Lyndon Fiddles While Vietnam Burns

President Lyndon Baines Johnson is fiddling, while American soldiers are dying in Vietnam. Continually defining our objectives as "limited," the President has refused time and time again to order a knockout blow against North Vietnam.

As early as March, 1965, the Joint Chiefs of Staff had recommended a "sharp, sudden strike" against 94 targets in North Vietnam, but were overruled by the Johnson administration.

These are only two examples of indecisive fumbling which have contributed to the rising American death toll in Vietnam.
