# Eye to eye with Soviets

USS LASALLE was looking forward to a more relaxed time in December with an inport maintenace period, but first we had to steam south for a meeting with Commander, Joint Task Force Middle East (CJTFME).

I was looking forward to it because I served onboard carrier USS MIDWAY with this same staff in May and June of this year. We steamed from Japan to Australia together in happier days. Admiral Brooks and his staff were assigned to 7th Fleet then, and reported their new assignment in the North Arabian Sea just before I reported to Middle East Force in the Persian Gulf.

But getting to the meeting was more difficult than it sounded because we had to steam through the Straits of Hormuz to get to the Gulf of Oman, where Admiral Brooks' staff was embarked on USS LONG BEACH. The Straits are narrow and have a high volume of merchant traffic, and Iran has armed their side of it with the Silkworm missles they have been using in the Northern Persian Gulf.

LASALLE was escorted out and back by a guided-missile frigate. On the return transit, we also had a Soviet merchant and her escort proceeding through the same time we were. The Soviet escort was a SOVEREMENNYY-class guided missile destroyer named STOYKIY. I suspect the Russians were doing the same things we were - at "General Quarters" (battle stations) throughout the transit and all sensors and eyes looking north. It was a harrowing passage both ways. Communications in the Persian Gulf are getting even more interesting with the new ships in the area. It seems funny to call up a British ship with a name like BATTLEAX, then a Belgian ship with a name like ZINNIA. But who can pronounce the Dutch ship HELLEVOFTSLUIS? She must be the loneliest ship in the Gulf because no one ever talks to her unless they absolutely have to. We pulled into Bahrain after Thanksgiving, but we maintained a watch in Flag Plot around the clock every day. Convoys continue as does the war between Iran and Iraq. Minesweepers INFLICT and FEARLESS had destroyed five mines they had found by that time. But there are things to do off-watch, too. One of the big attractions is the "Hash House Harriers," which sponsors a race every Monday night. The "Hashers" are found around the world, especially if there is a large British community, and the Bahrain chapter of the Hash is the largest anywhere. The Hashers are now an international organization, but they had humble beginnings. Before World War Two, British soldiers garrisoned in Malaysia were fed at a local restaurant called the "Hash House." To break the boredom, they organized a race and obstacle course through the jungles on the way to chow, and the popularity of this particular sport spread to almost everyplace that had the influence of the British military. It is an interesting race because the course is laid out beforehand by different organizations (businesses, ships, pubs) and the word is put out as to where the race will start. The people who lay out the course are called "hares" and the race is really very similar to a pact of hounds on the hunt. Only the hares know the course the race will take and where the finish line is. The hares get the crowd of runners started in the right direction, and then they are on their own. When a runner finds a trail marker, he shouts "On, on" and the runners near him pick up the cry. Runners converge from all directions and the race is on with everyone shouting "On, on" like a couple hundred beagles in hot pursuit of a fox. However, the hares also lay out false trails, double-backs, or lay the trail over any number of obstacles. My first Hash run, along with several hundred other sailors, British and other European expatriates, and even a few Arabs, was run in the desert south of Manama. We made our way over shifting dunes, past oasis palms, through gulleys filled with brambles, as the sun disappeared in the west. It was an interesting experience, running at top speed to lead the pack, yelling "On- on" at each new marker and laughing at the fools who were yelling "On-on" in a totally different direction.

## CRP signup under way

Texas farmers have another opportunity to enroll highly erodible land in the Conservation Reserve Program.

The signup period is under way and ends Feb. 19. Farmers may enroll land at the ASCS office.

This is the sixth signup since the program began two years ago. Texans have enrolled 2.8 million acres in CRP, and nationally about half of the 45 million acres targeted for the program are under contract and removed from crop production.

Farmers who participate in the 10-year commitment receive annual rental payments. Also, USDA picks up half the cost of establishing a permanent conservation cover.

The "highly erodible" designation is based on land capability class, soil loss tolerance and the erodibility index.

According to the Texas Extension Service, in Texas, the maximum, or cutoff, bids have ranged from \$35 to \$55 an acre, depending on geographic location.

## Blackford to present paper

Dr. LeeAnn Blackford, daugh- to see if it will prevent or of Farwell, will be presenting the results of her research on the "Effects of Captopril therapy in dogs with mitral valve disease" at the annual meeting of the American College of Veterinary Surgeons in Tuscon, Ariz. this week.

Dr. Blackford is a resident in small animal surgery at the College of Veterinary Medicine. She did research on improving the health of dogs with congestive heart disease.

Dogs do not have the same kinds of heart problems humans have. Dogs seldom have problems with coronary artery blockage, but they often have congestive heart

ter of Bert and LeMoin Williams slow the progression of mitral valve malfunction to congestive heart failure. Captopril has not been used in this way before in dogs or humans.

The dogs Dr. Blackford is studying have heart murmurs, indicating early stages of heart valve damage. If left untreated, these dogs are likely to develop congestive heart failure, especially if they experience stress. Blackford has monitored dogs treated with Captopril for three months with some improvement noted.

If Captopril therapy proves effective, the drug would be used to treat dogs with heart disease. Dr. Blackford's research might even help doctors to someday treat humans with mitral heart leakage after sufficient research and testing is done.





In congestive heart failure which is caused by mitral valve disease, blood flows backward through the damaged mitral valve between the left ventricle and atrium. This causes outward flow from the heart to decrease. The body attempts to compensate by increasing blood pressure. This puts more strain on the heart and decreases its efficiency.

Dr. Blackford is studying the effects of the drug Captopril which reduces stress on the heart of patients by interrupting the release of a hormone from the kidney that causes blood vessel constriction and increased blood pressure.

Dr. Blackford is testing the use of the drug at very early stages of heart disease




