We will make some sort of an exception in this week's column. We received a release from a Judge Oliver S. Kitzman who is running to unseat an incumbent of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. Based on the very meager information contained in the release we would favor the election of Judge Kitzman over the incumbent Judge Sam Houston Clinton.

According to Judge Kitzman's release, it was Judge Clinton who played a leading part in the Court of Criminal Appeals reversal of several hundred narcotic cases because the indictments said "cocaine" instead of "cocoa leaf deriva-

This appears to our uncluttered mind to be poor grounds to sock the Texas taxpayer several million dollars to retry these cases. That, plus the fact that probably many of the reversed cases were dropped because witnesses could not be located to retry the offenders.

## Community Center Gets City Funding

At a special called session of the project such as hanging the the Farwell City Council last Thursday afternoon, the City Dads agreed to finance the continued construction of major renovation projects at the Farwell Community Center on 9th Street in Farwell.

Members of the Community Center Committee, Joe Jones, Don Williams and Charles Aycock, presented the Council with the request for the funds to complete the present work program on the Center.

The Committee members stated that the over \$43,000 that had been contributed by the public toward the project was running short, and that parts of ceiling and finishing other parts of the building cannot be completed until the heating and air conditioning system is procured and installed.

The donated funds have been

allotted toward these projects but there is not enough to install the heat and air conditioning and other necessary basic items of construction. Committee members estimated that an additional \$30,000 to \$35,000 would be necessary to finish the major reconstruction work to bring the new Center up to a point where it could be comfortably used by the public.

This estimated amount does not include basic furnishings such as additional chairs and tables or providing the kitchen equipment. Additional public contributions will be needed to provide this equipment and those present felt that these monies would be donated as the Center was put to work for community activities.

Williams also pointed out that at the present time the contractor on the project was available to finish the work and that the Committee, by working closely with the contractor, had accomplished much more with the original \$43,000 than had been thought possible at the start of the project. He added that if work stopped at this point it would be more costly to resume the work at a later date.

The Community Center Committee members all agreed that the building would be in usable shape for the Farwell Chamber of Commerce annual banquet set for Saturday, May 19.

Farwell City Council, with Mayor Walter Kaltwasser and Councilmen Jerry Monk and Fred Chandler present, agreed to fund the major work yet to be done and to finish the project as presently planned.

If someone stops to offer help, do not get out of the car under any circumstances. Only roll the window down far enough so that you can safely converse with the person, and ask them to call the police or a tow truck. Never, she said, give that person your home phone number.

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
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### Texico Track Teams Compete At EPAC



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
