




Lyndon Fiddles While **Vietnam Burns**

President Lyndon Baines Johnson is fiddling, while American soldiers are dying in Vietnam. Continually defining our objectives as "limited," the President has refused time and time again to order a knockout blow against North Vietnam. He has instead pursued a policy of "gradual escalation" as he calls it, ignoring the advice of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and allowing over 13,000 deaths among American forces in Vietnam,

As early as March, 1965, the Joint Chiefs of Staff had recommended a "sharp, sudden strike" against 94 targets in North Vietnam, but were overruled by the Johnson administration. According to General John P. McDonnell, Air Force Chief of Staff, the original concept of the Joint Chiefs of Staff was "to go in there with a very severe application of manpower, destroying 94 targets in a total of 16 days." This then would have resulted in a paralysis of the enemy's capability to move equipment and to supply the Viet Cong in the South. Instead, the President chose to completely disregard the advice of the best military minds in the nation, and listen instead to his civilian advisors. As a result, the end of the war is still not in sight.

At a time when the North Vietnamese were just starting to build SAM missile sites, it was recommended that the United States deliver a knockout blow against the installations. The President fiddled once again, and as a result, air attacks against the North are now much more difficult, resulting in the loss of hundreds of aircraft, many to SAM missiles.

These are only two examples of indecisive fumbling which have contributed to the rising American death toll in Vietnam. Time and time again, the President has refused to listen to experts on military matters, listening instead to the man who thought the Edsel would sell, and others like him, who have advised against winning this war. Despite glowing optimism from official sources, we are no closer to ending this war than we

were three years ago, all because the administration has lacked the nerve to back up our men in Vietnam.

Somebody should tell the President, that there is no such thing as a limited war. Ask the wife of a soldier killed in Vietnam about that. She will tell that this war is a total as any war ever fought.

Never before in the history of man (Korea excepted), has a nation gone to war without the intention of winning it. Victory is the only worthwhile objective of war, anything less wastes the lives of the men who have fought it.
