I.W. "Dutch" Quickel was a student at West Texas State in December 1941. When Pearl Harbor was attacked, he decided to volunteer for duty.

Finally, they were told that they could not get off in Louisiana because there had been a case of smallpox at the base. Instead, they were sent to Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

Step taken toward new City Hall

The Texico City Council took a step toward a new City Hall Tuesday by hiring an architect to prepare preliminary plans for it.

For several weeks, the council has been discussing the deteriorating situation at the present building. At first, the council planned to have an architect give cost estimates on renovating it.

But Warren Pendleton, a Clovis architect, said at the Tuesday meeting that state requirements say that if renovation is taken up, the building must be brought up to current standards. And he hazarded a guess that this would mean removing everything except the outside walls and roof.

Councilman Doyal LaRue said he had spoken with several folks about the situation and they favored a new structure. "I support a new facility over putting a new building in this old shell," he said. Mayor John R. Hadley agreed.

LaRue said one resident suggested a new City Hall be placed away from the highway and that ample parking be available. Also, it was suggested that the building have a large community room for showers, meetings, etc.

LaRue said he would like to see a new building on the north side of the highway. An area near the bank was suggested.

At the last council meeting, councilman Steve Chancy, who was absent Tuesday, suggested a building be placed the pool's maintenance. Also, just south of the current fa- a profit and loss statement cility. But the council seemed to oppose that idea due to space limitations.

The water tower park was mentioned as a possible site. But the deed calls for the land to be returned to its donors if not used as a park.

Councilman Bryan Kube said he would like the architect's plans to include a place for senior citizens and a large community room. Also needed are offices for the city judge, marshal and clerk.

The council hired Pendleton to do up to 30 hours work on a preliminary design for a building on up to five lots.

- Told City Attorney Duane Hamar to draft a water and sewer ordinance change to allow higher rates to be charged for persons buying bulk water, such as well

The suggested charge would be \$10 per 1,000 gallons, with a \$10 minimum purchase. Prior approval would be needed and fines allowed for violations.

- Tabled until the next meeting a discussion on raising water tap-in fees. Water Supt. Billy Hammit said the current rates are too low. He gave as an example the charge for a 3/4-inch tap-in is \$75 - while it costs the city \$163 to install it.

- Agreed to seek an appeal hearing of a Farmers Home Administration directive calling in a loan early. The city still owes FmHA \$22,700 for the fire station, and the original schedule calls for it to be paid off in three years. The FmHA wants all the remaining money now. If the city wins the appeal, it could get an \$1,100 discount on what is owed.

- Approved two mobile home permits, one at 803 Garwood for Clarence Sena, and one at Catherine and State for Boyd

Cates. - Hired Terry Bartley as pool manager. She was the only applicant who has a lifesaving certificate. The council also voted to charge 10 cents per user to help pay for must be turned in by the pool manager at the close of the season. Previously, the pool has opened each year in late May.

Paid the annual dues of \$287 to the Eastern Plains Council of Governments.

- Heard Kube report on a sewer blockage in the alley between State Line Road and State Street. He said raw sewage is running down the alley.

So the council voted an emergency situation and authorized Mayor Hadley to immediately find a company to replace the sewer line, which Kube said was in very bad shape.

Kube, since his home is on the line, abstained from the vote.

The board will await any comments from the community before finalizing its action at its June meeting.

Presently, the school day runs from 8:25 a.m. to 3:39 p.m. The new schedule calls for it to run from 8:15 to 3:49. Buses would run 5 minutes earlier.

Supt. John Grigsby gave principal Lynn Burton credit for putting together the new schedule. Each period would run 50 minutes, down from the current 55.

Some of the advantages of the new schedule are:

Mayor Chris Gikas reported to the Farwell City Council Tuesday on options involving better security in the city.

He doesn't envision the city having its own city marshal due to the high cost. It would equal more than 50 percent of the current city budget, he

Emphasizing this was still in its early stages, he said Texico City Marshal Brent

Gikas said he has talked with Texico Mayor John R. Hadley about the possibility of paying a share of Byrum's salary for part of his time and extra work in his off-duty

Gikas said Byrum would have to be certified in Texas and that the marshal is interested in doing so.

Another option would be to employ Byrum as a security officer in his time off from regular Texico duties. Gikas said he, as mayor, is em-Johnson, secretary. New board credentials. This would allow

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
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
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


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
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Texico girls 2nd in state meet

Quickel'

In December 1942 Quickel went to New York for a naval gunnery school. Then he was assigned to the 83-402 Coast Guard small cutter based in Miami to do patrol and convoy

"We didn't know it at the time, but there were some guys on the ship who monitored radio signals from the Caribbean and South America. We found that out later," he said.

Then his ship was involved in anti-submarine duty and convoy escort duty. In 1943 his ship was credited with sinking a submarine between Cuba and the Bahamas.

"We made one trip to EBAR on the west end of Cuba to pick up some parts. We didn't know it, but the radio wasn't working on that trip. Our base was trying frantically to reach us to tell us to report to New York. We rushed straight to New York, and then we had to wait six weeks before we were assigned to do anything. It was a typical hurry up and wait situation," he noted.

From New York his ship was loaded on to a much larger ship which carried 4 cutters on its decks to Ewe, Scotland.

"Here we were used for airsea rescue. We later found out that we were there to pick up surviving pilots who had been involved in the bombing raids of ball bearing factories in Schweinfurt, Germany," said Quickel.

"Then we were told to report to escort a British cruiser. It turned out to be an old paddlewheel job that had patrolled from Rangoon to Mandalay."

"We went through the slot between the Cliffs of Dover and and Cape Grisney. The British had developed radar, and theirs was more sophisticated than the German radar was. The British guns in place there had sheet of metal attached to them so that they would mess up the German radar."

Quickel's ship was then sent to Normandy. "At H hour on D Day we were just off Omaha beach to take wounded and dead to the hospital ships,"he said.

Normandy, but they do not always mention the storm that hit a few days later.

"On June 10th, the wind blew so hard that the anemome to take Dorothy back to ter on the British fleet flagship H.M.S. Ancon broke at 110 knots. We lost a lot of stuff in that storm. On our way back to England, we were strafed because some idiot turned on a search light."

During the next few months Quickel's ship went from beach head to beachhead delivering men and supplies and picking up wounded.

After a short period of rest and relaxation in London, the crew was assigned to work with SHAFE, which was then headquartered in London. "Our ship took dispatchers, couriers, and replacement officers across the English Channel. There were 12 ships making the voyages back and forth across the channel. We did that until SHAFE headquarters moved to Paris."

In December 1944, Quickel was assigned to a base at Poole, England while the rest of his shipmates went to Plymouth, England to prepare to go home. Two and one half months later, Quickel went to Plymouth to find his shipmates were still waiting to return to the States.

When they did get back to the U.S.A., Quickel enjoyed some leave time back home. It was during this leave that he met his wife, Dorothy. Later she traveled to New York where they married.

During the next four months, Quickel was assigned with the 3rd Naval District Intelligence at Ellis Island, where he spent most of his time guarding naval prisoners.

Quickel was then assigned to the U.S.S. Cobb, a Spanish American War vintage gunboat complete with a ram attached to the front.

He and his shipmates attended amphibious landing school and gunnery school in

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Long Island and New London, Conn. Quickel was on board the Cobb on VE Day.

Quickel was granted leave Farwell before he was to report to his next duty. Isaac William Quickel was born while they were here; Quickel was glad to see his first son before he left for his next

"I was assigned to the C.H. Muir APA 142. We made 7 round trips from Europe to Calcutta, India via the Suez Canal. We were in Calcutta when the Japanese announced they would surrender. From then until June 24, 1946, we spent our time hauling soldiers home."

Along the way Quickel saw many interesting sights including Hindu festivals in India and Ceylon (Sri Lanka today), cremations of bodies in India, and famous temples.

On one trip the Muir picked up troops in French North Africa and hauled them across the Red Sea to a conference in Cairo.

On another trip they were supposed to transport one of Chinese leader Chaing Kai-Shek's relatives. "She was afraid to step on the launch so a friend and I picked her up and lifted her in. It really made the diplomats upset," he said.

On another trip they transported 5,000 German troops home. "We could carry 10,000 if they slept in double shifts, but we only took 5,000 that time." He added.

After the trip to Germany, Quickel spent some time near Leghorn, Italy. "In 1946, the Italian Communists tried to take over the country. We were there to show force, and to evacuate people if it was necessary." he said.

He had two weeks of leave time near Florence, Italy where he was able to see the sights of the city including masterpieces by Michaelangelo, DaVinci and Cellini.

"We saw the cathedral

doors that Cellini made. We were told that they were the only bronze sculpture that goldsmith Cellini did. Years later, after the flood in Florence they found that the doors were actually made of gold. Today, the real doors are in a museum, and bronze replicas are hanging on the cathedral door."

Another interesting sight that Quickel saw was a military cemetery near Florence. The farther back he went into the cemetery, the older the gravestones were. When he was way back into the cemetery, he came to a concrete block building surrounded by graves from the 14th and 15th centuries.

"Suddenly a man in a white robe appeared. If he had said 'Boo' I would have thought that the place was haunted. Instead, he invited us into the building to see the old log and plaster church inside. He was a member of a Catholic order that kept the building up. He said that it was founded in 96 A.D. by Demetrius," Quickel

Finally, Quickel returned to the U.S.A. "We made one trip to Puerto Rico; we picked up the Puerto Rican National Guard in New Orleans and took them home. Then we went back to New York and Baltimore before we were discharged," he said.

Quickel and his Coast Guard shipmates had been needed

to transport troops and supplies. They were classed as essential personnel, so they were not allowed to leave the military until most of the other veterans had gone home. By the time he arrived home, the parades were over and most of the other veterans had already found jobs. Quickel decided to return to West Texas University to complete his degree.

In July, 1947 he began teaching in a G.I. school in Farwell. It was a job he kept for 5 years.

Today the Coast Guard is part of the Department of the Interior. During World War Il it was part of the War Department (now called the department of Defense). At other times it has been part of the Treasury Department.

"The U.S. Coast Guard is one of the largest police forces in the world. They stop smugglers, teach ship safety, run search and rescue missions, inspect piers and docks, and their big thing now is stopping drug smuggling," said Quickel.

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
