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
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

Taking a look at next year's cotton crop

The following information comes from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center.

The 1987 cotton crop is shaping up as one of the best on the High Plains in several years. While enjoying this year's harvest, there are several things cotton farmers can do to improve next year's prospects, says cotton specialist with

the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
"Barring unforseen weather problems, yields of both lint and seed are expected to be good this year," said Dr. James R. Supak, Extension cotton agronomist. "The favorable seed production outlook is important because much of next year's planting seed will have to come from this year's production."

The quality of planting seed is affected by several preharvest, harvest, and post harvest factors, Supak noted. Producers and seedsmen who will catch seed they produce for planting must be mindful of these factors, he stressed.

The quality and vigor of the seed was determined during the enlargement, filling and maturation phases of plant growth, the Extension specialist said. The best quality planting seed usually comes from fields that were planted early, fruited uniformly, weren't overly stressed for moisture or nutrients, and had 80% percent or more open bolls prior to termination with chemicals or by a freeze, Supak said. "Frequently, the best yielding fields don't produce the best quality seed," he cautioned. Plants that support large numbers of bolls tend to produce smaller, lighter seed, presumably due to competition for photosynthate.


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
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FmHA's Rainey:

Emergency loans available

"Emergency loans for farmers or ranchers are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration," Weldon Rainey, FmHA County Supervisor, said.
Parmer County is one of 12 in Texas recently n

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible to cover part of actual production losses from half

Rainey said farmers may be eligible for loans 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is farmers unable to obtain credit from private con lenders, the interest rate is 4.5%.

'As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Rainey said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Rainey asked that those who need farm credit as a result of hail make their needs known at the FmHA office at 207 Avenue D in Farwell.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken

counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until July 11, 1988 for physical and production losses, but applicants should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FMHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Rainey said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5% and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as

feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay. To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must

have suffered losses from the disaster.

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

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

Minesweepers go a-hunting

The war between Iran and Iraq is being waged in many

different ways, one of which being the "war of the tankers.

Both countries' economies are based on the money raised from the export of petroleum and petroleum products, and their war efforts are bolstered by imports of armaments and necessities delivered by sea. Tankers and freighters have been hit by gunfire, rocket propelled grenades, and missiles. There is another threat that is ever present as well - the naval

The Persian Gulf is a shallow sea. Mines can be moored in a number of places with a good probability of sinking or severely damaging a ship, particularly in the vicinity of major ports. The "IRAN AJR" was caught in the act of seeding mines near the anchorage off Bahrain. To counter this threat and to ensure the safety of the merchant ships and warships in the gulf, the U.S. has been investigating reports of mine sightings with its minesweeping helicopters of Squadron 14.

These large CH-53 helos fly over the surface of the sea trailing mindsweeping arrays. Their efforts will be somewhat bolstered by the arrival of USS minesweepers USS FEARLESS, USS ENHANCE, USS ESTEEM, USS INFLICT, USS CONQUEST, AND USS ILLUSIVE. Minesweepers from

France, Italy, Britain, the Netherlands, and Belgium are also

The U.S. minesweepers are Korean War vintage but are equipped with state of the art mine hunting and sweeping gear. They are unique in that they have wooden hulls, the last wooden hull warships in the world. No magnetic metal is allowed onboard and great care is taken in the effort to reduce the "magnetic field" the ship produces (some mines are acuated by fluctuations in the magnetic field around them). When mines are located, the sweep gear breaks the mooring cable and the mine can be destroyed or sunk by gunfire, or exploded with countercharges installed by the U.S. Navy Explosive Ordnance Disposal Teams (EOD).

The real history of mine warfare began during the tragically unsuccessful war of Southern Independence (also called The Civil War, or the War of Northern Agression). In August 1864, the Union Navy had blockaded all the Atlantic ports of the Confederacy, leaving only Mobile, Alabama, as a

major port.

A U.S. fleet, under Commodore David Farragut, attacked there to close it as well. The Confederates had placed a defensive field of mines (or torpedos, as they were also called) outside the harbor and when the leading Yankee monitor, USS TECUMSEH, hit a mine she sank rapidly with heavy loss of life. The other ships fell into disorder, and Farragut said his famous words, "Damn the torpedos, full steam ahead" (or words very much to that effect) and took his flagship, the Frigate USS Hartford through the field without hitting one.


USS TECUMSEH was thus the first warship to fall victim to a mine. She was joined within a year by monitors USS PATAPSCO, USS MILWAUKEE, and USS OSAGE.

Mine warfare began to come into flower during the Russo-Japanese War of 1904-1905. The Russians sank a Japanese gunboat, two Japanese cruisers and two Japanese battleships. (The Russians also sank one Russian cruiser, which is a lesson on the importance of good navigation and remembering where you've laid mines once you've dropped them overboard.)

Navies around the world began to develop mines and mine counter measures at this time. Mines took a heavy toll in World War I, many of the victims being major warships. But the primary development was the offensive minefield. The U.S. Navy attempted to spread a field from Scotland to Norway to keep German U-Boats from getting into the

The lessons learned during World War I were applied during World War II and losses of major warships to mines were nowhere as great although smaller warships suffered greatly off coastlines during amphibious assaults. One major use of the mine was against enemy shipping, and by war's end, Japan had lost almost 400,000 tons of shipping to mines. (It is impossible to estimate what other losses can be attributed to mines indirectly. If a mine field is known to exist, it will affect the decisions your enemy makes. Movements of his ships may be delayed or accelerated to your advantage, or convoys routed into an area where you can engage them with

With the arrival of additional minesweeping forces into the Persian Gulf, the chances of severe reductions of oil exports from this area are greatly reduced. The minesweepers and their crews will be working, investigating reports, hunting, and sweeping mines. They will succeed whether they destroy mines or not, because they will have cleared an existing threat, or they will verify that no threat exits.







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

Sarpalius satisfied with election outcome

AUSTIN - Voters statewide managed to wade through the ridiculously long Nov. 3 ballot and give their seal of approval to 17 of the 25 constitutional propositions and one of the two non-constitutional referanda.

With such a long ballot, in-depth analysis of the results is almost impossible. What is possible is a close inspection of the three or four votes that will have the biggest impact on the 31st Senatorial District.

Proposition 8, which authorizes the sale of \$500 million in bonds to pay for prisons and other new facilities, already is paying economic dividends in our part of the state. Just last week, the State Board of Corrections approved Amarillo's bid to become home to a new 2,250-bed maximum security prison.

The prison naturally will bring many construction jobs to the area in the short term and, more importantly, will be the source of almost 1,000 permanent jobs in the Amarillo area. The economic implications of such an employment boost are obvious.

But, the significance of the Amarillo prison extends far beyong the boundries of the city itself. The Texas Department of Corrections is in an expansion phase, and this new facility marks the first time a maximum-security prison has been built outside the general east-central Texas area.

also made concerted efforts to bring some type of correctional facility to their areas. The awarding of the Amarillo prison breaks down a long-standing barrier and paves the way for one or more of those cities to receive some future

The passage of Proposition 19 will not yield the immediate results of Proposition 8, but the importance of the amendment should not be underestimated. Proposition 19 authorizes the state to sell \$500 million in bonds, if a Texas site is chosen by the U.S. Department of Energy to house the \$6 billion superconducting supercollider.

Amarillo, of course, is one of two Texas sites currently being con-'sidered by DOE. As we've mentioned many times, a \$500 million promise from the state to help fund SSC construction gives our Texas sites an edge on the national competition for the SSC. If the SSC were to come to Amarillo, there is no doubt it would be the economic development prize of the decade.

Of a more local interest is the passage of Proposition 25, which gives voters in parts of Randall County the option of becoming part of the Amarillo Hospital District. Those residents in the part

First, five percent of the property owners residing in the aforementioned area must petition the Randall County Commissioner's Court for an election. Once the economic development interest. election is ordered a majority of for membership in the AHD must

approve membership. Membership can be dissolved at any time by going through a similar petition/ election process.

Interesting as the amendments we've discussed are, they are not the items that attracted the voters' attention. It was parimutuel wagering that drew people to the polls, and it is the legalized gambling issue that continues to attract

There can be no doubt some areas people residing in the area eligible will benefit economically from the voters' decision to legalize betting

on horse and dog races. Our area will not enjoy that many benefits. Only one county - Randall County has passed the local option election necessary to be eligible for a race track with wagering, so there won't be tracks dotting the Panhandle-

South Plains area. Also, no county in our part of the state is eligible for a large Class One racetrack. Those tracks are limited by law to the Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth and San Antonio areas. The track in Randall County, though, could receive a Class Two permit,

which would limit wagering at the track to no more than 44 days per

We wouldn't want to downplay the economic importance of that Class Two track, but we wouldn't want to build it up too much either. Some, but not many, in our part of the state will prosper from pari-mutuel wagering.

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

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
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
