Election overview

Well, the election is over. Long live the election. I have to admit that I never really got into it. Some of my choices won, others lost. I had thought Clements would beat White and that outcome came as no surprise. And I thought Combest would win easily. That, too, came about.

I felt badly that Texico's John R. Hadley lost in his commissioner's race. He gave it a good shot.

On the national scene, the big story was the takeover of Senate control by the Democrats. I realize that has important implications but I don't view Congress as Republican vs. Democrat. I view it as conservative vs. liberal.

In that latter context, it means that conservatives still control the Senate (taking into account conservative Southern Democrats). And conservatives have a slight majority in the House. To me, that means Congress can work with a President whether he is a Republican or Democrat.

O'Neill fought untiringly as a New Deal Democrat. Goldwater led the way for the conservative revolution. And Long's leaving marks the end of the Long era, started by his father, the Kingfish.

I wonder what would have happened if Huey Long had not been assassinated in the 1930s. I doubt he could have been elected president since FDR did such a fine job at restoring American optimism. But if FDR had failed, it would have been a cinch for the Kingfish to be in the White House.

What was the Kingfish's theme? "Every Man a King"? It may sound silly today but back in the Depression it struck the right chord. He was one heckuva man.

Going back to this year's election, it seemed to me that Reagan's campaigning was not that effective. I've always been suspicious of how effective endorsements are. I've felt that in the final analysis that people vote for or against the man up for election.

For example, if I were running for mayor and the Texas Mayors' Association endorsed me, would it matter? I think people would still vote for or against me depending on their views of me. I doubt the endorsement would amount to much.

Back in 1980, when I worked for a Virginia newspaper, I used to write a daily column. During that election, I threw my hat into the ring for the presidency, announcing that I was the Apple Pie Party's candidate.

My platform was simple: more services and lower taxes. Yes, I borrowed it from the other political parties.

Anyway, I campaigned hard through my column, pointing out my positions on national defense, the budget, the street in front of my house and other important issues. It was only toward Election Day when I discovered that people could not write in candidates for President.

With one exception, that is. It is allowed in Alaska. And since our Virginia area was full of military types from around the country and bureaucrats on loan from everywhere, it turned out that one lady wrote me in for President on her Alaska ballot.

I appreciated that. It would have been tough to have run hard and ended without a solitary vote.

I checked the major newspapers the next day but they erred and didn't list my vote. Oh well, nobody's perfect.

One other note about elections... I look forward to the day after for the bombshells.

You see, when important news is about to be broken, they usually don't like to do it right before an election because some folks would cry "politics." Instead, they wait until the day after when it's safe.

Loretta attends Manila rally

Mabuhay! which means "hi", "welcome" or greetings here in the Philippines.

It has rained here in the Philippines both day and night, and, as a result, schools and colleges have been cancelled for three days! A lot of places were flooded up to the waist, and businesses were closed for that reason.

However, Aug. 21 was an exception. That was the day set aside as Nino Aquino's Rally. Nino Aquino, you'll remember, was President Cory Aquino's husband. When he was returning from exile in the United States, he was shot in the head by former President Marcos's people just as he was getting off the plane. So, as a special tribute on Aug. 21, many people gathered at Luneto Park in Manila for a rally.

One of the host fathers invited some of the exchange students to join in this rally. Little did we know we were going to have to walk a long distance; therefore, we weren't dressed properly. So there we were in pumps and dress pants walking a distance of six miles in 110 degrees of heat along with a high humidity that made the temperature almost unbearable. After we found out we were walking the minimum distance, we were able to stand our discomforts.

People from all over came, and some had even walked 40 miles just to meet in the Park. We even had to run just to meet the deadline. Some Filipinos cheered as we passed by them, and we gave the sign of people power. It was an experience that I'll never forget!

Once we arrived I was so surprised to see so many black-haired people - millions and millions of them. President Cory Aquino was there giving a speech, and she had no body guards except for one person who stood near her. It certainly was not like when President Reagan gives a speech or makes an appearance with numerous Secret Service agents nearby. Mrs. Aquino hardly has any security at all because she believes God is her bodyguard.

At the park, there were vendors all over selling food and native products - anything and everything you can think of. Finally, the event came to a halt, and our group all went to eat at McDonald's!

Since you last heard from me, I have changed host families. My previous host family took me to see two more of the provinces - Tagay-Tay and Pansol, Los Banos.

In Tagay-Tay, I viewed the volcano that had sunk in and formed a lake. It is a very beautiful sight. Another unique thing about this province is the climate. It is cool all year round, and the climate is much like New Mexico's. The scenery was great; it was free of smog, pollution, and noise.

In Pansol, Los Banos we went to the mineral pools where the water comes from the mountains. We stayed in little cottages and just spent our days relaxing in the pools (private ones rented by the family) or we went sightseeing. We brought our own food and had a picnic; of course, rice was included and fish. However, this fish was different because after it is caught, it is washed and then a stick is inserted in it, and the fish is cooked whole - the head, eyes, fins, internal parts, and all! Luckily, they also had chicken.

The family also took me out for a night on the town before I left. The place we went to was very "high class" and the food was exceptionally good. I'm really going to miss them, but my new host family is really nice too. They have two girls and one boy, but the family doesn't stop there; they also have two

maids, cooks, drivers, some relatives, grandparents, and factory workers who live with them.

They own a leather factory which is situated behind their home. The thing I like best about the family is that they make me feel at home, and I'm treated just like "one of the family." So, my privacy is limited because the kids are always in my room begging me to tell them jokes and stories. Another thing I like is the air conditioner. Not many people here own them because they are so expensive, so the air conditioner is like a treat to me, and believe me, I am enjoying it to the fullest.

Sometime in November, I will change to my third host family. Last month I had some unusual experiences. Angie, another exchange student from New Mexico, and I were invited to a party where many important people attended. Two of these people dedicated a tagalog song to us - the Governor of Manila and a well-known actor, Herbert Bauistia. We were asked to come forward so that we could be seen by the audience while the song was being sung to us. It was pretty exciting to have actual "stars" dedicate a song to us.

The month of September, however, wasn't a very good month for me due to the fact that my host father's father died. This was a very hard situation for me to handle, but somehow I pulled through it and even learned a lot from it. For example, when he died the family and friends mourned for five days. Then, the body was flown to the province of Pandan, Antique, which is up north, and it is an hour and ten minutes away by plane. We went a few days later.

Once we were there, the mourning period began again, but it continued for a week, both day and night. They call it the wake period. Sometimes the wake will last from two to four weeks. During this time, I was told, we shouldn't wear red or wash our clothes. They believe this may bring bad luck to the family. The body is kept in the home the whole time, and it seemed very eerie to me to be sleeping in the house where a corpse was. When they started taking pictures of the corpse and putting the funeral on video tape, it made me a little nervous.

Also, after every meal, food and lighted candles were put near the body. My host sister said it was food for the spirit of her grandfather so that his spirit may continue to live. Finally, it was time for the burial, and he was buried above ground along with fruits and one live duck.

Although the circumstances weren't the best, my host family made every possible effort to make me feel welcome, and in turn, I had a pretty good time. They took me to two beaches. At one of these beaches, a native woman who was mute taught me how to find little clams that live under the sand. The people boil these and eat them along with six-legged bugs that are caught and cooked alive over an open fire. Being an exchange student offers a lot of wonderful opportunities, but there are also some experiences that are most dreaded - the ones when we have to try the native dishes and hope we live to remember it!

Next semester, I'll be changing schools and I hope I will like it. The name of the new school is Sampson's School of Design and Cosmetology. It sounds pretty interesting. Until next time, Loretta

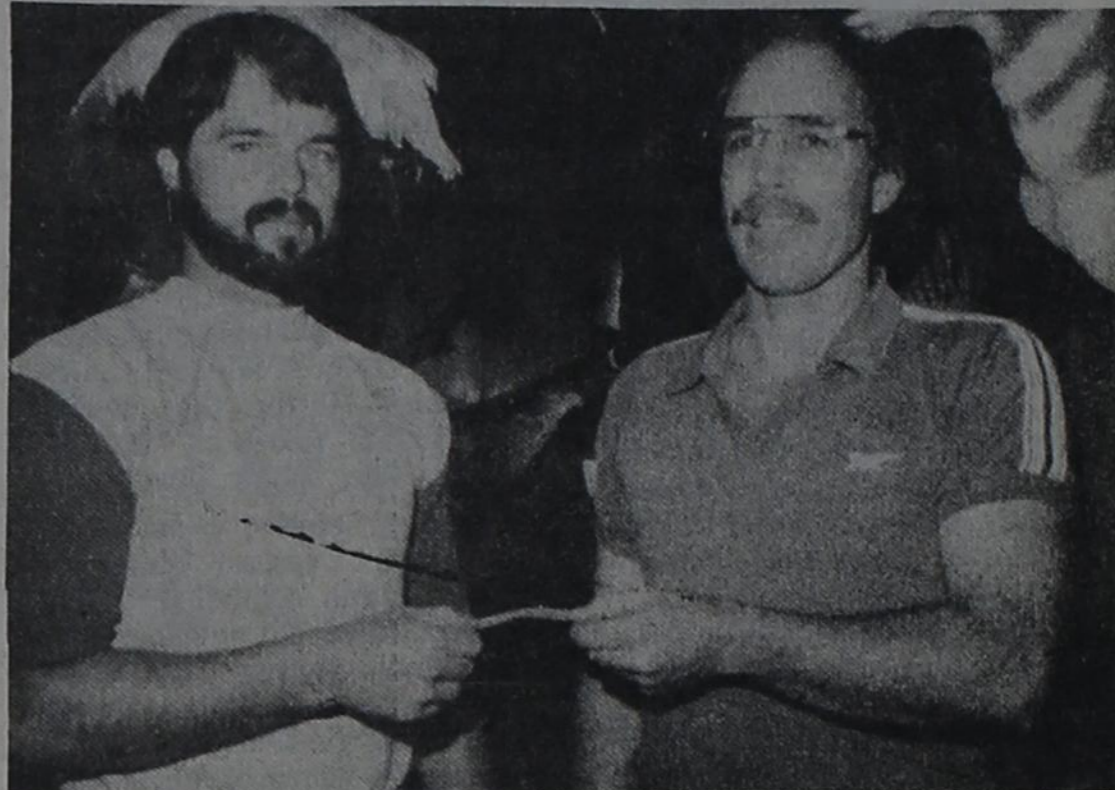

Election called for tax change

The Farwell City Council unanimously agreed Monday to call for an election to see if the city tax structure should be changed.

The proposed change calls for eliminating the personal property tax (on vehicles and boats) and increasing the city sales tax from 1 percent to 1.5 percent.

The increase in sales tax money is expected to generate about the same amount of money that the personal property tax has been bringing in, said city clerk Janie Bowery.

The earliest the election can be held is in May. If approved by voters, it would go into effect Jan. 1, 1988.

Councilmen supported the measure since they feel it would make the tax more equitable for city residents.

Also at the meeting, Texico City Councilman Bryan Kube asked if Texico could use the Farwell dog-catcher and dog pound.

The Farwell council supported Kube's request. "I feel good about this," said Mayor Chris Gikas. "There's no way Farwell's dog problem will be controlled until Texico's is controlled."

Texico would be charged \$1 a day for dogs brought to the pound. The dog-catcher, Farwell city employee Floyd Robinson, would be paid \$3 by Texico for each dog caught.

Currently, Texico has to pay \$25 per trip to the Clovis dog pound, plus a daily cost.

After getting approval from Farwell, Kube reported to the Texico City Council Monday night (see other story in this issue).

Gikas also announced the free RV parking is planned for the area across the highway from City Hall. This area has been donated to the city by some Amarillo doctors.

Gikas said he was organizing a committee to set this up. Utilities won't be furnished so it won't compete with regular RV parking facility operators. But there will be a place to dump. And the site will be listed in a booklet distributed nationwide.

The council also:

-Agreed to spend \$25 a year for membership in the municipal judges' association. Councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell completed a three day course last month at the Texas Municipal Courts Training Center in San Angelo, Texas. She was appointed Municipal Judge for Farwell.

What should be done with the mural?

What should be done with the Texas Sesquicentennial mural painted on boards on the side of Farwell City Hall?

The Farwell City Council earlier this year had voted to place it on the side of the wall inside the Farwell Community Center. The thinking was that this would protect it for many years to come.

But at Monday's City Council meeting, councilman Fred Chandler said everyone he talks with suggests leaving it

on the side of City Hall so they can see it.

If the mural is left where it is, it apparently would need more maintenance due to the weather.

The council seemed undecided on what to do and asked that city residents give them their views before a decision is made. The council consists of Chandler, Martin Kube, Liz Phillips, Ysleta Kittrell, Curtis Smith and Mayor Chris Gikas.

-Agreed to pay Lester Sears \$3,971 to create a parking area of 1,222 square yards at the cemetery. It will be composed of bottom ash and fly ash in a triangular area behind the fence. Gikas said the cost for regular paving was prohibitive.

-Renewed its membership in the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for \$88 a year.

-Heard Gikas say that he would like to see flowers planted in front of the cemetery fence, suggesting mums. He said he has received several compliments on the cemetery improvements.

-Discussed buying the Lenau property at the southwest corner of Farwell as a possible well site. It will be checked into.

Texico to use Farwell pound

It was the consensus of the Texico City Council Monday that they work out a joint agreement with the city of Farwell to use a Farwell dog-catcher and dog pound.

Councilman Bryan Kube reported on his meeting earlier that day with the Farwell City Council (see that story for details).

The Texico Council will check on the finer points of such an agreement, then get back to Farwell.

In other business, the council met with Ralph Vail, the engineer on the well project. He presented specifications for the new well, which will be studied. Bids tentatively will be taken in early December.

Max Carter received permission to move a 30x40 house from Clovis to

the site just west of City Hall.

Carter also alerted the council to potential water holding problems near the new Town & Country store.

David Vaughan received a variance to place a mobile home at 808 Turner.

The city decided to sell its own pickup. Bids will be opened at the next meeting.

At the suggestion of councilman Butch Tharp, a committee was appointed to study whether part-time police help is needed and also to study the situation of trucks damaging city streets. The committee consists of councilmen Kube, Steve Chancy and city marshal Dave Wheeler.

Muleshoe Hospital to close

Muleshoe Hospital is no longer taking admissions, it was announced Tuesday.

The hospital, leased by Westworld Community Healthcare Inc., has had financial difficulties. It has 31 beds.

Officials will attempt to turn over the nursing home portion to the hospital's local governing board.

Otherwise, the 40 residents in the home will have to move to other facilities.

There also is a chance the board would assume operation of all the hospital's programs.

Officials said the hospital will phase down operations over six weeks.

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Texas vice president dies after a lengthy illness

1836: TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 15. Lorenzo de Zavala, until last month Vice President of the Republic of Texas, died today in his home on the Buffalo Bayou, after a lengthy illness. He was 47. He resigned as ad interim Vice President on October 17 because of his illness, and was succeeded by the then Vice President-elect Mirabeau B. Lamar.

Zavala came to Texas in July, 1835, after a distinguished career in Mexico. He brought his family to the Buffalo Bayou home the following December. By that time he had already been elected to represent the Harrisburg Municipality in the Consultation at San Felipe de Austin, and he was also a member of the Convention which met at Washington-on-the-Brazos the following March. He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and was elected ad interim Vice President by unanimous vote of the Convention.

Born in Yucatan, he strongly advocated democratic reforms and was an ardent Federalist, in support of the liberal Constitution of 1824. Because of his views, he was imprisoned for three years in the Castle of San Juan de Ulloa in the Veracruz harbor. During that time, he studied medicine and English. After release he served in the Yucatan Provincial Assembly in 1821, and the next year was sent to Spain to represent Yucatan in the Spanish Cortes. When Mexico gained independence from Spain, he returned and served in the Mexican Congress. In 1827 he was elected Governor of the State of Mexico as a Federalist.

Army opposition forced him to retire to Mexico City, where he helped to elect the liberal Vicente Guerrero as President. Guerrero appointed him Minister of the Treasury, and he also retained his position of Governor of the State of Mexico.

On March 12, 1829, he received an impresario contract for the introduction of 500 families into Texas. His land was in the most eastern portion of Texas, from the Sabine River to west of the Neches, immediately south of Nacogdoches. The next year he transferred this contract to the Galveston Bay and Texas Land Company, at the same time as did two other impresarios, David G. Burnet and Joseph Vehlein.

Deposed again by the Centralists, Zavala fled to the United States, but with the mercurial swings of Mexican politics, he was soon able to return. He was re-elected Governor of the State of Mexico in 1832, and in 1833 served in the Mexican Chamber of Deputies. In October, 1833, he went to Paris as Mexico's Minister to France, appointed by his close associate in liberal causes, General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, now President of Mexico. However, when Santa Anna swung toward Centralism and established a military dictatorship, Zavala broke with him. Instead of returning

to Mexico, he decided it was safer to go to Texas. There he immediately entered into opposition to Santa Anna's Centralism.

When Santa Anna was a prisoner of Texas, Zavala conducted frequent conversations with him. He was aboard the Invincible when Santa Anna was forcibly removed from it, as one of the Texas commissioners to conduct him to Veracruz and negotiate for peace with Mexico.

Zavala leaves his wife, the former Emily West of New York, by whom he has had three children, Augustus, Emelie and Ricardo, the youngest just learning to walk. They were married before his Paris assignment, and she accompanied him there. He also had three children by his first wife, Teresa Correa, of Yucatan. His eldest son by his first wife has served in the Texas army, and prefers to be known by his English name, Lorenzo Zavala, Jr., rather than his full Spanish name. After the Battle of San Jacinto he served as an interpreter for General Sam Houston when Santa Anna was first captured.

1840: MONDAY, NOVEMBER 16. General James Hamilton, Texas diplomatic agent in Europe, today signed the third of three treaties negotiated with the government of Great Britain. The first two were signed last Friday and Saturday, and mark the official recognition of Texas by England.

The first treaty deals with commerce and navigation. The second provides that Texas will assume a million pounds sterling - \$5,000,000 - of Mexico's debt to England if a peace treaty with Mexico can be obtained through British mediation within a stated time. The third treaty, signed today, deals with the suppression of the African slave trade, and provides certain rights of search to both nations.

General Hamilton has been extremely aggressive in pursuing these treaties. On October 14, after

long delays, he addressed an unusually sharp and somewhat threatening letter to British Foreign Minister Viscount Lord Palmerston. If England failed to arbitrate with Mexico on behalf of Texas, Hamilton wrote, "In sixty days from this day, Veracruz, Tampico and Matamoros will be blockaded by the Texian squadron, which consists of one corvette, two brigs, three schooners and one naval steamer, now off the coast of Mexico, while Mexico is destitute of all naval force whatsoever."

Furthermore, he threatened, Texas would "forthwith join the Federalists, revolutionize the northern provinces of Mexico, and make such additions to her territory as the laws of war would justify upon the usages of civilized nations." He further threatened "discriminating duties" and exclusive commercial agreements with other nations at the expense of England.

Unusual and such a letter may be in the annals of diplomacy, it apparently has had the desired effect. General Hamilton is pleased with the first two treaties. The third, dealing with the slave trade, he considers a political move for Lord Palmerston's British constituency. The Republic's Constitution expressly forbids the importation of slaves into Texas from any country except the United States, although some smuggling has occurred. In his first annual message to Congress on May 5, 1837, President Sam Houston said: "It cannot be disbelieved that thousands of Africans have lately been imported to the island of Cuba with a design to transfer a large portion of them into this Republic. This unholy and cruel traffic has called down the reprobation of the humane and just of all civilized nations. But abhorrence to it is clearly expressed in our Constitution and laws." The treaty therefore merely formalizes a position already taken by the Republic.

1842: MONDAY, NOVEMBER 14. A

special session of Congress, called to meet today in the newly designated capital of Washington-on-the-Brazos, failed to muster a quorum. The regular session is scheduled to meet on December 5, the first Monday of that month. The Executive offices have been at Washington since September 20.

The present capital site marks its fifth change of location since the convening of the Republic's First Congress. There were also a considerable number of capitals before then. Under Spanish rule, the province reported directly to Mexico City. After Mexican independence, the capital of the State of Coahuila and Texas was first in Saltillo and then in Monclova. The capital of the Provisional Government of Texas of the winter of 1835-36 was San Felipe de Austin. During the Mexican war, the ad interim government first met in Washington-on-the-Brazos, then fled to Harrisburg, and then to Galveston Island. After the Battle of San Jacinto, it operated mostly from Velasco.

The elected government, which took office in October, 1836, first met in Columbia, on the Brazos River. After three months the capital was moved to Houston City by order of President Sam Houston on December 15, 1836. The First Congress met there the following May.

The "permanent" capital of Austin was authorized early in 1839, and construction of the new seat of government began in May. The archives arrived there on October 9, and the Executive Department, headed by President Mirabeau B. Lamar, arrived on the morning of October 17. His party was met by an elaborate welcoming committee and escorted into town with a 21-gun salute. A "sumptuous dinner" at Bullock's Hotel followed. The Fourth Congress convened there on November 11. In his annual message to Congress, President Lamar said: "That the selection of the site now occupied will command universal approbation is not to be expected. A diversity of opinion upon such subjects is the unavoidable result of the diversity of interests and local prejudices which must necessarily exist in a country so widely extended as ours."

He was correct. Many objected to Austin as being on the remote western frontier, far from other communities, and vulnerable to attacks from nearby Indians and from Mexicans. Foremost among these was ex-President Houston, who served in Austin as Representative from San Augustine County in the Fourth and Fifth Congresses of Lamar's administration.

The brief invasion of San Antonio by General Rafael Vasquez last March 5 and 6 created panic throughout Texas, and Austin was abandoned by most of its citizens. A week later, President Houston, who was re-elected the previous September, ordered the capital moved to Houston City. General Adrian Woll's invasion of San Antonio last September 11 further demonstrated Austin's vulnerability, and President Houston has refused to consider a return there. Instead, he has accepted an offer from the citizens of Washington-on-the-Brazos to provide the necessary quarters for the seat of government.

1845: FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 7. With the annexation of Texas to the United States almost an accomplished fact, Texas exchequer bills are now being accepted at face value in many parts of the Republic. The first money issued by the Republic was \$500,000 in promissory notes, authorized by an act of Congress of June 12, 1837. They were redeemable 12 months from

date, at 10 per cent interest, with the name of the payee written on the face, and passed by endorsement. Printed in denominations of \$1, \$2, \$3, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, and \$500, these notes came to be called "Star Money," because of a five-pointed star printed on the face. Later, engraved notes were authorized.

By the end of 1838, a total of \$1,165,139 in "Star Money" notes had been issued, of which about \$514,500 were printed and usually accepted at face value. The remainder were engraved notes, which were being redeemed for only about 45 cents to the dollar by the end of the first Houston administration in December, 1843.

In January, 1842, shortly after President Sam Houston assumed his second term, several series of treasury notes called "exchequer bills" were issued, payable to a designated payee or to order. Only small quantities were issued at any one time, with the limit set at \$200,000. They were used almost exclusively to pay taxes, postage and other government charges.

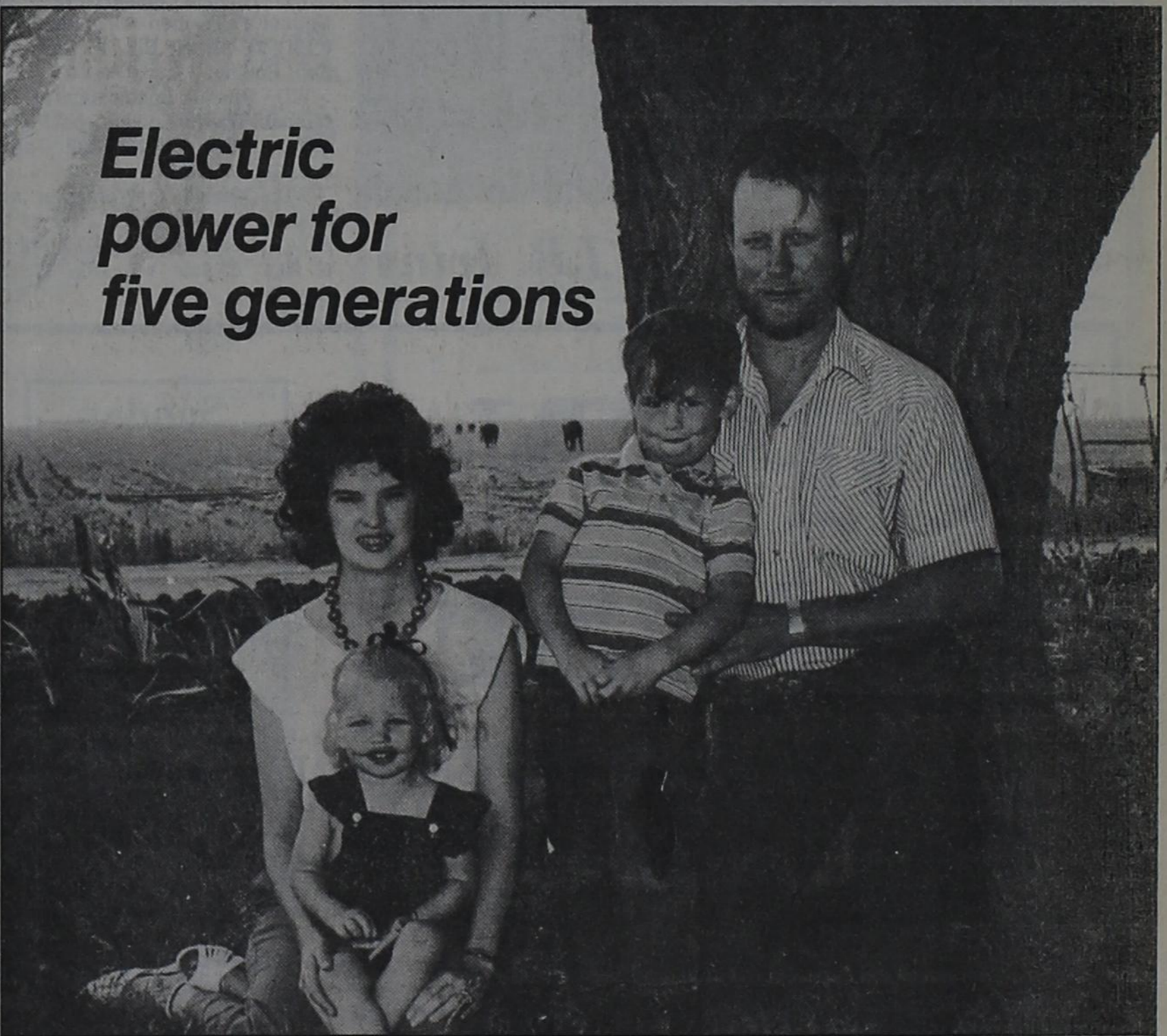

Poll yields interesting results

Keeping in touch with constituents constantly proves one of the biggest challenges a state senator faces, especially when representing a district as large geographically as the 31st Senatorial District.

This year, we decided to add something a little extra - a public opinion poll. About 650 people of you (an excellent number for a sample survey) stopped by, filled out our poll at our booth at the Tri-State Fair and provided us with some interesting input as we work through another special legislative session.

The poll questions dealt both with issues currently being debated in special session or those expected to be discussed when we convene next January in regular session. Here briefly are the issues and the results of our survey:

***Open Container.** We asked you if you would support a bill that would make it illegal to drink an alcoholic beverage in a moving vehicle or possess an open container of alcohol in a moving vehicle. Seventy-one percent of you said you would support such a bill while 29 percent of you said you wouldn't.

***On the question of whether Texas should have a presidential primary,** 73.3 percent of you said we should and 26.7 percent said we shouldn't.

***Most of you had very firm opinions about the so-called tort-reform issue,** where the Legislature is looking at limiting the amount of

money juries can award in lawsuits. We asked you if you would favor limiting the awards, and 76 percent of you said yes while 24 percent voted no.

***State lottery.** Current legislation proposing a state lottery would allow minors to participate, a provision 80.7 percent of you opposed and 19.3 percent supported.

***On the subject of a merger between West Texas State University and Amarillo College,** 57.2 percent said you would support the proposed merger and 42.8 percent said you wouldn't.

***We also asked you one fairly obvious question; we asked you how you felt about the Department of Energy's investigation of Deaf Smith County as a possible site for the nation's first high-level nuclear-waste repository.** Not surprisingly, 81.5 percent of you opposed DOE's investigation and only 18.5 percent supported it.

***And finally, we asked you three separate questions about taxes.** The first dealt with whether you would support a plan that would allow the

sales tax to float with the price of oil. In an almost even split, 49.7 percent said you would like such a plan while 50.3 percent said you wouldn't.

We asked you if you wanted to broaden the state's sales-tax base to include some service items while at the same time lowering the sales tax rate. In another close vote, 51.8 percent favored the sales-tax base expansion while 48.2 percent opposed it.

The governor's plan to increase the sales tax temporarily to 5 1/4 percent also was included on our poll. Fifty-four percent of you supported the governor's plan and 46 percent opposed.

There's no way to express how valuable these poll results have been during this special session. While it isn't a scientific poll in which the results can be considered absolutely accurate, it is a solid measure of how the people of the 31st Senatorial District feel, and a useful guide to us as we determine how to vote on many controversial issues.

The poll, for instance, convinced us to continue our support of the presidential primary for Texas, to continue pursuing our open-container legislation and to weigh the tax options very carefully before deciding which plan to support.

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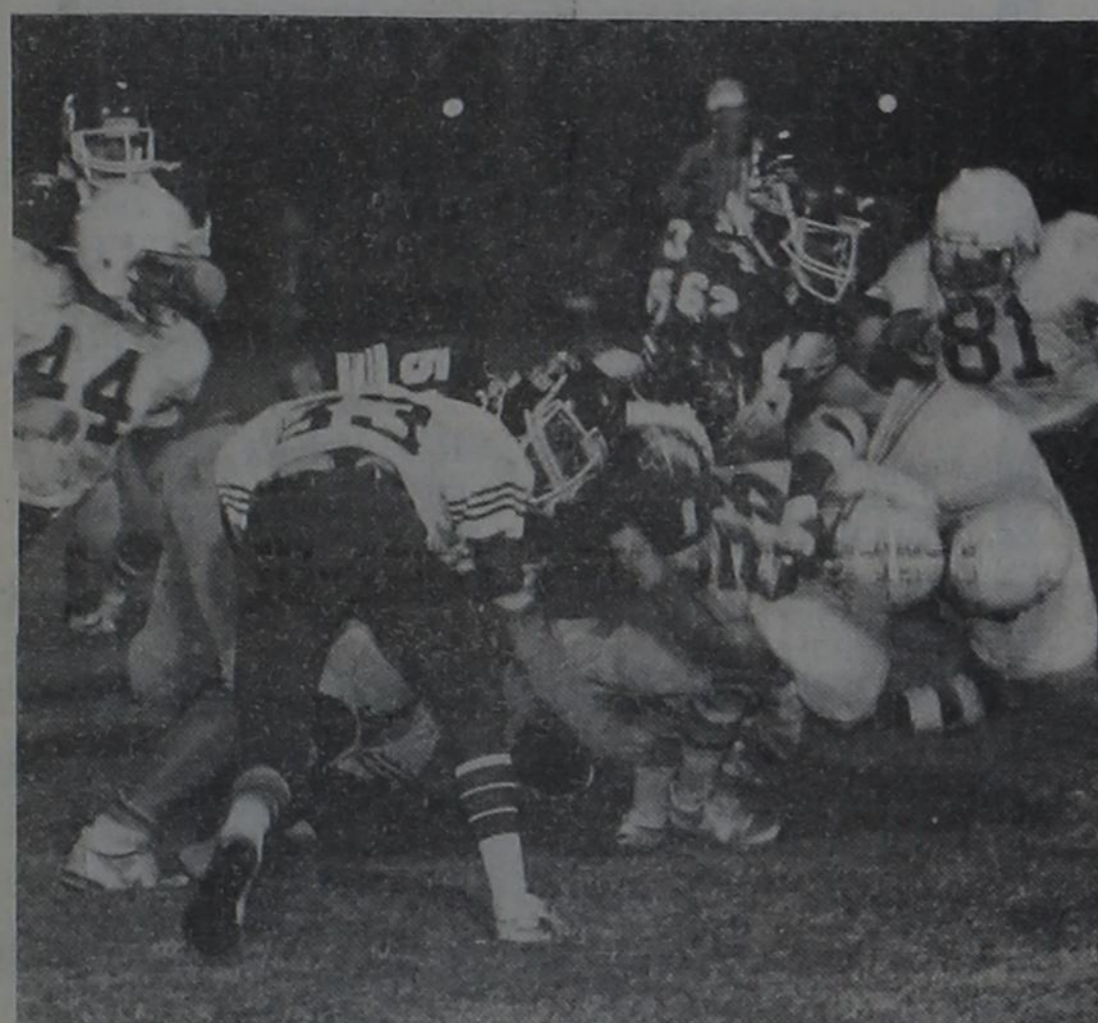

Texico Knights honored

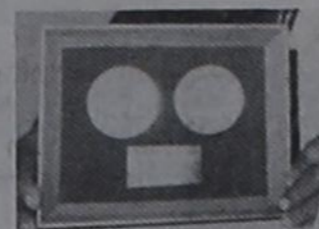
The Knights of Columbus Council 8591 in Texico was presented two medals by the Supreme Knight Virgil C. Deckant for 1985-86.

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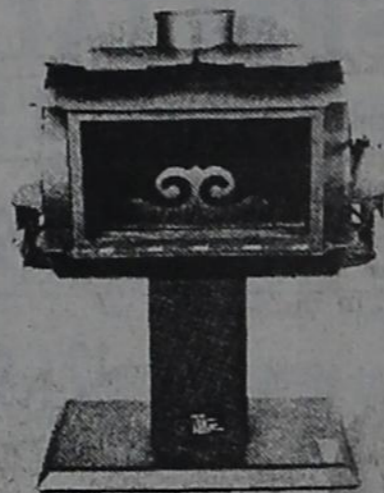

- 1 pkg. (11½ oz.) milk chocolate chips
- 2 tablespoons half-and-half
- ¼ cup almond liqueur
- Pound cake squares
- Ladyfingers, split
- Banana chunks, sprinkled with lemon juice
- Mandarin orange sections, drained
- Pineapple slices, drained and quartered

1. Combine chocolate chips and half-and-half in small bowl or 1-quart casserole.
2. Microwave at Medium-high (70%) until chocolate is melted, 2 to 4 minutes, blending with wire whisk once or twice during cooking. Stir in liqueur. Serve from bowl, reheating as needed, or in fondue pot over low heat. Dip pound cake squares, ladyfingers, banana chunks, mandarin orange sections and pineapple slices into fondue with fondue forks or skewers. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

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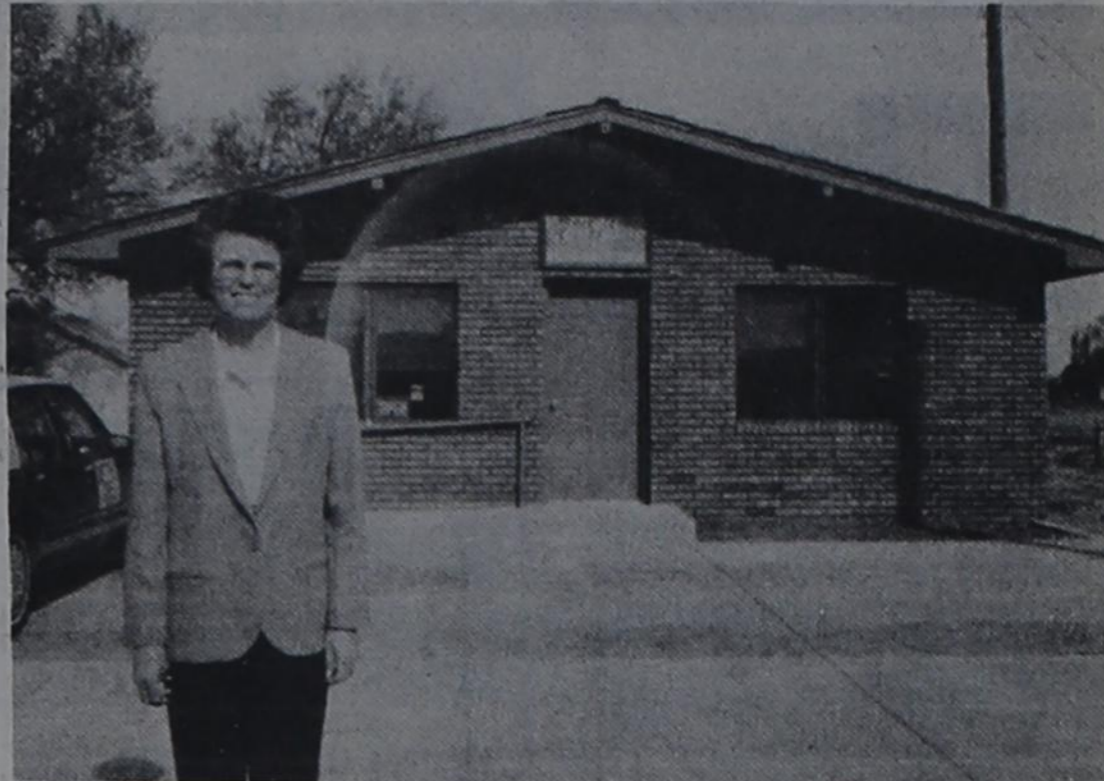

To Albert and Louise. We want to extend a special Thank You to you both. You have given so much love, so much time and so much of your selves to us. Your truly "one of the family!"

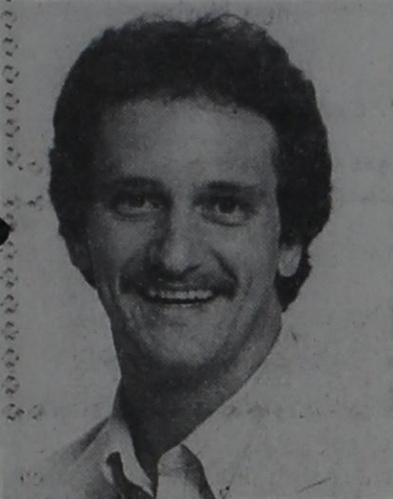

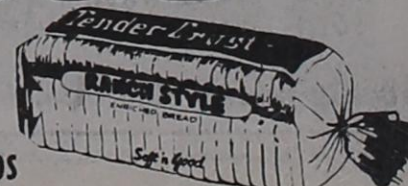

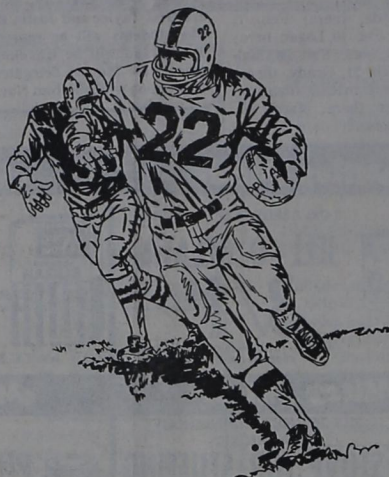
