last year's survey, 9 percent said they were daily users and 11 percent weekly users.

Warnick, a former member of the Texas Drug Abuse Prevention Advisory Council, showed comparisons between marijuana and regular cigarettes in how they affected your lungs.

Warnick said that the main chemical in marijuana that allows you to get "high" is called THC. In testing, marijuana cigarettes with a 2 percent THC content are used.

THC goes to the fatty parts of the human body, such as the brain and lungs.

Tests have shown that one marijuana cigarette with a 2 percent THC content is equal to a package of regular cigarettes (20).

Warnick then noted that marijuana being sold the streets of America today have between 4 percent and 12 percent THC content. Thus, if a user had five marijuana cigarettes with a 6 percent THC content in a week, it would equal smoking 15 packs of regular cigarettes that week.

He told the story of a man who had smoked marijuana for 10 years, giving it up at age 23. Two years later, he began jogging but found he couldn't. He had a physical taken and was told that his lungs were those of a man 40 years his senior. Warnick noted the need for early drug prevention, pointing out another survey of high school seniors. When asked how old they were when they first tried marijuana, 10 percent said they were 10 or 11 years old, and 75 percent said they were between 12 and 14 years old.

And Warnick also noted how marijuana is a "threshold drug," often leading to worse drugs such as cocaine and heroin.

He then offered one idea on how to fight against children using drugs --

Why Hughes was chosen

Here is the speech given by Benny Haney, last year's Man of the Year recipient, in honor of Walter Hughes, this year's winner:

As first place winner, Kelm received a \$75 cash prize. The second place winner, Julie Puzey of Clovis, received \$25.




The FFA members will run the contest at the agriculture shop. Parents will receive a plaque and the parent winning in more than one contest has a chance to win the sweepstakes.

The Bowl signs a treaty with Texas

1836: TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 23. Today in the Cherokee village northwest of Nacogdoches, General Sam Houston and John Forbes, co-commissioners authorized by Governor Henry Smith to treat with the Indians, signed an agreement with the Bowl, chief of the Cherokees, guaranteeing them terrritorial rights in return for neutrality should Texas be invaded by Mexico. The Bowl signed not only for the Chero-kees, but also for the twelve Indian bands in East Texas associated with them: the Shawnees, Delawares, Kickapoos, Quapaws, Chocktaws, Biloxies, Iowanies, Alabamas, Cochetties, Caddoes of the Neches, Tachoocattakes and Unataguous. In their report to Governor Smith, the commissioners stated: "The state of excitement in which the Indians were first found by your commission rendered it impossible to commence a negotiation on the day set apart for it. On the day succeeding, the treaty was opened. Some difficulty then occurred relative to the exchange of lands which the commissioners proposed making for those now occupied by them,

which was promptly rejected." The area agreed upon is that now occupied by the Indians, and guaranteed to them previously by Mexico. General Houston will depart im-

mediately for Washington-on-the-Brazos, where he is due on March 1, when a new Texas convention will be assembled. He was elected a delegate from Refugio. In the Consultation last fall he represented Nacogdoches.

1836: TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 23. The Texas garrison at San Antonio de Bexar came under siege this afternoon by a Mexican army of more than 1,000, led by General Joanquin Ramirez y Sesma. Additional forces are said to be advancing to reinforce him, under command of the President of Mexico himself, General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna.

Although the Texians have been expecting a Mexican invasion, its timing has come as a surprise. There are only about 150 volunteers in Bexar, and they have taken refuge inside the Alamo fortress. The Mexican troops thereupon immediately entered the town. They have hoisted a blood-red banner at the top of the San Fernando Church, indicating no quarter unless there is an immediate surrender. The Texians responded with rifle and cannon fire.

At 3 p.m. today, Colonel William Barret Travis, co-commander at Bexar with Colonel James Bowie, sent an urgent message to the citizens of Gonzales: "The enemy in



large force is in sight. We want men and provision. Send them to us. We have 150 men and we are determined to defend the Alamo to the last. Give us assistance.'

The Bexar garrison was down to 90 men last month, until it was reinforced with 30 men under Colonel Bowie, sent by General Sam Houston, and another 30 under Colonel Travis, sent by Governor Henry Smith. Bowie carried an order from General Houston to Colonel J.C. Neill, then in command of the Alamo, to blow it up and bring off the artillery. Neill decided not to do so, since he had no means for moving the cannon. He departed on February 11 due to illness in his family, and turned the command over to Colonel Travis, who is a career soldier. However, the volunteers elected Bowie, a legendary frontiersman, and after some friction, the two officers agreed to a joint co-command, as of February 14.

On February 16 Colonel Travis sent a request for reinforcement to Colonel James W. Fannin, in command of the main Texian army of some 500 men, now at Goliad. Fannin refused, on the basis that he could not spare the men from his proposed invasion of Matamoros. General Santa Anna has acted more rapidly and more vigorously than Texians have expected. He is familiar with Texas terrain, having served there as a young 18-year-old lieutenant under General Joaquin de Arrendondo against North American filibusters in 1812. He was decorated for bravery under fire in that campaign. He received authorization for a

Texas campaign from the Mexican

Congress around December 1, and departed immediately for Salitillo, which served as the rendezvous point for an army of some 6,000. He dispatched a large force under General Jose Urrea to Matamoros, with orders to move up the Texas coast. He himself with the main army, left for Bexar on February 1, by way of Monclova. He reached Guerrero on February 12 and paused there to regroup.

While at Guerrero, he announced his war aims to his associates. He will execute the leaders of the revolution against him, drive out of Texas all who have taken part in the war, and even those who have not, if they are Anglo-Americans. He will seize the property of Texians and nullify their land titles to defray the cost of his campaign. He will liberate all slaves in Texas. The best Texas lands will be offered to his officers and soldiers who wish to settle there. The remaining land he will sell at about \$1 per acre, but none to Anglo-Americans. French and English settlers will be permitted to buy a maximum of 5,000,000 acres each, and German settlers a bit more. There will be no limit on the amount sold to those speaking the Spanish language.
