No room for errors

What do you call someone who earns his pay by looking for someone else's explosive devices so that he can take them apart?

The U.S. Navy teams that do just that are called EOD. I used to joke that it stood for "Extra-Ordinarily Dumb," but the teams generally prefer the proper name, "Explosive Ordnance Disposal," and EOD team members have been more than earning their pay in the Arabian Gulf.

Their responsibilities cover a wide range of areas. The large numbers of mines that were discovered by the minesweepers in November and December were destroyed by EOD teams. They have the training to simply destroy the mines with counter-charges, or to disassemble it bit by bit to discover a whole world of intelligence-related information. Where was it made? Is it a well-made explosive? Are there

weaknesses in its design that can be exploited? If a ship is hit by bombs or missiles that fail to explode, it is the EOD team that must disassemble the warhead and get it off the ship. The EOD teams are also used around the world to dispose of terrorist bombs. That is where the EOD

gets the phrase, "no room for errors". The fusing device for the explosive charge is a complex and delicate piece of equipment, and there are any number of varieties of designs, modifications, and inconsistencies. Plus, there is always the possibility that the fuse has been "booby-trapped" to explode if it is manipulated. Any slip or

any mistake is fatal. The officers of the EOD teams form the newest warfare community, which is called Special Operations. They specialize in explosive ordnance disposal, mine countermeasures, expendable ordnance management (EOM), and

All EOD officer and enlisted personnel begin with 12 weeks of diver training at Panama City, Fla. After they qualify

as divers, they proceed to 10 weeks of training in the tools and procedures involved in setting and disarming explosives. The final 26 weeks are filled with learning the specifics of U.S. and foreign ordnance, including all kinds of land mines, anti-ship mines, projectiles, missile warheads, torpedos, and any other type of explosives.

Arabian Gulf operations are unpredictable. Ships are escorted to Kuwait and then back again. Tankers are attracted from boats or by jet bombers as the Iranian and Iraqi belligerents pursue their own missions in their own

secret ways. Each new breeze brings a mixture of threats, calls for peace, rumors of new weapons or tactics. And through it all. the EOD teams watch and wait with an air of detachment,

because they can be called to served again at any time.

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
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Rip's Western Wear began 45 years ago

Rip's Western Wear has been located at the same location on Wheeler in Texico for 45 years.

Rip's covers the ground floor of what used to be three different stores. There was a drug store on the corner, the shoe shop in the center, and the post office on the eastern end of the row of brick buildings which were built in 1910.

Even today the buildings still have the baroque metal ceilings and wide carved moldings which were popular at the turn of the century. The outside of the building features window treatments that were so popular 75 years

Rip Snodgrass (current owner, Roy Snodgrass's father) began the business as a shoe shop in what is today the center part of his store.

Rip had run a shoe shop in Wellington, Texas, where he also ranched. He agreed to trade for the store in Texico on the day that Pearl Harbor was bombed - Dec. 7, 1941. It was two years later before the Snodgrass family could move from Wellington to Texico.

Rip and Thelma Snodgrass and their family lived in the back of the shoe shop; they made repairs and sold shoes in the front of the shop. At first it was called the


"Electric Shoe Shop."

Shoes and leather goods were hard to get during the war years; leather products were rationed. There was a much stronger demand for shoes than there were shoes to meet that demand. Rip sometimes had the opportunity to buy odd pieces of old leather which he fashioned into sandals.

"People drove for miles to buy those sandals. They didn't care if the color was strange - they needed something on their feet," said Roy. Families with growing children often needed shoes for the children before they were entitled to more ration coupons. Even if they found ration coupons, they couldn't always find shoes to buy with the ration coupons.

Roy was just a boy at that time, but he was put to work in the family business. "I was put to work early. They had me glueing or staining or polishing shoes. As I got older I learned to do shoe repair," he said.

As time went on, the Snodgrass family expanded their business. Today their store

features boots, saddles, harnesses, and other leather goods in addition to all types of western wear.

"We don't make many leather items ourselves nowadays, but we do have the equipment to make things if we want to do it. We still tool names or monograms and designs on belts, and we have made chaps on occasion." said Roy.

Rip's devotes one whole room to its Wrangler jeans. It is the one place in the area where a person can buy a pair of jeans, and have them cut and sewn to the right length on the spot.

Recently Rip's has added a ladies' ready- to- wear Western department. They feature everything from silver ropers and fringed suedecloth shirts

to everyday plaid blouses.

"We draw our customers from a really wide area. We get ranchers and rodeo enthusiasts from way off who come in for specialty items that we carry," said Roy.

"We also sell a lot to feed lot employees who need tack and heavy duty clothes. Local farmers also come in for boots and hats and gloves and things," he added.

Rip's is a family business; in the past few years all of the Roy Snodgrass family has worked there. They currently have one employee who is not part of the family - Maxine Shaw of Texico.

"I've seen things go from the best of times to the worst of times in Texico, but I think that it is coming back now,"

said Roy.

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
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


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
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
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Cook hired as grid coach; 1% pay raises given

The system is needed July 1 when the rate hikes go into effect





Apple and Molassas Muffins

4 c. flour 3/4 c. molassas 1/2 c. packed brown sugar 1/2 c. butter or margarine,

softened 1/3 c. milk

2 tsp. baking soda 2 tsp. ground cinnamon

1 tsp. ground allspice 1 tsp. salt

3/4 c. pecans

2 eggs 3 large red cooking apples, peeled and diced

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Grease and flour 18 muffin pan cups.

In a large bowl, place all ingredients except apples and nuts; with mixer at low speed, beat until blended, constantly scraping bowl. Stir in apples and pecans.

Bake 25 min. or until a toothpick inserted in the center of a muffin comes out clean.

Cool on rack 10 minutes; remove from pans. Serve warm. just before baking.



Soil moisture deficits listed

Soil moisture deficits in the portion of Parmer County which lies within the High Plains Underground Water Con- ing, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist servation District's boundaries range from two inches to eight inches.

Pre-plant irrigation will be needed in most areas of the county to bring soil moisture levels up to field capacity for average or above average crop yields.

The plant root zone is drier than it has been in the past several years, according to data taken during the annual pre- plant soil moisture survey done by the Water District and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-

Two to four inches of water will be needed northwest of Bovina and south of Hub community. Four to six inches of water will be needed over most of the remainder of the county. Small portions of the northwestern, northeastern and southeastern corners of the county will require preplant irrigation of six to eight inches of water.

Moisture levels in the top foot are generally fair to good and should provide excellent

conditions for land preparation. While there may be sufficient moisture for plow-Mike Risinger is concerned that producers will be misled by these moist plow layer conditions. "Most fields are much drier below the 12 to 18 inch levels," he says.

Soil moisture conditions are measured at about 220 neutron tube sites throughout the Water District's 15-county service area. Soil moisture monitoring sites are selected to be representative of the soil type and farm management practices typical of the area.

Soil moisture availability and deficit maps are drawn by the Water District as a tool to give producers an idea of soil moisture conditions in their area. With this information, farmers can make better water management decisions and avoid over-irrigating or under irrigating in the spring.



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

Aphids to be topic

Warmer weather, combined with dry conditions means that the Russian Wheat Aphids will be increasing in area

Wheat producers are invitedd to learn more about the pest at two meetings April 19.

Soil moisture need evident

The amount of moisture stored in the soil at planting time is the best early indicator of potential crop yields, says Mike Risinger, Soil Scientist with the USDA-Soil Conservation Service.

If the top five feet of soil is filled with moisture before planting, producers can generally expect an exceptionally good crop. In contrast, if the soil is dry at planting time, below average yields may be expected.

Currently, the area soil moisture conditions are generally below average and pre-plant irrigation will need to improve

crop yield prospects. "Over the majority of the District, soils will need four to six inches of water to bring the top five feet of soil to field capacity for the upcoming growing season. A few areas will need only two to four inches of water to bring the top five feet of soil to field capacity for the upcoming growing season. A few areas will need only two to four inches of water, while small areas will need up to eight inches," says Risinger.

SCS personnel measured avail- (806) 762-0181. able soil moisture at 6-inch intervals down to five feet at more than 220 Water District neutron tube access sites during December, January, and February.

Data obtained from the survey was used to construct soil moisture availability and soil moisture deficit maps to provide area producers with an inventory of soil moisture conditions.


While Water district and **USDA-SCS** personnel attempt to get the most accurate soil moisture readings available, Risinger notes the soil moisture survey results are not error-free or absolute. He encourages producers to check the soil moisture conditions on their own farms before beginning pre-plant irrigation.

Producers who do not have enough irrigation water to keep up with a growing crop's increasing water needs may wish to use a pre-plant irrigation to fill the plant root zone soil profile to field capacity before planting.

If the top five feet of the soil profile is filled with moisture before planting, a third to a half of the total water needs of most field crops can be obtained from the reserve. This greatly increases the chances for producing an average or above average crop, Risinger says.

Producers are reminded that nature will provide some of the needed moisture. Risinger says it is important to catch and hold the moisture in place until it can soak into the soil. Research has proven that the use of furrow dikes to harvest precipitation is the single most cost effective conservation practice that the Texas High Plains producer can implement to increase crop yield profits.




