I trust everyone has had a nice holiday season.

We got away over the New Year's Weekend. It was my first time out of the area since June. Felt great.

We went down to Hatch, N.M., to visit friends. My boy discovered the delights of quail hunting. Just ask him...

A real nice thing happened when we got back Sunday night. One of our neighbors apparently saw the pile of newspapers begin stacking up on our lawn, and realizing that's a good way to draw burglars, took the time to pile them up behind a flower pot.

I don't know which neighbor it was but I'd like to thank the person. That's why we enjoy living in the Twin Cities. Folks like that make it pleasant. That's what "neighborliness" means.

(Editor's Note: Mrs. V. Scott Johnson's obituary cites the fact that she helped to start a school cafeteria for Farwell Schools. Willie Roberts, former longtime Farwell school superintendent, helped with the research needed to shed a little more light on this story.)

Farwell had one of the earliest school cafeterias in the area due to the work of private citizens working together.

The minutes of the Farwell School Board meeting for Aug. 27, 1939, report that Mrs. V. Scott Johnson and Mrs. John Porter from the Cafeteria Committee appeared before the School Board to present their plans for hiring someone to run the cafeteria for the school year starting in September 1939.

Mrs. G.C. Danna was elected to run the cafeteria under the direction of the Cafeteria Committee.

The minutes record that a lengthy discussion was held about the management of the cafeteria. It was decided that the Cafeteria Committee would devise and post rules and regulations for the proper management of the cafeteria.

Farwell School Board members A.F. Phillips, H.Y. Overstreet, Roy Bobst, Ray Ford, and Glan Schlueter were present to vote on the question; board president E. M. Deaton was absent that day.

"I came to Oklahoma Lane School in 1945, and they did not have a school lunch program at that time," commented Roberts this week. He added that many schools in West Texas were adding cafeterias during the early 1940's, but Farwell was clearly a leader in the field by adding a cafeteria for the 1939

school year. The cafeteria was primarily for needy students, and it was funded locally in those

Lucille Johnson, 79, died on Dec. 31 at Clovis High Plains Hospital.

Services were held Jan. 2 at Kingswood United Methodist Church. Dr. Cryil Stone officiated. Burial was held at Sunset Terrace Memorial Garden under the direction of Steed Todd Funeral Home.

Mrs. Johnson was born Feb. 23, 1908 in Carmi, III. She was the last born of 12 children of F.B. and Nancy Ellen Lamp. One sibling died in infancy.

Mrs. Johnson attended a one room school in southern Illinois. She graduated from Carmi Township High School in 1925. Later she attended Missouri Baptist School of Nursing in St. Louis, where she received her degree in 1930. She came to Farwell in August of that year and worked with Dr. V. Scott

Johnson whose office was in the Security State Bank Building.

In 1931 she married Dr. Johnson in Nashville, III. Their three children were born in Farwell. The Johnsons moved to Clovis in 1946 where they still reside.

In 1949 and 1950, Mrs. Johnson attended Eastern New Mexico University working to get her masters degree in nursing education.

She continued her association on a part time basis with Dr. Johnson's office until his retirement in 1982.

In 1958, Mrs. Johnson was New Mexico Mother of the Year. She was the youngest mother ever given the honor of being the representative of the American Mother's Association. Mrs. Johnson worked with the Boy Scouts of America and the Girl Scouts of America, the Red Cross, the USO (both during and after World War II), and Clovis Women's Club. She was a charter member of Altrusa and she was active in an official capacity for many years. She was active at Kingswood United Methodist Church teaching as well as on boards.

Mrs. Johnson laid the ground work and planned the first school cafeteria in operation in the Farwell area. It was primarily for the needy children in and around Farwell. This project never would have been possible without the help of Dr. Johnson and other men in the community.

In 1980 members of the Adult Bible Class of the Kingswood United Methodist Church sponsored the golden anniversary celebration to honor Dr. and Mrs. Johnson for 50 years of medical service to the west Texas and Eastern New Mexico area.

Mrs. Johnson aided many children to further their educations in both high school and college.

She continued to work until 1980 when the doctor's office was closed.

Survivors include her husband, Dr. V. Scott Johnson of the home; three children, Marcia Cole of Farwell; Nancy Currier of Scottsdale, Ariz.; and Dr. V. Scott Johnson II of

Portales; and a sister, Teresa Mauntel of Carmi, III.





Farwell's Steers took second in the Sudan Varsity Tournament, defeating Lovington and Sudan, and losing to Nazareth in the final game.

"We had very tough competition, as we do in our district. The team played pretty good basketball," said coach Larry Gregory.

Farwell defeated Lovington 89-51. Scoring for the Steers were: Shawn Stewart, 23; Jeff Actkinson, 13; Monty Delgado and Greg Actkinson, 12 each; Damon George and Abel Lopez, 8 each; Dustin Hardage, 5; Brian Haseloff, 3; Bony Nicolas and Steve Geries, 2 each.

Farwell defeated Sudan 58-54. The lead changed hands several time in this nip and tuck game. Scoring for Farwell were: Jeff Actkinson, 14: George, and Stewart, 13 each; Lopez, 9; and Nicolas,
