Having spent 24 straight months in Germany myself, I can testify to the importance of receiving mail from home, especially at holiday time. It's lonely out there. In fact, I'd be glad to print in this space any addresses of servicemen or women who are away from home at Christmastime. Each year the members of ESA sorority sponsor the annual Pheasant Hunt.

They go around to local farmers and request the use of their lands for hunting. They advertise the hunt through letters and news stories and personal contact. They register the hunters, and they line up guides to help them.

Is all the work worth the effort? You bet it is!

Each year the Pheasant Hunt brings in local and out of town hunters who spend money in this community. The money raised by their registration alone enables ESA to carry out many fine local projects that would not be possible if it were not for the Pheasant Hunt.

In 1986 alone, the proceeds raised thousands of dollars that were spent to better our community; yet the local cost involved was minimal. \$900 was donated to the fire department to help purchase equipment. \$2,000 was spent for a letter cutting machine for the Farwell Schools system. \$500 was donated for improvements at the Farwell Community Center. \$5,000 worth of playground equipment were

Pheasant hunt again sponsored

The Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority will sponsor its sixth annual pheasant hunting preserve, located in Parmer and Bailey counties, for pheasant and duck hunting through the pheasant hunting dates, Dec. 12-27.

This is a fund-raiser for the group's philanthropic projects.

In the past this has included \$15,000 (over three years) to the Community Center; money and equipment for the New Mexico Girls Ranch; the establishment of the Rosa Roberts Educational Fund with Opportunity Plan, Inc.; playground equipment for the Farwell City Park, along with donations to such worthy causes as the Texico - Farwell Rotary Club polio project, Hodges Cancer Center, St. Jude's Children's Hospital and the Parmer County Child Welfare Board.

Sorority members make sure that all areas of their preserves have plenty of cover for birds to hide in so there will be come birds there for hunters. They talk to landowners to get permission for the use of their land and pay a fee to the Texas Parks and Wildlife to establish a shooting reserve. Then the land is posted as such.

After the land is set up, the sorority estimates the number of hunters who can

safely hunt in each area. They patrol the preserve to make sure there are no unauthorized hunters.

To hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter and purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. Permits are good for any or all of the land secured by the sorority. Each participating landowner is given one or more complimentary permits.

ESA permits will cost: \$75 for those sold Dec. 12-13; \$50 for those sold Dec. 14-20; \$25 for those sold Dec. 21-27; and \$25 for permits for hunters ages 12 or younger. All permits are good for the date they are issued through the closing day of the season.

A \$25 non-refundable deposit will be required to hold all reservations with the balance of the permit price to be paid when the permit is picked up. Receipt of deposit will be acknowledged with a post card. If it becomes apparent ESA cannot accommodate a hunter because the quota has been filled, his deposit will be returned. Linda Gerries wins Dallas trip

Actkinson wins final contest

It was a photo finish as two of the 691 participants in the 29th annual Area Merchants Football Contest tied for first place after the 12 weeks.

In a case like that, the judges use the tie breakers for all 12 weeks to determine who would win the contest. That gave the victory to Linda Gerries, who was 230 points off the tie breakers, to Owen's 285.

Mrs. Gerries said she was thrilled about the win.

"We always enter the contest; it's a family thing," she said. "Years ago, they even took a photo of our family working the ballots. Also, I'd like to very much thank the sponsors of the contest."

For her victory, Mrs. Gerries received two tickets to the Dallas Cowboys - St. Louis Cardinals game Dec. 27 in Dallas. 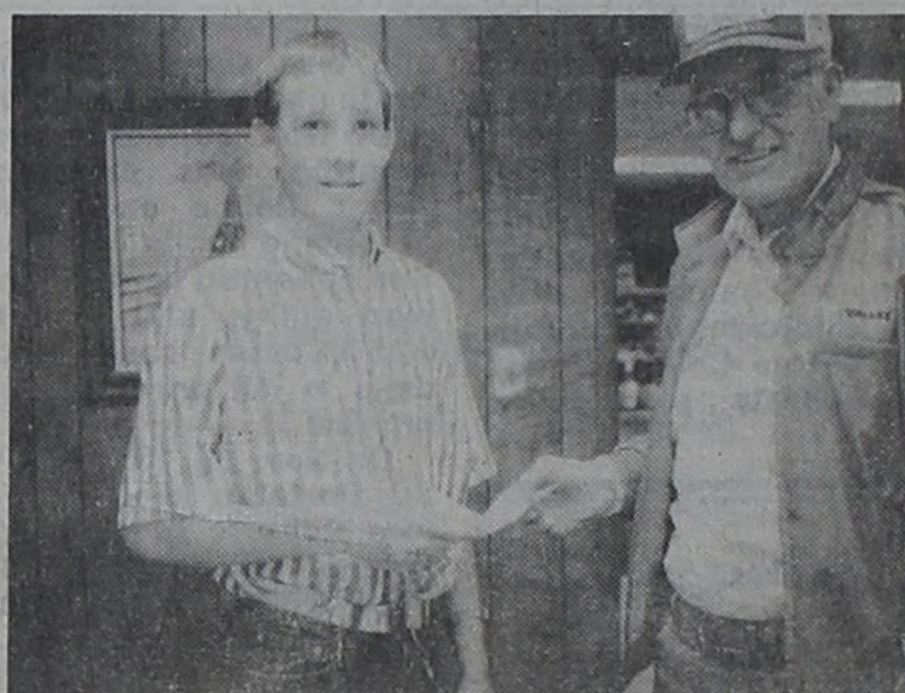

When making reservations, hunters should indicate if they will be hunting with dogs. The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying ESA permits. Each hunter will be given a map of the posted land and will be free to hunt on any of the preserve land. The preserve will be patrolled so that only those having permits will be allowed to hunt.

The reserved permits and maps may be picked up Dec. 11 from 7 to 11 p.m. CST or Dec. 12 from 5 to 10 a.m. CST at the Farwell Community Center on Ninth

Street in Farwell. After Dec. 12, available permits may be obtained from Gwen Corn, Leslie Lunsford, Altha Herington or Terri Nichols.

In conjunction with the hunt, there will be a longest tail feather contest (see adjacent story).

Well, another football contest is over. Whew!

I have to admit it's a lot of work each Sunday for 12 weeks. This year we ended up with 691 entrants, down a few from last year, but way, way ahead of the several preceding years.

What was "up" this year was the fact that more participants entered every week. Of the nearly 700, we must have gotten in from 400 to 500 ballots every week.

That's a bunch.

When you figure that more than 90 percent of the participants are Texico - Farwell residents over the age of 12, I believe that that's a goodly portion of our local citizenry. There's no doubt in my mind that the contest is a fun community-wide event.

And what I really like about it is that it's a family affair. Just like Mrs. Gerles pointed out in the adjoining news story on this page, it's a time for the family to get together and try to pick the winners. That's awful nice.

Here's a few interesting notes about this year's contest:

- Hurshe! Harding was up among the leaders for the first time ever. Congratulations, Hurshe!

- Juan Rojo, the Spanish exchange student at Texico High, entered the contest twice, in the 1st and 12th weeks. A 6 and a 5 for Juan; not bad!

- Several school classes entered the contest but only one stuck with it for all 12 weeks: the 11th grade U.S. history class at Texico. They finished with 80 points.

- It was a contest with ups and downs for the leaders. At first, Bruce White burst into the lead. Then Stephen Ketcherside shot up. Then it was Steve Kittrell's turn. And finally Linda Gerles topped them all.

- A couple of Farwell residents who have moved away stayed with the contest by either mailing in their ballots each week or calling them in: Russ Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Jones, and Daniel "Bubba" Hutchins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Hutchins.

- No one got a 0 this year, although several entrants posted 1's. No, I won't say who they were.

- A real comer was Maggie Lewis. She only entered the contest the last three weeks, but posted a total of 27 points for that short period. Multiply that out for the whole 12 weeks, and she would have won going away.

- As usual, I tried to make the contest harder and harder the final few weeks,

to give those entrants trying to catch up a chance. For all 12 contests, we only had 2 entrants get 12 right: Nollia Walls and Rusty Stover. Part of this was because several ties dotted the contest this year.

We got a fun note in the mail the other day from the Texas state comptroller letting us know some of the new taxes now being collected in the Lone Star State. Thought you'd like to know...

Taxable information services now include newsletters and mailing lists; scouting reports and surveys; financial market reports; data retrieval and research (such as stock quotations and court cases); newscipping services and wire reports, and multiple listing services.

Any business relaying a credit report by telephone, in writing or by computer should charge a sales tax for that service.

If your office or home is sprayed for fleas, termites or other pests, you'll pay state and local sales taxes for it. This includes the identification, control and elimination of insects, nuisance birds and animals, and weeds.

Now taxable are security services including security contractors, armored cars, guard dogs, security guards, burglar alarm systems and armed couriers. Police officers are exempt.

Janitorial and custodial services, including commercial and household services and swimming pool maintenance, are now taxable. "Anyone who hires a janitorial service, even if it's just to clean home, must pay a sales tax," says the state.

Examples of taxable janitorial services include cleaning and straightening; washing floors, windows, walls or ceilings; cleaning air ducts; replacing light bulbs or fuses; picking up trash indoors or outdoors; and cleaning a swimming pool.

Newly taxable insurance services include appraisals, inspections, claims adjust-

ments or processing, investigations, actuarial analysis or research, and loss prevention service.

Debt collection services are now taxable, including any fees charged for collecting payment of hot checks. "People ought to know that when they bounce a check now, they aren't just paying the collection fee - there's sales tax due, too," says the state.

Landscaping and surveying are now taxed but there are some exemptions. Examples of some non-taxable landscaping services are consultations, research and preparing design plans. Harvesting, cultivating and fertilizing farm land when the plants or trees are grown for re-sale, are exempt.

However, the law exempts services performed by persons under 18 and self-employed if they earned less than \$1,000 the previous calendar year - i.e., neighborhood kids who earn their summer money mowing lawns.

"Grady is the best team we've played so far this year. They were in mid-season form because they don't play football, and it showed," said Coach Larry Gregory.

Tuesday, Grady defeated Farwell's varsity boys' basketball team 70-46 on Dec. 2, to leave Farwell with a 2-3 record.

Grady was up 19-14 at the end of the first period, and 37-27 at the half.

Scoring for Farwell were: Shawn Stewart, 12; Jeff Actkinson, 10; Damon George, 9; Greg Actkinson, 8; Abel Lopez, 3; Steve Gerles and Donald Rubio, 2 each.

"We had 27 turnovers in the game. We were a pretty inconsistent team in this game," said coach Gregory.

Dora edged out Farwell's varsity boys' basketball team 51-48 Nov. 24 in an away game. It was a close match in which Farwell led most of the game.

Farwell was ahead by one at the close of the first quarter, by four at the end of the second quarter, and by three at the end of the third quarter, only to see its victory slip out of its hands at the close of the game.

Scoring for Farwell were: Damon George, 16; Jeff Actkinson, 9; Shawn Stewart, 8; Bony Nicolas, 6; Greg Actkinson, 4; Brian Haseloff 3, and Dustin Hardage, 2.

The Steers then evened their season record at 2-2 by defeating Melrose 93-64 at Melrose on Nov. 27.

Farwell ran up a good lead in the first quarter and stayed ahead of its opponent the rest of the game.

Damon George led the scoring with 17 points; Abel Lopez was close behind with 15 points, and Dustin Hardage had 12. Also scoring were: Bony Nicolas, Jeff Actkinson, Donald Rubio, and Shawn Stewart with 10 each; Greg Actkinson, 5; Curtis Chisom and Steve Gerles, 4 each.

"This was the best game we have played so far this year. We hit our shots and played pretty good defense. We had seven kids score in double figures which is important," said coach Larry Gregory.

Once Farwell gained the lead, Melrose did not have a chance. At the end of the first quarter, Farwell led 25-9; at the end of the second Farwell led 42-33. The third quarter ended with Farwell ahead 70-45.

The varsity boys play Dora on Dec. 5 at 5:30 p.m. It will be their first home game of the year. On Dec. 8 they meet Muleshoe here at 4 p.m.

Farwell's varsity girls basketball team was defeated by Melrose 60-56 Nov. 27.

Amy Murray scored 28 points to be named the offensive player and co-defensive

player of the week. She had 5 rebounds, 14 lay ups, and 3 steals. Robbi Fly was co-defensive player with 6 rebounds, 6 steals, and two assists.

"It was a real a team effort," said Coach Fred Libby. "The girls played a smart game."

At this point in the season the varsity and junior varsity players are playing interchangeably. Final cuts have not been made.

The Farwell Junior Varsity girls were defeated by Melrose 45-14.

Farwell only had 5 players on its team - they played the entire game. Melrose had 14 players on its bench, and they were able to wear the Farwell girls down.

"Our girls played good ball. Melrose pressed the entire game, but our girls kept their hearts out there, and kept trying. I didn't look at it as a defeat," said coach Patsy Camp.

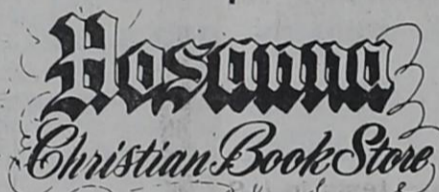

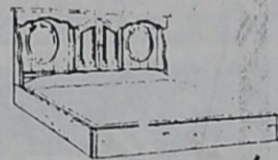

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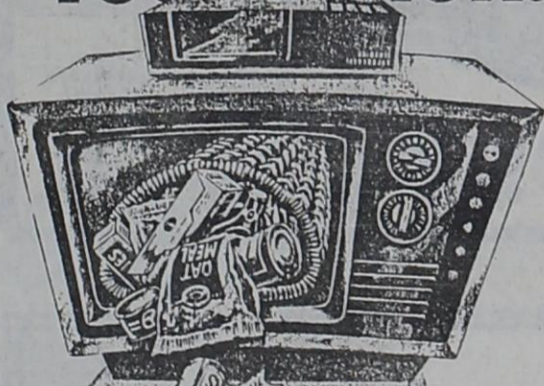

Rick Shumate of Farwell was featured in an article entitled "Milo Master" in the December issue of "Progressive Farmer," which gave the Tribune permission to use it:

MILO MASTER

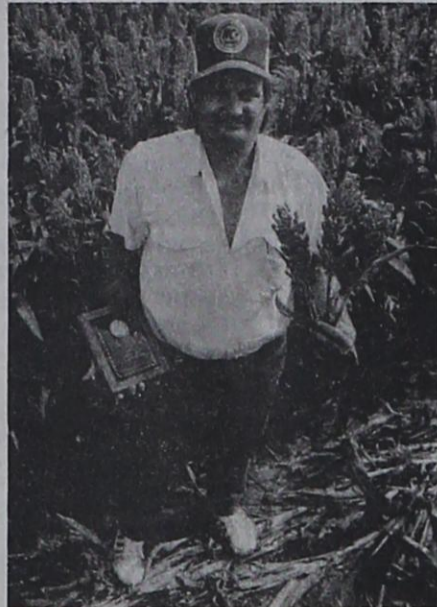
Rick Shumate is not a "contest" farmer. But he does everything possible to get the highest yields from the crop he plants.

"I didn't block off part of a field and grow it for the contest," he says as he talks about his winning yield in last year's contest sponsored by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Instead, his winning entry came from a 20-acre portion of one of his regular production fields

of irrigated grain sorghum. It weighed in (after being dried) at 11,780 pounds, about 210 bushels per acre. He planted NC Plus 271, a full-season, cream-colored sorghum that he feeds in his operation's on-farm feedlot.

Generally, yields above 10,000 pounds are exceptional in West Texas, but not for Shumate. "That's the yield level I strive for year in and year out," he says.

His positive approach to growing milo is noteworthy, too, because he farms in prime irrigated corn country. "I like milo because I can produce as much grain from it as from corn but with less

risk," he says. "And I can grow a milo crop for half of the investment needed to grow corn. Also, I can make top milo yields on less than half the water that corn needs."

Milo is fairly drought tolerant but he never lets it become stressed after booting.

He plants his crop in 30-inch rows at the rate of 8 pounds of seed per acre. "Narrower rows and high plant populations help to con-

control weeds," he says. Fertility management is just as important as variety choice, Shumate believes. "A complete fertility program is a cheap investment, considering what you can expect in return," he says. "We take soil samples from every field every year, and we apply all of the trace elements the samples call for. In fact, I always try to be generous in projecting what it will take to keep the soil in shape."

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

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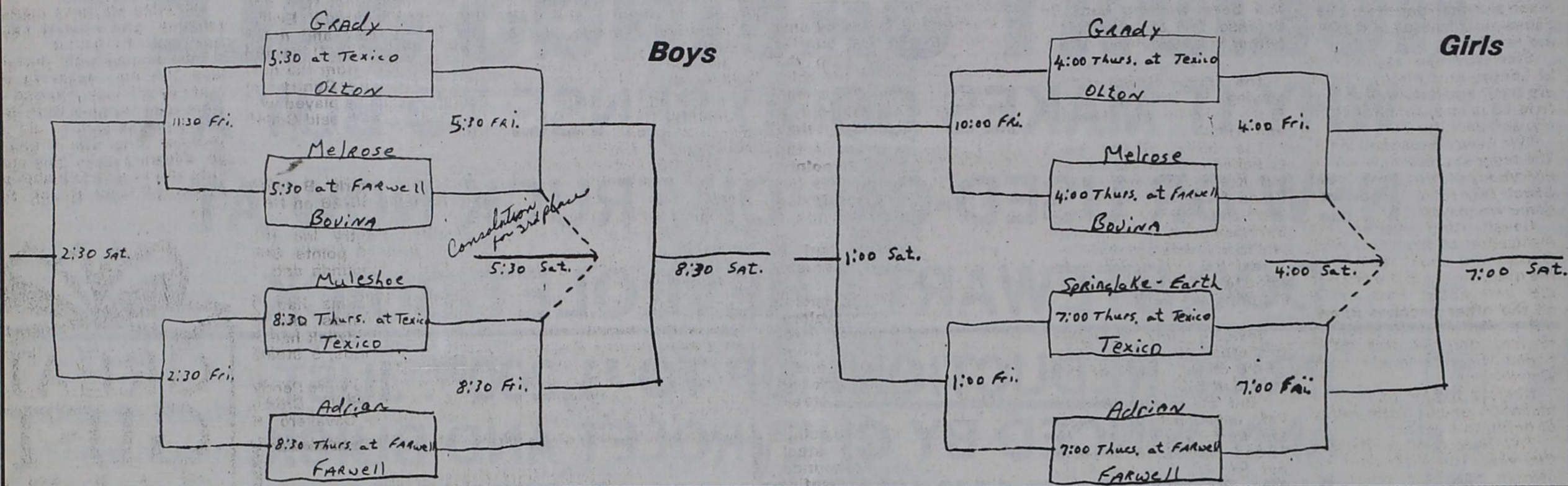

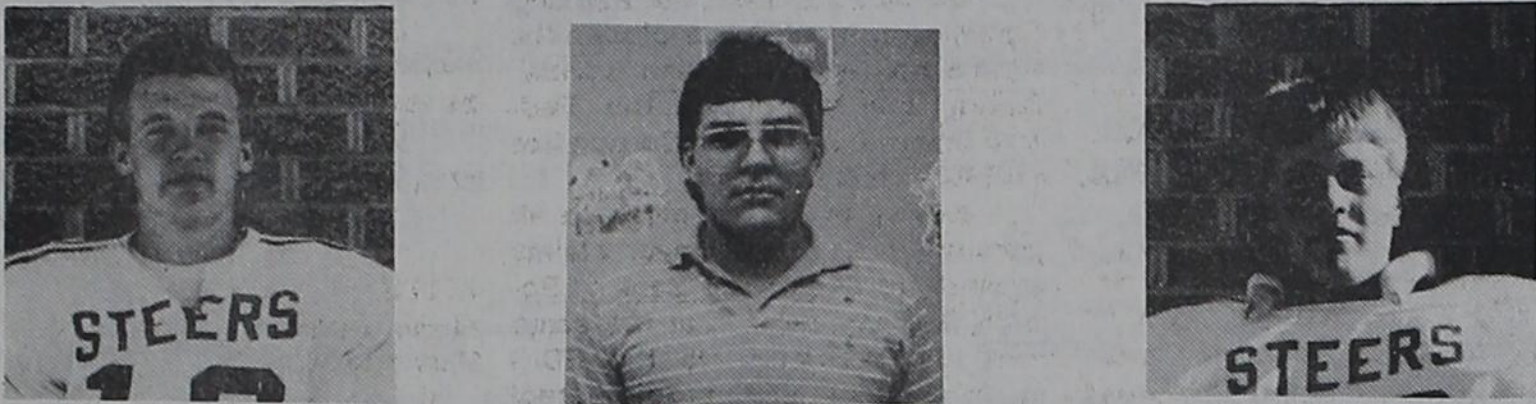
