It may not be prevalent in rural areas like ours, but when Jamaican gangs set up headquarters in small cities like Charleston, W. Va., that tells me it's an epidemic.

And once a person is addicted, you are looking for the crime rate to increase rapidly. And a further breakdown of society.

Longtime readers may recall that I wrote awhile back that I didn't worry about the Russians being our main threat; it was drugs. We would fall from within, like the Roman Empire decayed before the onslaught of the Goths. My opinion is the same. Heck, the Russkis don't need to invade us, they just need to sit back and watch us destroy ourselves.

When you hear these politicians on TV emphasize the need for a War on Drugs, wait for them to add on how it should be fought. You'll probably hear a commercial in-

Welcome center site acquired

Charles Wade, a real estate agent from Clovis who is an outreach aide of state Sen. Caleb Chandler, announced at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting that the state has purchased 4 acres for a Neww Mexico Welcome Cen-

He said 4.09 acres of the trainer. He got his wings near E.C. Clifton Campground site, a mile west of the Port of Entry, has been bought and that the welcome center should be built this year. It will have information on New Mexico for persons coming from the east.

Wade also discussed increasing the space for the new Port of Entry to be built. He said the state has acquired 10 acres next to the present site at the west end of Texico for a new building. The current one is outdated and an eyesore, he said.

He said the state also wants a site on the south side of the highway and bought 2 acres at the mill site, but it isn't enough room.

Wade suggested that four parcels of land be acquired those housing the J.J.'s Mobile Home Sales and parcels to its west. If this were done, Wade said, it would help clean up the area and also solve the problem of truckers taking 21st Street to avoid the current Port of Entry. He noted the problem of heavy trucks passing by Texico Schools.

Wade said that Texico now shines better than Farwell and people have been commenting on it.

Wade told the council, "I talked to Sen. Chandler and he feels that if you will write letters to the state highway commission, it might help."

The council voted to do so. In other business, the council discussed the proposed City Hall project.

Warren Pendleton, the architect, wasn't able to be present but had left a note asking if the council wanted to include the senior citizens in the new building plans, and if any special rooms, storage, etc., were to be included.

The council, in general discussion, suggested separate offices for the clerk, marshal and judge; a shop area with an office for the water superintendent; a foyer; a separate meeting room; a multipurpose room for community events; and a kitchen.

The council was unanimous in agreeing that the senior citizens meeting room should be part of a new metal building.

Councilman Steve Chancy said that it would mean maintaining two facilities if the current senior citizens center were left out of a new City Hall.

It was noted that a state grant had been received on the present center, which has 3 years left on it. But it was felt this wouldn't be a drawback to current plans.

Councilman Doyal LaRue suggested little landscaping, since it was a costly maintenance item, and favored a concrete parking lot.

Further discussions will take place with Pendleton, who is drawing up tentative specifications.

The council also:

- Approved a new budget, including 3 percent pay hikes for city employees. The budget is a shade higher than the current one, said Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian.

- Approved a revised water and sewer ordinance (the legal ad is elsewhere in today's newspaper). It goes into effect July 1.

- Heard Mayor John R. Hadley say he will contact Max Carter about installing a new sewer between State and State Line Road for \$2,942. This is an emergency due to raw sewage in the

- Approved a motion saying that the council not act on variance requests unless they go through proper channels. At the last meeting, requests were approved without past procedure being followed due to a misunderstanding. Also, copies of the procedures will be given applicants in the future.

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





a choice: he could go to El Paso as an instructor pilot, said Helton. or he could go to Salt Lake City to join a combat unit. His request to go into combat at night," he said. was granted, "I'd rather fly a bomber in combat than train somebody - it's safer," he said.

The Army Air Corps sent him first to the Central Instructors school for four engine bombers in Tennessee. Then he went to Hamilton Field, Calif., to join a crew. His crew was sent to Langley Field, Va. where he trained to do low altitude radar bombing. "Radar was top secret then," Helton explains.

"Every time we'd make a move, it was supposed to be secret. Our orders said that our family would not accompany us. When we rode the train from Blythe to Hamilton Field, we came to a little train station called Black Point, Calif. The town was about the size of Texico. Next to the station was the Black Point Inn, a rooming house.

"When we arrived we notices some ladies standing on the patio. Dardanella and some of the other wives had beaten us there even though they weren't supposed to know where we were going to be." Helton said with a smile.

When his crew finished its training, they got a brand new B-24, and flew to the Island of Owie in the Celebees illo after the war where he northwest of New Guinea.

He joined the 63rd squadron, 43rd bomb group of the 5th Air Force. "We did night bombing at about 12,000 feet. We'd drop bombs on the shipping lanes. I had about 300 hours of night combat missions," he said.

Helton switched to the A-3 intelligence unit of the 43rd bomb group. He was at Clark Field in the Philippines when the first atomic bomb was dropped.

"We had all heard rumors about the atomic bomb, but they were just rumors until the first one was dropped. We know that the Japanese were warned that we would be using a terrible weapon on them, but they did not believe us until we did," said Helton.

Helton saw B-29 bombers

"We were pilots in the train- like the ones used to drop the atomic bombs, but the ones he had seen had dropped ton was in San Marcos when incindiary bombs on Tokyo

> Twelve days after the peace treaty was signed, Helton flew to an air base near Osaka with I Corps ground units for the army of occupation.

> Helton stayed at Osaka until Thanksgiving. "The Japanese were very submissive. They treated us very well. and they said they were there to serve us. We didn't try to mistreat them in any way. They gave us good food and treated us like guests," said Helton.

Helton felt uneasy during his stay in Osaka. "Even now I feel that they were treacherous. I couldn't relax because I always wondered what they would do," said Helton.

Helton explained that his uneasiness stemed from the facts that the Japanese had carried out the sneak attack at Pearl Harbor, had ignored the Geneva Conference regulations about the treatment of prisoners of war and used kamikazee tactics and other suicide missions.

"We would tell them, 'If you do this, we'll do that.' We used no element of surprise. They knew what we would do, but we never knew how they would react," said Helton.

Helton returned to Amarworked from Broom Electric.

"There was no job waiting for me when I got out, and there was no parade, either. I applied to TWA as a pilot, but they told me I was a Johnnie Come Lately.' There were more combat pilots than they needed for commercial routes in those days."

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
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
Liberty students honor Horne

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

City of Texico

Ordinance No. 240

An ordinance pertaining to public utilities; prescribing the rates to be charged for water and sewer services; prescribing penalties for violation of certain provisions; and amending prior ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico:

Section 1. Recitals. It is hereby determined by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico, that the rates presently being charged for the furnishing of water and sewer services are not sufficient to defray the cost of furnishing and maintaining such services, and that an increase in the rates to be charged to users of such services should be increased. It is further determined that the rates set out in this ordinance are sufficient to defray the cost of operation of the utility services delineated in this ordinance, with no excessive revenues being generated by any such rate increases for transfer to the general revenue accounts of the city.

Section 2. Water Rates Established. All prior ordinances of the City of Texico, New Mexico, are hereby amended so as to establish the following rate schedule for water uses for those customers having access by water supply lines:

Minimum Gallonage Required charge monthly for a

minimum usage or 4,000 gallons for

city users (i.e., these users located

within the city limits of Texico.)

Rate Charge \$8.50 per month

Required charge monthly for minimum usage of 4,000 gallons for non-city users.

\$12.80 per month

For each of the next 2,000 gallons of water actually used monthly by gallons either city or non-city users.

For each 1,000 gallons used by

fifty cents (.50) per 1,000

ninety cents (.90) per 1,000

either the city or non-city users gallons monthly, in excess of 6,000 gallons.

Section 3. Bulk Water Rates, Rules and Guidelines.

a. No water from the city water supply shall be turned on by any person other than the superintendent of public works or some other person authorized by him to perform this service. b. In the event any person or entity wishes to obtain water from the

city water supply by any means other than the regular service provided hereinabove, such person or entity must obtain prior approval of the city superintendent of public works and meet any requirement of such superintendent to insure proper payment for such service and supply. c. The rate for such use shall be Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each

1,000 gallons of use, with a minimum fee of \$10.00 for each tap of the d. Any violation of this Section shall be punished by a fine not

less than \$250.00 nor more than \$500.00 or by imprisonment for not less than 90 days of both, and each occurrence shall constitute a separate offense

Section 4. Sewer Rates Established All previous ordinances are

amended to establish the following rate schedule for sewer uses: A minimum user fee of \$4.00 shall be charged. For each outlet exceeding a minimum of four (4), an additional fifteen cents (.15 cents)

per outlet shall be added to the minimum fee. Section 5. Applicability. This ordinance shall apply to all individuals, corporations or other entities operating in the city limits of Texico, New

Mexico, or using the systems described herein. Section 6. Effective Date. This ordinance is effective on July 1,

Section 7. Repealer. All ordinances, or parts thereof, that conflict herewith are hereby revoked and this ordinance is substituted.


