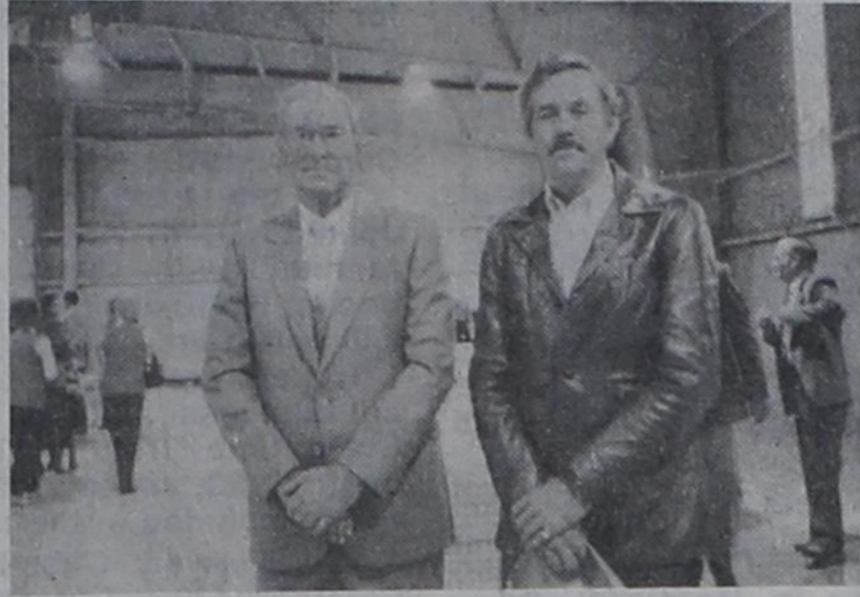
I would like to add at this point that everyone I played against was very kind and understanding. There were no giggles or outright laughter after some of my more surprising plays.

## AIDS program to be given

The School Board of Farwell Independent School District, in its January meeting, endorsed the implementation of AIDS education and curriculum materials for the school district.

The Texas Education Agency has encouraged and supported Texas schools in getting educational information into schools in order to educate school staff and students about the facts of AIDS.

It is widely accepted that the only way to truly combat the problem of AIDS is through education. Farwell Independent School District will work with the Health Project of Region XVI Education Service Center for school staff training and selection of educational material. Farwell School Board has also recommended the formation of a community committee to function under school district leadership regarding AIDS education.

Additionally, a community-wide AIDS awareness program has been scheduled for Farwell for Tuesday, Feb. 23, from 7 to 9 p.m. Dr. Arnold Isaacson, the Regional Director for the Texas Department of Health from Lubbock, will be the speaker. The program will be held in the high school auditorium. All community parents, school staff and other interested persons are encouraged to attend.

After the community awareness meeting on Feb. 23, the district will be asking for volunteers to serve on a committee to recommend to the Board a curriculum regarding AIDS instruction.

The AIDS Awareness Program is one which should prove very enlightening. We hope you can attend. The committee regarding AIDS instruction is also very important. The Board is committed to community awareness and input in our programs.

## Mesmans host Danish visitor

"Farms are bigger here in the United States than they are in Denmark," says Danish visitor Torben Andersen.

Andersen is staying with Ben and Mary Mesman at Mesman Dairy. He is participating in an international exchange called The Communicating for Agriculture Exchange Program. Andersen is a 23 year old who has finished his schooling in Denmark.

Andersen is from Arsballe, Denmark, where his parents own a dairy farm. His parents own 60 acres. They have about 20 dairy cattle and 20 sows.

In Denmark, dairymen must keep their cattle inside most of the year because of the cold, moist climate. They have more cleanup work to keep their barns clean since the animals are inside all of the time. They have more expense than American dairymen, because they have to build warm, strong barns.

Andersen said Danish farmers usually have Holstein cattle, just as the Mesmans do. He thought that the yield per cow was probably similar.

Danish farmers do not feed their cattle corn and alfalfa. They feed the cows "feed beets" which are similar to our sugar beets and grass and barley.

Andersen hopes to own a farm in Denmark near his family's farm. He reports that land is available in his homeland, but it is very expensive. Farms are very small there.

In Denmark, grain farms do not make much money because their farms are so small, and land and equipment are expensive. Dairy farms, on the other hand, can be profitable if they are well managed. Danish people eat lots of cheese and milk products in their diets, and beef is a very expensive commodity to buy.

Andersen has already completed the basic 10 years of schooling all Danish children have. He has also completed 5 months of agricul-

ture school training and three years of working on farms in a type of apprenticeship program. He followed that up with nine months of additional classroom training.

This process has made him eligible for the "green card" which is required before he can buy a farm in Denmark. When he returns to Denmark Andersen will apply for a loan to buy the land he wants.

As part of the exchange program, Andersen spent 7 months in Minnesota working on a dairy farm there. He was surprised by the heat of the summer there, since it does not get very hot in Denmark normally.

After his stay in Minnesota, Andersen visited Las Vegas, Nev., and California before he reported to Mesman Dairy. Andersen enjoyed the many sights he saw along the way.

The exchange program makes the connection between different types of young farmers around the world, but it does not pay the farmer's way. The young farmer and his family must pay for the trip.

Here in Farwell Andersen has attended church with the Mesman family, and hunted with the men. He has also enjoyed some traveling and some social events.

Hunting is an activity that Torben Andersen enjoyed in Denmark. He hunted rabbits, pheasants, deer and prairie chickens there. Here in the U.S. he has tried his hand at deer and duck hunting.

"In Denmark you must pass a very hard school before you can get a hunting license. You must know all of the birds, and the dates of their seasons as well as gun safety. It costs about \$25 for the classes and about \$25 for the license. Then comes the hard part - you must have land to hunt on, and few people own their own land in Denmark," says Andersen.

Andersen has also watched some television shows while he has been in the U.S. He says that American tv is "ok."

## Five seek the sheriff's post

The five candidates for the Democratic nomination for sheriff of Parmer County, John Armstrong, Jerry Atchley, Larry Cox, Bob Davis, and Rex Williams, spoke Monday at a meeting sponsored by the Neighborhood Watch committee.

John Getz was moderator. Each candidate gave a 3 minute summary of his background at the start of the meeting. Then questions were asked of the candidates by members of the audience.

What changes would you make if you were elected sheriff?

Armstrong: The sheriff sets the 3 p's for his department - philosophy, policy, and personnel. One of the first things I would do is evaluate personnel and make changes as they were necessary.

Atchley: Times have changed; people in Parmer County can no longer leave their doors unlocked. We need more night patrol, and we need to be seen more by the public. Our sheriff's cars need to be on the move.

Cox: We need more night patrols; we need to be seen because seeing the sheriff is some deterrent to crime.

Davis: If elected, I would make sure each deputy would have a specific area of the county to cover night and day. Each complaint will be investigated.

Williams: I'm big on crime prevention. I believe in making marked patrol cars visible. Police patrol cars deter crime. Last year an average of 7 people were arrested each week in Parmer County on the charge of driving while intoxicated. National statistics show that for each drunk driver picked up, there are 8-10 out there who don't get picked up. I would make a much greater effort to arrest DWI suspects.

What would you do to prevent crimes?

Armstrong: Starting a Crime Stoppers program would help. Nationally most burglaries occur between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. when people are out of their homes working. Crime Stoppers offers a reward for information about a crime that has taken place.

The way I see it, most of the crimes in Parmer County are penny-ante crimes - not associated with any crime syndicates or hardened criminals. Most of the local criminals brag to their buddies about their crimes. If we offer a reward for information, we can often solve crimes.

Atchley: Crime Stoppers and a Neighborhood Watch program only work if the people of the community do.

Cox: I think we need a reserve force. We could use the fire department to answer calls. If we started a Crime Stoppers program, we would need to generate interest and money to get it going. It would be good if you could get it going.

Davis: Crime Stoppers and Neighborhood Watch are some of the best things going.

Williams: Crime Stoppers and Neighborhood Watch are both good. We've been looking into Crime Stoppers in Friona. From what I've read, it is a time consuming project. It ties a person up almost full-time. If we did go into Crime Stoppers, it would need to be a county-wide project. There are grants available that might help with Crime

Stoppers.

What should be done about juveniles?

Armstrong: Law enforcement is hamstrung by the current laws concerning juveniles. I would go to the schools with programs to educate young people on drugs and alcohol. I've worked with young people for the past 20 years. I feel strongly about them, and in my jobs in law enforcement I have seen the death and destruction that can occur to young people.

Atchley: Our hands are tied. We can no longer incarcerate a juvenile in our jail for any reason. We must transport them to Lubbock where they can be locked up overnight. We need to loosen all enforcement rules. A 14 year old can kill you just as dead as a 50 year old.

Cox: I live in Lazbuddie. Out there we need to stop letting juveniles drive without a license. We also need to stop drinking and drugs. We need to take kids to their parents. Let their parents know what they are doing. Get tough with people who sell alcohol and drugs to kids.

Davis: One of the worst problems concerning young people is alcohol and drugs. We need to work on these things.

Williams: Prevention is the key to juvenile problems. Keep them busy doing something else. On nights in Friona when there is a dance or a game where there is no alcohol, the kids are there instead of running up and down Main Street.

What should be done to provide police service for Farwell?

Armstrong: The city of Farwell needs to provide some of its own law enforcement - at least a night watchman. The sheriff cannot enforce

city ordinances, and the sheriff cannot offer a patrol for Farwell when Friona and Bovina must provide their own.

Atchley: It is state law that counties can't enforce city ordinances. We can and do answer all calls in Farwell where county or state law has been broken.

Davis: The city of Farwell should have a city marshal. The sheriff's department can't handle it all.

Williams: If possible, I'd have Farwell pay for a deputy.

If elected, where do you plan to reside?

All candidates indicated that they would probably stay where they live right now except Mr. Williams who said that he would consider a move to Farwell if elected.

How much coverage does the sheriff's department have; what do we need?

Armstrong: The jail ties up 25% of our deputies' time right now. We really need a jailer so that the sheriff's personnel are freed up. We'd need one man in each office 24 hours per day to adequately cover the county. The question is, how much do you want to spend?

Atchley: We have almost 900 square miles to cover in Parmer County plus the jail. Right now we only have 5 men doing that.

Cox: We need two deputies per precinct. The deputies may need backup.

Davis: Eight people could take care of it adequately in addition to the city officers.

Williams: We have 5 police officers cover Friona 24 hours a day. The county could be covered 24 hours a day with 6.

Also, the candidates for the Democratic nomination for Parmer County Tax Assessor, Doris Herington and Bernice Pennington were introduced.

## 'Depot' group unable to seek state grant

The Bordertown Heritage Foundation, the group trying to save the old Texico depot from being demolished, was unable to file a grant application for state funds by last Friday's deadline.

The Texico City Council last month said it wouldn't do so, and the depot group was not allowed by law to do it as a private group (only state groups could file).

Ann Cooper, depot group official, said the BHF will now try to find a private consul-

tant who can suggest ways to raise the money needed through private funds.

It has been estimated that at least \$200,000 is needed to move the building.

Mrs. Cooper said that if the grant had been filed, the Santa Fe had agreed to wait until April 1 before tearing down the depot, thus waiting to see if the grant was approved. She hopes the railroad will give her group the same deadline to see if private funds can be raised.

Richard Hadley of Citizens Bank of Clovis and Texico mayor John R. Hadley have tickets to sell as well as agriculture teacher Eddie West.

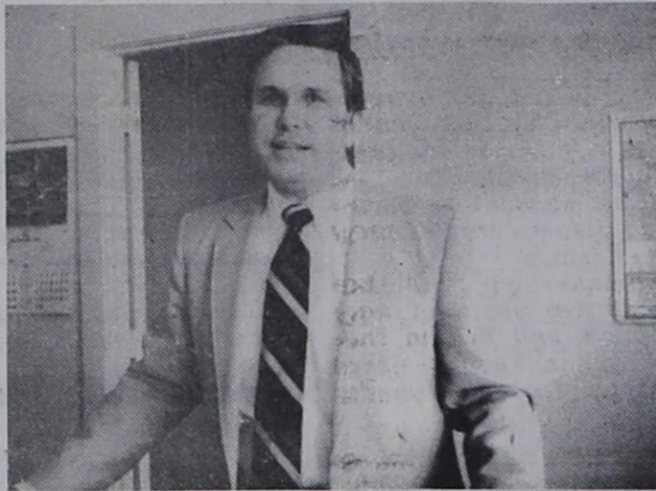
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**Combest stops by**

He prefers Danish television because the programs are in his native tongue, and because the news shows are usually about local happenings. Andersen says that Danish television is very good. There is only one channel in Denmark. It does not show any commercials. "Dallas" and "Dynasty" are two of the shows aired there. Andersen does not have much time for recreation on a dairy farm. His normal day starts at 4 a.m. and ends at 8 p.m. Dairy farming is a lot of work whether it is in the U.S. or Denmark. The chores vary from day to day, but there is always milking and caring for the animals to be done.

The weather was extremely cold and snowy when Andersen arrived at the Mesman Dairy. It was not what he expected at all when he heard that he would be living in Texas.

"Torben is such a good worker," says Mary Mesman of her visitor from Denmark. "When he first got here we had such terrible weather, and there was so much to do. He helped out and he never complained. He is really special."

Andersen plans to visit Florida with the Mesmans and to visit his friends in Minnesota before he returns to Denmark.

Andersen is not the first exchange visitor to stay with the Mesman family. In the past they have had younger 4-H foreign exchange students from Japan and Panama, and they have recently had young adult exchange visitors from Switzerland and Mexico.

"It is really funny to hear all of us at meal time. Ben and I speak English with some Dutch, our children speak English, Torben speaks English with some Danish, and Manuel speaks English with some Spanish. Somehow we all understand each other," Mrs. Mesman added.

Casket bearers were Emmett Autrey, Ronnie Autrey, Bill Autrey, Tommy Sapp, Jimmy Love and Jim Heron.

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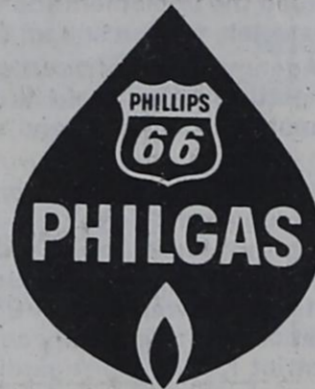
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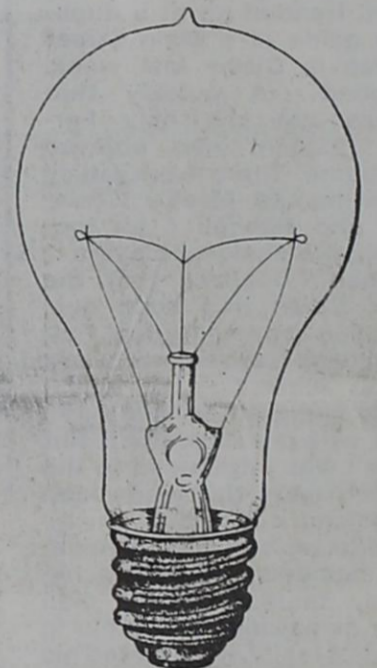
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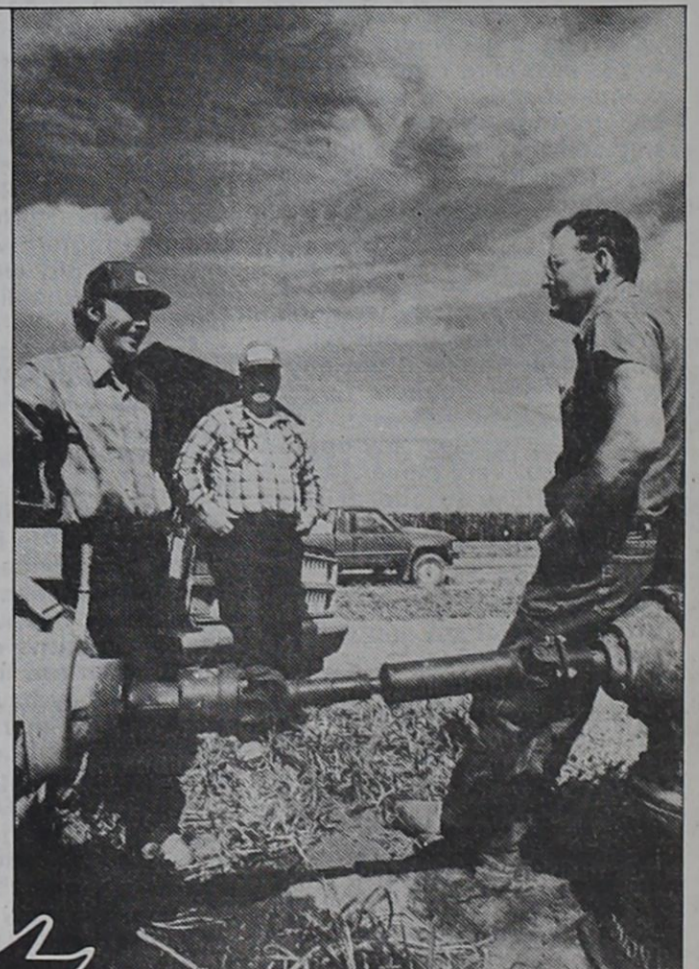
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**Welcome**

**Farwell Elementary School schedules registrations**

To register a child must have immunization records and a birth certificate. Only official copies of birth certificates are accepted and must have been obtained from the state offices.

Sarah Owen, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration.

To be eligible for pre-

kindergarten, a child must be 4 years old prior to Sept. 1, unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced price lunches), and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Texas school districts are required to provide pre-kindergarten if 15 or more students are identified.

**Green Noodles Romana**

- 1 clove garlic, quartered
- 6 sprigs parsley, no stems

### Workshop to view chemigation

The program will begin with a comparison of the economics of center pivot vs. furrow irrigation by Dr. Steve Amosson, extension agricultural economist at Amarillo.

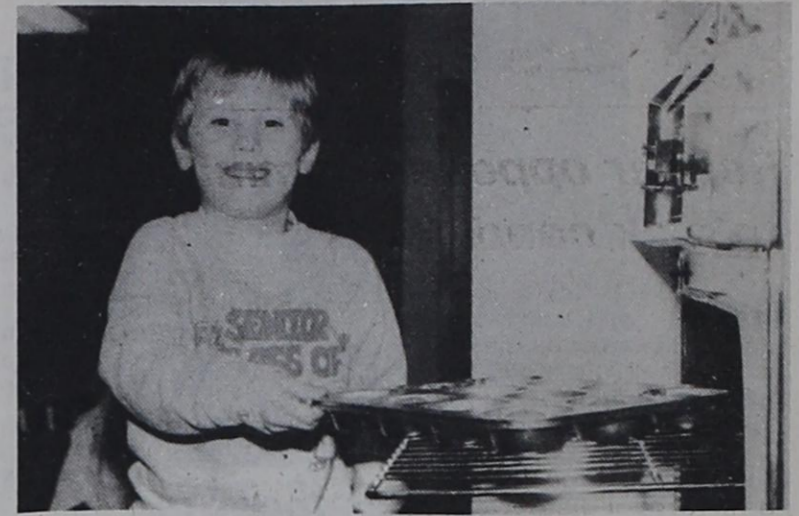
Application of fertilizers by center pivot systems will

Fungicides for chemigation will be covered by Dr. Harold Kaufman, extension plant pathologist at Lubbock. New regulations by the Environmental Protection Agency regarding chemigation and human safety will be reviewed by Dr. W. Pat Morrison, extension entomologist at Lubbock.

Insecticides for chemigation will be discussed by Knutson. Chemigation with low energy precision application center pivot systems will be explained by Dr. Carl Patrick, extension entomologist at Amarillo.

Herbicides for center pivot application will be the topic of Dr. Brent Bean, extension agronomist at Amarillo.

Sanchez, a fighting vehicle system mechanic, is a 1977 graduate of Farwell High School.

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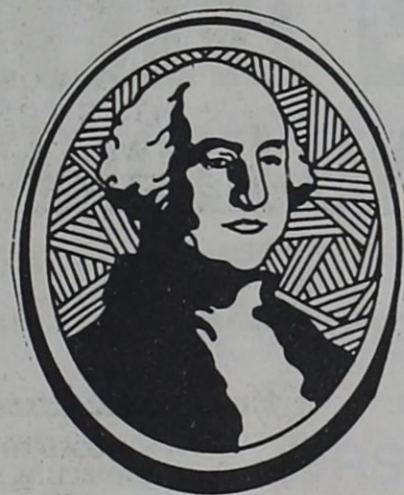
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# Lady Wolverines seeded second in tournament

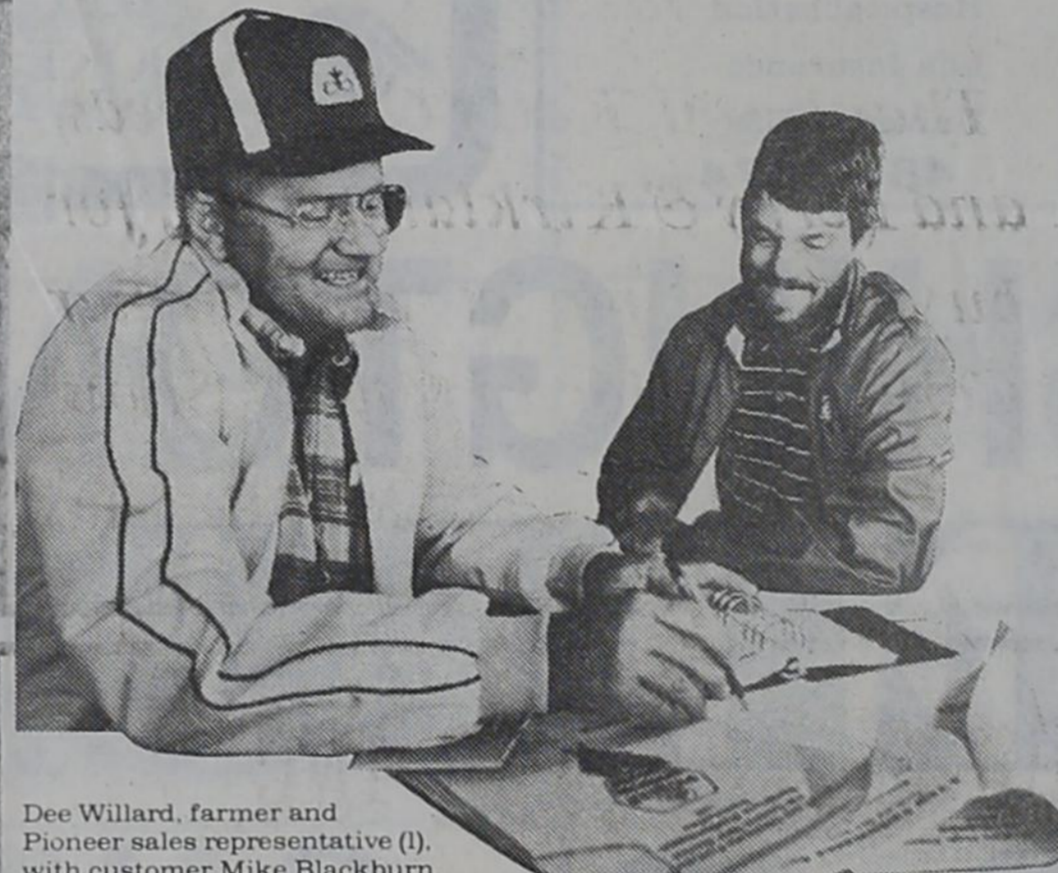

Farwell teams had mixed results. The Steers lost to the Hornets by two points in an overtime. The Cobras and the Cubs each beat the teams they played.

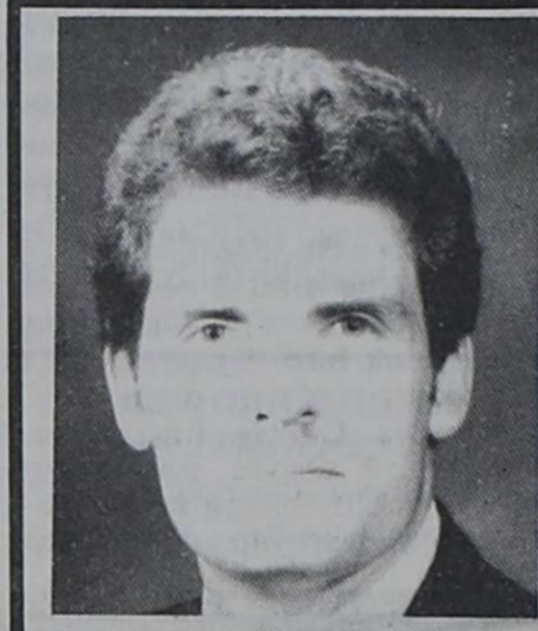
