

## 40th reunion reflections...

Reunions are a competitive sport. At early reunions classmates compete with each other about jobs and incomes; at the 25th its spouses and children and vacation homes while regarding with envy or glee, the classmates' waistlines, hairlines, wrinkle lines. Everybody hates the streamlined and loves the slob. As we approach our Fortieth Reunion we enter a new phase of reunion competition, the one described by Woody Allen when he remarked, "Ninety percent of life is just showing up."

It is said there are Three Ages of Classmates: youth, middle age, and "you haven't changed a bit." But change is the name of the game.

Consider: We were before television, before penicillin, polio shots, antibiotics and frisbees. Before frozen food, nylon, dacron, Xerox, Kinsey. Before radar, fluorescent lights, credit cards, and ballpoint pens. For us, time-sharing meant togetherness, not computers, a chip meant a piece of wood, hardware meant hardware, and software wasn't even a word, and camping out meant a tent, or the back of Curtis' old Chevy truck - not a microwave equipped motorhome.

In our time, closets were for clothes, not for coming out of; bunnies were small rabbits, and rabbits were not volkswagens. We were before Grandma Moses and cup-sizing for bras, and we thought a deep cleavage was something butchers did. We were before Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer, Snoopy, DDT and one-a-day vitamin pills. Before the white wine craze, disposable diapers, jeeps, The National Gallery of Art, Grand Coulee Dam, Paine Webber, Merrill Lynch and M and Ms.

When we were in Farwell High, pizzas, frozen orange juice, instant coffee and McDonald's were unheard of. We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent. We were before FM radio, tape recorders, electric typewriters, wordprocessors, Muzak, disco dancing - and that's not all bad. Almost no one flew across the country, and transatlantic flight belonged to Lindberg and Amelia Earhart. We were before India, Pakistan, Indonesia, The Philippines - and a host of others - were independent countries. And we were before the cataclysm of nuclear fission.

We were before panty hose and drip-dry clothes. Before icemakers, clothes dryers, freezers and electric blankets. Before students held cocktail parties or had their own apartments. Before unmarried members of the opposite sex took trips together. Before men wore long hair and before premarital sex (it says here). Anyway, we got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be?

In our day cigarette smoking was becoming fashionable, grass was mowed, coke was something you drank, and pot was something you cooked in. We were before daycare centers, house-husbands, and full-time baby-sitters. When we had a baby it was a three-day hospital event, not something you did on your way to work. In the late 1940's American schools (in our part of the country) were not desegregated, blacks were not allowed to play in the major leagues, "made in Japan" meant junk, and the term "making out" referred to how you did on an exam. We had five-and-ten cent stores where you could buy things for five and ten cents.

For just one nickel you could ride the bus, make a phone call, buy a Coke, or buy enough stamps to mail a letter and two post cards. Our big brothers and sisters had gone off to fight in the "last" war, and at home you couldn't buy a car, tires, sugar or shoes (without a ration stamp). If anyone had asked us to explain C.I.A., Ms., N.A.T.O., U.F.O., N.F.L., S.A.T.s, B.M.W., E.R.A., or I.U.D., we would have said alphabet soup. We were not before the difference in sexes were discovered, but we were before sex changes. We just made do with what we had. And we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby.

But the 1940's were super days. We had Tommy Dorsey, Glenn Miller, Dean Martin, Patsy Cline, Bing Crosby and Frank Sinatra, or we listened to George & Gracie, Abbott & Costello, Amos & Andy, or Grand Ole Opry on KICA or KGNC. We played thick 78 RPM records - often with cactus needles that always seemed to need sharpening. A "hot" time was "supper" at El Monterrey in Clovis. There were hayrides to the sandhills, and we didn't have to go out on a cold night to a football game-no lights (or grass) at the football field. We didn't have to deal with consciousness-raising or sensitivity training. We didn't have to jog or like pasta sauce, pump our own gas, or aerobics.

We have witnessed and dealt with the above changes, and we have returned for our reunion in 1987 to reassure ourselves that there are some things that never change - our ability to have a good time, and our pride in and love for our classmates and our Alma Mater!

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## Biggest crowd ever at BTD

Once again, the estimate of the crowd at Border Town Days in the Farwell City Park Saturday was more than 2,000.

In fact, several persons felt it was the biggest crowd ever. Several family and class reunions were held.

Members of the Farwell classes of 1943, 1952, 1937, 1947, 1957, 1967 and 1977 were present, plus the Oklahoma Lane School class of 1937.

The winner of the traveling trophy which is given to the class which has the largest percentage of living graduates attend BTD was the Farwell Class of 1967, with 25 present.

The weather was perfect with temperatures in the 80s, and a slight breeze. Some rain had been predicted but nary a dark cloud was seen.

More than 1,000 barbeque meals were served by the Texico - Farwell Rotary Club, while hundreds of other persons patronized the hamburger booth run by the Knights of Columbus and its Ladies Auxillary.

The day kicked off with the decorated bike contest in Texico. Ann Cooper handled this contest, with three Clovis residents serving as judges. In the bike contest, first place winners got \$5; second, \$4; third \$3, and fourth, \$2. Results were:

Class A (ages 7-12): Chad Cochran and Benji Sisneros, firsts; Caleb Cloud and Jeremy Stanton, seconds; Brea Travis, third; and Clay Corn and Melody Montgomery, fourths.

Class B (ages 6 and under): Clint Corn, first; Jose Cenicerros, second; Eric Smith, third, and Brett Carter, fourth.

Then came the annual parade, highlighted by the appearance of the Texico Wolverine Marching Band. This was the second straight time the band was in the parade, last year being the first time in many years that a high school band had marched in the parade.

The parade entries topped 60, about 10 more than last year. They included the West Texas State buffalo, the Red Raider from Texas Tech, antique cars, horse and mule units, ugly pickups, and lots of floats. Besides the Texico band, music was provided by Gladys Hardage's calliope (played by Ed Hardage) and Joe Hughes one-man band.

The winning floats were: Farwell Study Club, first; Texico - Farwell Senior Citizens, second; Capitol Foods, third, and Past Fashions, fourth. The theme of the parade was New Mexico's 75th anniversary. Each of the four winners received cash prizes, from \$75 on down.

Trophies were given for motorized units. Winning first was the Clovis Shriners' small cycle unit. Second was the Shriners' large cycle unit.

The plaque for best unit in the mule team entries went to Raymond McGehee of Lazbuddie.

There were 8 pickups in the Ugly Pickup contest, sponsored by Farwell Farm Supply. The winner was Joe Jaime. He won \$25.

A large group of antique cars participated in the parade. The winners were:

Oldest car - Keith Terry, 1913 Model T; longest distance driven, Weldon Reed, 1956 Ford, from Floyd, N.M.; and judges choice - Ken Wooley, 1931 Model A. Each received \$25.

The finalists read essays at the bandstand. The winner receives a \$100 scholarship award toward college.

Essay judges were Kit Smith and Judy Worrell. Contest judges were Tim and Laura Valentine, Betty Snipes and Glen Rae Klebold.

The first official act of the new queen was to judge the beard contests. The winners were: Best-looking, Calvin Johnson; most unique, Rodney Herington, and ugliest, Roger Menning. Each received a cash prize.

The giveaway of the new pickup truck, sponsored by the Farwell Fire Department, was won by J.E. Guthrie, of Columbia, Mo. All 1,100 giveaway tickets were sold.

Four watermelon-eating contests were held, sponsored by Tim Holabird and Max Carter, who have opened a produce stand in Texico called "The Shed."

Winners were: ages 6-9, John Osborne; ages 10-13, Gary Pickrell; ages 14-16, Sammy Herrera, and 17 and over, Les James. \$85 in cash prizes were awarded.

## Kellie Anderson contracts illness

Kellie Anderson of Farwell is in stable condition in the hemovascular unit of St. Joseph's Hospital in Phoenix, Ariz.

Kellie exhibited flu-like symptoms for two weeks. She had seen her family physician for a viral infection before she left home. She heard her doctor say what we have all heard so many times: "The body heals itself of a virus. We have no antibiotics to treat viruses. We just treat the symptoms as they crop up."

She decided to go with her family to Arizona to visit her brother, Jay, because the symptoms did not seem too severe at the time.

She was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital Sunday night in a coma.

"Kellie is holding her own, and the doctors are trying a new medication," said her mother, Sallie Anderson, on Wednesday. "Say a prayer for her."

Kellie's doctors have diagnosed viral encephalitis. Viral encephalitis can be caused by hundreds of strains of viruses. The Andersons were told that only one kind responds to medication.

Mrs. Anderson voiced some frustration when she said: "They tell us one of the doctors is the most brilliant neurologists in the United States, but he didn't know what to do at this point. All we can do is pray and wait to see if the medication works."

Nurses have given Mr. and Mrs. Anderson encouragement because Kellie's vital signs are strong, and she is capable of breathing on her own even though they have her hooked up to a respirator in case of a problem.

Kellie is the daughter of Sallie and Marvin Anderson of Farwell. She will be a senior at Farwell High School this fall.

Kellie is a cheerleader, member of the band, on the basketball team, and golf team. She is active in the UMYF at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

She has worked at the Farwell Country Club as a lifeguard this summer, and she also taught swimming lessons there.

Mayor Chris Gikas reported that Farwell crews have been spraying very regularly this year to kill off mosquitos.

"We've actually had some complaints that we have been spraying too often," said Gikas.

He added that we can never completely eliminate mosquitos because they can fly into town from outlying areas.

Dr. William Green reports that Farwell may have had one isolated case of viral encephalitis.

"We see one or two

unrelated cases of this every summer," said Dr. Green.

It is difficult to track because the same virus might cause mild symptoms in one person, and extremely severe symptoms in the next person.

Symptoms of viral encephalitis include: high fever, stiff neck, and headache. Convulsions, and coma are possible in severe cases.

Patients with encephalitis usually get well, but severe complications or death are possible.

Dr. Green stressed that he did not want to alarm people. "We have no evidence of mosquito borne infection or community involvement. We don't have an epidemic, and I don't want to frighten people."

It is important to keep a close watch on people who exhibit the symptoms listed above.

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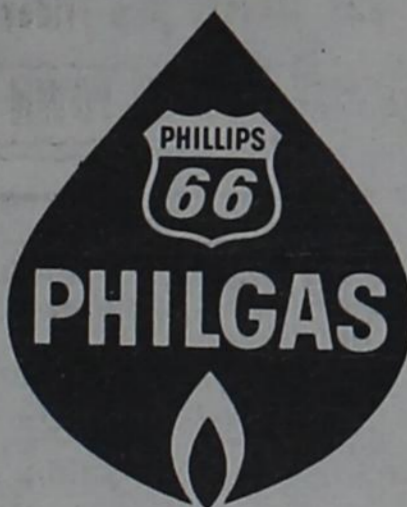
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# Berry, Jennings win tourney

### Ready for harvest?

Many fruits and vegetables are beginning to ripen, and home canners should be getting prepared for the harvest. Preplanning can make the process easier and safer. "It's a good idea to check out any questions you have before beginning any home food processing," says Janette Pierce, Extension Home Economist, Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

County Extension agents can tell you if your preservation methods are safe, and will provide you with the latest research based processing times and procedures.

Using the correct procedures in home food preservation is important. Incorrect methods can allow bacteria

growth in food, which may cause food poisoning or lead to spoilage.

"If you have any doubt about the safety of your home processed food don't hesitate to call," Pierce says. The County Extension office phone number is 481-3619.

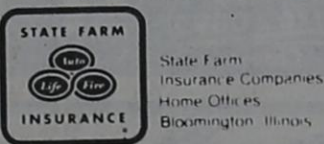
Food can sometimes be saved if you act quickly. Tell the agent what you think went wrong. Review the exact steps you followed when processing the food, being careful not to leave anything out. The smallest thing might make a difference.

Have your dial gauge canners tested annually, and get any questions answered before you begin food processing. Preparation can save you a lot of time, money, and needless frustration.

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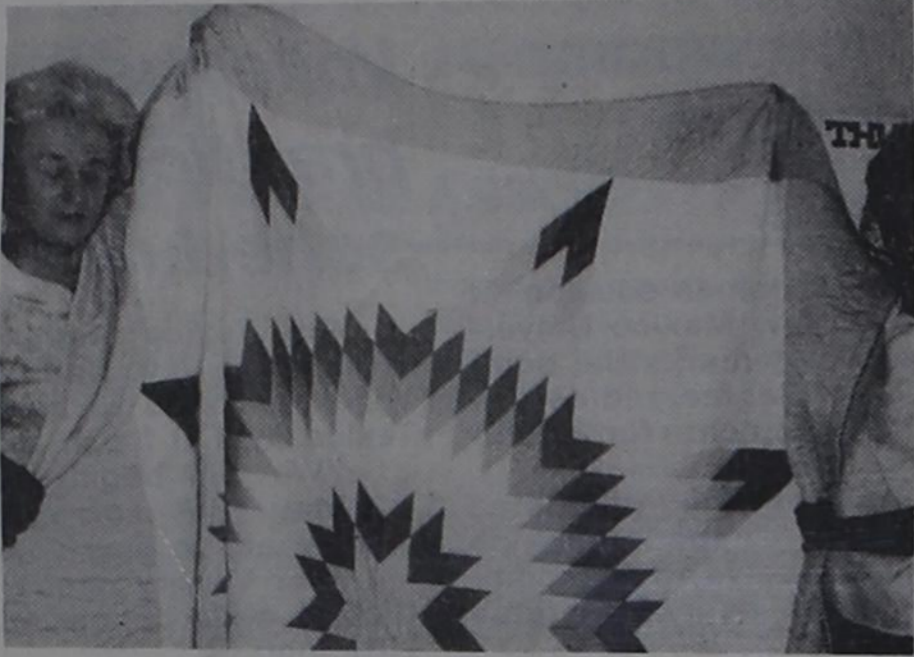

 A resolution was approved supporting Swisher County's bid to have a minimum security prison built near Tulla.

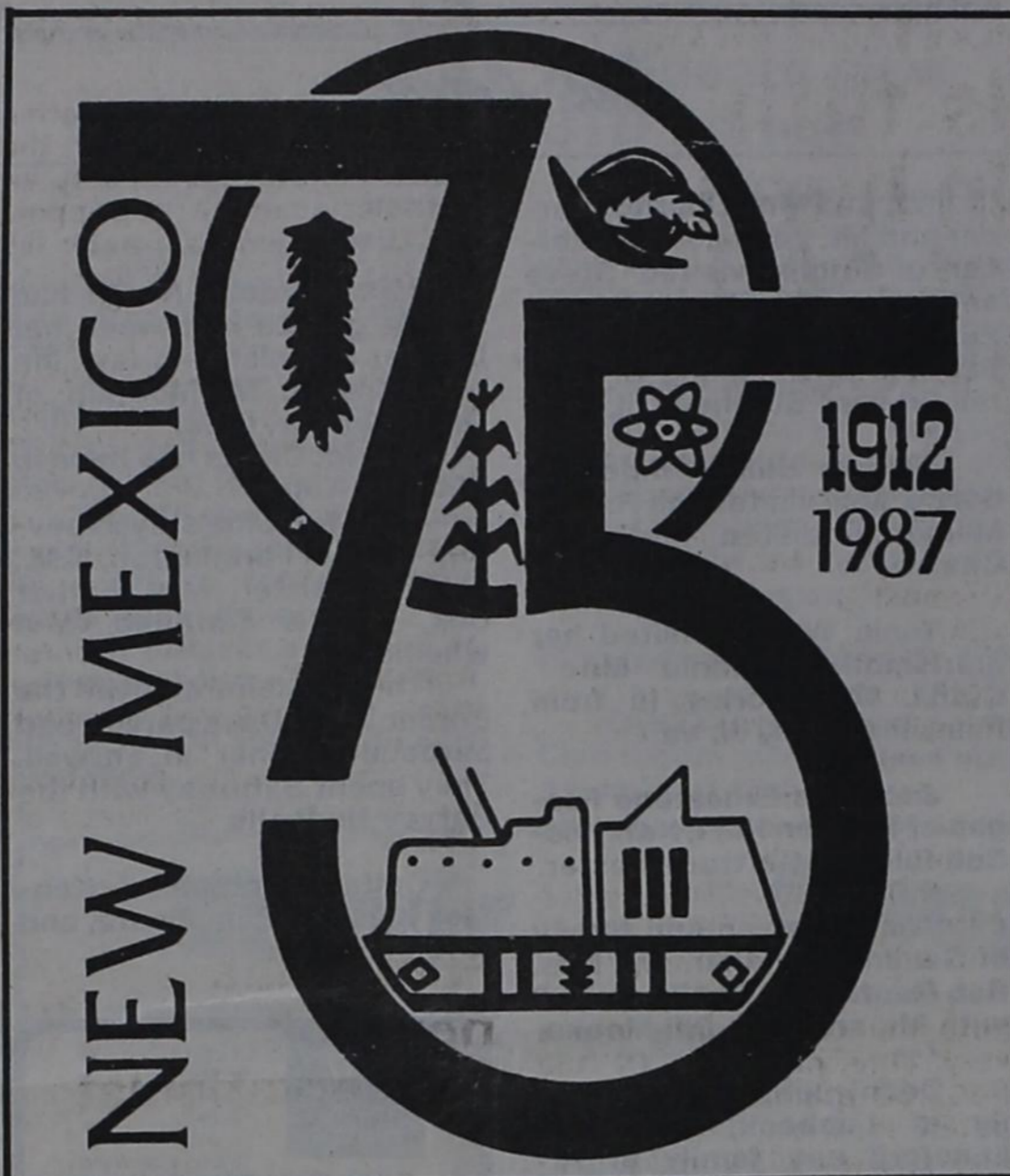

Heat oil in large skillet. Add zucchini, onion, parsley, garlic, salt, pepper, oregano and rosemary. Saute mixture over medium heat, stirring often, until zucchini is tender, about 20 minutes. Toss in tomatoes and continue to saute until tomatoes are thoroughly heated, about 5 minutes. Turn mixture into a serving dish; sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Makes 8 - 10 servings.

leaf lettuce  
1 29-ounce can peach halves, drained  
1 17-oz can pear halves, drained  
1 14-oz can sliced pineapple, drained  
1 lb. Armor Golden Star Ham thinly sliced  
cream cheese  
chopped walnuts  
blueberries  
1 strawberries

Dressing:  
3/4 c. dairy sour cream  
1 Tbs. horseradish mustard  
2 tsp. sugar  
1 tsp. lemon juice.

Combine dressing ingredients. Chill. Serve with salad.  
Salad: Line platter with lettuce; arrange peaches, pears, pineapple slices and ham on lettuce. Roll cream cheese into balls; roll in walnuts. Arrange cheese balls in pineapple rings. Fill each peach half with blueberries. Garnish each pear half with a strawberry. Serves four.

1 bottle (2 oz.) ground red pepper  
1 bottle (1 oz.) chili powder  
1 carton (1 oz.) monosodium glutamate  
1 bottle (1 oz.) garlic powder

Mix well and use like salt to season food.

1 lb. broccoli  
1 c. chopped celery  
3 green onions cut up the whole onion  
1/4 c. oil

1/4 c. peanuts  
Chop vegetables. Heat oil to very hot, but not smoking. Stir vegetables into oil and saute quickly. Salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle the peanuts on just before serving. Garnish the platter with tomato wedges. Other summer vegetables may be substituted for those listed above.

In a small saucepan, melt 1/4 c. butter or margarine. Add the juice of 1/2 lemon and its grated peel, 1 Tbs. chopped parsley, and 1/4 tsp. of crushed oregano or basil leaves. Heat. Serve over cooked vegetables.  
Makes about 1/3 c. sauce.

4 medium tomatoes, half ripe  
1/2 c all-purpose flour  
2 1/2 tsps. salt  
2 1/2 tsps. sugar  
1/4 tsp pepper  
3/4 c. evaporated milk oil for frying  
Wash tomatoes, but do not peel. Cut into 3/4" slices. Place on paper towels to drain. Combine flour, salt, sugar and pepper. Dust tomatoes in flour mixture on both sides. Add evaporated milk to remaining flour mixture to make a thick batter. Dip floured tomatoes in batter Fry in hot oil 1/2" deep until golden brown on both sides. Makes six servings.

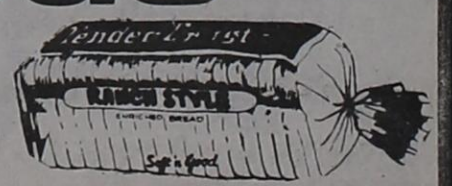

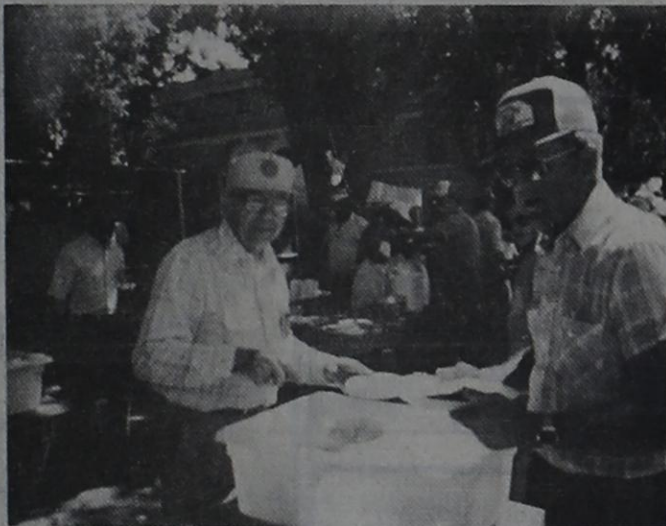

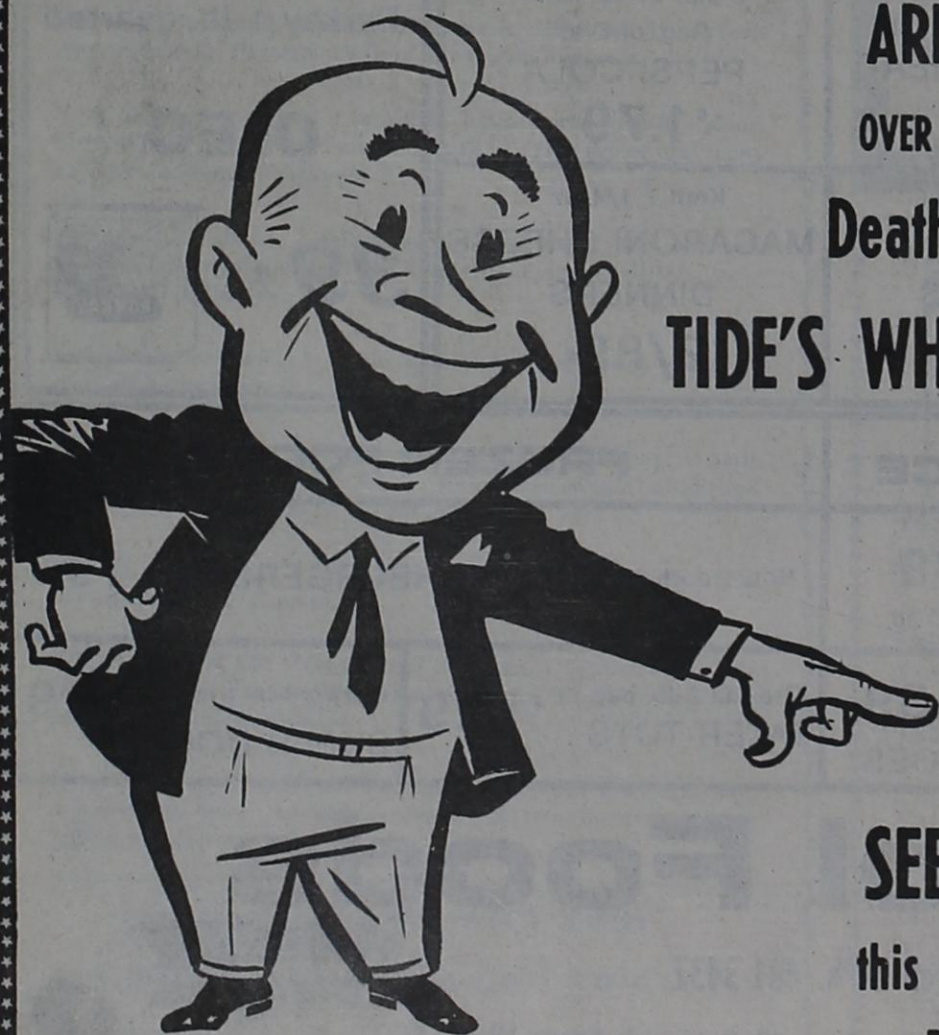
