Russia an enigma

Now that the Moscow summit is over, it's time to take a look at the current status of the Soviet Union.

Since my grandparents lived in Russia, I've enjoyed studying the history of that unhappy nation.

As I wrote a long time ago, if Genghiz Khan - who I consider the greatest military conquerer of all time hadn't captured Russia back in the 13th Century, today's ball game would have been completey different.

But due to the Khan, and later the other Mongol conquerquer Tamerlane and his Golden Horde, Russia was cut off from the West. And instead of gradually growing into a social democracy as other European states did, Russian came of age as a cruel, totalitarian society.

And historians have always said that Genghiz Khan left

no legacy. Hal

My view today of Russia consists of a two-pronged approach. The Russian people generally are decent folks happy with their lot. Unfortunately, there's the military complex that rules with its Communist world-take-all philosophy.

Make no mistake about Mikhail Gorbachev's aims: he needs to reform Soviet society in order to build it up to continue with Lenin's world conquest aims. If that means one step militarily backward at this time, fine.

We should remember that each time Soviet propaganda comes through about "arms reduction" and "world peace." The Communists simply are buying time to strenghten the motherland. Once the Communists feel comfortable that their internal house is in order, then it will be back to supporting Communist revolutions around the globe.

This probably is a good time, though, to admit an error in judgment I made in a past column. I never thought I would see the Russians pull out of Afghanistan like they apparently are doing now.

I just assumed, based on past experience, that the Russians would kill the Afghan dissenters, leaving only a motley group of a few hundred thousand who would do as they were told. Stalin would turn over in his grave if he saw the way this situation was being handled.

I realize that the U.S.supplied Stinger missiles eliminated the Russian air advantage and helped the Afghan guerrillas maintain supremacy over the countryside. But I never thought Afghanistan, bordering the Soviet Union, would be such a problem for modern Soviet soldiers and weaponry.

Now, I know that the Afghans gave the Mongols some problems back when Genghiz Khan (whose real name was Temujin) was on the move. And, of course, the battles with the British in the late 1800s are legendary.

But we're talking 1980s. And the mighty Russian armed forces can't defeat a few thousand poorly-armed and trained fighters on horseback. I can't believe it. And the NATQ countries worry

about the Russians pouring across Western Europe? I give Gorbachev all sorts of credit for getting the heck out of Afghanistan. Considering

the circumstances, that's the smartest thing he could do. Most of all, though, I give credit to the Afghans. In order to take back their country from the Russian puppets in Kabul, they allowed the sacrifice of many of their people, including women and children, to Russian weapons.

That takes guts. The battle isn't over. But I feel pretty sure once the Russian soldiers retire completely, there is no way that their proxies can maintain control: just like how the

Texas A&M marches off to war

Bob Anderson was a 17 year old student at Texas A&M when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. He, like most of his classmates, volunteered for service.

"There were about 6,000 of us in my class; only about 600 were left in January 1942 - all of the rest of us volunteered to fight," said Anderson.

The Army sent Anderson back to A&M to complete some of his courses, then he reported to Camp McCall,

"They told us that we had volunteered for Airborne,"said Anderson. At Fort McCall, Anderson was trained as a glider pilot. Anderson remembers his training at Fort Mc-Call as an enjoyable experi-

"Actually, it was great fun for an 18 year old to play with real guns and to fly in an airplane," he joked.

Anderson fondly remembers the friends he made there. "At Christmas, they let the fellows who lived close to the camp go home to visit with their families. Because I was from Texas, I had to stay there. One Jewish fellow named Goldsmith offered to take my duty and give me his pass so that I could go home to spend Christmas with my family. I figured he needed to spend some time with his family, too, so I said 'no thanks,' but it shows the kind of great guys I was with," said Anderson.

One of the soldiers in Anderson's unit was "Mr. Fiddling Slim" Messer, who was a star on the Grand 'Ole Oppry.

"When we shipped out, all of us were carrying more gear than we could handle. There was Messer on the dock with all of his Army gear and a bull fiddle, too. The reporters had a field day," said Anderson. Messer and his friends often entertained with songs and jokes.

The reality of actually being part of a war sunk in as Anderson was crossing the Atlantic on the way to France. He and his unit were part of a convoy crossing the Atlantic. General Quarters sounded one night, and all hands had to report topside. They stood in the freezing January night and listened to ships near them being struck by torpedoes from

in France in April 1945.

a German submarine. Knowing there was grave danger, the men could do nothing about it.

In France, the glider pilots waited to be called into action. They spent most of their time training, guarding prisoners of war, and doing other support tasks.

The gliders were designed to be used very near enemy lines. They were towed behind a C-47 until they were in flight. Then, the engineless craft would soar over enemy lines to do recognizance or to drop the pilot behind enemy lines for some important task.

"We were supposed to be in the Rhine crossing. We were all loaded up and we were waiting to go when we found out that Patton and his Third Army troops were already 10 were supposed to land," said Anderson.

Anderson vividly remembers watching the preparations for the last big bombing raid on Germany in World War

"The sky was covered; as far as we could see there were planes. As they flew over, some of them started peeling off in different directions to go to their various targets. I've never seen so many planes in all of my life," said Anderson.

It was frustrating for the glider pilots to spend months training and planning for perilous duty, and then to sit back and wait. They amused themselves by enjoying the sights of Europe.

"The French were glad to see us back then. We really enjoyed our stay in France. I took my family back to visit a few years ago, and it is different now," he added whistfully. Americans are no longer the liberating heroes they were in 1945.

The report showed that 100% of the students in four grades (3, 7, 9 and 11) mastered mathematics. Strengths were also shown in the area of writing in grades 3, 5, and 11 with 94%, 93% and 100% of the students, respectively, demonstrating

On the narrative written composition, the highest rating of 3 or 4 was received by 67% of the third graders, while 93% of the fifth graders received the highest rating of 3 or 4 on their descriptive written composition.

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In language arts and math, 100% of the 11th graders demonstrated mastery. In reading, the third graders led the other grades with 94% mastering. Following closely the 5th and 9th graders showed 93% and 92% mastery, respectively, while 88% of the seventh graders mastered reading.

A three-year comparison shows significant improvement in the district's overall scores. The state originally encouraged districts to strive for 85% mastery. Lazbuddie students have exceeded the state's original expectations with an average of 90% or above at every grade level in math, reading, and

Beef checkoff program okayed

"We can now plan for the future and establish longrange goals for a more profitable beef industry," Anne Anderson, executive director of the Texas Beef Industry Council, announced May 27.

She made her remarks after the U.S. Department of Agriculture released the results of the producer vote on the beef checkoff program that was held May 10 around the nation.

The overwhelming passage of the checkoff referendum by the nation's cattlemen sent a strong message that they wanted to continue funding national and local projects of education, research and promotion of beef. Nationally, 78.9% of voters said the \$1 contribution each a bovine is sold is important in securing


