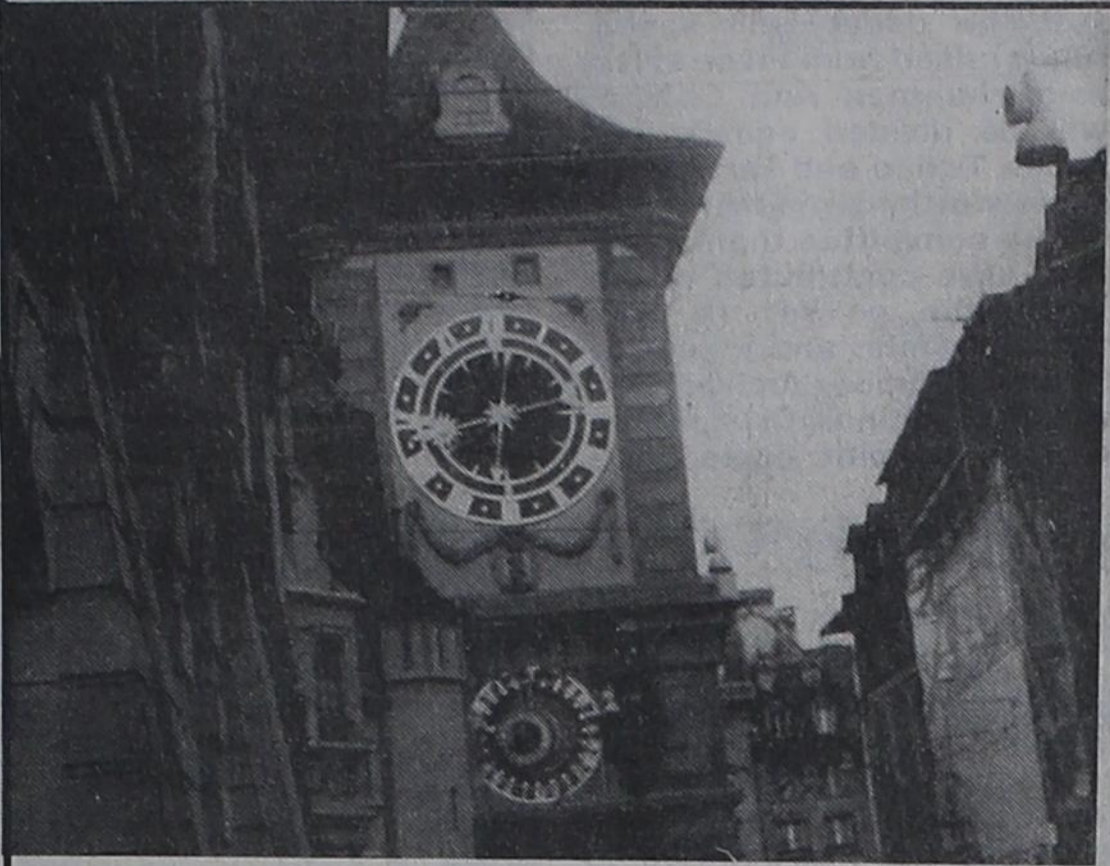
Teel Bivins, 40, is a Republican candidate for Sarpalius' seat. The native of Amarillo is also an attorney.

However, during his stay Lynn discovered that the city is far from being simply a relic from the past, instead displaying a distinct mixture of the old and the new. Outstanding features of not only Frankfurt, but of every place Lynn visited, were the lack of trash or litter and the beautiful flowers growing almost everywhere.

'I never thought I'd be in Germany'

When Lynn Tubbs of Texico talks about his experiences last summer, there is a note of awe in his voice as he says, "I never thought I'd be in Germany!"

But in Germany he certainly was, and the adventure did not stop there. He also spent time in Switzerland.

Lynn's unexpected treat came as a result of brother-in-law, Manuel Robles, an 18-year Air Force veteran, being stationed at the U.S. Air Force Base in Frankfurt, West Germany. Along with Robles went his wife, Alice Tubbs Robles, and their two youngsters, Jeffrey and Tamika.

Lynn's plane landed at Frankfurt International Airport, ending almost 17 hours of flying time. The airport, which is used by both civilian and military aircraft, is one of the busiest overseas, with a plane landing every three minutes.

During his time in Frankfurt, Lynn spent much time touring the area. According to the Texico resident, one of the most remarkable features of both Germany and Switzerland is the cleanliness. The people there "really take care of their country." There is no litter of trash and, Lynn says, there are even flowers in the alleyways.

Another of the features that struck Lynn is the sheer beauty of that part of the world. He comments that it is "hard to describe because it's so pretty."

Especially interesting are the wooded areas set aside for "folk marches." Since so many Germans are fitness-minded and love physical exercise, organized walks take place very frequently, with medals awarded to those who complete the course. Marches come in many types, short to long distances, relatively gentle to rough terrain. In some places, at least, the route is fenced off for the use of the marchers. Although they did not participate in any of the marches, Lynn and Alice did spend many afternoons wandering the walkers' trails.

In Frankfurt itself, Lynn was impressed by the intermingling of old and new. Many tall, older buildings display large clocks, bringing to mind scenes from movies. One of the surprising things was that almost all show windows display expensive jewelry and other items of that sort, but almost no clothing.

Asked his impression of the German people, Lynn explains that the residents look like old-timers because of the way they dress. Clothing is heavy and usually dark, and although Lynn visited in June, almost everyone needed sweaters all the time. A constant accessory is the umbrella, for rain falls frequently and is usually unannounced. Germans usually wear "sensible" walking shoes. Another item of interest is that females are attired in dresses, not slacks. In fact, Lynn cannot remember a single instance when a German lady had on pants of any kind. Men usually, and women often wear small-brimmed felt hats.

While sightseeing in the Frankfurt area, Lynn did not have occasion to eat the local food; however, he did try soft drinks and chocolate ice cream. The drink, which is not known by the brand name Coke is spoken of as "cola." Each sells for the whopping price of \$1.50, American money. Lynn laughs and admits that, while the taste is about the same as the drink back home, a person has to "enjoy it more because of the price." The chocolate ice cream in Germany is a whole new experience for the taste buds. It is so strong that it is almost like eating chocolate syrup.

Another surprise came in the form of the McDonald's restaurant, located in the Frankfurt airport. According to Lynn, the food did not taste the same as it does in the U.S., but it was still interesting.

Corn resigns school board post

Ed Corn resigned from the Farwell School Board at Tuesday's board meeting.

State law forced the action because his wife, Gwen, was appointed as a substitute counselor. A spouse cannot work for a school system if the other spouse is on the board.

Mrs. Corn was named to the post because of the illness to counselor Howard Carlyle, who has been hospitalized in Houston but is expected to be home later this week.

The board decided not to appoint a replacement for Corn until after this year's election.

The School Board election will be May 7. Billie Blain will be election judge, and Bonnie Warren will handle absentee ballots.

On the ballot will be three posts, currently filled by Doyle Johnson, Joe Schilling and Steve Kaltwasser (who was appointed after the death of Maxine Williams).

Also, Roberta Johnson was named board secretary.

In other business, the board: - Extended the contract for School Supt. John Grigsby through the 1989-90 school term.

There was a discussion over whether Grigsby would prefer a raise or getting assistance with his work load. He opted for the latter. So he will look into the possibility of getting assistance in the areas of guidance and curriculum.

- Added Fred Libby to the textbook committee.

- Discussed how to add discussions of AIDS to the curriculum with Joan Hodge, regional service center health consultant. The board authorized Grigsby to begin a community awareness program. Then a committee will be formed to design an AIDS curriculum. Decisions will be made in several areas, such as how early to teach it, and what training is needed.

- Planned the annual school open house for March 17. Public School Week will be celebrated March 14-18. The state has different dates because their dates coincide with Farwell's spring break.

- Appointed a career ladder committee, of administrators.

- Authorized Grigsby to write a guidance and counseling plan for the school, which is mandated by the state.

Farwell FFA sponsor Richard Montgomery is seeking cooperation from local businesses in sponsoring the trophies for the Livestock Show again this year.

Armstrong seeks sheriff's post

John N. Armstrong is running for the Democratic nomination for Parmer County Sheriff.

Armstrong graduated from Farwell High in 1958. He attended Texas Tech, and then served in the U.S. Navy and Coast Guard. While he was in the Coast Guard, he was a radioman in charge of the Coast Guard Communications Center in New Orleans, La.

When Armstrong left the Coast Guard, he became a deputy sheriff and dispatcher in New Orleans. He held the position for three years.

When he attended the Orleans Parish Criminal Sheriff's Academy in 1981, Armstrong won two awards: one for the highest scholastic average in his class, and one for scoring the highest mark on the post test in the academy.

Armstrong left the Orleans Parish sheriff's department to become city patrolman of the City of Danville, Ark., and later that year he became deputy sheriff for Yell County, Ark.

Armstrong moved back to Parmer County to farm land which his grandmother owned since 1909. Armstrong is married; he and his wife, Sharon, have one son, John, who is in sixth grade at Farwell Junior High.

Armstrong is the leader of the Pioneer group of the Royal Ambassadors at the First Baptist Church in Farwell. He is also a third degree Mason.

Armstrong said sheriff's work runs in his family. His grandfather, John R. Armstrong, was a deputy sheriff of Parmer County who was shot by cattle rustlers in Bovina in 1908. John R. Armstrong was also manager of the southern division of the XIT ranch.

Texico begins search for new city marshal

The Texico City Council voted Tuesday to begin advertising for a new city marshal.

The post has been vacant the past couple of months after Alvin Pittman was let go.

In other business, the council:

- Signed the annual grant request for operating funds for the Senior Citizens group.

- Didn't discuss the proposed rate hikes for water and sewer; it must await the legal advertising.

- Was told that Billy Hammit had fixed the carburetor in the water department pickup truck.

- Asked Mayor John R. Hadley to check into what other municipal judges are paid before deciding on whether the Texico judge should get a pay raise.

- Approved the quarterly maintenance agreement on

city hall's NCR machine, at \$713.

- Asked councilman Steve Chancy to check into proposed remodeling of city hall and to report back.

- Received a bid for the old pipe threader, from Vernon Thigpen and Lee Hutchins, for \$401. It used to belong to Thigpen's father. The bid was accepted.

- Decided to check into new proposals for janitorial services at city hall.

- Approved the low bid of \$2,166 from Fitz Sheet Metal for a rotating unit for city hall. It was purchased before the meeting due to emergency situation (a crack in the fire box of the old unit).

- Agreed to write a letter of support for Clovis' application for state funds to replace 2 dispatch consoles. Clovis dispatches Texico calls. The Texico fire department also is writing a letter of support.

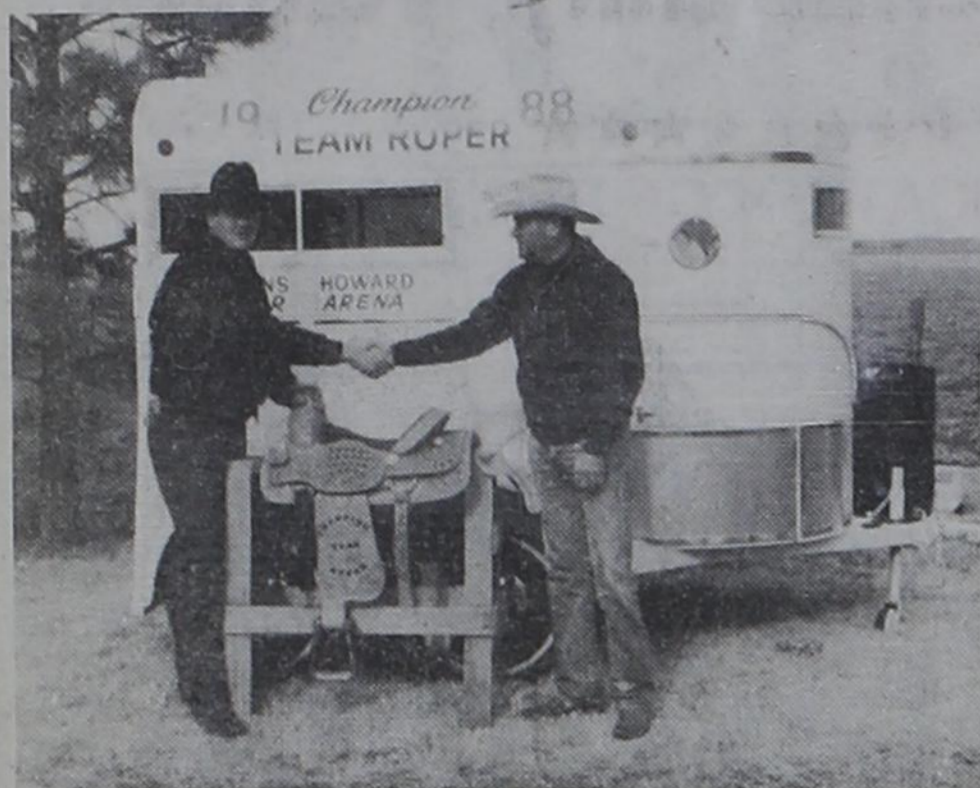

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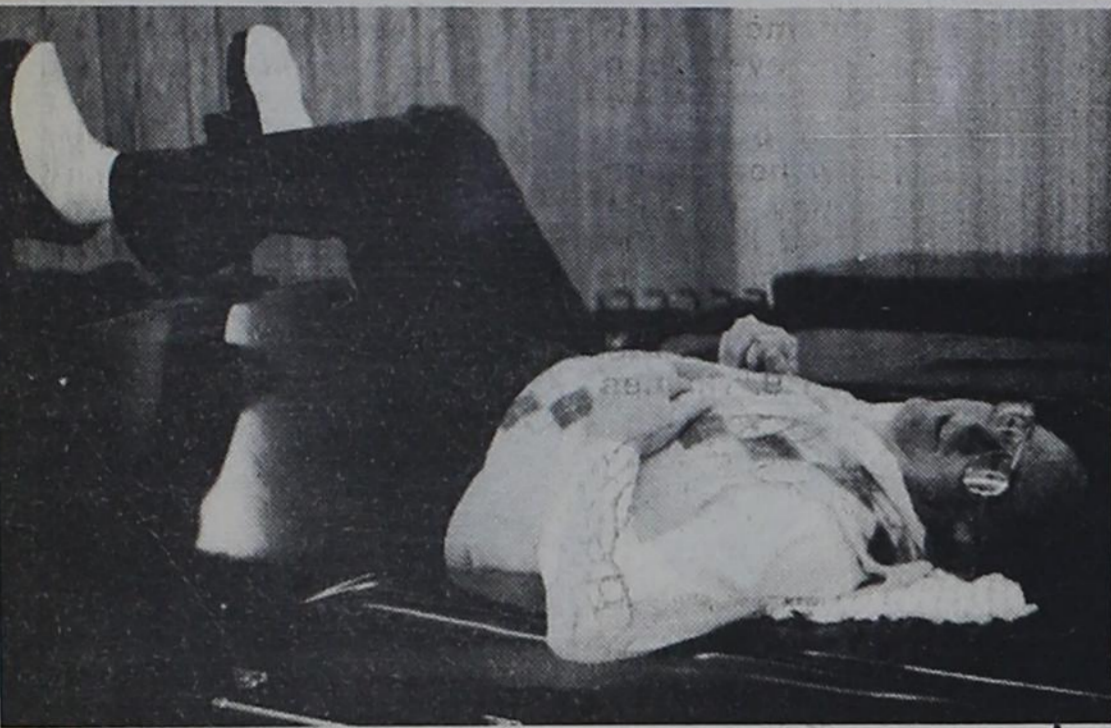

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Cattlemen attempt new sales method

Local cattlemen will be trying a new method of selling their cattle on Jan. 21.

They will participate in a Via Satellite Auction. The sale will originate from Denver, but local buyers and sellers will be connected via satellite from the Clovis Livestock Auction. A large screen television and several small televisions will be set up in the Livestock Auction Barn, along with several telephones.

About 9,000 head of local cattle will be involved out of a total consignment of 30,000 head.

The cattle will be videotaped in advance, and buyers can watch the videotape or read the descriptions from the sale catalog.

"If any cattle are not up to the standards described in the videotape or the sale bill, the buyer may decline the contract," said Edith Bradley, wife of organizer Bob Bradley.

"I went to a sale like this at Billy Bob's in Dallas- Fort Worth last February," said Mrs. Bradley. "They had about 20 phone lines hooked up so that the buyers and sellers could talk to the auctioneer at the same time. It was really interesting to watch."

Once a high bid is made, the seller has just a few seconds to accept the bid or pull his cattle out of the sale. It really moves fast.

This type of sale has been going on for several years, but this is the first time that so many local cattle have been represented. If the sale goes well, it could have quite an economic impact on the area.

"These via Satellite sales have proven successful for both buyers and sellers in other areas. If this one works, we hope to have them here monthly," said Mrs. Bradley.

"There is more direct contact between buyers and sellers with this method, and the cattle are guaranteed to be the way they are described."

Previews begin at 9 a.m. (MST), and the sale begins at 10 a.m. The public is invited to attend.

Dump truck bought

The Farwell City Council voted to spend \$8,900 to buy a used dump truck from Eastwood Construction.

Mayor Chris Gikas said the city has been using it on a trial basis and it is working well. It will be bought on a lease-purchase.

The council also voted to update three city ordinances, dealing with the volunteer fire department, keeping livestock and fowl, and capping and drilling wells and septic tanks. All changes made were minor.

The council also: - Received one bid, from Henry Insurance for \$12,882, for the city's insurance. It was accepted.

- Agreed to continue improving city alleys on a sequential basis. Gikas said he hoped all the alleys (except for ones which have grass and the residents don't want the bottom ash poured) taken care of within 2 years.

- Tabled the proposed purchase of a used typewriter with memory for city hall. One was proposed at \$1,995. It will be discussed later.

- Approved the new city clerk's salary at \$1,000 a month.

- Heard Gikas say the council should consider having street lights placed on the north side of Ave. A in order to improve the highway's appearance at night. This will be discussed later.

"We played as well as we could in the first half of this game," said coach Roy King. "Our press was effective, and we shot 50% in this game."

Twilla Longo scored 29 points. She made 14 out of 22 shots. She also had 5 rebounds, 6 steals and 1 assist in the game.

Tracey Askew and Andria Chadwick each had 12 points. Askew had 2 rebounds, and 2 steals. Chadwick had 2 rebounds, 1 steal and 1 assist. Three of her points came from a three point shot.

Robin Pierce scored 11. She had 4 rebounds, 4 steals, and 7 assists.

Leslie Steward had 5 points, 4 rebounds, 11 steals, and 10 assists. "Leslie Steward had an outstanding floor game; what she did running the team doesn't show up in the point totals, but it was very impressive," said King.

Valerie Cavallero scored 5 points, with 1 three pointer. She also had 2 assists.

Angie Liggins scored 2 points. Geneva Garcia had 4 rebounds, 8 steals, and 4 assists. Amy Chadwick had 2 steals, and Denise Gonzales had 1 assist.

The Lady Wolverines defeated Elida 41-39 to compile a district record of 2-0 and an overall record of 11-1.

"We played badly enough that we should have been beaten, but we couldn't give this game away," said King of the game Saturday.

"Everyone thought that Elida wasn't a very good team, but they were better than we thought. We kept giving them second and third shots all night; it's a wonder they didn't win," said King. "I was glad to see the way our team pulled out at the end. Anybody can play with a 30 points lead, but it is important to be able to play well when one basket can beat you."

"We led until the fourth quarter. We played well, especially defensively. It was a tough loss," said Cook.

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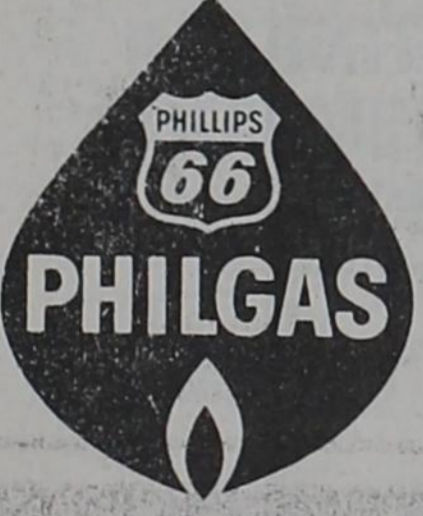
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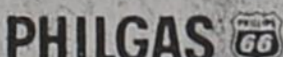
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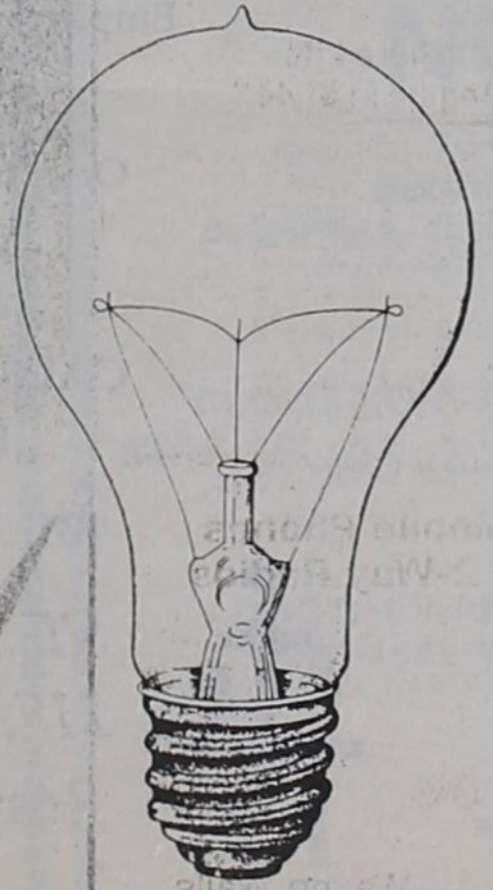
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'5 contact mines ... 4 Silkworm scares...'

The escort of the U.S. flagged Kuwaiti tankers is called "Operation Earnest Will" (perhaps named after me?) Convoy 87017, which was a very large one, delivered tankers to Kuwait without incident this week, and Convoy 87018, which is the southbound leg, began a couple of days later. But in-between, the pace slowed somewhat and the USS LaSalle had some time pierside at Manama, Bahrain. When I get some time ashore Manama, I will write more about it.

It's almost winter in the Persian Gulf, with cool nights, and the days seldom get into the 90's. Halloween was spent under way in the Gulf, but passed without much notice other than the decorations that my department (Logistics and Maintenance) put up. A friend in Missouri sent me an envelope full of real autumn leaves which we hung all over our door.

We get under way tomorrow and will be under way for some time, so Thanksgiving will also be spent at sea, but perhaps Christmas will be in port. The intelligence department is already making preparations for it. (There are five other departments besides mine on this staff - administration, intelligence, operations, security and

communications.) Anyway, the "spooks," as intel officers refer to themselves, are practicing their version of "The Twelve Days of Christmas" and what little I've heard of it goes something like this:

"Five contact mines ... four Silkworm scares ... three platforms burning ... two French minesweepers ... and a threat written in Farsi! (the language of Iran)

Boy, I just love the Christmas spirit. One big advantage of being in the Persian Gulf is that you see someone else you know from another ship, another time almost every day. My first ship (1977-79) the USS Barbour County, escorted the Pacific Fleet minesweepers to Bahrain last week.

The ship Julia and I were married on, USS Robert E. Peary, is patrolling the North Arabian Sea. I have seen officers I served with in England, onboard the USS Forrestal, and in Hawaii. The young officer who was my academic advisor at Officer's Candidate School in Newport, R.I., is now a gray-headed commander on a staff out here and he's retiring next year (I wonder why he got so much older the last 12 years if I didn't?).

Since I've been here, Middle East Force staff has received letters from Veterans of Foreign Wars chapters in Richfield,

Minn., and from all over New Jersey. We've received letters from school children in Traverse City, Mich., and a Department of Defense school in Germany, and an enormous box of cookies from a ladies' organization in Plains, Mont. That is not uncommon if you are on a ship named after a city, state or county (Barbour County, Alabama, always stayed in touch with the USS Barbour County when I was aboard her). But staffs and ships named after battles (USS Guadalcanal, etc.) or people (Peary, Forrestal, etc.) or qualities (USS Esteem, etc.) are not used to such interest and kindness. This has been a real treat.

We also get a lot of visibility from Washington, D.C., with fact gathering visits this year by the Vice President, the secretaries of Defense and the Navy, and most recently by the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Trost. A couple of candidates for President also requested visiting us.

Not much else in the way of news. I hope your holidays are restful and happy and please remember that all of us out here are thinking and praying for Farwell and all the thousands of home towns like it.

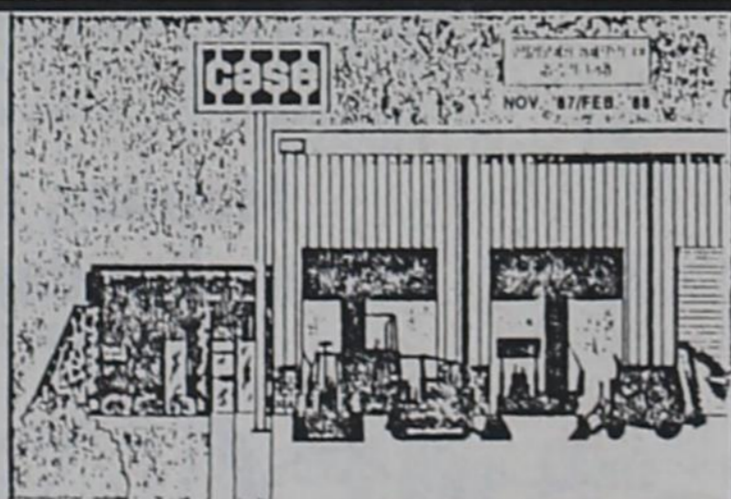

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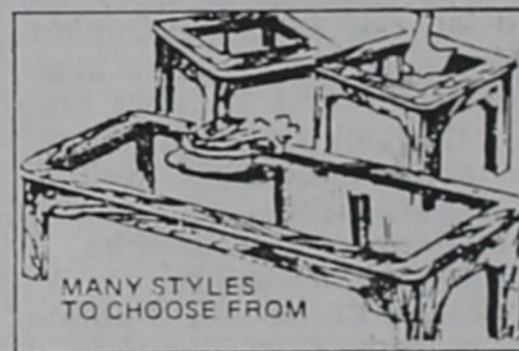


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Steers give Nazareth a tussle

The Nuclear Waste Task Force and its predecessor organizations, Stand and Power, have been working for six years and are gratified by the support of a vast majority of Texans and the entire Texas Congressional delegation. We still support the use of dry cask storage at the point of generation and a responsible resolution to the waste problem.

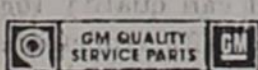

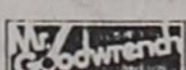
