TV commercials alert you to check for bombs

For most Germans the automobile is an unaffordable luxury, especially since gasoline is extremely expensive. And for those who have the money for a car, the choice is quite limited, compared to the hundreds of styles and makes on the American market. In fact, Lynn recalls only three brands: the BMW, Mercedes, and Saab. While most drivers maintain a reasonable speed on city streets, the opposite is the story for the famous Autobahn. On the expressway Lynn estimates the average speed at 125 kilometers per hour. In addition, the Autobahn holds at least one other difficulty. Drivers must be alert for the proper exit, for if one misses a turn-off, he must continue another 15 to 20 miles before the next opportunity arises.

Since few own private vehicles, almost everyone utilizes the mass transit system of open, trolley-type cars.

While in Germany, Lynn generally ate American food which Alice obtained through the base commissary. However, Alice did prepare some typically German foods, with Lynn's favorite being the sausages. He also mentions that certain German citizens are allowed on the base to sell juices. Since the label was in German, Lynn has no idea what he drank. Whatever it was, it tasted like nothing else he's had before, and can be summed up in one word, "delicious."

During his entire time overseas, Lynn was constantly reminded to keep his passport safe. When asked who had done the constant reminding, he answers, "Everybody." In fact, he made it a habit to carry the document in his front pants pocket. Even with a passport, Lynn was not allowed on the air base unless accompanied by someone with a military ID. In the PX and commissary, Lynn could only look, for only those with the necessary identification card are allowed to purchase items.

Although Lynn did some sightseeing around Frankfurt, he spent most of his time with Alice's family, shopping and playing with the youngsters. A favorite activity was taking the children to the park and pushing while they swung.

Another pastime was watching television. Though only one channel carried American programming, the group watched such shows as "All My Children," "Amen," and "227." But for Lynn the commercials were the most interesting part of viewing. They were not really commercials in the usual sense, for no products or services were advertised. Instead, safety was the topic. For example, the screen might show a simple box sitting on a park bench. Then the announcer would ask if such a normal place for a box. In this way, Americans were alerted to possible bombs and other dangerous situations.

Because the children are not accustomed to regular commercials, there was one amusing and totally unexpected bonus to some movies Lynn had taped and carried with him. The films, taken from the usual weekly choice of titles, included all commercial breaks. Lynn explains that the two children were much more fascinated by the commercials than by any of the movies.

An exciting event occurred on June 9, when Manuel and Alice's son Jeffery celebrated his fifth birthday. There was the usual cake and, as guests, other children from the base. Did the gathering have a German flavor at all? Not according to Lynn, who confesses that he felt, "about like I was at home."

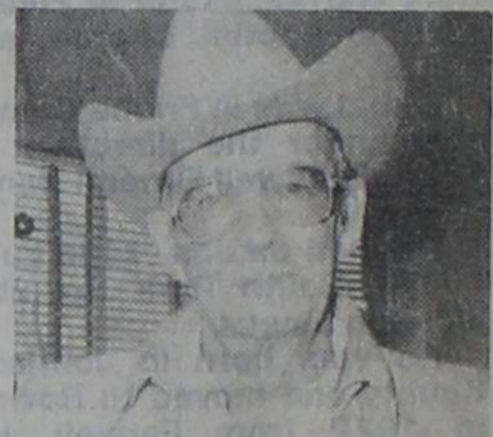
Williams seeks sheriff's post

Verdict favored Longhorn Sprayers, Union Carbide

There was an interesting case heard in District Court in Farwell last week.

L.M. Smith brought suit against Longhorn Agricultural Sprayers of Muleshoe and Union Carbide Agricultural Products, Inc.

The dispute arose in June 1984 after 47 acres of Mr. Smith's onions were sprayed with a product called ME 4 Brominal, a broadleaf herbicide, when the crop was two-thirds mature. The crop died. Jurors heard arguments

from five lawyers concerning the proper use of chemicals. Among the many questions raised were: Was the chemical used at the wrong time? Was the chemical properly mixed? Should the sprayers have applied the ME 4 Brominal by aerial spray? Was the product clearly and accurately labeled?

Jurors heard the evidence for 5 days, and they deliberated until 1:20 a.m. Saturday before they returned a verdict in favor of Longhorn Sprayers and Union Carbide.

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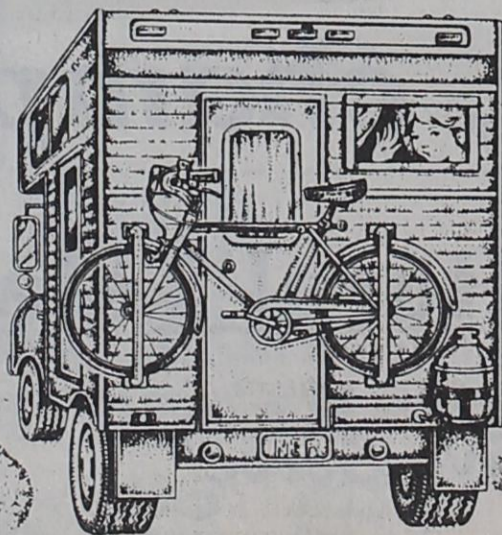
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Recipe of Week

Italian Parmesan Twists

1 package (8 oz.) Martha White Deep Pan Pizza Crust Mix
 1/2 c. hot tap water
 1 c. grated Parmesan cheese
 1 1/2 tsp Italian seasoning
 1/3 c. melted butter or margarine
 Pizza sauce

Preheat oven to 450 degrees F. Combine Pizza Crust Mix and water; stir vigorously about 20 strokes. Cover and put in a warm place 5 minutes. In a shallow plate or pan, combine cheese and seasonings. Divide dough into 8 sections. Divide each section into 4 pieces. Roll each of the 24 pieces into a 4 inch rope. Dip each rope in butter; roll in Parmesan mixture. Twist rope 3 times; place on a greased baking sheet. Bake 7 to 9 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm with pizza sauce or homemade pizza sauce dip.

Pizza Sauce Dip: Combine 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce, 1/4 tsp. garlic powder, 1/4 tsp. thyme leaves, 1/2 tsp. oregano leaves and 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce. Blend well and heat until warm.

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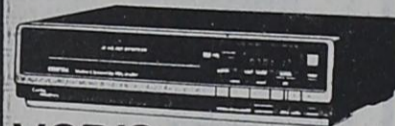
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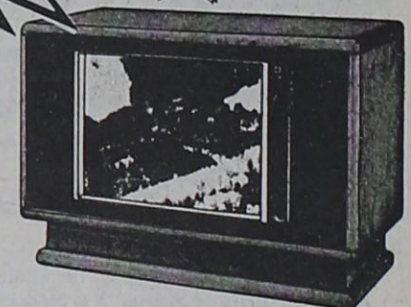
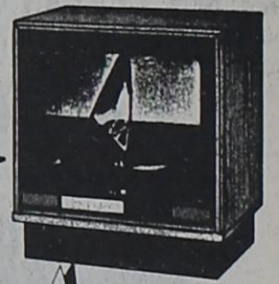
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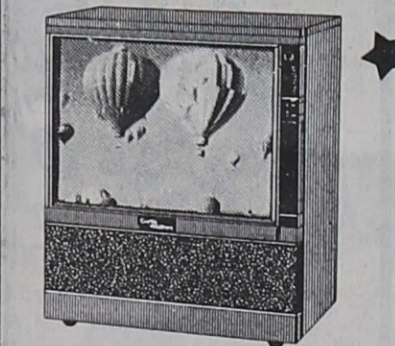
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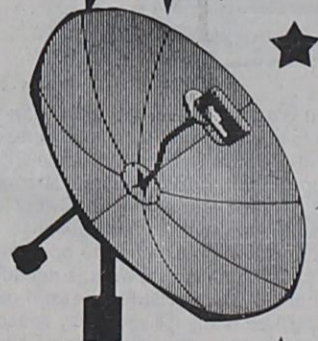
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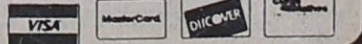
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Steers improve district record to 3-1

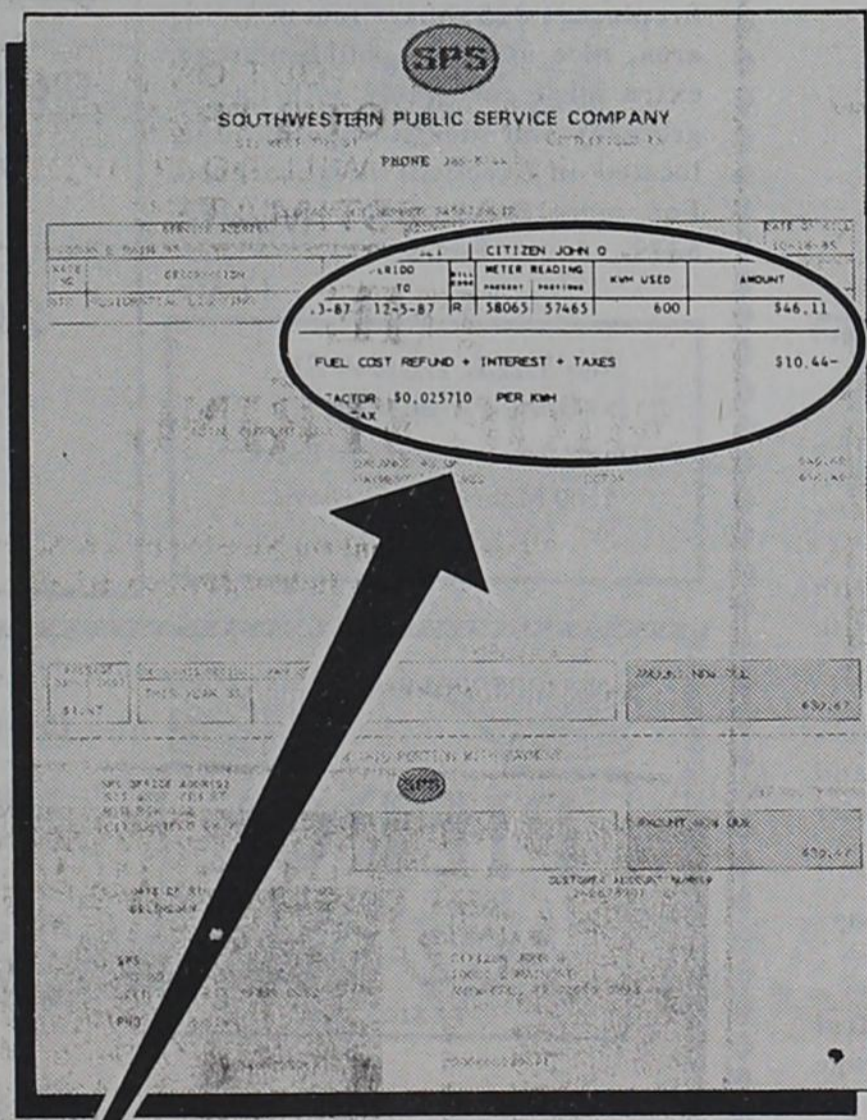



Dropouts a real problem

AUSTIN — No one thing, of course, will cure all of Texas' economic problems, but it would be a mistake to underestimate just what a reduction in the dropout rate would do for this state.

Dropouts are one source of our economic problems? You bet; just take a look at some of the statistics regarding high school dropouts and related problems such as illiteracy.

*As many as 25 percent of the youths entering high school never graduate.

*Of the national fall 1983 ninth-grade class of 3.3 million, up to 830,000 students will drop out before graduating.

*Of the nearly 17 million people between the ages of 18 to 21 in 1983, up to four million were or had been high school dropouts.

*Seventy-five to 78 million adults in this country are functionally illiterate, a by-product of not completing school. That means some can't determine if their paychecks are correct or read a simple job application.

As we said at the outset, all this relates directly to our economy. Consider these additional facts:

*States spend \$6.6 billion annually of the taxpayers money to house some 260,000 prisoners whose life of crime can be linked directly to illiteracy. Nationally, 59 percent of all inmates are in jail because of literacy problems. In Texas,

Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports

an even higher percentage of inmates are dropouts.

*More than \$1 billion annually is paid by businesses in the form of worker's compensation, equipment repair and higher insurance premiums because of the poor training level of their workers.

*Fifty percent of mid-sized companies and 25 percent of large companies are forced to offer remedial training to incoming employees.

Perhaps, though, the most chilling assessment of what dropout related problems are doing to our country can be found in a report by the Structured Employment/Economic Development Corporation (SEEDCO). SEEDCO this year completed a study of dropouts that provided many of the figures listed above. The report reached two very important conclusions.

"As our technological society has come to require greater skill and knowledge," Margret Terry Orr, the report's author, writes, "em-

ployment and economic opportunities for youth dropouts have become quite limited. Business and industry have become increasingly dependent on a poorly prepared work force to fill entry-level positions, thereby adding to their training and production costs."

Orr also concluded that, "The decline in our youth population, coupled with the growing proportions of that population that are . . . disadvantaged and poorly educated, projects a dim picture for productivity."

We don't need to go any further to show the dangers of a soaring dropout rate and continued illiteracy. And, we've only discussed the economic aspects of the problem. The cost in terms of human suffering is equally tremendous.

If there is a bright spot in all this, it is that Texas is doing something. We co-sponsored a bill last session that will allow our schools to take action quickly when they identify potential dropouts and to track the dropouts closely so that we can get a better grasp on what type of students we need to be reaching.

That's only a temporary solution, though. We're also pleased to be serving on a select interim committee that will look closely at the dropout and illiteracy problems facing Texas. We on the committee are committed to preparing for next session a package of legislation that will help the state

further address this problem.

Our society is changing. We're more of an information society now than an industrial society. Our work force must be better educated if they are to adapt to technology that changes constantly.

If we ignore the dropout problem, we'll dig an economic hole in the future from which Texas may never be able to dig out.

It starts with the thumb...

Lynn also laughingly tells of the difference in European counting. One always starts with the thumb rather than the forefinger. On one occasion, Lynn held up tow fingers to signify how many items he wanted. To his surprise, he received three. Lynn's visit came at the peak of summer in Europe. One advantage, for which he was not completely prepared, was the extra long day, which began about 4:30 a.m. and ended about 11 p.m.

During Lynn's stay, he joined Manuel, Alice, Jeffery, and Tamika on a jaunt to Switzerland. To make arrangements easier, the family joined several other groups in a guided tour. Almost no one else spoke English. However, almost all the others did have one thing in common - an enormous fondness for food. Regardless of the meal, whether the traditional continental breakfast consisting of rolls, jam and coffee or a larger lunch or dinner, almost immediately after returning to the tour bus, the Europeans would start to delve into their carry-ons. Out would come a bag or roll or other goodies. Shaking his head, Lynn remarks that Europeans "eat all the time." In fact, "that's about all they want to do."

The first stop in Switzerland was Bern, the nation's capital. While there, the group viewed the parliament buildings, meeting place of the two legislative groups, the Council of States and the National Council. They also toured a cathedral. One of Lynn's first impressions of the Swiss was that everyone was shod in snowboots and wore expensive clothing.

The next stop was Lucerne, where the highlight was a boat ride on the Glacial Lake. Particularly interesting was the view of the Lion Monument, which is quite famous worldwide. The imposing monument, depicting a recumbent lion, was hand carved into the natural sandstone rocks facing the lake. It is a monument honoring the Swiss soldiers who were killed during the French Revolution in the Tuileries in Paris on Aug. 10, 1792. Other interesting sights included several castles and the homes of composers Richard Wagner and Sergi Rachmaninow.

Also in Lucerne, the group visited the famous Chapel Bridge, a wooden structure stretching across the River Reuss. Standing at the center of the bridge is the ancient stone Water Tower, which along with the bridge was constructed in 1333. The octagonal tower was first used as a belfry, then as a torture chamber. Lynn and other family members were extremely impressed by the Lion Monument and the Chapel Bridge.

Brienz, another of the tour stops, was reached by ascending Mount Pilatus and crossing through the Brunig Pass. In Brienz the group made a stoop at the city's largest and oldest wood carving factory. Intricately carved objects of all sizes were on display. Lynn comments that the items, each bearing an expensive price, were mostly the work of one man.

The group also visited Interlaken, the year-round resort town which is set against the stunning backdrop of the Eiger and Jungfrau mountains. It is also known as Glacier Village.

Next on the itinerary was Grindelwald, one of the world's leading ski resorts. Lynn especially enjoyed the village, for the group lunched at a restaurant on Lookout Point, situated atop one of the surrounding mountains and reached by cable car.

Almost everywhere the visitors ate, the meal was preceded by a cheese fondue appetizer. Lynn admits that the Swiss specialty was about the only food that failed to please him. Even the coffee (two to three times stronger than American style) was palatable compared to the fondue.

Also on the subject of food, at one of their stops Lynn notes that several members of the tour group bought the Swiss version of an American hamburger and fries. For that taste treat, along with a cola, the diners paid approximately 10 American dollars.

Near Grindelwald the tourists encountered one of the most breath-taking sights of the entire trip, Trummelbach, the only glacial waterfalls inside a mountain in Europe. All together, seven separate waterfalls eventually combine to drain the glaciers of Eiger, the Monk, and the Jungfrau. In order to reach the viewing area, Lynn explains, visitors ride

an elevator upward for several hundred feet then progress by stairway from there. The swirling waters, brilliantly lighted, fall into what appears to be a spiral core eroded from the living rock.

After Trummelbach, the group returned once more to Lucerne for an "end of the trip" supper and celebration. After the meal, the guests were treated to traditional Swiss entertainment, including yodeling, flag throwing, and alpine horn blowing. Lynn, who never cared much for other yodeling, was impressed by the vocal gymnastics. He also thoroughly enjoyed the deep bass sounds that the alpenhorn emitted. The slender six-to-eight-foot long instrument flares at the end. The flag throwing was all right, but it was really more along the lines of a flag juggling, with the entertainer keeping

three fairly short-staffed banners in the air at once. Lynn reports that some of their fellow tour members tried their luck at yodeling and at blowing the alpenhorn, but that he and his family were content to leave both to the professionals.

Since Lynn's return to the States, there has been an extremely important change in the household of Manuel and Alice Robles, the addition of a baby girl named Nicole. When Manuel's tour of duty in Germany ends, the couple expects to be stationed stateside.

As Lynn speaks of his experiences in Germany and Switzerland, he displays respect for all those he met and everything he saw. Still, in looking back over the three-week period, he smilingly confesses that the best part was being with loved ones and "visiting."
