Is a day care center needed here?

Traci Clift of Farwell is attempting to find out if folks in the Texico - Farwell area would like to have a day care center.

Mrs. Clift, who moved to Farwell last August, formerly operated a day care center in Clovis for two years.

Since coming to the Twin Cities, several folks have told her of their wanting a center here. So Mrs. Clift decided to find out if there is enough interest.

On Page 2 of today's Tribune is a questionnaire. Persons filling it out do not have to sign their name; there is no commitment being made at this time. What Mrs. Clift wants to know is simple: Is there enough interest here for a day care center?

Mrs. Clift has found a building here to house the center, which will be licensed by the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Everything is pending on the response to the questionnaire in today's paper," said Mrs. Clift. "If the response is poor, there will be no facility. This is a one-shot questionnaire."

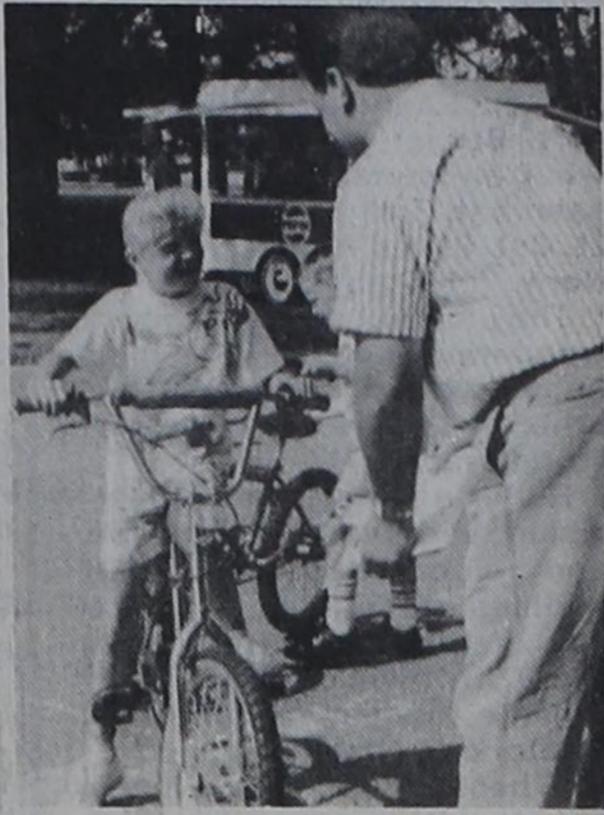
The state of Texas has more railroad crossings than any other state with 14,500. In the five year span from 1983-1987 there were 3,314 car/train collisions which resulted in 290 fatalities and 1,832 injuries in the state.

Trains travel through this state at speeds up to 90 miles per hour. They slow down when they get to Farwell-Texico, but a 6,000 ton freight train can do horrible damage to a car even at slow speeds. Once in motion, a vehicle of that weight is hard to stop even if it is going slow.

Please be careful, especially at unguarded railroad crossings.

Parmer had top yield per acre

Figures released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service show production in the 25 High Plains counties of cotton at 2,668,550 bales.

Using an estimated 55.5 cents per pound average price, Plains Cotton Growers puts lint value at \$710,901,720. Seed, at \$75 per ton for 1,134,134 tons, was worth another \$85,060,050. Another \$210,740,573 in target price deficiency payments brings the total value to \$1,006,302,343.

This marks the first time in history that area cotton has achieved a billion dollar crop status, and tops the previous record of \$900 million set by the 2.9 million bale crop of 1973, said PCG.

TASS reports planted acreage for the 25 counties at 2,819,800, harvested acres at 2,599,000, and an average yield of 494.7 pounds per acre. That yield is about 18 pounds short of the area's best, 513.2 pounds per acre in 1965, and is the fourth highest ever, behind 1965, 1973 (498) and 1968 (496).

Total 1987 production also ranks fourth in records kept by PCG back to 1928, trailing the all-time record 3.522 million bale crop of 1981, 3.22 million in 1977 and 2.89 million produced in 1973.

The chart below shows 1987 planted and harvested acres, yields per harvested acre and total production in 480 pound net weight bales for each of the 25 PCG counties.

Roberts was a combat medic in Europe

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts was a combat medic during World War II, assigned to the medical detachment of the 309th Infantry Company of the 78th Infantry Division.

"No, it wasn't like MASH on television," he was quick to say. "MASH was a field hospital. We were in the front lines - way ahead of the hospital."

Roberts drove a Jeep with a litter squad to carry wounded back to a first aid station. Seriously wounded patients were sent from the first aid station to a collecting company where they would await transportation to a clearing company which would send the patients to the appropriate hospital.

Often, though, it was the immediate attention of the combat medic that made

the difference between those who could make the journey to the hospital and those who could not. Medics used the most up to date technology of the time.

"I got pretty proficient at stopping the bleeding and giving shots."

"They do things a lot different now than they did back then," says Roberts of the first aid he learned in the Army during World War II. "They used to tell us to put grease on a burn, now doctors get mad if you do that. They want you to put cold water on a burn."

"We used the old Army leg traction splint. Now they use an air splint in ambulance work."

"We were taught to use tourniquets back then. Now they don't use them like they

did."

"And now if you suspect a back injury, you use a back board. Back then, we only had the GI litter."

Combat medics got "a cute little badge and \$10 extra per month" for being in the front lines. Technically, combat medics were classified as non-combatants because they were supposed to give first aid to anyone who needed it - Allied soldiers, civilians, or enemy soldiers.

Under the Geneva Convention, combat medics were supposed to work in hospitals if they were captured. They were not supposed to be treated as regular prisoners of war.

Roberts was assigned to the medics because he had driven an ambulance for a volunteer fire department back

home. "I really wanted to fly," he said.

Roberts went through several training sessions in the U.S. before he saw any actual fighting. He started with basic training at Camp Butner, N.C. It was followed by two advanced infantry courses for medics as well as several maneuvers before he was shipped to Europe.

"It is a good thing I'm not superstitious about the number 13," the judge jokes. "I shipped out for Europe on Friday, Oct. 13, 1944 on the 13th largest ship in the world; it was its 13th voyage as a troop transport. It took us 13 days to cross the ocean. I went into battle on Dec. 13th. When I went home I sailed on the same ship. It took 13 days to go home, and there are 13 letters in my name."

Roberts first saw combat south of Aachen, Germany, on a snowy, foggy day. "I drove that Jeep 23 hours straight before a mine blew the front wheels out from under it," said Roberts. The Jeep was one of 5 Roberts would drive during those months of combat.

The German Army started to close in on the Allied Troops from two different directions, horseshoe fashion. "We were too green to know we should get out of their way. We held our ground," says Roberts of the Battle of the Bulge. Allied forces pulled back a bit, then they stopped the Germans who planned to flood the Cologne Plain by blowing up the Schwammund Dam. "Our engineers defused most

Donnie and Mary Gustin of Pleasant Hill have purchased Special Occasions flower shop in Farwell from Karen Lovelace. Mrs. Gustin will be managing the business. She plans to rename the flower shop: "A Touch of Country."

"We'll be cleaning, and painting, and moving things around for a while. We'll be getting in helium for balloons next week, and talking to suppliers about other lines. So, we will be pretty busy for a while," said Mrs. Gustin.

"I love working at a flower shop because no two days are exactly alike. I never know what my day is going to be like when I walk in the door.

"This is a real happy business - we are always making somebody happy. We get to find out about all the babies being born, and the weddings, and the special occasions. We get to see all the good-hearted people who want to do something special for the people they love."

Planning the floral arrangements for weddings is one of Mrs. Gustin's favorite tasks. She enjoys helping the brides pick the types of flowers and types of arrangements that they want.

"One of the hardest things in this business is trying to give the customers just exactly what they want. Sometimes what we perceive that they want isn't exactly what they actually do want. We plan to take the time to find out just what the customer wants," she said.

911 resolution explained

A lady called the Tribune to comment on the last Farwell City Council meeting.

She said that Farwell residents have had the 911 number for about 2 years, and that she didn't know why the city council had passed a resolution on it at this point.

City Councilman Fred Chandler responded that the resolution passed by city council concerned Farwell joining a regional 911 calling service.

Each house and each address in the county would be assigned a number on a map or grid. When the 911 number was dialed, the emergency people could automatically lock on to the caller's

number, and it would show up on their grid. This would enable the emergency vehicle to answer the call even if the caller was unable to give his address.

It would be especially helpful in rural areas where addresses are routinely given as: "You go about 2 miles north, and 1/2 mile west, look for the trailer parked in the yard."

The regional 911 system would save time and confusion.

of it," says Roberts. "Our unit (78th Infantry) and 1st Infantry were the first to cross the Ludendorf Bridge at Remagen," says Roberts.

The German soldiers started surrendering in large numbers at that point. "Thirty thousand German prisoners marched in one day," says Roberts.

Roberts was in Marburg on VE Day. He went from there to Fritzlar to Hume nach Hof Gasmar to Berlin. Three days later he went to Bremen. At Bremerhaven he boarded the same ship he had taken to Europe.

"It was misty and rainy when we sailed into New York harbor, but Old Madame Liberty looked beautiful with the flood lights on her."

After the war Roberts went to college at East Central State in Ada, Okla. Then he moved to Levelland and Post, Texas before he settled with his wife in Friona.

Roberts put his war experiences behind him until 1984 when he was watching a TV program called "D-Day Plus Forty". The announcer

was talking about fathers and sons who lost their lives together on D-Day. The camera zoomed in to read the names on some of the headstones including one that said "Col. Oliver W. Reed."

"I got chills up and down my spine. Colonel Reed was my commanding officer at Fort Butner. I never knew what happened to him until I saw that. Both he and his son, Lt. Col. Oliver W. Reed died at Normandy," says Roberts.

The incident started Roberts wondering about what had happened to some of the other people he had known in World War II.

Roberts joined the 78th Division Veteran's Association and relocated some of his buddies through it. In 1984 one of the newsletters from the 78th division mentioned a name familiar to Roberts - Gaetano d' Ambrosio.

"There aren't too many people with a name like that, so I figured it had to be the same guy," Roberts wrote to d'Ambrosio on May 13, 1985. "The last time I saw the guy he was badly injured, and I thought he would be paralyzed for life. I took him

into the first aid station when he got shot up. I was surprised to see that he was still alive."

The next Monday Roberts got a phone call from Waterbury, Conn., from d'Ambrosio who recalled Roberts quite well. D'Ambrosio had spent three years recuperating in a veteran's hospital in Mas-

sachusetts where he met his wife. Roberts enjoyed the phone call from his Army buddy, but it meant even more when he found out that d'Ambrosio died on May 21, 1985.

Since then Roberts has contacted 25-30 people he knew during the war, and he attended a reunion in 1986.

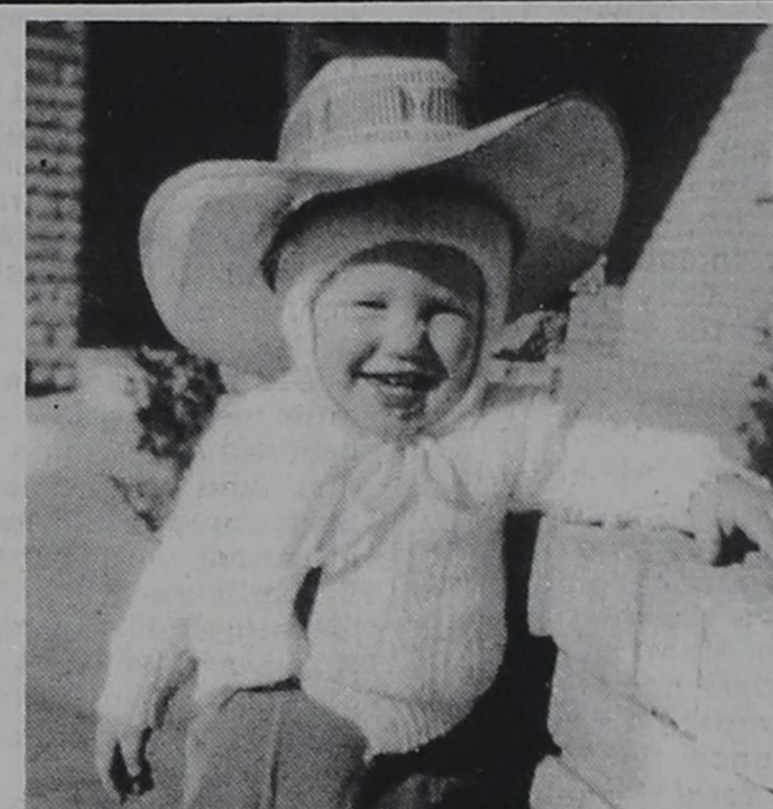

Louise Christian and Fern Bell accompanied their husbands on the trip.

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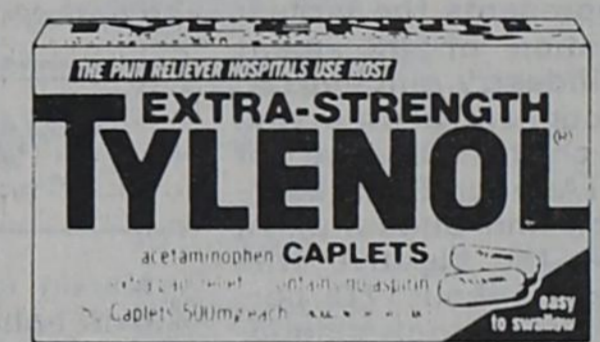

Excel part of 'Big 4'

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports that the four largest beef processors (IBP, Conagra, Excel, and National Beef) control 64 percent of the steer and heifer slaughter in the United States.

This represents the largest concentration of the meat packing industry since 1920 when a consent decree was imposed on the "Big Five" of that day (Armour, Swift, Morris, Wilson and Cudahy). At that time, the big five was slaughtering about 70 percent of all livestock slaughtered in interstate trade.

On June 17, the Farwell ambulance was called to a home east of Farwell. A patient was transported to Friona hospital at 7:01 p.m.

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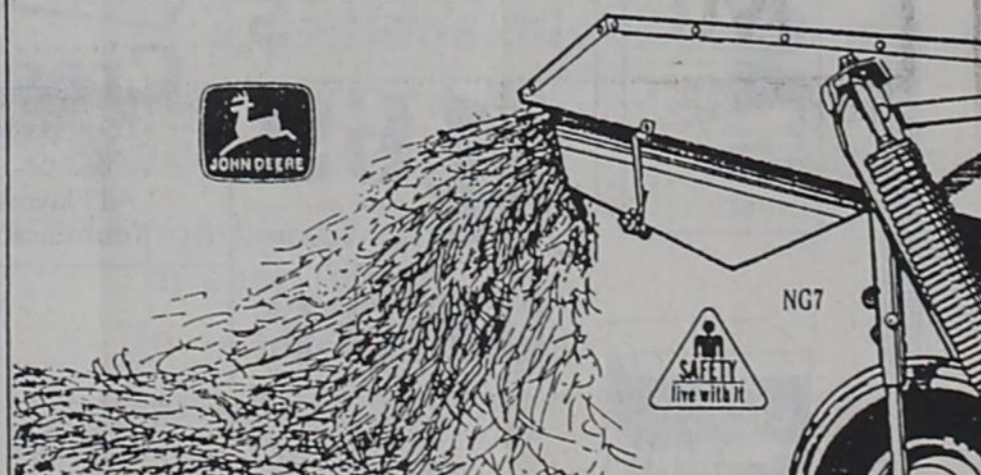
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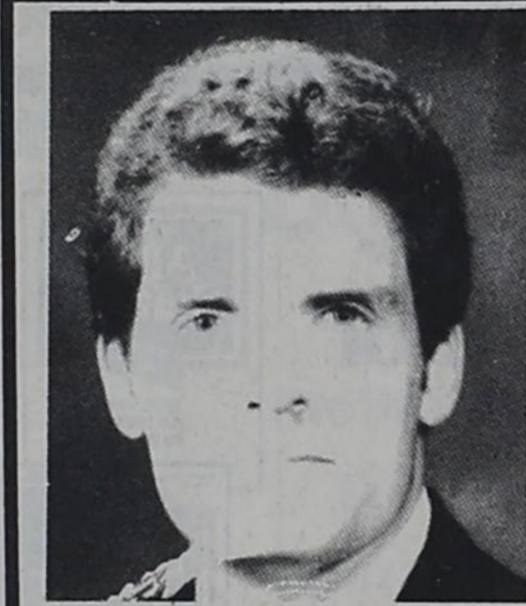

- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

Plan and shop for your weekend menu during the week so that you won't spend time at the supermarket when Saturday arrives. Select no-cook recipes and simple, light dishes that don't require a lot of preparation such as dressing up ordinary hamburgers by replacing the usual ketchup and mustard with an easy-to-prepare creamy sauce made with 1/3 c. low-fat plain yogurt, 2 T. ketchup and 1 T. pickle relish.

Cut down on the fat and calories of summertime salads and dips by substituting non-fat plain yogurt for mayonnaise and sour cream in your favorite recipes. In one-cup servings, non-fat yogurt contains only 110 calories and 0 grams of fat, while sour cream has 415 calories and 40 grams of fat and mayonnaise has 1,585 calories and 176 grams of fat. Instead of potato chips with the dip, try serving strips of vegetables such as zucchini, cucumbers, carrots, and celery.

Don't eliminate calcium rich dairy products from your outdoor menu because of perishability. Packing the meals in an ice-filled, styrofoam chest will keep these items fresh. If you don't have a cooler on hand, you can convert a wicker picnic basket by lining it with a large plastic bag and insulating it with a tablecloth. At the bottom of the basket add ice packs. When you pack your

meal, place the most perishable items closest to the ice.
