A better Texas

I hope our Texas readers have been reading the columns the past two weeks from state Sen. Bill Sarpalus.

They give good insight into the Constitutional Amendments on the November ballot. I received the following letter, called "Let's Build a Better Texas," from Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, which I thought was important:

"A hundred years ago, prosperity in Texas came from the cotton fields and cattle pastures. Towns and cities filled with smiths and merchants who traded in the necessities of agrarian life.

"The discovery of vast oil reserves brought wealth and full employment to the state. By the late 1970s, Texas was the envy of the nation. People flocked here, drawn by the promise of an economy built on the lifeblood of the modern world. The construction crane was the most prominent feature of our metropolitan skylines.

"No need to tell you the rest of the story. Most Texans can attest to the impact of the recession on our state. There is one clear lesson from the recent turn of events: we can no longer depend on oil and agriculture for our well being. We must attract new industry. And we must diversify.

"Much of the legislation passed earlier this year was aimed at making Texas more competitive in attracting new industry and at making Texas a better breeding ground for new ideas. But when the session ended last summer, the job wasn't finished. It won't be finished until the Build Texas constitutional amendments are adopted on Nov. 3.

"The Build Texas program is aimed at making Texas a better competitor. Our quality of life and our attractiveness as a state depend directly on the quality of our highways, our water and waste water systems, our airports, our libraries and our parks.

"Amendments 7, 8 and 23 provide capital to construct prisons, repair and renovate mental hospitals and schools for the retarded. They provide money for local water distribution and waste water projects. And they establish a state - local partnership that would give our cities and counties an incentive to construct much needed projects like jails, convention centers, airports, parks and other public facilities.

"These are not make-work projects, although the creation of jobs when Texas unemployment is more than 700,000 is welcome. It has been estimated by Dallas economist Bernard Weinstein that these projects will provide over 50,000 jobs. These are projects with an established need."

I thought Hobby's points were well taken.

P.S. Gloria said the fish were not cooperating with her trip!

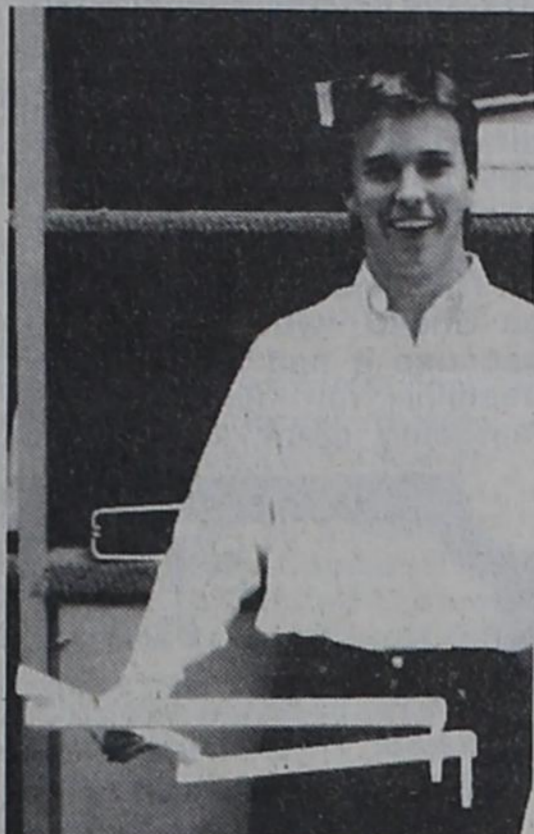
Speaking of Lt. Gov. Hobby, I received a card in the mail last week from his office addressed to me as "Celebrity Auction Chairman."

Horner builds carrier racks

Jerry Sadberry, Texico's band director, was looking through catalogs one day to find out what equipment was available for school bands.

He commented to his student-aide, Jeff Horner, that he wished that the school could afford a carrier rack so that the band could have bells or chimes included in their routines.

Jeff looked at the bells, and he looked at an unused chestplate that is designed for the bass drums. The chestplate was too awkward for most of the students to handle when the large drum was attached, but he thought it might work with the bells because the bells did not extend up as high as the bass drum did. All he needed was a rack to attach the bells to the chestplate.

Jeff went to the Texico Vocational Agriculture building, and welded the pieces he needed from scrap metal. The entire project was done with unused items.

The carrier rack he fashioned can be removed so that the chestplate can still be used with the bass drum if necessary. A similar rack would be quite expensive if it was purchased through a musical instrument company.

How did Jeff learn to invent things himself without even seeing a picture?

"I grew up on a farm, and my dad taught me how to weld; when you are a farmer, you have to learn to do everything yourself. And, I have taken several shop courses."

He attributes the inventing talent to "good old Southern engineering."

The carrier racks Jeff made are used by Robyn Pierce, Dara Jenkins and Andrea Heacock when the Texico Band performs.

Jeff does many other things as a band-aide. "He is worth his weight in gold," says Sadberry.

Last week Jeff, Geneva Garcia and Twilla Longo designed the drill designs for the band's Oct. 30 performance at halftime of the game against Fort Sumner.

He also runs off tests and papers, sorts music, and helps kids adjust their uniforms. Jeff also helps oversee the packing of instruments on trips.

Each year the Texico Band has gone to Albuquerque and Ruidoso, as well as to several football games. Some years the band has also gone to Carlsbad, Lubbock, and Amarillo, as well as Six Flags.

Jeff has played cornet in the band since he was in 5th grade. He helps with The Star Spangled Banner at the beginning of football games, and plays solo at the beginning of volleyball games.

In addition to being a band-aide, Jeff is FFA Treasurer, Senior Class Secretary, and President of National Honor Society. He plans to go to college next year when he finishes high school.

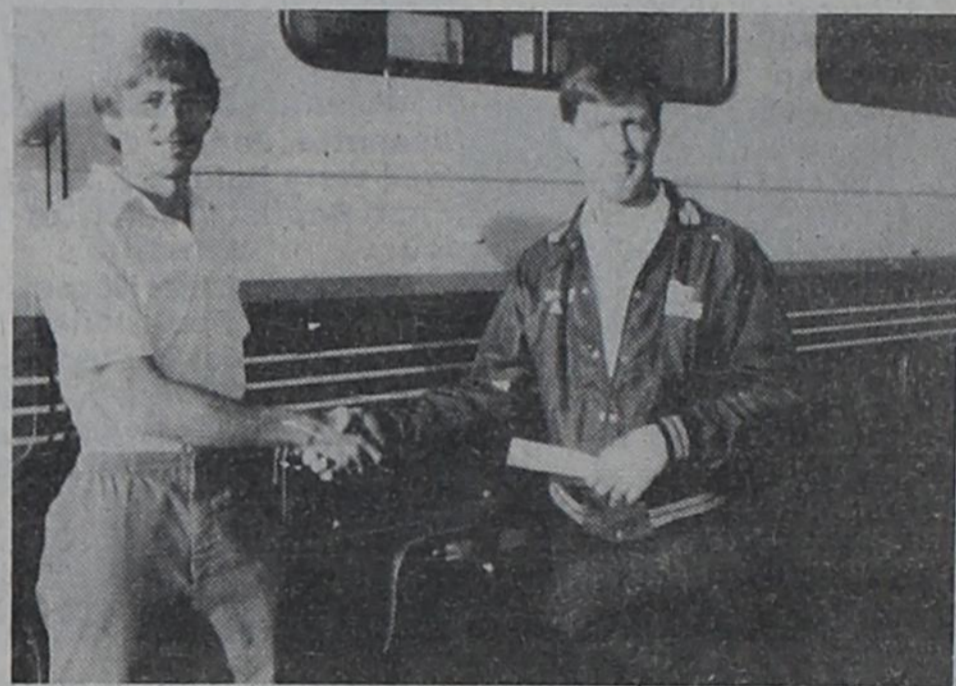

zures or other serious symptoms. In the past, doctors lowered the dosage of the strongest medications at 30-day intervals. Today they lower them on weekly intervals.

"I want to say, 'Take all the medications away, and let us go home,' but I know that is not possible," said Mrs. Anderson.

Each day Kellie has physical therapy. She works out on a mat to rebuild muscles that atrophied during the weeks she was in a coma. Some days she also walks and climbs stairs, and plays ball with the therapists.

"Yesterday she walked very fast, and the therapist had to work to keep up with her. The prayers, cards, letters and phone calls have really helped, but we can't wait to get home," said Mrs. Anderson.

Fitness Center put on back burner

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
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Deaf Smith signs pact

A new mortgage agreement with the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation was signed Oct. 12 by officers of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc., according to James Hull, President of the Cooperative.

The officers, acting with full authority vested in them by unanimous action of the full Board of Directors, signed the new mortgage document which replaces the old REA all inclusive lien on cooperative property. Elred A. Brown, Chairman of the Board of Directors, Donald J. Wright, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors, and Jerry L. Roberts, Secretary/Treasurer of the Board of Directors acted on behalf of all members of the Cooperative in signing the new mortgage and thereby releasing lien restrictions on many assets of the \$29,000,000 electric utility plant.

The new mortgage has no lien on all motor vehicles, cash and other interest bearing investments, accounts receivable, warehouse inventory, fuel, and CFC Capital Term Certificates which amount to over one and one-third million dollars. The old voided REA mortgage included a lien on all assets of the Cooperative, but on Dec. 30, 1986, this Cooperative retired completely all outstanding debt to the United States Government at a 31% discount amounting to a write-off by the government of 3.1 million dollars.

Another advantage of the new mortgage will be to provide an opportunity for the cooperative to negotiate for lowest interest rates available when borrowing money for new construction, that is, investment in distribution plant, electric generation, or in transmission lines. These borrowing options include the Texas Bank for Cooperatives, sale of bonds, local banks, and the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation.

Since this cooperative retired 100% of its REA debt at discount, a total of 30 electric cooperatives over the nation have done likewise. This was made possible because of Public Law 99-509, which expired Sept. 30, 1987. Retirement of this debt at discount increased member equity in Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative to 66%. Many of the old REA requirements still exist under the new mortgage, however, as related to engineering standards, accounting standards and annual audits by approved CPA firms. The Board felt that adoption and acceptance of this new mortgage agreement would provide the cooperative members with much more flexibility and latitude in operating the rural utility system and over the years would save the member owners of the cooperative vast amounts of money in operating expenses and eliminate compliance with non-applicable government regulations.

Ideas and information to help stocker cattle operators improve their economic opportunities will be presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in a seminar Oct. 28 in Friona.

The program for operators in Parmer and surrounding counties will be held in the Friona Community Center. The program will begin at 9 a.m. It is free and lunch will be provided, said Dr. John McNeill, Extension beef cattle specialist and seminar coordinator.

Vaccination recommendations for stocker cattle will be discussed by Dr. Dee Griffin, veterinarian with Pioneer

Hybrid International. He will cover diseases to vaccinate against, use of modified live or killed products, and reasons some vaccinations fail.

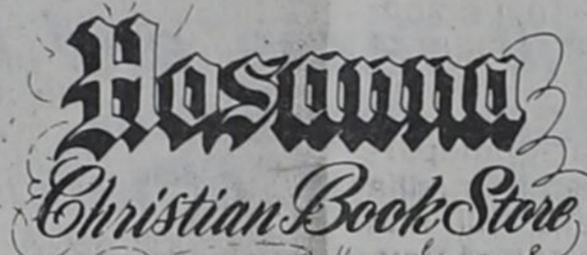
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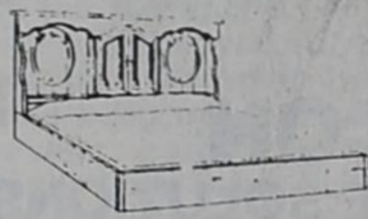

Scoring for the Eagles were Brent Harrison and Lupito Garza with 2 TD's each. Garza also kicked one point after, and ran in a conversion.

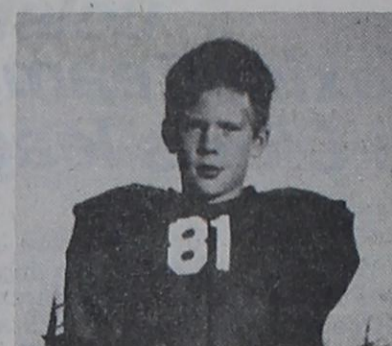

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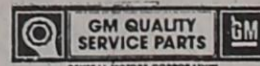
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Steers have a happy Homecoming

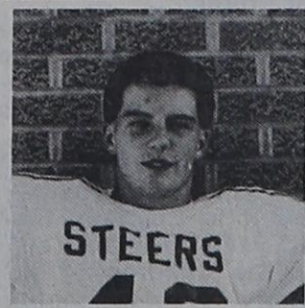
