"I come back every year for the wheat and milo harvest,"said Guthrie.

He was in Ronald Byrd's office when Hurshel Harding came in to buy a ticket for the Border Town Days pickup. Guthrie heard about the pickup give away, and bought the ticket just before Hurshel's.

"I've never won anything like this before in my life. I always wondered if anyone ever won those pickup trucks or shotguns I had bought tickets for over all those years. I can't believe I actually won it," said Guthrie.

Guthrie shared his joy with Border Town Queen Michele Stover by making a donation to her college fund.

has viral encephalitis. She is currently in what is described as the first stage of coma, which means she is

just below consciousness. The doctors explained to the Andersons that there are six levels of severity that they can observe in comas.

In the first stage, the patient is able to open their eyes or squeeze a person's hand if they are called upon to respond. In the second stage patients no longer respond to voice commands, but they will move or jump if pinched. In the third stage, patients respond only if pricked sharply with a needle or receive a strong blow. There are three other stages of coma that are more severe.

"We are encouraged," said Marvin Anderson about his daughter's condition. "I think all the prayers have helped."

Earlier, Kellie had been in the third stage of coma.

"They all hated to leave," said Mrs. Dannheim. " I hope that they can all return next year,"she added.



He related that he had been talking constantly in school one day. His teacher tried to admonish him, and finally said in exasperation, "What are you going to do with your life?"


