Bovina baseball program available

The Bovina Bronco Baseball Program is opening its program to all players in Farwell and Texico since there is not a program here this summer.

Bovina's program is operated by a board, and it is run under the same rules as the Farwell-Texico program has been in the past.

The program is open to all children from kindergarten-14 years of age. If there are enough interested people, there will also be a softball program.

T-ball coaches who had already picked a team may bring the whole team over to Bovina to play. They may want to practice as a team in Farwell, and play in Bovina.

Russian Aphid population is on the rise here

Parmer County Extension Agent Gary Patterson reports that the Russian aphid population is on the rise in the county. He predicts most wheat farmers will need to spray one more time this growing season.

Aphids can cause a 30-40% reduction in yield. Aphid infestation peaks before the flag leaf (the last big leaf before the head) comes out. So, farmers need to be very careful to check their crops now, and spray if necessary.

Extension agents Gary Patterson and Mike Blanton held meetings last week in Lariat and Rhea communities last week. In Lariat there was a small turnout, but in Rhea community several producers came. The agents took the producers out to fields to show them what an aphid infestation looks like, and how it differs from other pests.

"If anyone has any questions about aphids, they should just give us a call," said Patterson.

New city hall suggested

The Texico City Council Tuesday discussed whether City Hall should be remodeled - or another City Hall built.

Prior to the meeting, councilmen Steve Chancy and Bryan Kube had met with Clovis architect Warren Pendleton about proposed City Hall remodeling.

They said Pendleton indicated that the council was very low in its estimate about spending about \$30,000 for the remodeling. The cost could be twice that much or more.

The council isn't excited about spending a great deal of money on an old building. Also, state funds may be available to build a new City Hall. One suggestion was a metal building behind the current building, which would be torn down.

The council decided to hire Pendleton at \$50 an hour, with the cost not to exceed \$500, to review the remodeling specifications and give a specific recommendation to the council on what is more feasible: the remodeling - or new construction.

In other business, the council:

- Received two bids for the annual audit. De'Aun Willoughby of Melrose, N.M., bid \$2,200. Schonberger of Clovis bid \$17,00. Willoughby's bid was unanimously accepted.
- Discussed whether to amend the new city water and sewer ordinance so fees could be raised for persons coming to the city and taking water out. Currently, the fee is 50 cents per 1,000 gallons. Kube urged that this fee be raised. He suggested it should go to \$7.50 to \$15 per truckload, depending on the size of the truck. The topic will be discussed further at the next meeting. Also, water meter fees may be raised.
- Agreed to tape record future council meetings so as to prevent misunderstandings.
- Approved buying another load of cold mix for patching streets.
- Discussed possible future major expenditures so the next year's budget could be worked on. Ideas broached were \$25,000 for a street repair program, with streets to be worked on in order over a 5-year period similar to Farwell's, and \$8,000 for a used front end loader.
- Councilman Butch Tharp said some city equipment needs replacement.
- The council also adjourned to executive session to discuss salaries for city employees.
- Discussed landfill problems. Some residents throw heavy metal, such as appliances, into the "burn area" where they don't belong. The state monitors this. City employees will go to the landfill and pick up these items and put in a dumpster.
- Turned down a request by Alice Autrey to institute a stretch and tone class for more mature adults in the community center. She asked that a percentage of her receipts pay the rent. The regular fee is \$15 per day, which is too high for her to pay.

- Received a letter from Farmers Home Administration dealing with the \$22,700 still owed on the fire station construction. The note is due to be paid off in two years.

It wasn't sure what the letter said, and the indication was that the FmHA was giving Texico the chance to pay off the note (at 5 percent interest) early.

The council indicated it wasn't interested in paying it off early, noting that the funds used to pay it off come from the state. City officials will check further into the letter.

Pleasant Hill pheasant hunt in question

The Pleasant Hill Fire Department will be the site of an important meeting between a representative of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department and local citizens at 7:30 p.m. on May 5.

The Pleasant Hill Fire Department's annual Pheasant Hunt may be in jeopardy.

Gary Singleterry of the Pleasant Hill Fire Department said a study done in 1986 caused the Environmental Protection Agency to ban the use of Azodrin, a chemical used to control spider mites. Environmentalists allege that Azodrin harms pheasants and other game birds.

Many local corn producers believe that Azodrin is necessary to control spider mites which cause great losses to corn crops.

According to Parmer County Extension agent for agriculture, Gary Patterson, "Nothing being used currently is as effective as Azodrin," for control of spider mites. "The chemical company that produces Azodrin did a study that found that it didn't affect the birds, but the E.P.A. yielded to pressure from wildlife activists, and banned it anyway."

Patterson said Texas farmers have been unable to use Azodrin for the past three years. They have had to resort to using a chemical called Comite which must be applied before the corn tassel appears.

"The first time we get a hot, dry summer, (mites) will eat us alive," said Patterson.

During the last several years, New Mexico farmers have received temporary emergency licenses to allow them to use Azodrin. Last year the temporary permits were not issued. Because it was a cool, wet growing season, there was no major loss from the spider mites.

Singleterry noted that if the temporary permits are not issued, local farmers may post their land and stop pheasant hunting altogether.

"The loss of income from the pheasant hunt is a drop in the bucket compared to the losses due to spider mites," said Singleterry. "We want to convince the game and wildlife people to let us use Azodrin."

Last March the Pleasant Hill Fire Department bought 300 pheasant hens and some roosters to help build up the population of pheasants in the area. "We have seen some increase in the pheasants around here," said Singleterry.

Singleterry hopes that there will be a good turnout of interested people for their meeting on May 5.

Somewhere back in elementary school, most of us read the poem about the blind men and the elephant.

Each blind man touched one part of an elephant, and surmised from that one part that the elephant was a creature quite unlike what it really was.

One felt the tail, and surmised that the elephant was like a rope. Another touched the side, and surmised that the elephant was like a brick wall. A third felt an ear, and thought that the elephant was obviously like a fan.

Each generalized upon what he "saw," and each formed an opinion that was partially correct.

The term "going to see the elephant," has another meaning that is quite different. Stephen Crane used the term in "Red Badge of Courage" to mean going forward in a situation to face death. It implied a test of manhood, and bravery.

We started to write a feature article for our Memorial Day paper about World War II. As we started to gather information, it became clear that local World War II veterans had a variety of impressions about the last great war.

One man's war might be totally different from his neighbor's war. One man might have experienced nightmarish torture, and the next might have experienced interesting and often pleasant experiences. One man might have frozen in the North Sea while another sweltered on a tropical isle.

All of them faced the threat of death. All of them went to see the elephant in some sense or another during the course of the war.

Many common strands ran through the interviews: patriotism, love of country, pride in winning, a sense of accomplishment, a sense of growing up together with comrades in arms. Most expressed a feeling of shock upon leaving their quiet, small towns to join an immense modern war.

We interviewed people who live here today. Some of them grew up here, and some of them did not. What started as an article blossomed into a series of articles. The first will run next week.

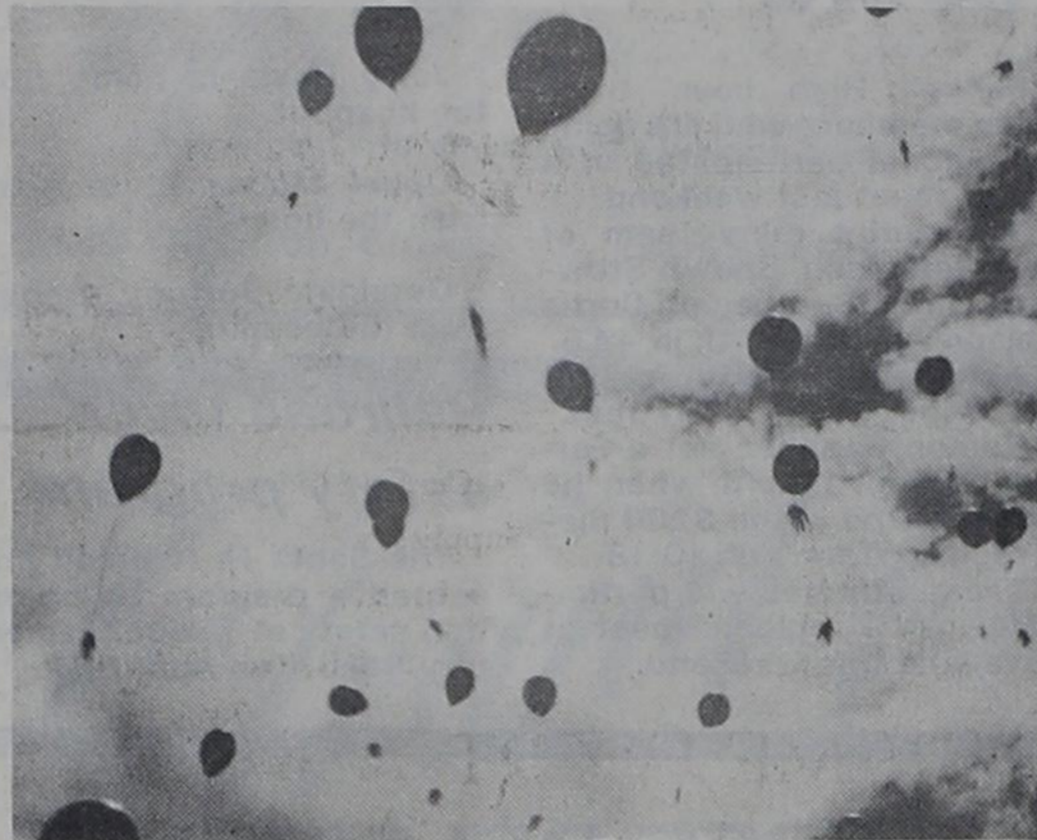

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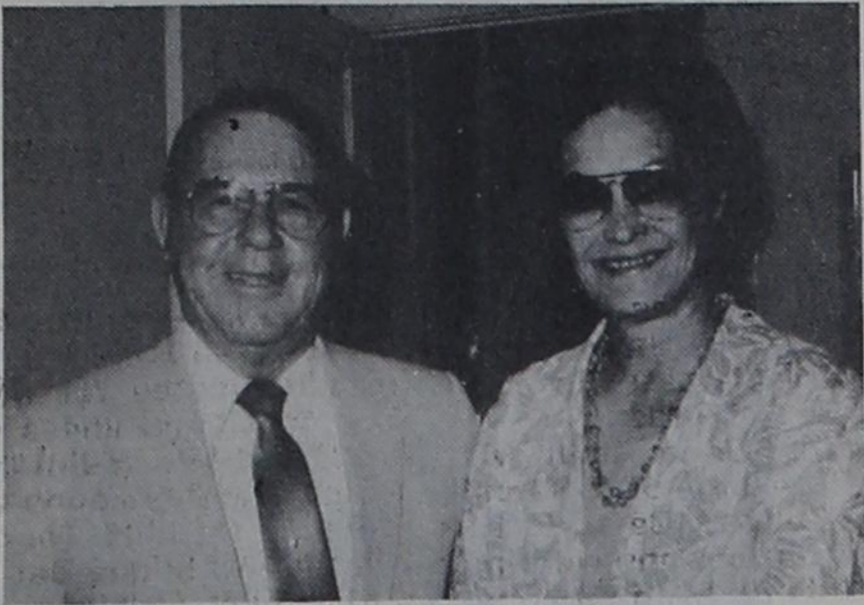
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Rev. Bob and Orvdie Burris

The following are several different kinds of recipe for punch: great for weddings, showers, and graduation entertaining.

Cranberry Sparkle
1/2 c. fresh cranberries
1 can frozen orange juice (6 oz.)
6 cups cranberry juice cocktail

Party Punch
1 16 oz. can pineapple tidbits
1 16 oz. package frozen whole strawberries
Sections of 2 peeled oranges
1 (12 oz.) can frozen orange juice
1 (6 oz.) can frozen lemonade
1 (6 oz.) can frozen limeade
1 (46 oz.) can pineapple juice
6 c. cold water
1-2 qts. club soda

Frosty Golden Punch
1 can frozen lemonade (6 oz.)
1 can frozen orange juice (6 oz.)
1 can frozen pineapple juice (6 oz.)
1 can apricot nectar (12 oz.)
1/2 c. lemon juice
1 quart lemon sherbert
2 quarts ginger ale, chilled

Reconstitute concentrated fruit juices according to package directions. Combine with apricot nectar and lemon juice in punch bowl. Yield 30 servings.

Magic punch
3-4 c. favorite mixed fruit punch
canned pineapple slices
maraschino cherries
1 c. unsweetened pineapple juice
1 c. orange juice
juice of 3 lemons
3 tbs. honey
1 quart ginger ale
1 quart ice cream

Partially freeze fruit punch. Arrange pineapple slices and cherries in ring mold. Spoon

fruit punch carefully over fruit. Freeze until firm. Combine pineapple juice, orange juice, lemon juice and honey in pitcher; mix well. Chill until serving time. Add ginger ale and ice milk; mix well. Pour into punch bowl; add ice ring.

Drain pineapple reserving juice. Arrange fruit in ring mold. Pour reserved juice carefully around fruit. Fill mold with cold water. Freeze until firm.

Mix concentrated juice and pineapple juice with 6 cups water in pitcher. Chill until serving time.

Pour into punch bowl. Add club soda and unmolded ice ring to punch bowl. Yield: 4-5 quarts.

Dirt Salad
1 package banana instant pudding mix (4 oz.)
1 can crushed pineapple (12 oz.)
2 c. miniature marshmallows
8-9 oz. whipped topping
15-20 crushed Oreo cookies.

Combine dry pudding mix and pineapple with juice in bowl; mix well. Stir in marshmallows and whipped topping. Spoon into bowl. Cover with crushed cookies. Chill until serving time.

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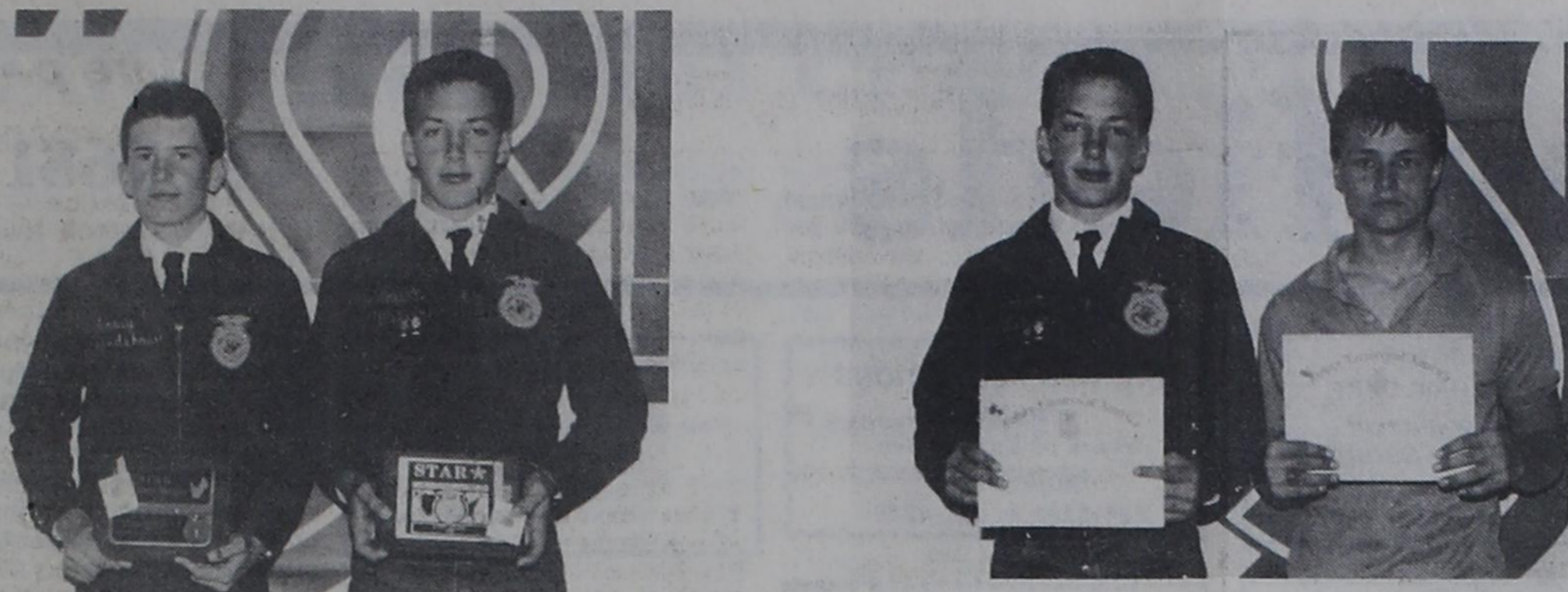

This filing recognizes the fact that East Glen Rio is the current name of what used to be the San Jon exchange and that Farwell is the current name of what used to be the Texico exchange. The proposed change may become effective on or before August 25, 1988. Customers will not be immediately affected by these changes except that the Commission will no longer regulate rates for monthly extension wiring and equipment leased by the cooperative. No rates (excluding charges for leased telephones and other equipment) will change as a result of this filing.

Through this filing, the Cooperative is also revising its tariff to reflect the elimination of monthly charges for extension wiring and the sale to customers of the telephones and certain other equipment leased from the Cooperative.

It is expected that the proposed changes will not cause the Cooperative's revenues to increase. All customer classes will be affected by the proposed changes. 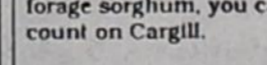

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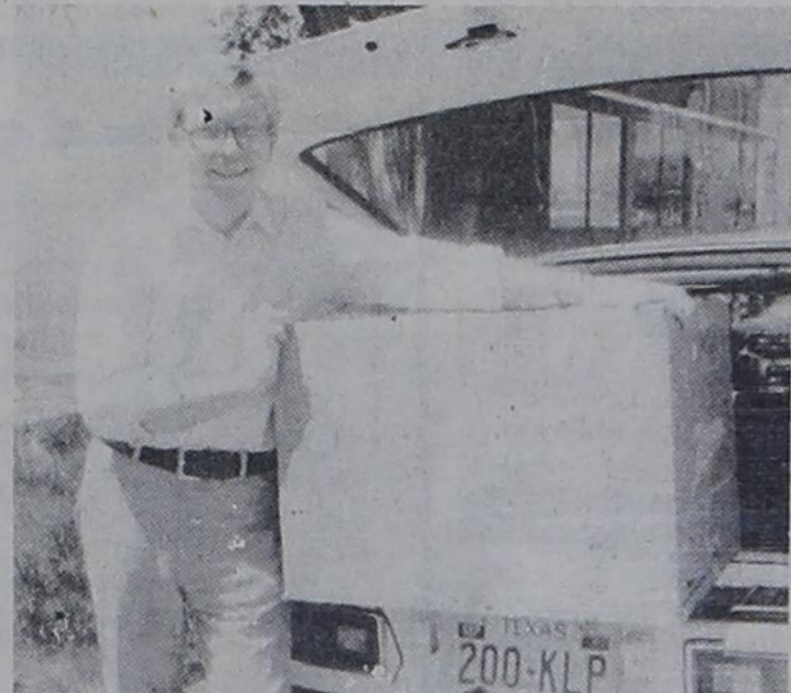

Board president Ed Sumrall was defeated by Larry Wallin, who was nominated by petition of members. This post represents Bellview, San Jon, Logan and Grady.

Incumbent Walt Eastland was unopposed for the post representing Santa Rosa, El Valle, Anton Chico, Trementina, Conchas Dam and Mosquero.

Incumbent Dee Perschbacher was unopposed for the post representing Clayton, Roy and Nara Visa.

Some statistics given included: 1987 income was \$13,828,989, up from \$11,956,563 in 1986; 9,310 members were receiving service, up from 9,147; average local revenue per access line per month in 1987 was \$20.23; average toll revenue per access line per month in 1987 was \$99.64.

ENMR officials noted that the system is now totally digital; they are still expanding into areas without service, and no rate increases are anticipated.

Plaques were given to two board members: Gilbert Ortiz for 10 years service, and Bruce Runyan for 15 years service.

Four by-law changes were approved:

- Allowing the annual meeting to be held between Feb. 1 and Aug. 1. Previously, they had to be held between April 1 and Aug. 1.

- Giving a better explanation

on the number of members needed to sign a petition for a member to be nominated and the date it must be received by to be placed on the official notice.

- Dealing with the disposition of capital credits and unclaimed property.

- Providing benefits of indemnity insurance to directors, officers, employees and cooperative agents.

A report was given on ETSC, which is owned by ENMR but was set up to provide services that ENMR can't. Sales have risen from \$234,000 in 1985 to \$487,000 in 1986 to \$1,184,000 in 1987.

The speaker was Roger Hutton, head of a telecommunications firm in Dallas that works for ENMR. He said that ENMR uses the latest technology available, including digital switches and fiber optics.

After the meeting many door prizes were awarded. The main one, a TV set, was given to John Getz of Farwell.


