Burial followed at Lawn Haven Memorial Gardens Cemetery. Steed-Todd Funeral Home handled the arrangements.

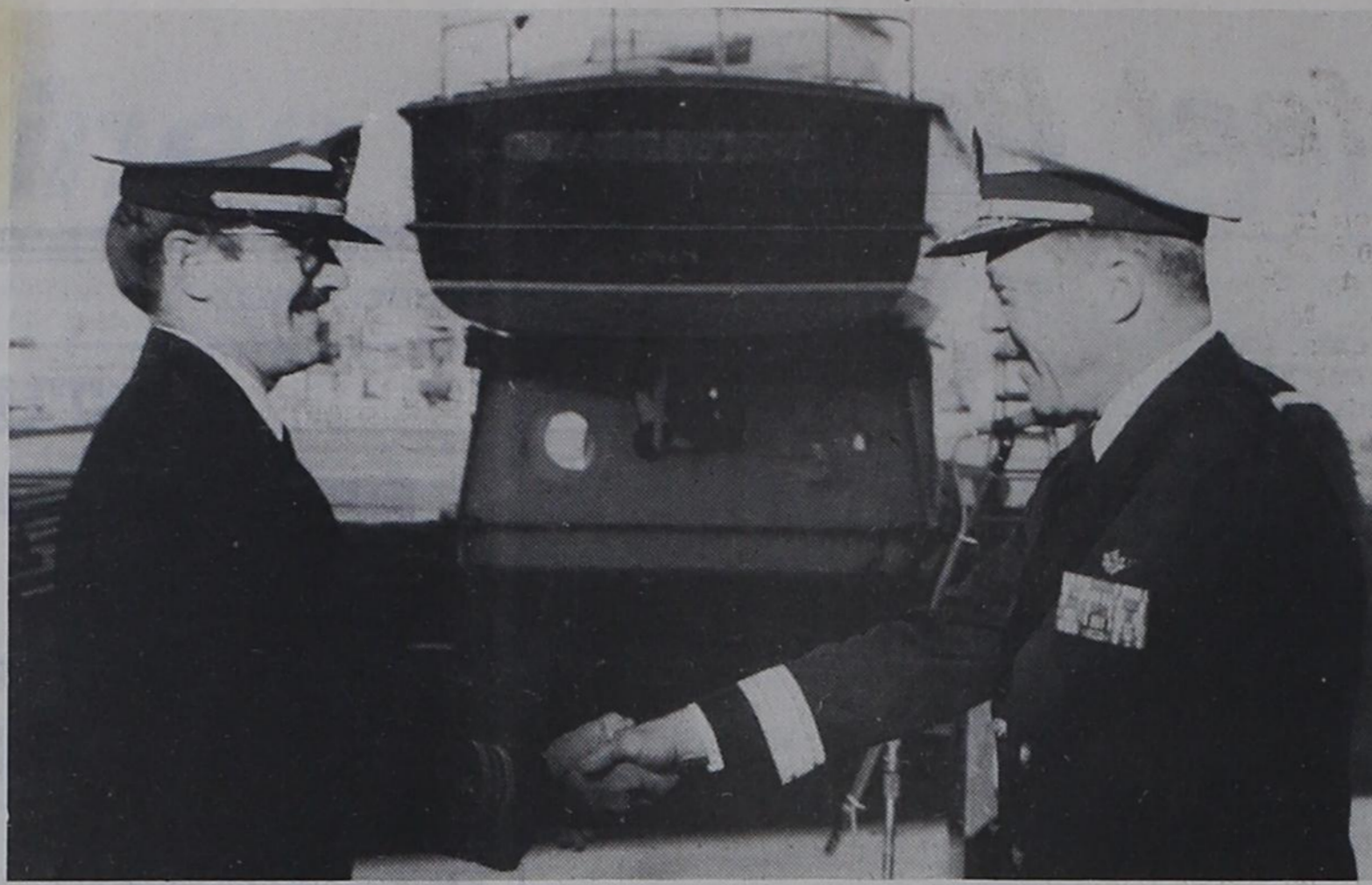

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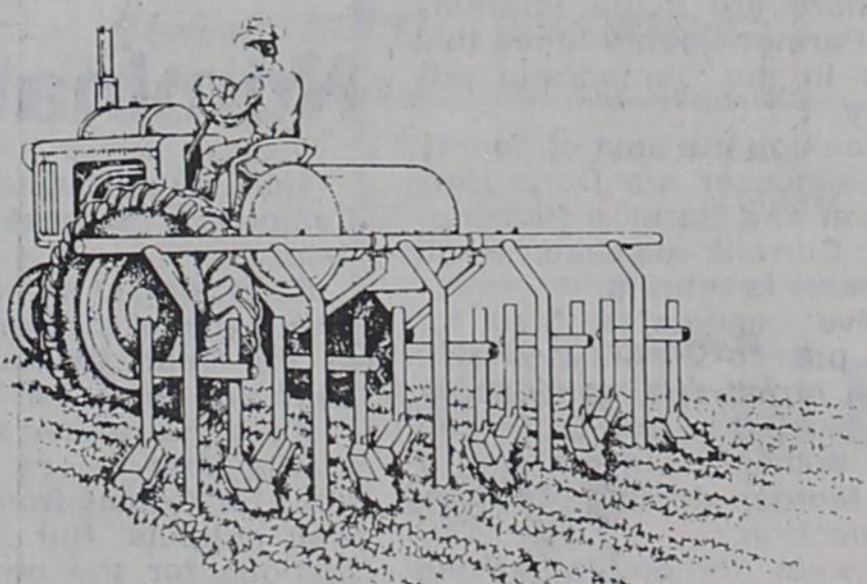


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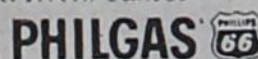

CRP signup under way

Texas farmers have another opportunity to enroll highly erodible land in the Conservation Reserve Program. The signup period is under way and ends Feb. 19. Farmers may enroll land at the ASCS office. This is the sixth signup since the program began two years ago. Texans have enrolled 2.8 million acres in CRP, and nationally about half of the 45 million acres targeted for the program are under contract and removed from crop production.

Farmers who participate in the 10-year commitment receive annual rental payments. Also, USDA picks up half the cost of establishing a permanent conservation cover. The "highly erodible" designation is based on land capability class, soil loss tolerance and the erodibility index. According to the Texas Extension Service, in Texas, the maximum, or cutoff, bids have ranged from \$35 to \$55 an acre, depending on geographic location.

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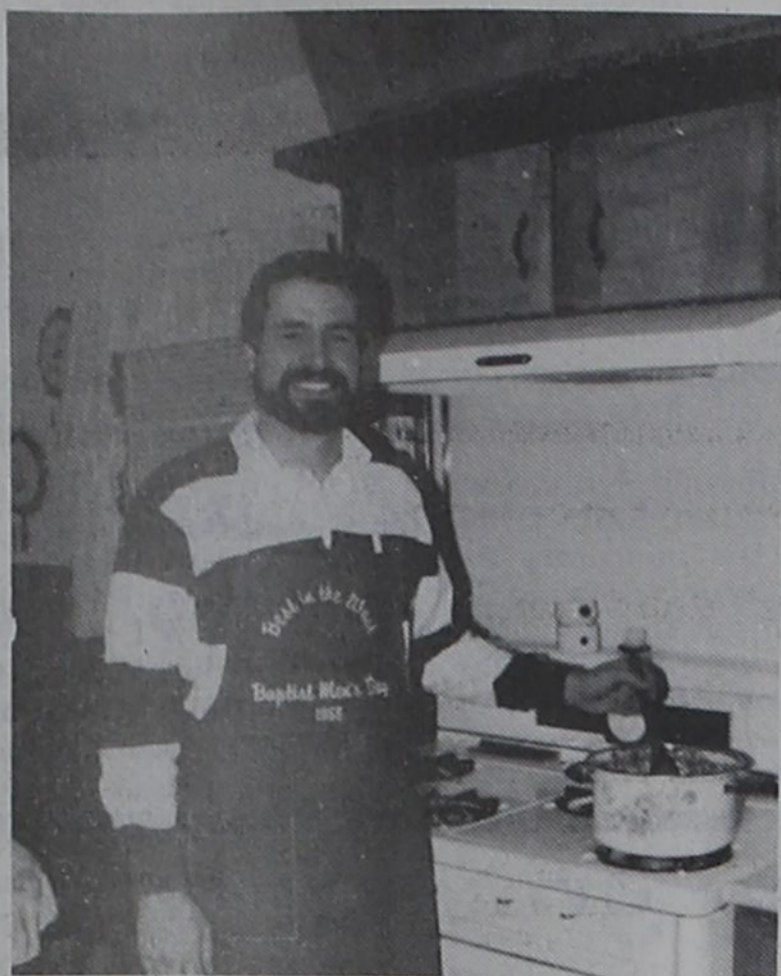

Blackford to present paper

Dr. LeeAnn Blackford, daughter of Bert and LeMoin Williams of Farwell, will be presenting the results of her research on the "Effects of Captopril therapy in dogs with mitral valve disease" at the annual meeting of the American College of Veterinary Surgeons in Tuscon, Ariz. this week.

Dr. Blackford is a resident in small animal surgery at the College of Veterinary Medicine. She did research on improving the health of dogs with congestive heart disease.

Dogs do not have the same kinds of heart problems humans have. Dogs seldom have problems with coronary artery blockage, but they often have congestive heart failure due to diseased or damaged heart valves.

In congestive heart failure which is caused by mitral valve disease, blood flows backward through the damaged mitral valve between the left ventricle and atrium. This causes outward flow from the heart to decrease. The body attempts to compensate by increasing blood pressure. This puts more strain on the heart and decreases its efficiency.

Dr. Blackford is studying the effects of the drug Captopril which reduces stress on the heart of patients by interrupting the release of a hormone from the kidney that causes blood vessel constriction and increased blood pressure.

Dr. Blackford is testing the use of the drug at very early stages of heart disease

to see if it will prevent or slow the progression of mitral valve malfunction to congestive heart failure. Captopril has not been used in this way before in dogs or humans.

The dogs Dr. Blackford is studying have heart murmurs, indicating early stages of heart valve damage. If left untreated, these dogs are likely to develop congestive heart failure, especially if they experience stress. Blackford has monitored dogs treated with Captopril for three months with some improvement noted.

If Captopril therapy proves effective, the drug would be used to treat dogs with heart disease. Dr. Blackford's research might even help doctors to someday treat humans with mitral heart leakage after sufficient research and testing is done.

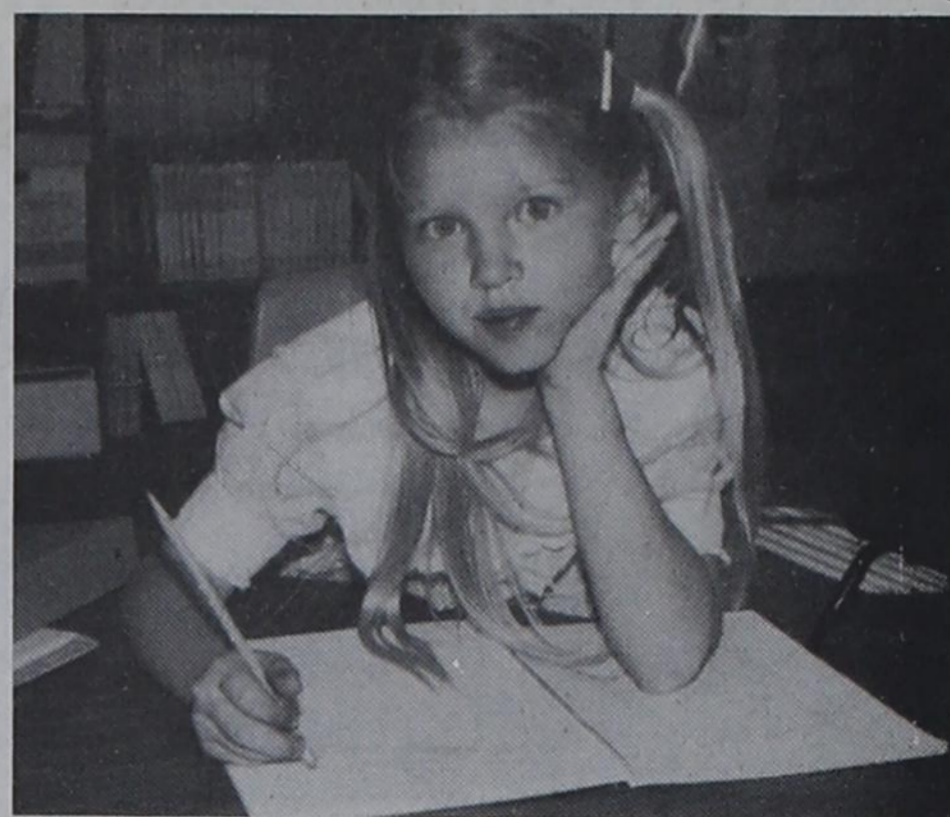

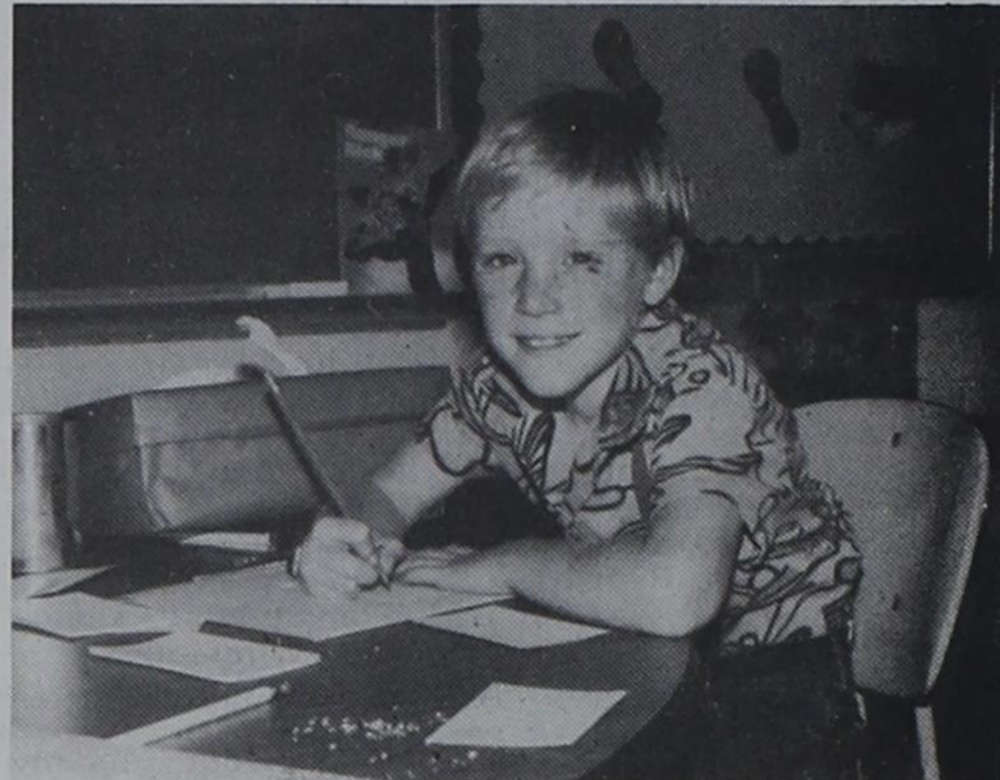

writing letters in their class. They are learning to write letters of request. Some students have also written letters to order specific items.




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

This isn't something I care to take lightly, but this part of the country is "different."

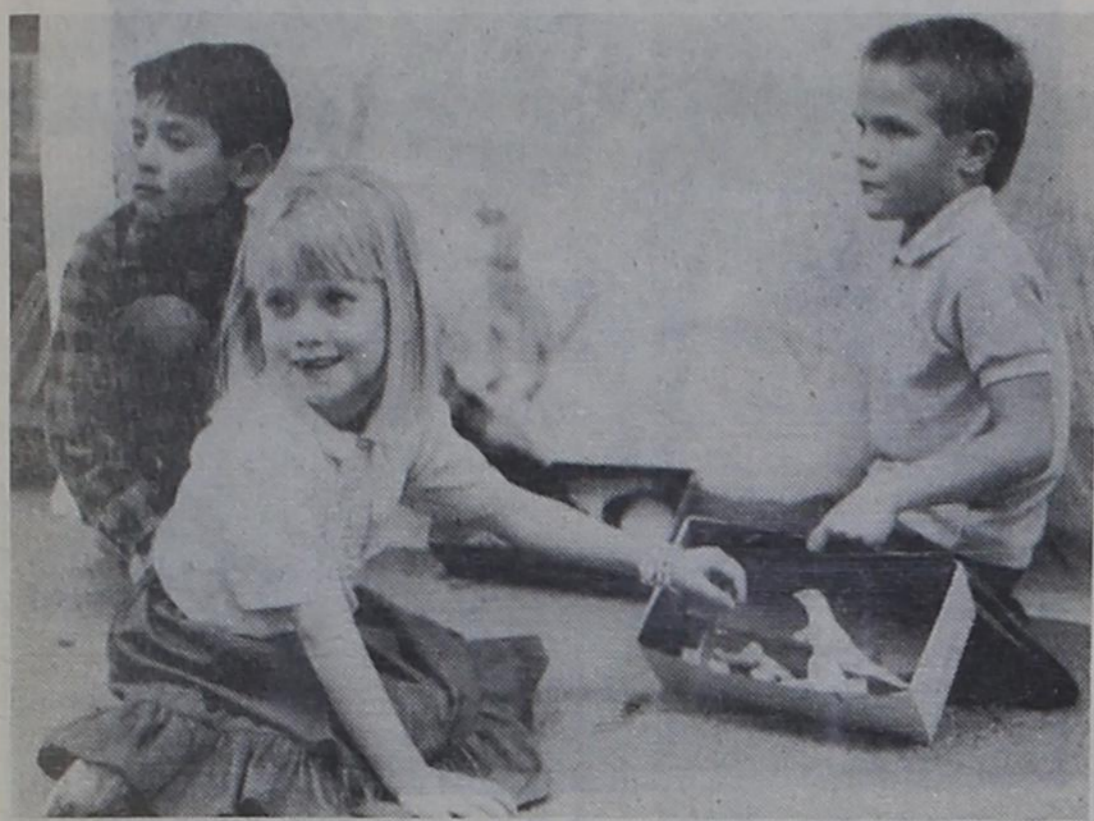
