What it's like to be a missionary in Africa

The ladies of the Farwell First Baptist Church hosted a salad luncheon Dec. 2, with guest speaker Kathy Kiffee, a missionary to Tanzania, Africa giving the program.

Roberta Johnson opened the ceremony and Susan Franse led the opening prayer. Gladys Kaltwasser introduced Dixie Marcades, wife of the Baptist music and youth director who sang, "Special Delivery" and led the group in singing "A Story to Tell to the Nations.'

Kathy and her husband Mark are employed as special missionaries. They have a four-month-old daughter, Laura.

Mark has worked in construction work, but is now working to get a degree at Wayland Baptist University. Mark has worked in Africa with the Peace Corp, but wanted to go into missionary work since the Peace Corp does not promote God.

Tanzania is on the eastern side of Africa, halfway down the coast. About 12,000 Christians have been baptized in a years time.

When Kathy and her husband arrived in Africa, they lived on a demonstration farm. It consisted of 300 acres of farm land. Kathy said they knew little about farming. They had 60 people working for them. They soon learned that demonstration farms don't work too well in Africa, because the people learn better from a one-on-one

teaching. The main crop is rice and everyone is well fed. They eat rice at every meal and eat a lot at one time, because sometimes they may not get but one meal a day. When they are cooking enough rice for a group, they measure the rice as two cups for each adult and one cup for each child. It takes quite a large pot sometimes to cook for several

Most of the clothes that they wear are hand-me-down western clothes sent from the U.S. Kathy brought a "conda" which is a large piece of fabric they wear wrapped around their clothing like a skirt.

Kathy said that some of the women used the condas to tie their babies on their backs. The babies ride like that until they are two years old. Some of the four-year-old children carry the two-year-olds.

The natives don't know or have any concept about how clothes match, so they put all different kinds of clothing, color schemes and styles together with their condas, which usually don't match either, said Kathy.

"The natives never throw anything away," said Kathy. "The clothes they have usually go through 20-30 people in their lifetime. They don't even throw away cans, because they like to use them to carry things around in. The people in Tanzania washed all their clothes by hand. The clothes had to be ironed, including one's underwear, because of bugs that would lay their eggs in the clothing."

All food in Tanzia is made from scratch. The people grind their own flour and make butter and cheese. "We cook on gas or wood stoves," said Kathy, "but some of the natives cooked out on the ground."

Kathy said most of their food was cooked for them by her houseboy. He could cook so much better than we could."

Kathy said children in Tanzania really don't miss out on as much as one might think. "They miss out on the bad, but not the good," said Kathy. "African people just love little white children. In Africa it is just one big happy family, aunts and uncles are thought of as the same as mothers and fathers and brothers and sisters."

They had a large grove of lemon trees. Kathy said, "That's something in a country where there is no sugar." They would send their lemons to missionaries all over the country.

"People in Africa don't seem to have a good concept of saving for their crops. They tend to eat all of their grain or rice until they have no seed left to plant," said Kathy. "So we would sometimes well or lend seed to them to plant."

Some farms grew pineapples on the presumption that the government was going to buy them, but that never happened. Kathy said that while they were there, they had so many papayas to eat that they fed some to their pigs.

They raised all kinds of animals -cows, pigs, goats, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, dogs and cats. Kathy said that they would raise their rabbits and sell as many as they could raise. In Africa they also eat guinea pigs.

Kathy was about 25 miles from a telephone, mailbox or stores. The closest gas station is about 3 hurs away and the stores don't carry much food, only about three items are usually on the shelves.

Medical treatment is not too good. kathy said they never went to the local clinics, because they used the same needle all the time on everyone. The hospital with an English doctor is about three hours away and if you are very ill the hospital is a four-hour flight to Nairobi.

"The roads are terrible. They are about 75% pot holes. One time a whole car got stuck in one pot hole. The roads are bad because it rains four months out of the year. With the roads being so bad it is evident that one can not get everywhere by car. Some of the churches were four hours away," said Kathy.

Kathy said that as a result of all the people going to Africa as missionaries, their main job was to work in some sort of job. They usually worked in agriculture or were teachers. They also built churches, took over all the church work, and supervised the evangel-

When Kathy and Mark first arrived in Africa, the missionaries were the only white men there. There were no Christians there either, but the people were begging to be taught. Kathy and Mark. learned to speak Swahili, but they had a limited vocabulary. Kathysaid that most of what she knew in Swahili was farm or house-related.

In Africa women workers were considered either young or old. "Once they had their 10 kids, or so, they were considered old. In church, the women sat on one side of the church and men sat on the other. Also, during the services, the people were constantly moving about."

There were no church buildings in Tanzania, when Kathy first arrived. Kathy said that the churches got together in the U.S. and sent money to build churches there, but then they needed someone to build them. So mark and another man worked together and within a years time had constructed 13 churches.

The Kiffees are planning to go back to Africa when her husband finishes his degree and they are approved to go.

Land annexation in Farwell topic

The possibility of annexing land to the city was discussed at Monday's Farwell City Council meeting.

Mayor Chris Gikas suggested two ideas to gain "more lots for nice homes to be built here."

One would be on property currently owned by Harold Travis south of the southwest corner of Farwell. The other would concern property currently owned by Hurshel Harding east of the southeast corner of the city.

"We need to start thinking about this," Gikas told the council. "We only have a couple of large lots left in the city for nice homes to be built on. We need extra space to encourage people to build good homes on."

The council discussed concerns such as utilities and streets but no decisions were made. Gikas said he will bring up the topic again later after councilmen had an opportunity to consider it.

In other business, the council

discussed the future of the Farwell sesquicentennial Mural residing alongside the city hall wall. The question is whether to leave it where it is or move it inside the Farwell Community Center.

The council reported that most people favor leaving it where it is if it can be weatherized. Unfortunately, moisture condenses behind the mural. It has been repaired four times this year and screws keep coming loose.

Although the council took no official action on the mural's future, it was indicated that the mural will be left where it is for several more months.

The council also:

-- Agreed to buy the area at the southwest corner of Farwell (Sandia Court) for \$2,500. The money will come from revenuesharing funds. The site will be a potential water well location and-or

-Agreed to serve as a committee

to redo the city's system. Some stop signs will be replaced with yield signs and in some places stop signs will be placed. The council and Gikas will begin surveying the whole city system.

-Agreed to have the sidewalk around City Hall improved.

-Agreed to seek insurance bids

-Heard Gikas suggest that some of the old city Christmas decorations be placed on the north side of the highway. Alo, the city will check into finding out why all the new lights are not burning correctly.

-Agreed to spend \$20 a week on janitorial cleaning of the Farwell Community Center on weeks when the janitorial service is not there. The service currently does a complete cleaning once a month. It was noted that more funds are being taken in than expended for the center.

-Agreed to change its meeting times to Tuesdays.

Students show math, language arts mastery

Farwell School Supt. John Grigsby told the School Board Tuesday night he was very pleased with the results of the state tests in math and language arts given high school

This is the second year of the state wide program whereby mastery must be shown in these two areas in order for students to graduate.

Farwell students showed 95% mastery in math and 91% in language arts. This means that only 1 student didn't show mastery in math and 2 in language arts.

Counselors will now check the results and inform parents. Tutorials will be required for students who didn't master the two areas. Tests will be given again next year for them.

In other business, the board:

-Approved the annual audit. -Hired Candi McKillip of Farwell as a fulltime special education

-Agreed to survey the community to see if there is enough interest to start GED (high school diploma equivalency) and English as a Second Language programs. If adults show enough interest for

either program to start. Farwell would provide classrooms but the funding would be provided by the regional service center. There are no tuition or charges for partici-

-Discussed possibly renovating the cafeteria and former wood shop. An architect will be asked about costs and ideas before a decision is

--Heard a report from Athletic

Director Rex Cumpton that said that 70 percent of all students in grades 7 through 12 are participating in athletics. The problem is that the schools don't have enough personnel to serve them like they ought to, said Grigsby.

School officials will check into ways to have more personnel available to work with these students and will report back to the school board.

-Heard Richard Montgomery report on upcoming changes in vocational education.

Risk Financing -- the systematic study of insurance deductibles. Districts should choose a deductible appropriate to its recent loss history and ability to cover unexpected claims. By choosing a higher deductible, the cost savings can then be directly funneled into a specific account to cover future claims and to do building repair.

Liability Coverage -- the meeting covered the recent history of litigation in the U.S. and explained why certain liability coverages have been dropped or the rates have soared to provide coverage for particular classes of purchasers.



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

Cotton reports look good

One of the few bright spots among U.S. exports is cotton. Boosted by the government's marketing loan program and competitive prices, cotton exports are booming and should continue at a high level over the next few years.

. That optimistic note was voiced by Dr. Carl Anderson, cotton marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, at the Annual Agricultural Outlook Conference in Washington, D.C., Dec. 3.

"Lower interest rates and a weaker dollar abroad are giving the new cotton program a big boost," Anderson said. "Foreign consumption of cotton is rising at an accelerated rate and is pushing world cotton trade to a higher level while reducing stocks. At the same time foreign cotton production will likely be about 8 million bales short of mill use. All of that has to be good news

to U.S. producers."
According to Anderson, export marketing prospects for the remainder of the '89s should be in the 6-7 million bale range per year provided the U.S. keeps a flexible cotton program with a marketing loan provision. The marketing loan allows producers to use the government's standard loan program as a safety net while taking advantage of fluctuating world market prices. He believes that declining exports from Russia may lead to some increase in

U.S. shipments to the European market, with major markets remaining in Asia, Japan, South Korea and Taiwan.

"For U.S. cotton producers to continue to compete in international trade, our government farm program needs to maintain provisions that will meet head on production and export incentives of governments in competing countries," Anderson emphasized. "The cotton marketing loan has done just that; it has given U.S. cotton a competitive price in foreign markets. However, future levels of exports will depend largely on relative costs of production and marketing, level of U.S. government support, and each exporting country's desire to maintain and subsidize its agricultural industry to generate trade dollars.

"The marketing loan removes the U.S. price umbrella over world markets, yet provides a safety net on farm income."



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President Houston gives farewell address

1836: MONDAY, DECEMBER 10. On this second Monday of December, the two houses of Congress convened at 12 noon on the portico of the capitol building in Houston to induct President-elect Mirabeau B. Lamar and Vice President-elect David G. Burnet. A crowd of spectators was also present.

Outgoing President Sam Houston was invited to deliver a farewell address. To the surprise of all present, he appeared in a George Washington-style costume, with knee breeches and a white powdered wig. Always an eloquent speaker, he delivered a long and somewhat disorganized address, describing the accomplishments of his administration, and the past, present and future prospects of Texas, with numerous anedotes and other asides. Much of his speech, if not all, appeared to be extemporaneous. It continued for some three hours.

President-elect Lamar became more and more disturbed as President Houston continued to speak. Lamar has a considerable literary reputation, and had prepared a lengthly inaugural address. When Houston finally concluded, Lamar was too indisposed to speak. His address was read to the gathering by his secretary. Some of the spectators have charged that Houston deliberately attempted to "upstage" and disturb his successor. There are wide differences between the two men, even though Lamar served as Houston's Vice President. Others say that it was simply a practical joke, a common practice in the Republic.

Lamar's inaugural address was general in nature. He stated that his administration would seek to foster "agriculture, commerce and the useful arts as the true basis of all national strength and glory." He affirmed his opposition to annexation. His position is not popular in Texas, but was not a campaign issue. "I cannot regard the annexation of Texas to the American Union in any other light than as the grave of all her hopes of happiness and greatness," he said.

'When I view her vast extent of territory, stretching frm the Sabine to the Pacific and away to the Southwest as far as the obstinacy of the enemy may render it necessary for the sword to make the bound-.ary," the incoming President said, the resources of Texas can only result in "carrying to the door of every citizen of the Republic, peace, plenty, and protection."

Vice President Burnet also delivered an inaugural address, although many of the spectators had left by this time. President Lamar will submit his Cabinet nominations to the Senate on Wednesday.

1841: MONDAY, DECEMBER 13. President-elect Sam Houston and Vice President-elect Edward Burleson were inaugurated today in a brief ceremony at the capitol in Austin. General Burleson, long famed as an Indian fighter, appeared in a complete suit of highly dressed and ornamented buckskin. President Houston was dresssed in a hunting shirt and a wide-brimmed white fur hat.

The President's flair for unusual costumes is well known, and there was some interest in what he would wear on this occasion. It was heightened by a report from the former French charge d'affaires, Alphonse de Aligny, who abandoned his post in Austin last April 28 after a dispute with the Lamar administration over what was come to be called the "Pit War."

Saligny took up temporary residence in New Orleans and later in Mandeville, Louisiana. Houston, who has had no doubt of his reelection, has kept in touch with him there, to smooth the way for his eventual return to Texas. the gist of one of his letters was reported by de Aaligny to his superior in Paris as follows:

"I have also received a letter from General Houston. He seems to have not the slightest doubt of his election, for he begs me to have made for him in Paris a uniform for

him to wear on the day of his inauguration. In my correspondence with the department in 1839 I already had occasion to remark on the bizarre tastes of General Houston in regard to dress. No doubt they stem from his life with the savages. He has remained true to these tastes in the choice of uniform he asks me to have sent him. The entire costume is to be made of green velvet embroidered in gold, worn under a short cloak in Spanish style, also in green velvet and lavishly embroidered, to be topped by a hat a la Henry IV sporting an immense three-colored plume. It is in this extraordinary garb that the future head of the Republic of Texas plans to appear when he is installed as President next December 10. I hastned to write to Paris to fulfill the ideas of General Houston."

Perhaps the costume was not ready in time for the inauguration today. Or perhaps President Houston changed his mind. Since his marriage to Margaret Lea on May 9, 1840, he has become increasingly conservative in his dress and his

1843: TUESDAY, DECEMBER 12. Barter has become the most frequent mode of exchange in the Republic of Texas, due to the continuing depreciation of its currency. Even large business transactions are often conducted by exchange of goods, with no money involved.

Money is passed as quickly as it is received. For example, one Texian reports: "I received a hatful of new, crisp \$1 bills in payment for a horse lost in the San Saba Indian fight, which I immediately turned over to a creditor, without ever having folded them. People would almost rather have anything else than the commonwealth paper."

There are no coins in the Republic, and none have ever been minted. Mexican coins circulated for a while after independence, but soon disappeared. As early as 1838, David G. Burnet, the former ad interim President, commented that there was no specie in the Republic, saying, "I doubt if the desk of the Treasurer has heard the jingle of it for the past year." To facilitate trade, "change notes" in amounts less than \$1 have been printed, but are considered of no value.

Barter has become so common that certain items have an agreed value, and almost become legal tender. Cows are presently in this category. Previously it was horses, but they were so often stolen by Indians that they became too risky. The following illustrates how this is



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"Mrs. H., a widow living near me, having need of merchandise, for which the cash was not at hand, offered a cow and a calf in lieu thereof, a cow being rated at \$10. The tender was accepted, Mrs. H. reserving the use of the cow during milking season. The bill of sale being made out, the merchant paid off a debt with it, and the creditor likewise passed it on. That bit of paper passed from hand to hand, always with the original reservation, till it paid about \$100; when the widow made a deal and bought the cow back again before it went dry." The cow itself never changed hands.

Merchants advertise that they will sell for barter--"cash, cotton, or country produce; call and see before purchasing elsewhere," as one

put it. Doctors accept produce and other items for medical services. A carpenter may contract for a large job in return for a gun. Even newspaper subscriptions may be obtained through barter.

William Bolleart, an Englishman who has been travelling through Texas, reports that "barter is the present system of trade." He says that money is especially scarce in San Antonio. "Even the curate is obliged to receive for his different duties cattle, corn, etc., which he barters for what he may require." He describes a typical scene in a shop, in which a young boy brings in a wild turkey his father has shot. He says his mother wants a pound of coffee and two pounds of sugar in return for it. They bargain, and eventually settle for perhaps half that amount. Chicken and eggs may be accepted for cloth and candles, corn for tobacco and salt.

"But let this country be blessed with peace," Bolleart predicts, "this system of things will change, and cash, cash, cash will once more be seen.

1844: MONDAY, DECEMBER 9. President-elect Anson Jones and Vice President-elect Kenneth Lewis Anderson were installed today in what many believe will be the final adminstration of the Republic of Texas before annexation by the United States. The ceremony took place outside Independence Hall in Washington-on-the-Brazos, temporary capital of Texas.

In his valedictory address, outgoing President Sam Houston implied opposition to annexation. "If Texas goes begging again for admission into the United States, she will only degrade herself," he said. He pointed out that the country is now in excellent condition, and if left alone, "may become a nation

distinguished for its wealth and power." Sound currency has at last been established, he said, and "the savage hordes by which we have been molested" have become generally peaceful. Foreign relations are "of the most agreeable character," and Mexico maintains only an attitude of "nominal hostility." It is not clear whether Houston actually opposes annexation, or is merely seeking a more favorable bargain-

ing position. President Jones did not mention annexation in his inaugural address. He pledged to maintain public credit, abolish paper money, encourage agriculture and manufacturing, moral and religious culture, education, and commercial relations with foreign powers.

An inaugural ball will be held this evening in the Hall of Representatives above hatfield's, to cap the day's festivities.

Recipe of Week

MICROWAVE CARAMEL CORN

½ c. butter

1/4 c. corn syrup


1 c. brown sugar 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. soda 4 to 6 quarts popped corn

Combine butter, syrup, sugar and salt in an 8-cup glass measuring cup or a 3-quart mixing bowl. Bring to a boil and then cook 21/2 minutes. Stir in baking soda. Pour over popped corn in a large grocery bag that has been sprayed with a pan coating. Stir slightly to cimbine. Put the bag in the microwave and cook 21/2 minutes, stirring after 1 minute; spread out to cool. Break apart.

NOTE: SPS does not recommend popping the corn in a paper bag because of the possibility of fire.

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



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
