Open house will honor Janie Bowery

There will be an open house honoring Janie Bowery who is retiring from the City Clerk's position after 25 years of service to the city of Farwell.

It will be held all day at Farwell City Hall on Dec. 31. Everyone is invited to come and wish Mrs. Bowery well.

Mrs. Bowery became the City Clerk when the school tax office and the city tax office were divided in September 1962. It was in 1962 that the city bought the water works and added the management of the water department to the city's jurisdiction. The additional clerical work became Mrs. Bowery's responsibility.

The school tax office moved to the school's old Home Economics building on Oct. 1, 1962. Dorthy Eason was employed as full time tax assessor for the schools at that time. She had been the city clerk before Mrs. Bowery.

At the time Janie Bowery took office as city clerk, she was the mother of six school aged children, all enrolled in Farwell School. She had worked 2 1/2 years in the criminal division of the District Attorney's office in Hidalgo County and one year as an assistant in the delinquent tax division of the same office prior to assuming her responsibilities as Farwell city clerk.

1988 is an election year for some Parmer County posts.

The deadline for filing for county offices is 6 p.m. Jan. 4, reports Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

The county offices that are open are Parmer County Commissioners from Districts 1 and 3, tax assessor, county sheriff and county attorney.

The district attorney's office is also up for election, but it is a state office, and applications are filed with the Secretary of State's office.

The following people have filed for office so far (all on the Democratic ticket):

Tax assessor: Pat Howard, Doris Herington and Bernice Pennington.

County sheriff: Bob Davis and Jerry Atchley.

Both incumbents have de-

clared for their County Commissioner posts: Ernest Anthony, Friona, and Robert White, Farwell.

Candidates for county offices must first file a form appointing a treasurer of their campaign fund with the County Clerk's office.

Then the candidates file with the chairman of the political party they will represent. Wendol Christian is the chairman of the Democrat party in Parmer County. Garvin Thorn is the chairman of the Republican party in Parmer County.

There is a filing fee which must be paid at the time of filing for office. It varies from office to office, but all of the county filing fees for this election range from \$300-\$600.

Snow startles Twin Cities

Dry powdery snow started falling on the Twin Cities early Sunday morning and continued through Monday to form high drifts.

Fred Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman reported 10 inches of white stuff at 3 p.m. Monday.

Hurshel Harding measured 12 inches of snow in his yard at the east end of Farwell.

Twenty-five mile an hour north winds combined with 20 degree temperatures to send wind chill factors far below zero.

The Parmer County Sheriff's office reported Monday that area roads were hazardous, but not closed. Travel was discouraged.

Local schools were closed Monday and Tuesday. Some Sunday night church services were cancelled. Texico and Farwell city halls and the Parmer County courthouse were closed Monday.

Some businesses were open as usual. Others were open part time, and still others were closed all day.

Capitol Foods was open. "Most wives sent their husbands in for a loaf of bread and a gallon of milk; some of them bought two or three. Many picked up chips and dips as well," said Benny Haney.

United Drugs was open. "I'm here by myself, but I'm here," reported owner Steve Breckenridge.

Lunsford Auto reported that they had "pulled a bunch of people out of the snow," on Monday morning.

The Farwell Clinic was open with shorter than usual hours.

Security State Bank and Citizens Bank in Texico were both open. "We are open thanks to Butch Tharp who plowed our parking lot," reported Jere Herrington at Citizen's Bank.

Area grain farmers are happy to see the snow. The snow brings moisture and protects the topsoil from the wind.

Cotton farmers, on the other hand, cannot finish stripping their cotton until the cotton dries out again; and, modules of cotton that have already been harvested must dry out before the cotton can be ginned.

"Wet cotton really clogs

up the machines. We're not ginning at all today," reported Cindy Patterson at Farwell Gin on Monday.

Sherley Anderson Pitman was open as usual on Monday. They hauled corn to the feed lots in the area. "The feed lots have to have corn, snow or no snow," reported Bobbie McFarland.

Lydia Smith at Farwell Feed Yard reported that the snow was hard on the men and the cattle in the feed lots. "The cowboys have to walk, and not ride in this blowing snow. They have to go out and break ice from the water trough so that the cattle can drink," said Ms. Smith.

"Cold, blowing snow like this pretty well wrecks us," said manager Phil Treadway. "The animals bunch up for warmth, and they stop eating and drinking. If it continues for any length of time, the animals lose 30-50 lbs. that they may not put back on."

Treadway said that some types of cattle adjust to the weather better than others do. "Our native cattle adjust

better than the others. Brahmas don't have much hair to keep them warm. And new cattle shipped from warmer climates can die of the shock on their systems."

**Tips on mailing packages**

Steve Breckenridge called to remind everyone of some important tips about mailing packages.

Now that United Drugs has begun accepting packages for U.P.S., he has become aware of the need for proper packaging.

"Proper packing of packages really pays off this time of the year. If boxes are not prepared well, their contents might not make it to their destinations intact," said Breckenridge.

Whether mailing through the U.S. post office or through a service like U.P.S., there are some simple rules to follow.

1. Use a good sturdy carton. Do not pick a carton that is too big for item being mailed. Wrap fragile articles in good packing material which fill the carton completely.

2. Seal the package with package sealing tape. Masking tape does not work well because temperature and humidity affect it.

3. Use proper labeling. Packages have more chance of arriving if they have complete addresses. The post office needs a zip code on every package. UPS needs a street address. Print plainly or type the address.

4. Do not use strings or wrap the package in brown paper. The paper and strings can become caught in the package sorting machinery. Once the wrapping is lost, it is often impossible to get it to its destination.

He is also survived by 8 brothers and sisters: Leonard,



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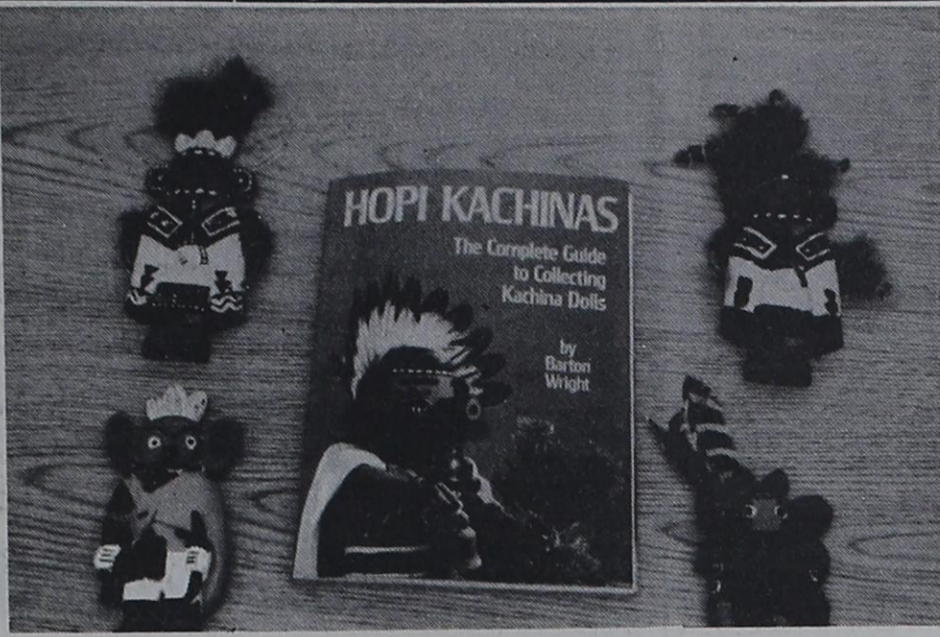
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**Kachina dolls made**

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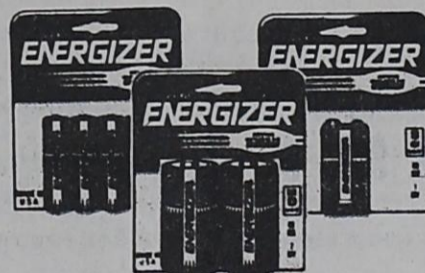
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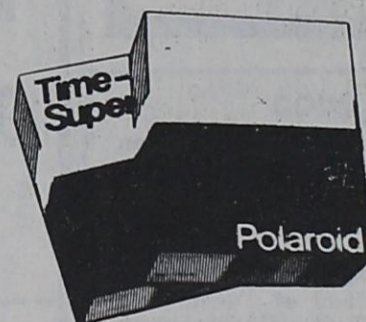
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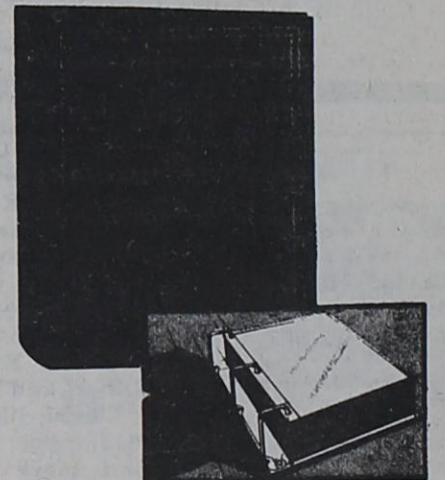

## Road change request denied

A request to change a Lazbuddie road, near the Lamb County line, was turned down by the Parmer County Commissioners Tuesday.

Commissioner Raymond McGehee abstained.

A jury of view had recommended approval but the commissioners said that, due to the ground condition, it would be too expensive to change, and also would result in two dead-end roads.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Received no bids for a used tractor for Pct. 1.

- Appointed Randy Richards of Friona to be Parmer County delegate on the board of the Panhandle Emergency Medical Service System.

- Changed its next meeting

date to Dec. 22 at 10 a.m., instead of Dec. 28.

- Approved dues to the Texas Association for Counties, \$820, and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, \$717.

- Officially designated the front door of the courthouse for trustee sales.

- Voted to have Parmer County retain taxing authority, at full appraised value, for boats, planes and recreational vehicles. One of the constitutional amendments passed in November allowed counties to give up this authority if they chose.

- Heard a request that retirement pay for the past several years be allowed for the district attorney's investigator. The matter was tabled.

## Owen helps ranked livestock judging team

The South Plains College livestock judging team consistently ranked among the top three teams in the nation by the National Junior College Livestock Coaches Association, has won the reserve championship in three major contests in the team's first season of competition.

The six-man team captured the reserve title at the National Agriculture College Teacher's Association contest last April in El Reno, Okla., and last weekend's contests at West Texas State University in Canyon and Panhandle State University, Guymon, Okla.

The team also was first high point team in sheep judging at the Louisiana State Fair in Shreveport, held in late October.

"With contests remaining this coming spring at the Arizona and Denver National shows, Fort Worth Livestock Exposition and the Houston Livestock Show, the SPC team is off to a fine start," believes Jim Jenkins, SPC associate professor of agriculture and now in his 20th year as coach of the College's livestock judging teams. "SPC has the most outstanding winning record of any college in Texas, and this year's contest results should be no exception," he said.

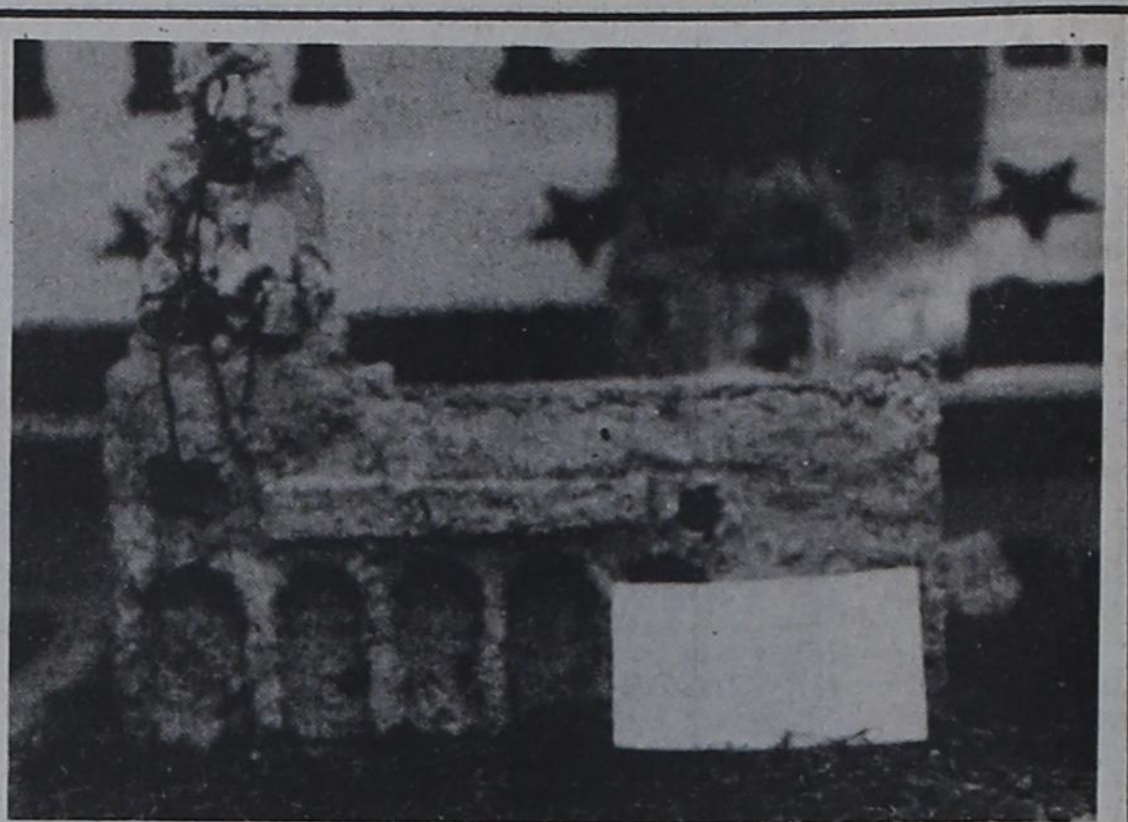
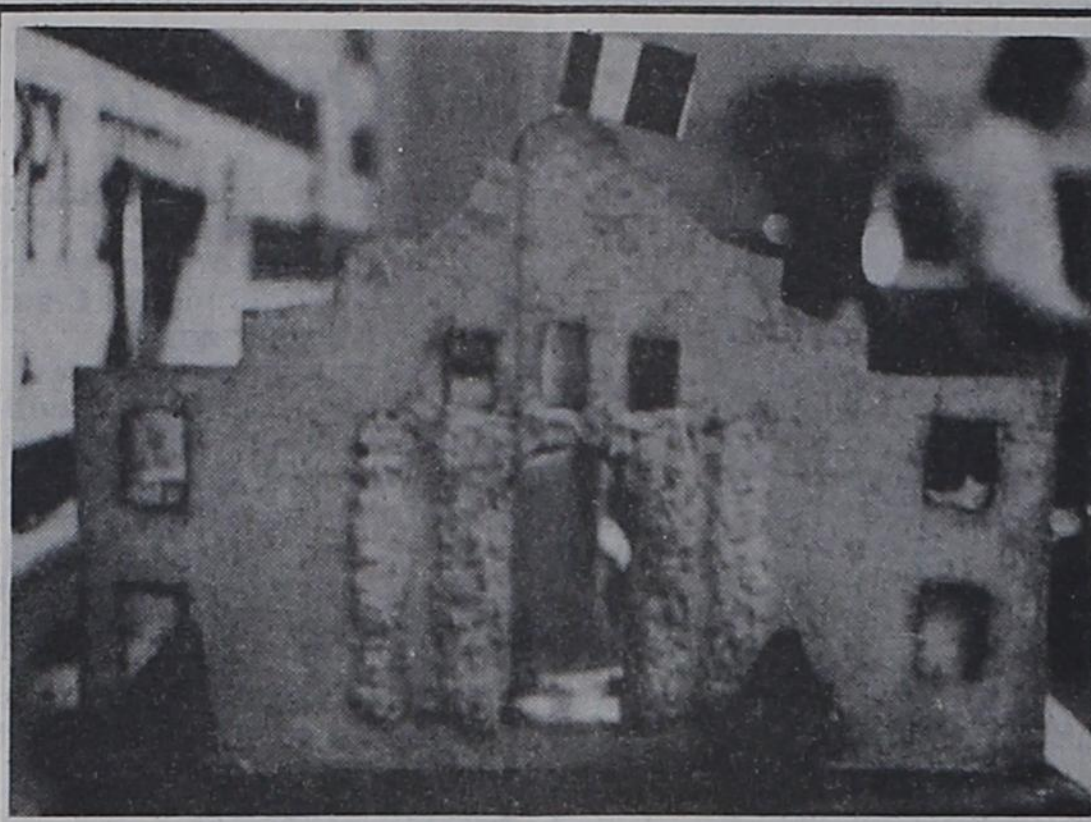
Team members have done equally well in their first slate of contests.

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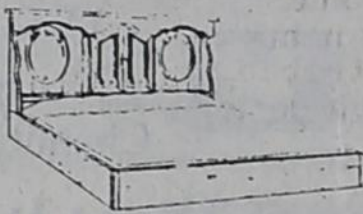

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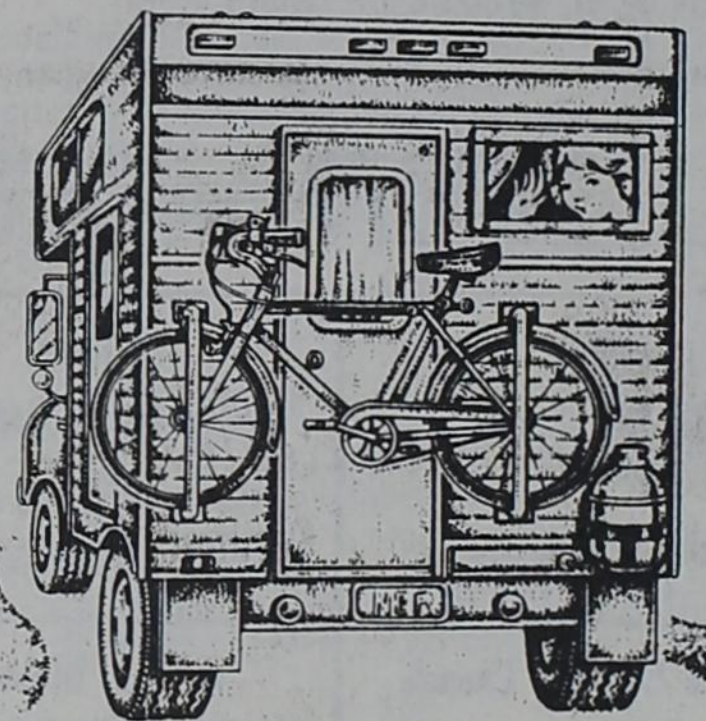
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# Lynn looks back

Texico Elementary School principal David Lynn, recently resigned as head football coach after a lengthy tenure of guiding the Wolverines.

"If the football season was any other time of the year than the start of school, I'd stick to it. But I really felt split this year. Every time I was in one place, I felt like I needed to be in the other," said Lynn.

He started his coaching career at Tucumcari when he left college and started his teaching career. Then he went to Muleshoe from 1973-76. In 1977 he accepted the head coaching job at Hagerman. The Hagerman team had an 11-1 record, and they were New Mexico state champs that year. Lynn then went to Lamesa where he was the defensive coordinator in 1978 and 1979.

Lynn became head coach at Texico eight years ago. "My first year here we had a 3-6 record. We had good kids that year, but they didn't have any experience in football," said Lynn.

In 1981 Texico played for the state championship, only to be beaten by Reserve. In 1983 Texico put it all together and won the state title. "We had good athletes and they really worked hard," said Lynn.

Texico needed to rebuild when the key players of that team graduated. In '84 and '85 Texico made the playoffs. The past two years Texico has had very young teams. They had 3-7 and 2-8 records. "In the next year or so Texico athletes will be competitive providing the boys on the team don't move or anything," said Lynn. "Sometimes you do a better job coaching a 3-7 team than you do a 10-1 team, because you have to work to get the team to win. I've al-

ways wondered what would happen if coaches all started with equal talent," said Lynn. Lynn stated that over the years his teams have been successful with 66 wins to 30 losses. "I've had my turn. I like coaching, but I can't see myself as a coach when I'm 60 years old. It's a stressful occupation."

Lynn indicated that he did not have to face one of the problems that plagues coaches in other communities. "I've had good community support in Texico. The board has been very understanding, and they never criticize. I feel I've had a very positive tenure here," said Lynn.

Lynn declined to guess who might take his place, but he thought that the school board might "sit on it for a while. They will want a good coach, but they don't have a

slot on the staff for a new teacher at this time."

Lynn indicated that the future for football in Texico looks good. "We have good athletes in the 7th, 8th, and 9th grades. Our junior high team was undefeated this year; we need to keep these kids in the program. It looks positive for the next 2, 3 or 4 years," said Lynn.

Lynn feels that "Football helps teach so many lessons that are important in later life. When a boy goes to two-a-day practices he really gets sore. The next morning he has to get up and goes anyway just like he does on a job. He learns to endure. It also teaches the players to contribute to a team. When the team gets beaten 40-0, the players have to get up and go on the next day. Football teaches the players to keep things on an even keel, and not to get too emotional or psyched up over things."

Much as he loves football, Lynn indicated that his principal's job would take lots of time this year. "I have some ideas that I would like to gradually implement at the elementary school. I'd like to work on some scheduling this year. I'd also like to work on some ideas for improved communications."
