We're four weeks away

About this time of year is the annual observance of the atomic bombs falling on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

KofC donates \$\$ for special ed

The 8591 Council of the Knights of Columbus from San Jose Mission in Texico presented checks to the Texico and Farwell schools for the special education departments of each school system.

This is the third year that the Knights of Columbus has made donations to the schools.

The money was raised through the Knights of Columbus' annual Tootsie Roll drive. This is a state-wide project in the state of New Mexico to raise money for the organization's emergency benevolent fund.

"Ninety percent of the money raised in this campaign remains here in this

community which gave so generously to sponsor it," said Isidro Ortega.

"Each year we have gotten more help and cooperation from local individuals and businesses. We appreciate their support," he added.

Paula Leighton of the special education department in Texico said that the money would be used to purchase a camera to be used by special education students in making reports, and computer programs.

Farwell schools had not yet decided what to do with the money. They might possibly use it to buy computer programs or a color monitor for the computer.

Transfer students may have a problem

The day of reckoning has arrived.

Transfer students may no longer change from one school district to another in Texas unless they meet some very strict regulations.

School systems must comply with Section A (1) of the state-wide federal court order, Civil Action 5281, which requires that the Texas Education Agency review all transfers between schools.

Transfer students may not be accepted from one school district to another if the transfer causes a change of more than 1% in the racial balance of a school district.

"If Farwell were to fail to comply with these regulations, it could face some severe penalties," said Farwell School Superintendent John Grigsby.

The penalties which a school system could face for willfully failing to enforce this law are: loss of all federal funding, and loss of accreditation. A school official who willfully disregards the law can lose his certification.

On the other hand, Civil Action 5281 causes some real questions about residency.

For instance, there is a resident of West Camp whose children have always attended Farwell schools. The person himself also attended Farwell schools. He owns property and pays taxes in both Bailey and Parmer County.

But, because his home is on the Bailey County side of the line his children will have to attend school in Muleshoe unless they can find a legal way around the problem.

The court order stipulates that a child must attend school in the area where his family resides if his transfer would change the racial balance of the school.

The question is immediately raised, why don't they

just declare that they live on their property in Parmer County?

The answer is that they must go to school where they have their legal residence.

Unlike Sen. Ted Kennedy, who could declare that he was a resident of New York to run for Congress by spending a few days in an apartment in that city, farm families in this area might not have the option to switch residency easily.

Once they have declared that a tract of land is their homestead, it isn't always that easy or financially advantageous to switch their homestead.

In addition to changing residency, the family could seek to get a hardship transfer. Very few of these are being granted at this time.

There are five grounds to seek a hardship transfer. Students may transfer from one school to another for academic courses that they cannot get in their own school district.

Second, graduating seniors who have attended the transfer school for two years may remain there for their senior year.

Third, under very strict circumstances transfers may be granted because of child care problems. This only applies to children under age 10 unless there is an older handicapped child involved.

Fourth, health reasons can cause reasons for transfer.

Fifth, transfers may be granted to children of employees of a school district.

"At this time, we anticipate that this will mean that we lose about 6 students in the Farwell ISD," said Grigsby. "but, we won't know for sure until school starts."

"It is completely out of our hands," he added.

Processing plant in works here

Blake's Lottaburger plans to place a processing plant on the western edge of Texico.

Wayne Smith, who will be the manager here, said a meeting has been set for Texico City Hall at 7 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 13, to answer questions from residents.

The company is New Mexico - oriented, with some outlets in Colorado and Arizona, too. The Texico location was picked because it is near an airport and is in the midst

of a highway transportation network. It is also in the heart of the beef industry.

The plant would employ from 8 - 12 fulltime employees.

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Texico may lower its speed limit

The Texico City Council Tuesday discussed the possibility of lowering the city's speed limits.

The current limit is 30 miles per hour. Councilman Butch Tharp suggested that the limit be dropped to 25 mph for the whole city. The council asked city attorney Duane Hamar to draw up a proposed ordinance and the topic will be further discussed at its next meeting.

It was also suggested that the limits around the school might be lower than the rest of the city. The city marshal will check with school officials.

In other business, Tharp reported a recent incident involving the city cemetery southwest of Texico.

It seems a Clovis woman died and a burial was set at the Texico Cemetery. When the burial party checked the gravesite they found that it was overgrown with weeds and they had to mow it before the burial could take place.

Mayor John R. Hadley, who also is president of the cemetery association, said the Texico Junior Class is hired each year to keep the cemetery clean. He said they have been doing a good job of it but that recent rains made it a mess.

The council asked Hamar to find out who owns the cemetery. Currently, fees are paid to the association by private individuals but the city handles the bookkeeping, Hadley said.

Hamar will find out whose responsibility it is to maintain the cemetery.

The council also: - Discussed having a contest in the schools for designing a city emblem. Councilman Bryan Kube will check with school officials.

- Approved the final payment to the engineer on the new water well project. The well is functioning correctly.

- Agreed to seek bids for a new storm drain section along State Line Road.

Kellie can reach or move or hold a hand on occasion, but not frequently.

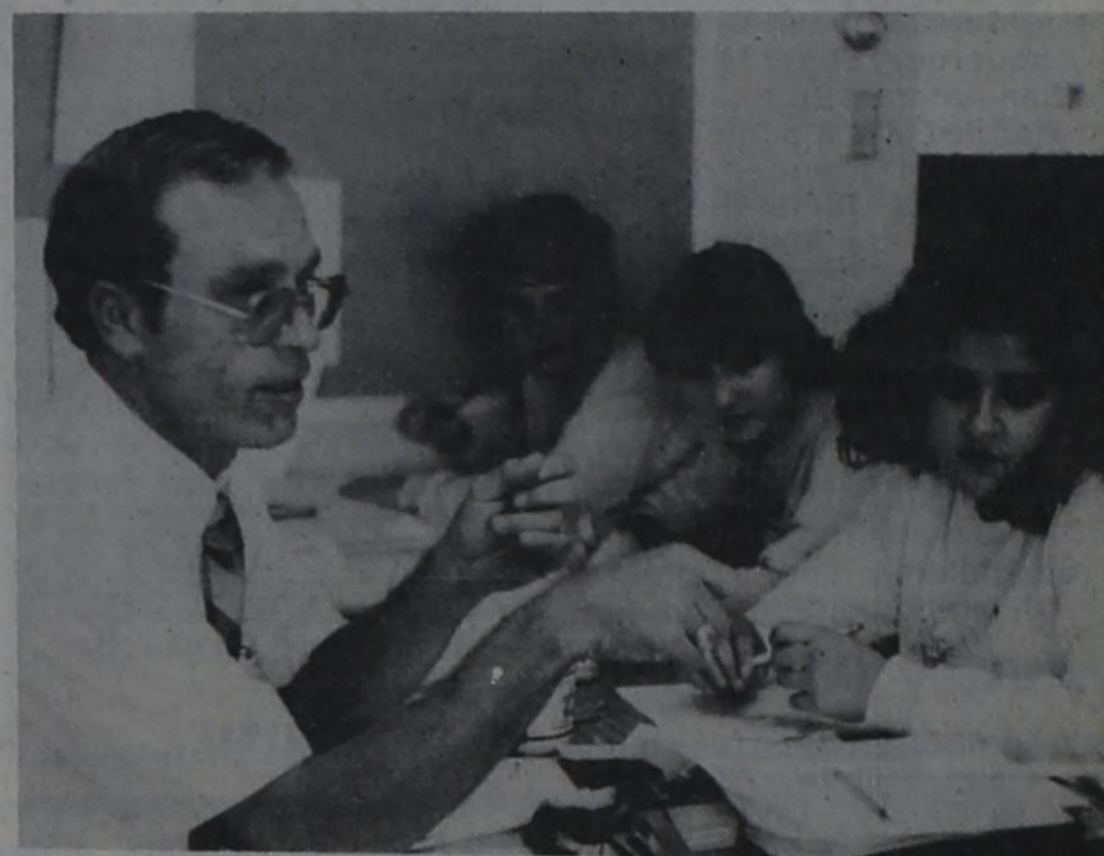
Kellie's progress is slow, so it is hard for family members to keep from being discouraged. They can only go into ICU to visit her four times a day, which increases their anxiety.

The board approved a bid to purchase 13 Leading Edge Computers with color monitors and dual disc drives.

The board accepted the resignation of Dorothy Robinson as computer aide.

Paula Leighton presented a check which she had received from the Knights of Columbus of San Jose Mission to be used by the special education department of the Texico schools.

The board expressed its appreciation for the donation.

5% pay hikes OK'd

The Farwell City Council Tuesday approved 5 percent pay raises (plus benefits about an extra 1 1/2 percent) for salaried city employees.

In favor were Curtis Smith, Elizabeth Phillips and Martin Kube. Fred Chandler abstained, noting he doesn't favor percentage-type raises. Ysleta Kittrell was absent.

In other business, the council decided to have an executive session Tuesday to interview the top candidates for the city clerk's post. Janie Bowery is retiring at the end of this year.

Nineteen applications have been received. Each councilman will list his top five choices and all persons on those lists will be interviewed.

The council discussed whether the person chosen should live in Farwell and it seemed the consensus was that the person, due to the importance of the post, should live in the Farwell school district.

There has been no decision made on the salary for the new person. It will depend on experience and other factors.

The council also: - Heard that patching street potholes will begin shortly.

- The sewer plant work is behind schedule but new equipment has been brought in and rapid progress is being made. A letter arrived from the state Department of Health noting that the sanitation plant is under general compliance.

- Approved a deal to put down fly ash in the alley behind Capitol Foods to storage facilities owned by Helton Oil. Hal Helton offered to bring the ash here if the city bought it and spread it.

Mayor Chris Gikas noted

that it's a goal to place down ash throughout the city's alleys. If any group of residents want their alleys done, and wish to share the cost, then it should be a priority to negotiate with them, the mayor said.

- Heard Gikas note that businesses making telephone solicitations in Farwell need a city permit. Residents should ask such businesses what their permit numbers are if called, he said.

- Discussed leveling off the unpaved street on Ave. E near the Baptist Church so the lake water level can be kept down.

- Heard Gikas say that the recent rains had caused some graves at the cemetery to settle and they will be repaired. Chandler said the grass along the highway by the cemetery needs to be mowed more and if the state highway department won't do it, the city ought to.

Fund-raiser planned for Martinez

A Mexican Dinner has been planned to raise money for George Martinez of Farwell. Martinez has lived in Farwell since 1962. He has worked in the irrigation pipe repair business.

He suffered a heart attack in June of 1985. He had heart surgery at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock in April of this year. He has been hospitalized three times since.

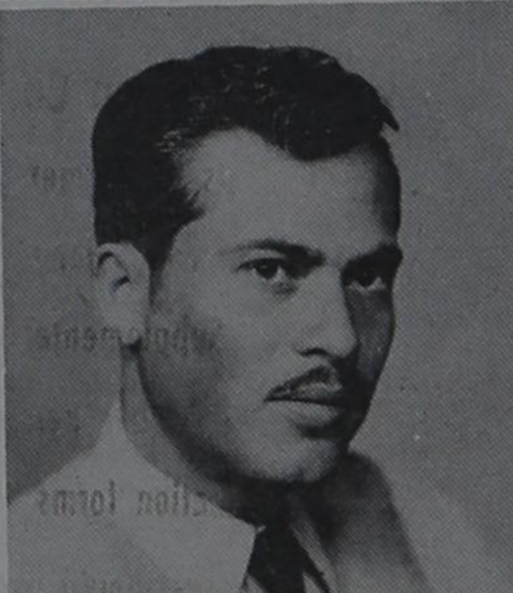
He was a retired vice president of Southwestern Life Insurance Company in Dallas. He was a mathemat-

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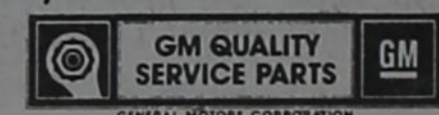
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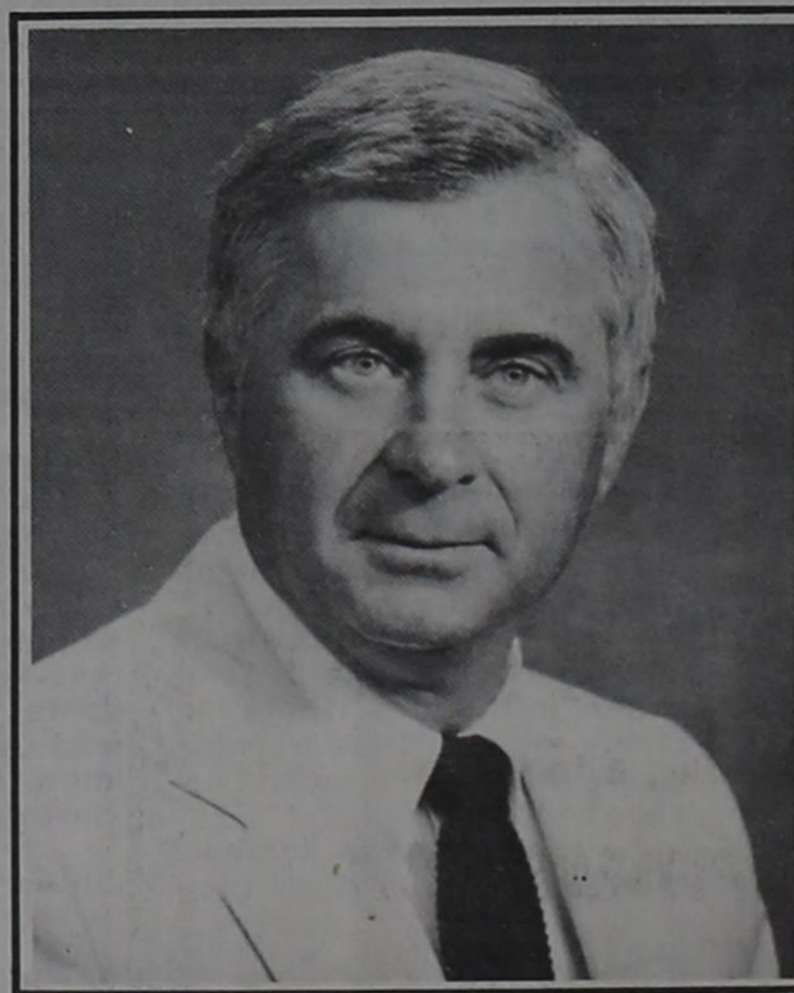

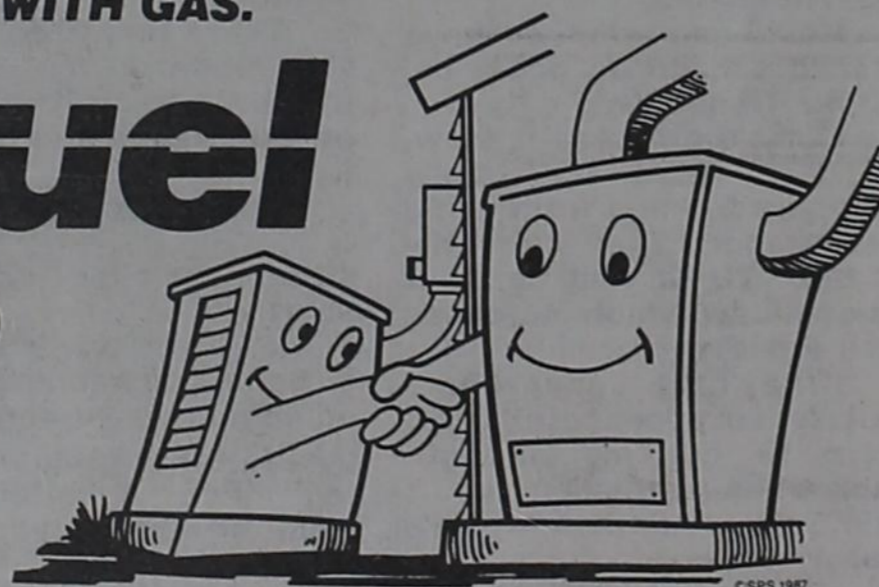
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Cooking school conducted

The following recipe for whole wheat bread was used in the Cooking School presented by Jeanette Pierce of the County Home Extension Office and Connie Moyer of SPS in Farwell on Aug. 11, 12, and 13.

The SPS school included games, demonstrations, and classes on food preparation, and nutrition. Most of all, students had a chance to roll up their sleeves and try some of the cooking themselves.

On Thursday, Ms. Moyer presented a demonstration on the use of electricity utilizing a new high voltage board.

Food Processor Whole Wheat Bread:
 about 1 1/2 c. unsifted all-purpose flour
 about 1 1/2 c. unsifted whole wheat flour
 3 Tbs. butter or margarine, softened
 2 Tbs. sugar
 1 Tsp. salt
 1 pkg. active dry yeast
 1/4 c. warm water (105° - 115°F.)
 3/4 c. ice-cold water
 vegetable oil
 raisins, nuts, candied cherries, and gum drops
 Egg wash

1. With metal blade in place, combine flours, butter, sugar, and salt in a work bowl. Process 5 to 10 seconds. Dissolve yeast in warm water; pour mixture through feed tube. Begin processing, pouring cold water through feed tube in a fast stream until ball forms, about 10-15 seconds. Continue processing for 60 seconds to knead dough.

2. Carefully remove dough from bowl. Knead about 1/4 c. additional all-purpose flour if dough is too sticky to handle. Divide dough into two balls.

3. Let dough rest on floured work surface 20 minutes. Punch down dough balls. Shape each ball into a desired animal shape. (See Fol-

lowing directions for shaping dough.) Brush with oil. Cover loosely with plastic wrap. Refrigerate immediately 2 to 24 hours.

4. When ready to bake, preheat oven to 375°F. and remove dough from refrigerator. Let stand about 10 minutes at room temperature. Brush with desired Egg wash (1 Tbs. water mixed with: 1 whole egg, or 1 egg white, or 1 egg yolk).

5. Bake 25-30 minutes or until loaves are browned and sound hollow when the bottoms are tapped. Immediately remove from baking sheets to wire racks. Cool. Makes 2 loaves.

To make bread animals, divide the dough into balls to form the body, and head, arms, legs, and tails.

Use a sharp knife to cut dough 1/8" deep to make facial features. Use kitchen shears to snip dough to make scales, feathers, etc.

Be sure to pinch firmly when attaching the body sections. To securely attach dough sections, moisten surface with some water to make a better bond.

Use your imagination.

Rabbit illustration

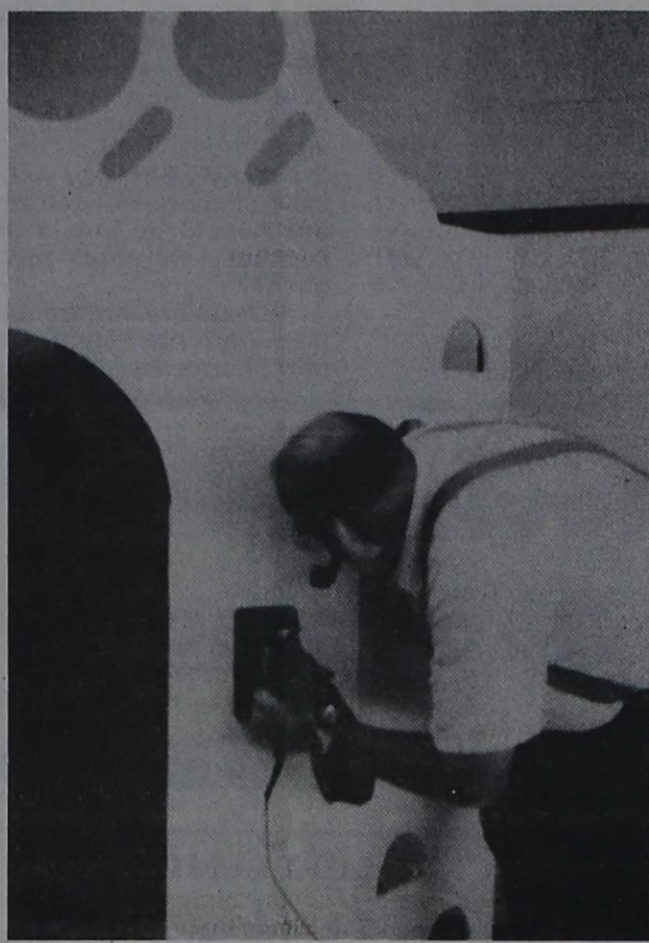
1. Divide dough as illustrated.

2. Shape body section into an oval.

3. Shape head section into a ball. Place above body; pinch to seal head to body.

4. Divide remaining section into six pieces; shape into ovals. Attach four to body for paws and the two remaining pieces to head for ears. Pinch tips of ears and turn one tip down slightly toward the head.

5. Press cherry halves into face for eyes and tongue. Score face to make the mouth. Press strips of cherries into face to make whiskers. Press a raisin into center of rabbit's tummy. Continue as directed in Steps 3 and 4 of recipe.

"I'm thankful for people who go the extra mile and take the time, money, and effort to say 'we care.'"

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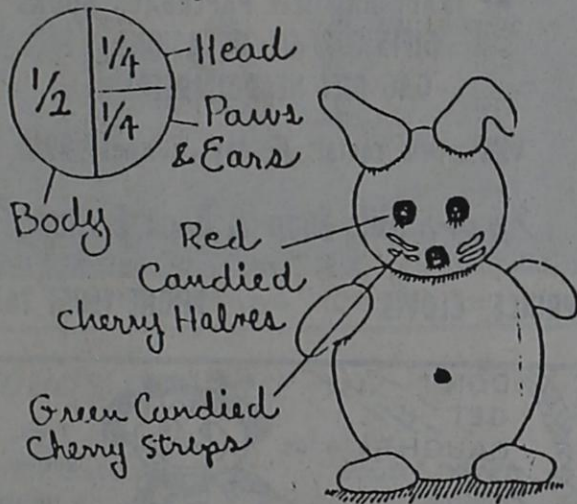
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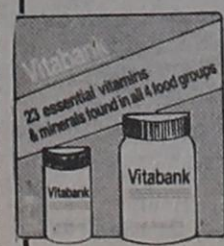
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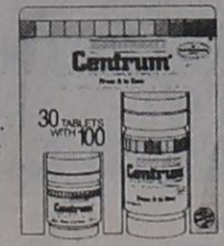
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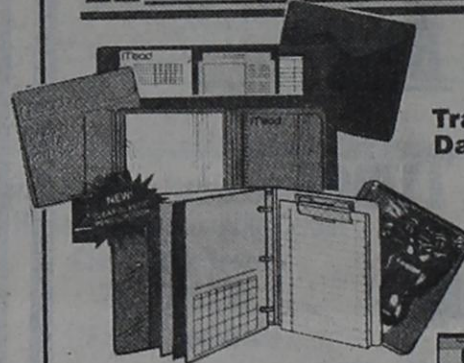
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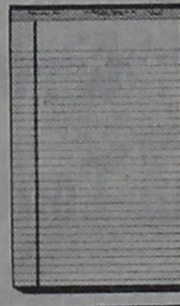
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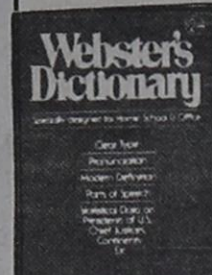
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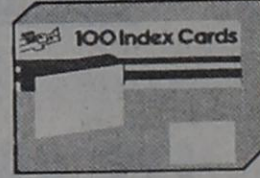
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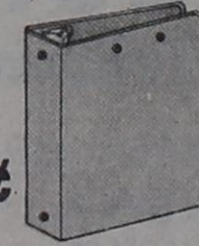
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Farwell school info given

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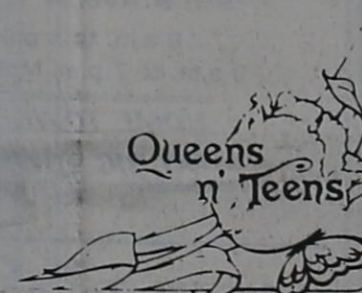
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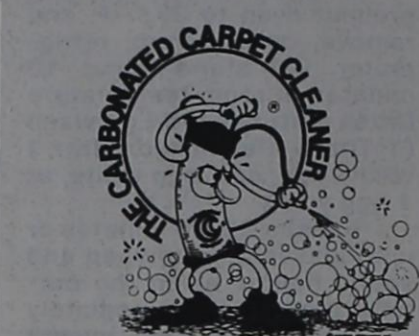
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Four-year-olds sought

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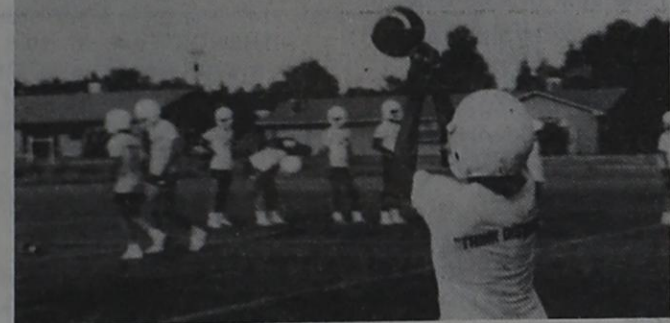

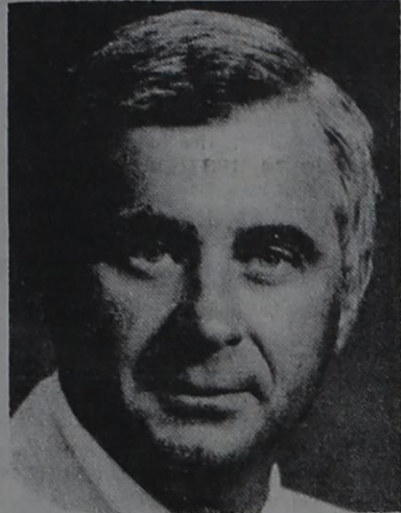
