Joni Autrey of Capitan, N.M., is one of the three stars of the of the 1988 Borden Gang. She is the daughter of Johnny and Vickie Autrey of Ruidoso, N.M., and she is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lee Richardson of Texico and E. E. Autrey of Grants.

Joni, 9, is a 3rd grader at Capitan Elementary School. She is a talented performer who has studied piano and dance. Joni is a natural singer. Her ambition is to be a country and western star following in the footsteps of her favorite singer, Reba McIntyre.

Joni apparently comes by her talent naturally. "When I was two, I started singing along with the car radio and my mom helped me with the words." The winner of last year's New Mexico Pre-Teen pageant, she has sung on television and also appeared at the 1987 Albuquerque Balloon Festival.

Time to register for bike contest

All area youngsters are reminded that registration starts Monday for the Border Town Days Decorated Bike Contest at Texico City Hall.

"Everything is ready at the city hall in Texico for registration," said Ann Cooper, who is in charge of the bike contest.

The registration deadline is 3 p.m. Texas time Friday, July 29.

She said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, if they are to be eligible for the cash prize to be awarded.

Prizes totaling \$50 will be awarded. No motorized bikes will be allowed in the parade.

All riders must have their bikes at the empty lot west of the flea market at 9:45 a.m. Texas time, and line up for judging on the southwest corner of the lot. "You must be on time or you will not be judged," added Mrs. Cooper.

Other rules are: * All participants must continue to Farwell City Park, and then park their bikes. No riding will be allowed in the park area.

* You must be present at the park to receive your cash prize.

There will be two divisions in the judging:

Division A: Best decorated bike, ages 7-12.

Division B: Best decorated bike, ages 6 and under.

Judging will be based 50 percent on originality and theme; 30 percent on neatness, and 20 percent on use of color.

Sales tax receipts up, down

Texas State Comptroller Bob Bullock said payments to cities that collect local sales tax continued to show an increase this month with July payments up 14.3 percent over those sent in July last year.

The City of Farwell showed a 12.13% increase over the same period last year. The city also shows a 47.42% increase in sales taxes collected in 1988 over 1987. Part of this increase is caused by an increased city sales tax rate.

Bullock's report shows that Parmer County as a whole had a decrease of 15.23% in July sales tax collections this year over last, although the county is running 7.62% ahead of last year's collections for the year as a whole.

"The gaining strength of our state economy is being reflected on a local level, and local governments can continue to expect a steady increase in their share of sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Statewide, year-to-date payments are 10.8% higher than the same period last year, according to Bullock.

 Mrs. Barnes currently serves as President of the First Responders which is the medical unit of the Lazbuddie Fire Department.

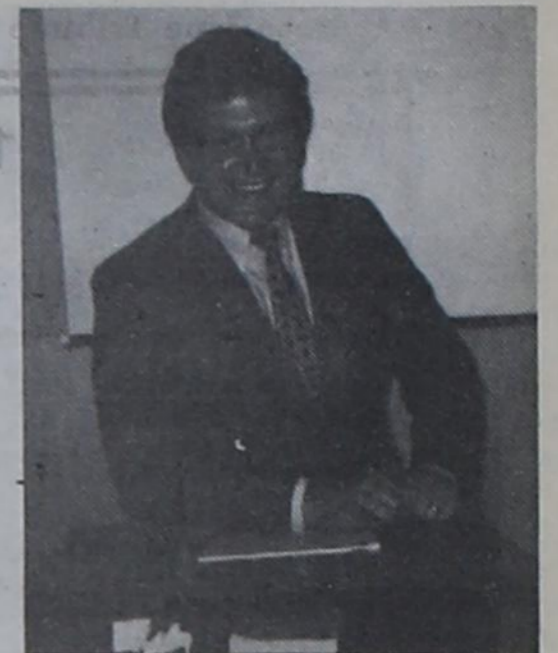
Twin Cities get a bit of rain

McClure story spotlighted danger of open water wells

With warm weather luring people outside for work and play, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 reminds area residents to become aware of the dangers posed by open, unused water wells.
 The consequences of having an open well was spotlighted last October when Midland toddler Jessica McClure was trapped 22 feet underground in an abandoned well for nearly 58 hours.
 More than 46,000 irrigation, municipal, and industrial water well permits have been issued by the Water District since 1953, says Ken Carver, High Plains Water District Assistant Manager.
 Most water wells range from 8 to 16 inches in diameter and are dangerous to humans and animals when left open. In most cases, open holes occur when individuals pull an irrigation pump and forget to plug the opening, Carver says.
 "The possible consequences of having open holes on your property outweighs the small amount of time it takes to close them. You can't justify having them out there," says Engineer Technician Obbie Goolsby, who has headed the District's open hole program since 1971.
 State law and Water District rules require that abandoned wells be properly covered. District rules define an open or uncovered well as "any artificial excavation constructed to produce water from the aquifer, which is as much as 10 feet deep and not less than 10 inches nor more than 6 feet in diameter."
 These rules also require that the well be closed or capped with a covering capable of sustaining a 400 pound weight. This cap should either be permanently attached to the casing or have a permanently attached weighted pipe which extends no less than 3 feet into the casing. The cap attached to this pipe should be large enough so that no opening will occur if the cap is shifted from side to side.
 "It costs between \$30 and \$60 to build a steel plug to seal an abandoned well," Goolsby says. "The Water District makes these plugs, and we'll even haul them out to the hole if the landowner doesn't have a vehicle to handle it."
 "We're not in the business to make a profit selling plugs. We install them at our cost. Our main concern is safety and getting the hole covered. We don't want any more open hole accidents like Jessica's to occur," Goolsby says.
 District personnel discover some open holes during their activities in the field. Others are brought to the District's attention by phone calls from the public. "Surveyors will note these open holes, and hunters are very conscientious about notifying the Water District when they find open holes during hunting season," says Goolsby.
 When an open hole is confirmed by the Water District, the well location is marked on a map. The landowner and operator are then informed of the situation and given a reasonable amount of time to correct the situation. If the

open hole is not properly covered by the landowner, then the Water District may take legal action to close the open hole.
 "Landowners have really cooperated with us to get these holes closed," says Goolsby. He noted that 59 open holes were reported to the Water District after the Midland accident.
 Smaller open holes have received increased attention since the Midland toddler's entrapment in an eight-inch casing. While Water District rules do not specifically include these casing widths, Goolsby says they cannot be ignored.
 "If you have an open hole and someone decides to get rid of some old chemicals by dumping them into the hole, the chemical will go into the aquifer and pollute the underground water supply. The Water District has been charged with the task of protecting the groundwater quality and can require the small hole to be closed as a possible avenue for a pollutant to enter the aquifer," he says.
 Open hole sites located within the 15 county High Plains Water District service area may be reported to Goolsby at the District office, 2930 Ave. Q, Lubbock, Tx. 79405 or by calling (806) 762-0181.

Some plants show brown spots on the leaves which are probably ascochyta or wet weather blight. Hot dry weather will take care of most of that.
 He also reports that much of the corn in Parmer and Bailey counties is now tasseling, with some beginning to silk. He suggests that farmers monitor closely for western corn rootworms which are yellow beetles with three black stripes down the back.

Farwell council to check into liability question

The Farwell City Council agreed Tuesday to check into liability insurance before going ahead with hiring a security guard or police officer for the city.

No decision has been made yet on what type of security coverage to have. It will depend on what the city can afford. It can range from having a night watchman, who would have no police powers but could contact the sheriff's department is something suspicious is seen, to an officer with full police responsibilities, to someone who is shared with the county sheriff's office.

Attending the meeting were two candidates: Marion Morgan and Robert Herrington.

Herrington, 32, is a native Californian who has bought a home in Farwell after living in Clovis on and off for 15 years. He has no law enforcement experience but has been an Emergency Medical Technician and volunteer fireman. He and his wife have three children.

Morgan is now living in Texico with his wife and two children. He is a New Mexico certified officer and recently worked for the Aztec Police Department for 2 1/2 years. The county then organized a special force, which he joined but it was disbanded.

So Morgan moved to the Twin Cities and is seeking a police officer's post. He is a friend of Brent Byrum, Texico city marshal. He said that if he passes a week-long Texas course, he could be certified in Texas.

The council will meet Friday (today) to further discuss the insurance questions.

In other business, the council:

- Approved having High Plains Pest Control spray trees for insects at the city park, cemetery and fire station.
- Denied a building permit for a boxcar in the 600

block of Fourth Street. Several neighbors opposed it and the plan commission recommended against it.

- Decided against joining Sam's Wholesale Club at \$25 per year. The consensus was that local shopping was preferred.

- Agreed to sell three lots in the 100 block of Eighth Street (see legal ad in today's paper).

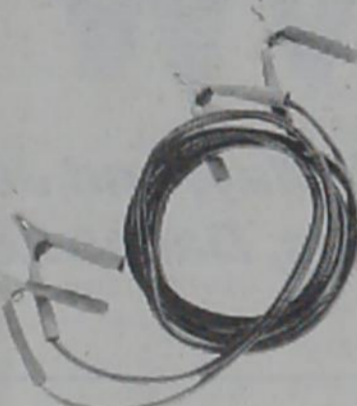

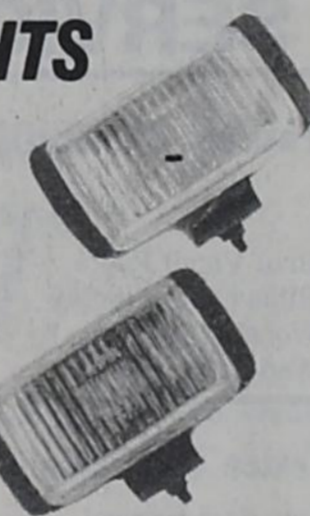

Actkinson elected 'County Attorney'

Jeff Actkinson represented Farwell High School at Boy's State in Austin last month.

Boy's State is conducted by the American Legion to teach youth about how government works.

Young men were elected to city, county, and state positions. They then learned about the jobs to which they were elected. Actkinson was elected the County Attorney while he was there.

He knew a lot about the job because his father is an attorney, but he learned a lot about some of the other aspects of politics. "I was really surprised about how the political parties work, and how they run the convention," said Actkinson.

Actkinson felt confident that some of the students he met at Boy's state would wind up in politics at some point in their lives. "The one who was elected governor last year changed his major to political science after just one week at Boy's State. He'll probably

go into politics when he graduates," said Actkinson.

The Texico-Farwell Rotary Club helped sponsor Jeff's trip to Boy's State. He flew with 25 others from the Amarillo area to Austin where the group swelled 958 people from all over Texas.

"I really enjoyed it. I learned a lot about the political system. It was a lot better deal than anybody knows about," said Actkinson.

Part of the experience included visiting the state capitol and meeting some of the officials. "I met Bill Sarpaulis and saw his office," said Actkinson.

Boy's State met on the University of Texas, Austin campus. "The only thing I would change is getting up at 6 a.m. and running to the stadium to exercise," said Actkinson.

In spite of the exercise, Actkinson would still tell his friends to: "Jump at the chance to go."

Pleasant Hill pheasant hunt may have to be cancelled

The Pleasant Hill Fire Department met on July 19 to discuss the possibility of cancelling its annual pheasant hunt.

At the end of the meeting, the consensus of the group was that if area corn farmers do not get permission from the EPA to use the pesticide Azodrin, there will be no Pleasant Hill Pheasant Hunt this year.

"Our fire department only has about a dozen members, and over the past several years we have raised most of the money for the building and the three vehicles out there through our pheasant hunt," said fire chief Richard Kelley. "The farmers in this area are the ones who have backed us on our pheasant hunt by letting us use their land. Without them, we would have no hunt. We feel like we have to back them now that they need us."

The members of the fire department also proposed that a petition be circulated among area farmers in Curry and Roosevelt counties in New Mexico, and Parmer County in Texas to find out which farmers will actually post their land to keep hunters out.

They also urged those people who were present to write or call their representatives in the government who might help pressure the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) to grant an emergency Section 18 permit which would allow the use of Azodrin to control spider mites and corn borers.

Gary Singleterry, who chaired the meeting, said that the average hunter in last year's

hunt killed about 2 birds. The hunters spent about \$200 per bird on the local economy between their hunting licenses, motel rooms, food, transportation, and hunting equipment. He estimated that all of the hunters in Curry County probably brought about \$150,000-\$300,000 into the local economy.

"That sounds like a lot of money, but it is a drop in the bucket compared to what our farmers stand to lose if there is a bad outbreak of spider mites," Singleterry added.

Spider mite populations increase in hot, dry weather. They can destroy a corn crop in a very short time. If substantial damage were done to area corn because of an infestation of mites, the loss would be measured in millions of dollars, not thousands of dollars.

Carl King, president of the Texas Corn Growers Association, and president of the American Corn Growers Association spoke to the group. In 7 of the past 8 years, the Texas Corn Growers have successfully gotten section 18 exemptions for Texas farmers to use Azodrin. They were turned down by EPA last year, but luckily the weather was cool and wet last year. They have also received one turndown from EPA this year.

"I have an appointment in Washington, D. C. next Wednesday to talk to EPA officials about getting a section 18 permit to use Azodrin on corn in the Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma coun-

ties that need it the most. I'll be meeting with one of the higher echelon officials at EPA. It's been my experience that the higher up you go, the better the chance you have of getting an exemption from EPA," said King.

Azodrin has already been cleared by EPA for use on cotton, peanuts, sugar cane, peanuts and tomatoes.

King stressed that local farmers need all they help that they can get to make a good crop this year. This year has the potential for being one of the most important crops in many years.

King, who has recently visited corn farmers in Michigan, Ohio and Illinois, said that the consensus of the farmers he had talked to in the Midwest believed that they would only make about 45-55% of their normal crop this year due to the drought in those parts of

the country. He pointed out that the surpluses of grain that our nation has known in the past may not be there in the future.

"Our government sold 175,000 metric tons of corn to Russia last week at \$1.85 per bushel, which is less than it costs to produce it. There was \$1.27 difference between the Board of Trade price and the sale price," said King.

The drought and the grain sale both lessen the surplus of grain in the U.S., and may increase the value of the corn our farmers produce this year.

King urged those present to call their senators and representatives or send Mailgrams to urge them to pressure EPA to grant the section 18 waiver on the use of Azodrin for corn.

It is not the intent of the Cooperative in this filing to change (either by increase or by decrease) the rates currently being charged to Texas members. However, this filing does reflect changes in rates authorized in the Cooperative's local exchange tariff that is currently on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Also, if the Commission accepts the proposed filing, the Commission will no longer regulate monthly charges for extension wiring and certain equipment leases.

The proposed monthly access line rate for Private Pay Telephone Service is \$17.50 in the East Glenrio, Farwell and Pleasant Hill exchanges and \$16.50 in the Bellview exchange. Through this filing, the Cooperative is also revising its tariff to reflect the elimination of monthly charges for extension wiring and the sale to customers of telephones and certain other equipment previously leased from the Cooperative.

The proposed changes will not cause the Cooperative's revenues to increase. Interest rates reduced
