## 'The most harrowing experience of my life'

Curtis Smith of Farwell had the most harrowing Northern California this month.
Smith joined expeditions of firefighters from throughout the Western states to battle wild fires that devastated large parts of California, Oregon and Washington early this month.
The National Forestry Service had put out word asking for help in fighting the fires, and for equipment. The Service had partially funded Farwell's WEPS unit and also the Lazbuddie In agreeing to help, Smith had to make a 14 -day paid by the Service. So Smith left Farwell at 3 a.m. Sept. 2 in the WEPS unit along with two firefighters from Plains. They met in Amariino West Texas and 9 East Texas firefighters.
The going was slow. Several trucks down frequently. But Sunday night they arrived in Norther California, near Redding, to begin their work
Smith explained that fighting forest fires is unlike fighting a house fire. Forest fires get so hot that just throwing wate
on them is to no avail. What firemen must do is to create fire lanes, which are bulldozed, to stop giving the fires "food" to continue. And they set backfires, which also burn up the ground so that when the wild fire meets up with them, there

"The way we came in was on fire. It was the most harrowing xperience in my life.
But they weren't out of the "woods" yet.
"We drove into another area where it was so smoky that you couldn't see past the windshield. You sort of felt your

"We got to a spot where the wind blew the smoke away and we were joined by a group of about 20 other men and
we used it to forge a path and we followed them out prairie fires. In Texas, you can run from a fire. But a fores fire can surround you - since it is composed of hundreds of

At one point, the forest fire had jumped a 90 -foot fire lane had to watch for new fires caused by fall-out. At 3 a.m., they returned to camp for rest.
On Tuesday night, the Texans were back setting back
fires, which worked well. Firemen and women were stationed
20 feet apart and worked for 12 hours
That work continued day after day as winds kept fanning fires. It wasn't long before all the firefighters had deep circles "One guy said that if you imagined what Hell was like, this was close to it," said Smith.
