Jones served aboard submarine tender

"What do you want to interview me for? I didn't win that war by myself," said Joe Jones of Farwell when he was called for an interview about World War II.

Jones served on the U.S.S. Sperry, a sub tender during World War II. It was named for the man who invented the gyroscopes that guided torpedoes. The Sperry's crew was responsible for maintaining and repairing, and resupplying submarines.

"We cleaned and repaired the torpedo tubes and loaded new torpedoes onto the ship," says Jones of his work.

"I don't know if I loaded on any torpedoes that sunk any ships, but the subs came back to port with tiny Japanese flags painted on the side when they did sink a Japanese ship, and lots of them had flags."

Jones received his sub tending training in Brainbridge, Md. Then he spent part of the war tending submarines at Pearl Harbor, and part of it near Guam.

"Our ship was all loaded and ready to go to Japan, but we never did get there," said Jones. The use of the atomic bomb at Hiroshima and Nagasaki stopped the invasion which would have taken a terrible toll of American lives.

Life on a sub tender was more comfortable for the sailors than life on a submarine was.

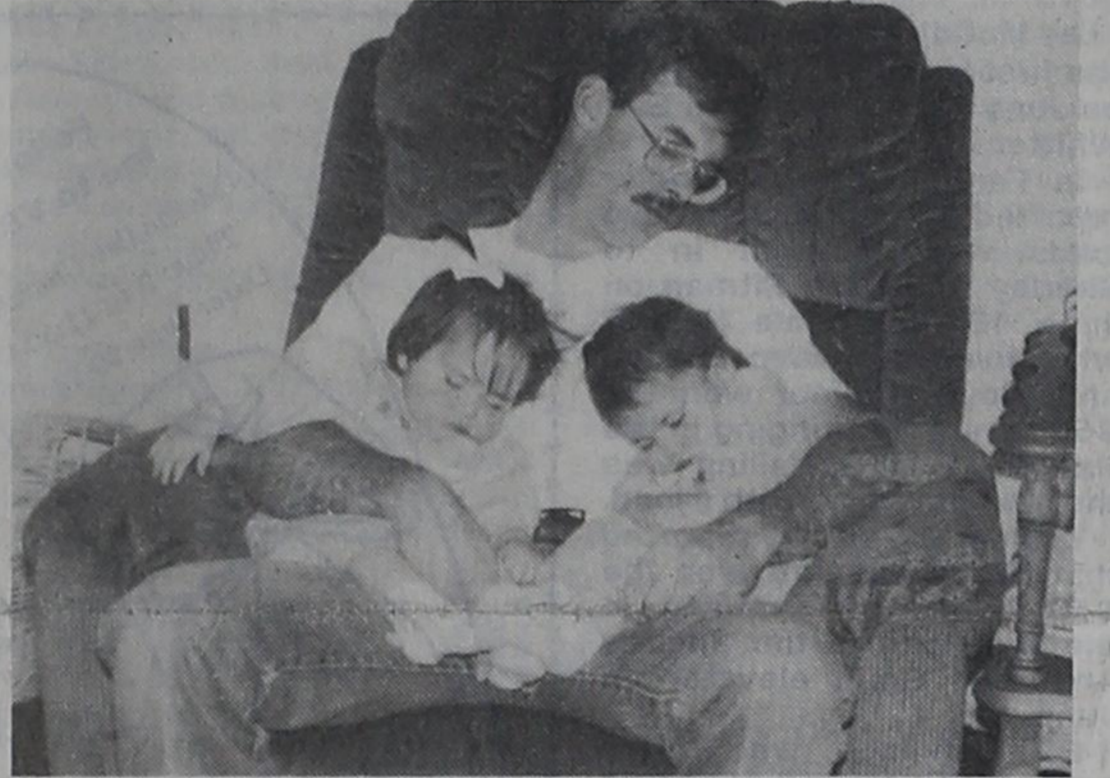
"On the Sperry each man had his own bed, but on a submarine there were only enough beds for the men who were off duty. They 'hot sacked it,' one third of the men would be in bed, and the rest would be working." Conditions were quite confining on World War II submarines.

Jones, who grew up in the country in Correll County, Texas, relates that he found the Sperry confining.

"I slept on the deck myself. It isn't as fresh below as it is on deck. I slept under the big gun on deck most nights. I'd rather get 4 hours of good sleep than 6 hours under deck. I'd just bring my mattress up on deck with me."

Like most of his shipmates, Jones volunteered for the Navy after Pearl Harbor was attacked by the Japanese. He was 20 at the time, and he had graduated from high school in Evant, Texas.

"I didn't necessarily like it," said Jones of the war, "but it was something in life I had to do. If I had my choice, I would have rather been someplace else."

Crackdown set on vehicles

After receiving several complaints of abandoned vehicles, Mayor Chris Gikas announced at Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting that a crackdown is in order.

Letters will be sent first to vehicle owners that they are in violation of city ordinances. City employees have identified at least 25 vehicles which fall into this category.

In other business, the council:

- Approved a resolution supporting the initiation of a 911 emergency number for Farwell. Plans call for starting the system in the Panhandle within two years. It will mean an extra 50 cents added to each phone bill. "Having a 911 number will give an edge to our firemen and sheriff's department," said Gikas.
- Approved buying a riding lawn mower from Beaver's Lawn Mower Shop, Farwell, for \$26.40. It was the lowest of three bids gotten by city employees. It will be used at the sanitation plant.
- Heard Melvin Sachs withdraw a request to get a variance for a metal storage building between 6th and 7th streets near the loop. Councilman Fred Chandler read the ordinance when Ridgecrest subdivision came into the city which stated only wood and masonry structures were allowed.

Texico library to be open

Texico Elementary School's PTO will open the school library for the use of interested students from 1-4 p.m. MDT on Wednesdays until June 29.

On June 22 they will sponsor a movie in the library for interested children at 1:30 p.m.

Attending the hearing were nearby property owners Ed Corn, Jerry Monk and D. Smith Day. The building would have been 50' by 50' or 60' and would have housed boats and trailers. Instead, Sachs said he may put in a carport.

- Awarded the old fire department utility van to O.D. Cole for \$650. The only other bidder was Kerry Walker, who bid \$80.

- Agreed to place a sign at the tennis courts noting that the state parks and wildlife department helped fund them. This was supposed to have been placed there when the courts were built but never was. The state recently asked that the sign be placed there.

- Heard Gikas say he has received complaints that more spraying for mosquitoes is in order, and asked city employees to handle it.

- Discussed buying a van or car for the fire department so it could haul several of its members to various schools for more training. Currently, the local department has 1 emergency medical technician (EMT) and 3 emergency care attendants (ECA). The department wants to qualify for EMTs and ECAs.

Firemen said that state law says the ambulance has to have 2 EMTs on its runs. The council voted to ask the state for a variance from that ruling.

Fire Chief Joel White will get cost estimates and report back next month.

- Discussed street repairs. Lists of streets in need of work were turned in by councilmen. It was noted that some streets have been built up too much, resulting in drainage problems.

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New City Hall plans presented

Architect Warren Pendleton presented the Texico City Council Tuesday night with tentative plans for the new City Hall.

He suggested a building of 66' by 11' on a lot of 115' by 125'. At the council's next meeting, he will present cost estimates for the masonry building. The proposed building is slightly larger than the present facility, Pendleton said.

The 7,480-sq.-ft. facility includes a senior citizens meeting room (36' by 28') and assembly room (35' by 45'). It also will house four restrooms, two entranceways, a kitchen, employee lounge, vault, computer room, storage rooms and offices for the marshal, judge, mayor, city clerk, cashier and bookkeeper.

The council expressed satisfaction with the plans. Still to be decided is whether the building can be afforded. It is likely state grants will be sought to help finance it. Also, a site needs to be chosen.

In other business, the council:

- Received three bids for city insurance. They were taken under advisement.
- Decided to ask Ruth Foster to handle regular cleaning of City Hall. The past cleaning service was dropped about three months ago.
- Decided to pay Clovis Office Center up to \$400 to train Glenna Mosier on the new City Hall computer.

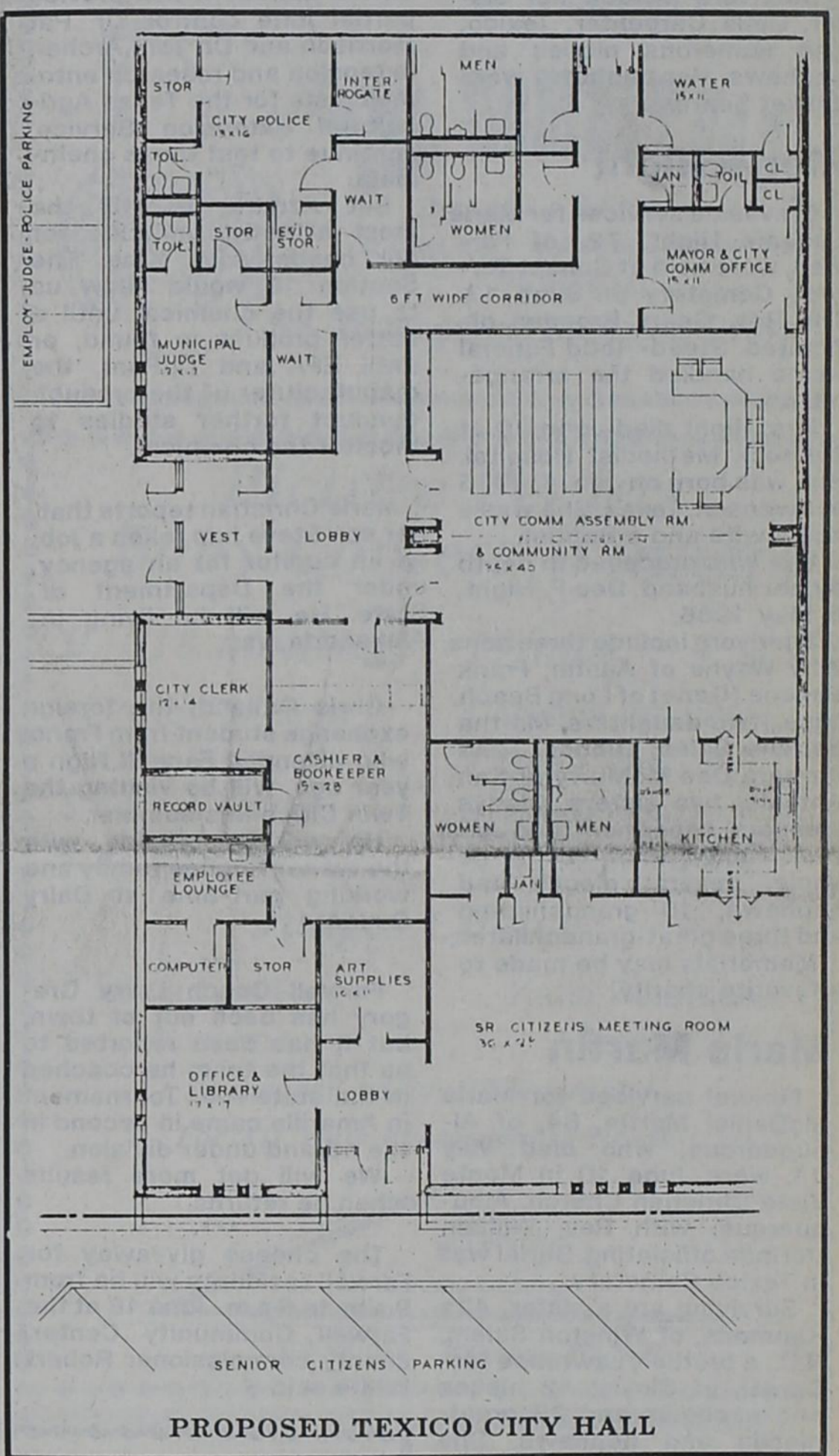
Cable rates for Farwell to increase

Farwell has been notified by Cooke Cablevision that on July 1 the cable company will increase its basic rate by \$1 and additional outlets by 25 cents. All other rates and charges will stay the same.

"This is a 'cost of living' adjustment due to increased operating costs, plus this year we will spend over \$300,000 for capital improvements to our cable system," said general manager Gordon Smith. "Included in these expenditures has been new microwave equipment for the Amarillo channels and the replacement of the overhead wiring to about 6,000 homes."

Smith said this is the smallest percentage increase (5.9%) in his seven years in the cable business.

Previously, approval was needed for rate changes from the Farwell City Council. But the industry has been deregulated in Texas and approval is no longer needed.



Carpet purchased for junior high

The Texico School Board Tuesday formally signed contracts.

The contracts for staff had been computed several weeks ago, but could not be formally signed until the budget was approved on June 1.

The board also handled a number of administrative decisions, most of which concerned maintenance projects. They include the following:

- Approved some policy changes which deleted duplication in their policies. The policy committee will again meet in September.
- Voted to sealcoat the parking lot between the junior high school and the high school building.
- Voted to purchase some pieces of equipment for the Wolverine Band including three

sets of drums, a set of cymbals, and a tom-tom stand.

- Voted to purchase 2 more sets of olympic weights for the physical education department. The school personnel will make the benches.

- Voted to move some electrical plugs in the ag. shop so that works stations will be more convenient.

- Approved the purchase of new carpet in the junior high building. Students from the agriculture and athletic departments were used to pull up the old carpet and clean the floors below. The savings from this will be passed on to the athletic and agriculture departments. The old carpet can be used in the agriculture and athletic departments.

ever, Azodrin has been proven safe to use, and is even labeled for use on cotton fields, some of which are adjacent to corn acres on the South Plains.

There are other chemicals on the market which provide partial mite control. Dr. Pat Morrison and Dr. Tom Archer, extension and research entomologists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, continue to test these chemicals.

But Azodrin is still the most effective miticide for our needs, says King. The Section 18 would allow us to use the chemical until a better product is found, or until EPA and DuPont, the manufacturer of the product, conduct further studies to monitor the chemical.

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'Made and Grown in the USA'

The National Cotton Council reports that their Women's Committee has begun a campaign called "Made and Grown in the USA" to draw consumers' attention to the fact that our national economy is being negatively impacted by the importation of foreign cotton.

"Imports of cotton, wool, and man-made fiber products have skyrocketed 170 percent since 1980, closing 1,000 plants and leaving 350,000 U.S. textile and apparel workers and farmers unemployed," said Mrs. Janie Braswell.

"Cotton textile imports have grown from about 1.9 million bale equivalents in 1982 to 4.9 million in 1987," she added. The Council estimates that if imports continue growing at their present rate of more than 20 percent a year, by 1990 they will take over three-fourths of cotton pro-

ducers' home market. Imports already account for more than half of the cotton apparel in this country. About 80 percent of the cotton in these imports is foreign grown.


