He saw his first ship in San Francisco

If you ask Neil Stewart what he did in World War II, you might hear him tell you that he ran a mimeograph machine on a ship.

Or, he might tell you a funny story about President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's son James who was on that ship.

But, if you can get him in the right mood, he has much more to say than that.

"I had never seen a ship before I reported to duty in San Francisco," said Stewart. The day he reported on board, a soldier walked up to him and asked Stewart questions about the ship.

"I had to tell him I didn't have any more idea of what they were than he did," said Stewart. The soldier wasn't very confident that he would arrive safely at his destination when he heard Stewart's answer.

Stewart did learn the parts of the ship, though, because he was assigned to sea duty

from 1943-1947.

After reporting that first morning in San Francisco, Stewart was ordered to Treasure Island. He took a bus to the Old World's Fair building. The bus driver, who was new on the job, took him to Goat Island by mistake. There Stewart saw marine guards drilling hardened criminals from Alcatraz who wanted to make the transition from prison to the military. The guards were getting pretty rough, and Stewart was sure he was in the wrong place. Luckily, he was right.

Stewart, who had never taken typing in high school, was assigned to work in an office on board the flagship. He was the Commodore's personal orderly during general quarters - emergency situations. He had to learn to type and run a mimeograph machine on the job.

Stewart saw lots of action

And while I don't agree 100 percent with Reagan's economic policies, I profusely thank him for doing what Jimmy Carter, who I believe will go down in history as one of the worst 5 U.S. presidents of all time - was unable to do: get a handle on inflation.

I guess that inflation handle is why I've liked Reagan. When he took office, inflation was running rampant and money was becoming worthless. The fear in the middle class was readily apparent. People were buying gold,

silver, anything because the dollar was going plumb to hell.

I didn't think Reagan could reverse the trend. And, obviously, our inept Congress isn't capable of anything worthwhile - except raising their own salaries. But Reagan's administration succeeded.

Twin Cities evade storm

The Twin Cities got just over an inch of rain Sunday night from the storm that dumped rain and hail all over the area.

Sherley Grain Elevator in Lazbuddie reported 3 1/2" of rain there. Roads were flooded on Monday morning.

Fred Chandler manager of Sherley Anderson Pitman in Farwell reported 1.1" of rain here. "We had a nice rain here," said Chandler.

Bert Williams reported 1" of rain south of town.

Yalonda McFarland reported 1.63" at Lariat at the Sherley Anderson elevator there.

Rev. Mac Bearss reported that the new shingles that

were being applied to St. John Lutheran Church blew away in the storm, and the church received some water damage. There were reports of 2" of rain south of Lariat.

Some areas were more severely affected by the storm than others were. Funnel clouds were sighted southwest of Cannon Air Force Base.

Clovis reported more than 3" of rain from the storm, and 1" hail. Many of the streets were flooded.

Leigh Ann Woods of Farwell was at Clovis High Plains Hospital with her husband, Mike, who was recovering from surgery. She reports that patients' beds were moved away from the windows due to the tornado watch. She was advised by hospital officials to spend the night rather than attempt to drive through the flooded streets.

Texico firemen, reported Bryan Kube, were stationed in a road south of town to watch for possible tornadoes. Another fireman was at the station, ready to blow the alarm if needed.

If a tornado nears the Twin Cities, here is what you will hear:

In Farwell, there will be one long blast on the fire siren.

In Texico, there will be two blasts in a row, each of 50-second duration.

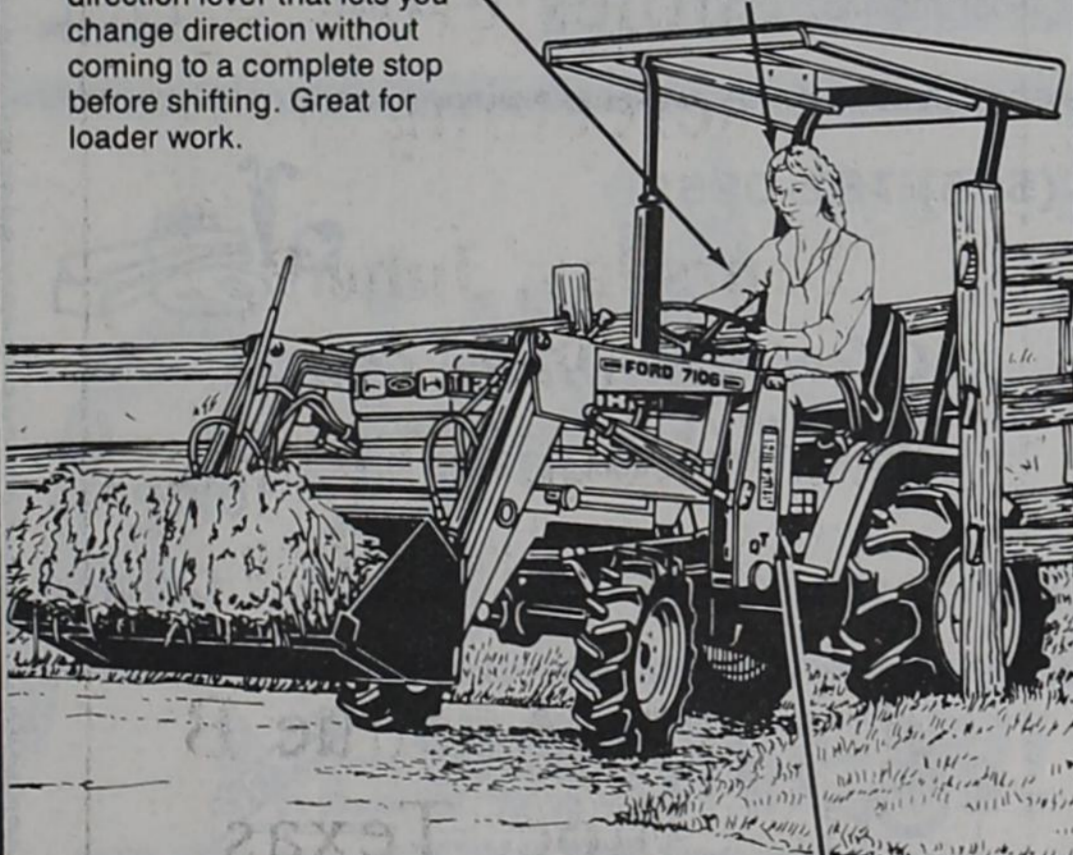

Creation" and "A New Song." Miller is featured in "Back to Back", a recording of Christian music which he did with Shauna Johnston.

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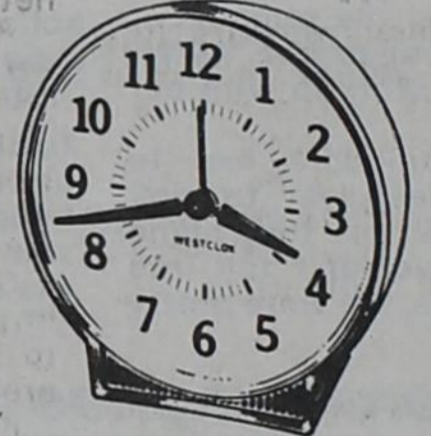
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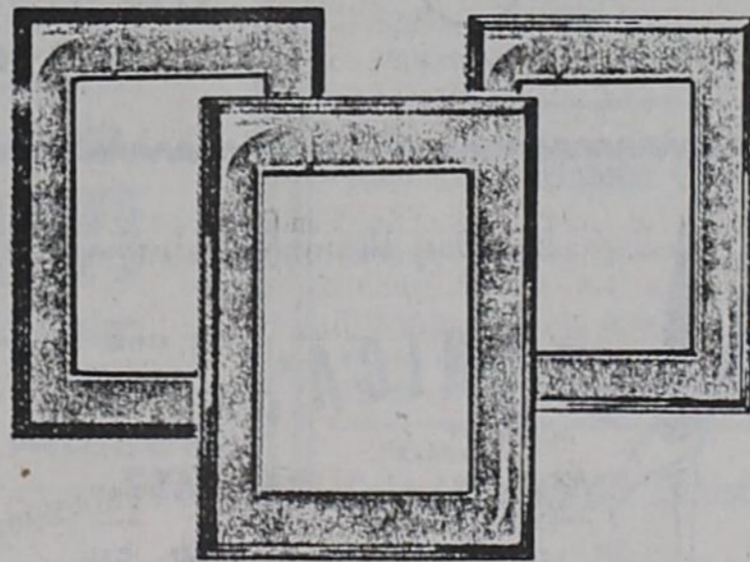
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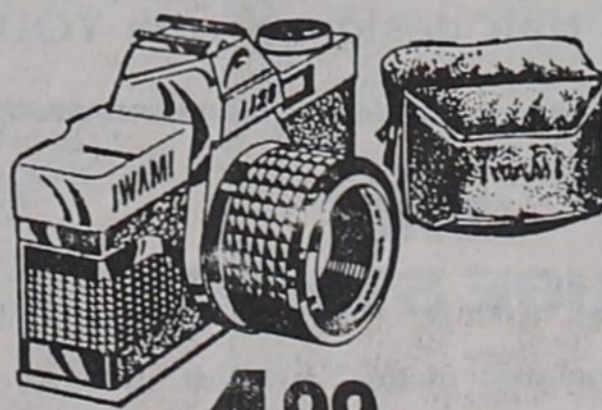
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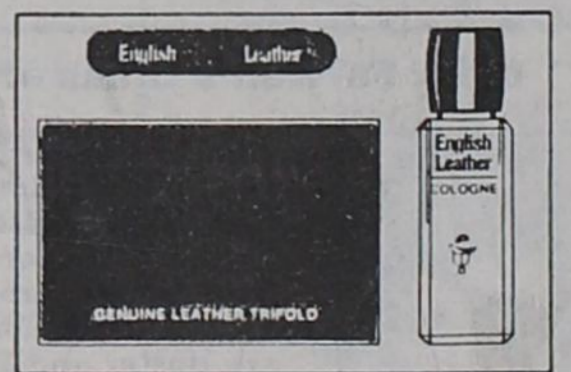

during the years he was in the Pacific. His ship was at the Gilbert Islands in 1943, Marshall Islands, Eniwetok, Saipan, Leyte Island, in 1944, and Luzon, and Iwo Jima 1945. His ship delivered the Marines making the landings, and picked up survivors after the battle.

He remembers seeing General McArthur at Luzon when the Americans returned to the Philippines as the general had promised when the Japanese invaded.

Stewart's ship hopped from island to island delivering Marines and picking up cargoes of wounded Americans, Japanese prisoners of war, and Korean slave laborers who had been enslaved by the Japanese.

"You have never seen anyone as happy as those Koreans. They were so glad to see us; they were so glad to be free of the Japanese," said Stewart.

At one point during the war, Stewart's ship delivered the same group of Marines to 5 different islands on 5 different days. Each day the Marines landed, fought their way across the island, and returned to the ship so that they could do the same thing at a different island the next day. The Marines never knew what kind of trap they might walk into on those islands, but they had to be ready to do the same thing each day.

One of Stewart's most vivid memories of the war was seeing a B-29 attempt a crash landing on the ocean. The B-29 was the most advanced bomber of its day. Its radar equipment was top secret.

Stewart's diary from the war dates the incident at 7:35 a.m. on March 8, 1945. He commented later of the incident, "The plane broke in two, and half of it sunk right away. We picked up eight of the eleven crew members from the water. Two of the men died after they were picked up."

"The engineering officer of our ship tried to hook the boom of the ship up to the remaining wreckage. The rest of the fleet except our ship and one destroyer went on without us. We tried, but we couldn't hoist the remains of that plane out of the water. We had to catch up with our fleet."

"Our Commodore had to order the destroyer to sink the remains of the plane so that it wouldn't fall into enemy hands. We were pretty

sure that nobody was left alive, but we could never be quite sure that all the survivors had been saved. We had to go on," said Stewart.

Stewart's ship often transported severely wounded Marines from the battles. One time Stewart's ship had to pick up victims who had been severely burned.

"I was there when two of them died. I've never heard anything so horrible as their breathing even in the worst scary movie I've ever seen. They were burned so bad that you couldn't even tell if they were black or white men."

Stewart was lucky because he was never on a ship hit by a kamikaze raid, but he saw some crash onto ships that surrounded his ship.

His diary tells of one incident on Oct. 20, 1944 when he saw two enemy planes near Leyte Island in the Philippines. One dove on a ship behind his. The ships threw up a barrage of gunfire, and the enemy plane flew away. In another incident on Nov. 24, 1944, a Japanese plane dropped a bomb 50 yards off the bow of a ship near his. American P-38's shot it down, and it dived at the U.S.S. O'Hara. Its wing and fuel tank hit the O'Hara. But no major damage was done.

Others times American ships were not so lucky. "Some of those (Japanese) planes were never equipped with landing gear. The pilots had their funerals in Japan before they got into the ship. They just aimed right at a ship and kept coming," said Stewart.

On Jan. 9, 1945, Stewart went ashore with the boat dropping Marines at Luzon in the Philippines. His diary records: "Never worked harder in all my life. Saw lots of Filipino men, women and children. Air attacks. Once I thought I was a goner. 18:30 underway for Leyte Island. More air attacks."

In May 1945 Stewart's ship headed home for leave. Stewart knew that plans for the invasion of Japan were being made. He thought it would be his last visit to see his family. Instead, the atomic bomb was dropped before his ship returned to action. It brought the war to a swift close.

Stewart has a knack for finding the humor in any situation. World War II could not be left out. At one point in the war Stewart was on board the same Coast Guard trans-

port as Marine Colonel James Roosevelt, son of President Roosevelt when the Marines landed on Macon Island.

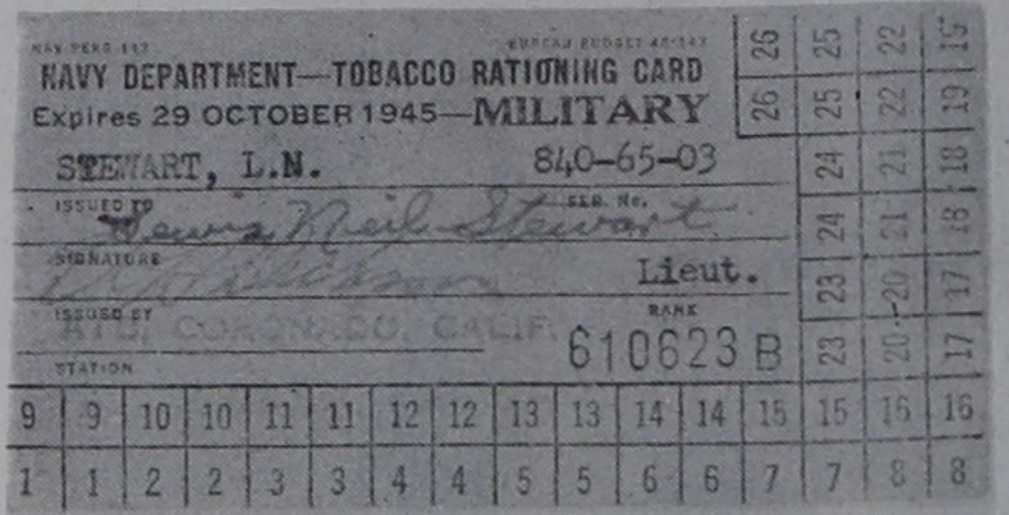
"The 'Stars and Stripes' said that Colonel Roosevelt had taken the island, but he didn't get off the ship until the island was secured," Stewart relates.

One of Stewart's shipmates parodied the famous fireside

chats of President Franklin Roosevelt. Stewart can repeat it in a voice just like the President's:

"My friends, and I know that you are all my friends, I am here to tell you that I hate war. My son Jimmy hates war. My son Elliot hates war. My son Franklin hates war. My wife Eleanor hates war. And, I hate Eleanor."

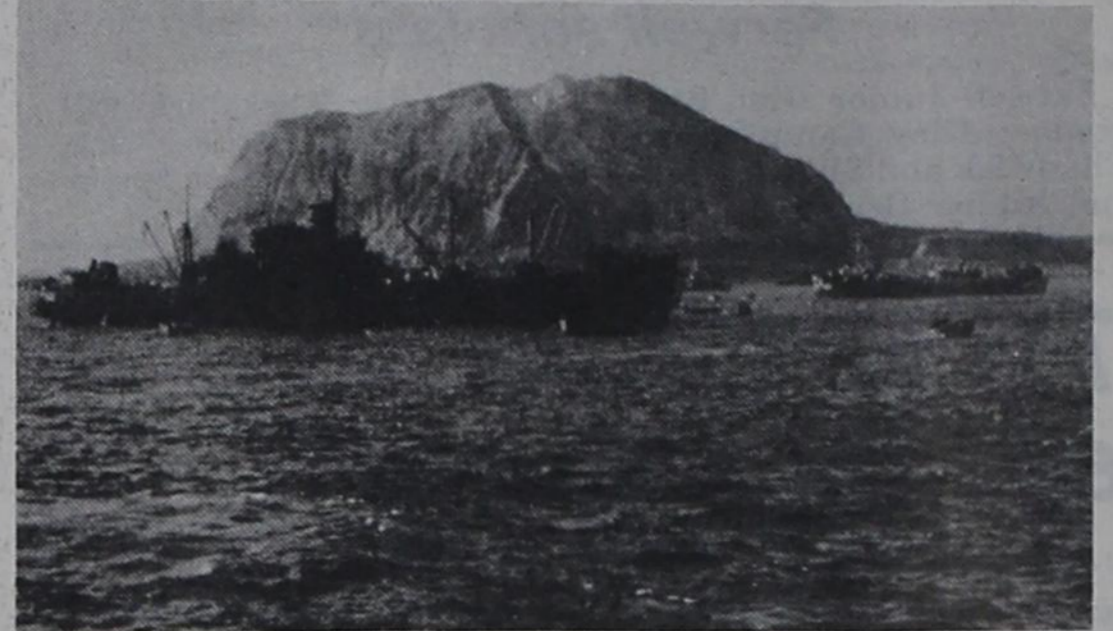

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'We wore out shoe leather'

Bill Whitesides was in the Pacific during World War II, but he doesn't talk much about it. He was in the Infantry in the Pacific for over a year near the end of the war.

"We wore out shoe leather," he said laconically. He saw hand to hand combat in the Philippines.

Whitesides grew up in Wolf City, Texas. He had family obligations, and did not think

that he would be drafted. By 1944 virtually everyone from age 18-45 was in the service, and so was Bill.

Following the end of the war, Whitesides was sent to Augsburg, West Germany as an MP guarding the freight on the railroads during the occupation of Germany.

"Things were pretty calm by then, some people had problems but I didn't," he said.

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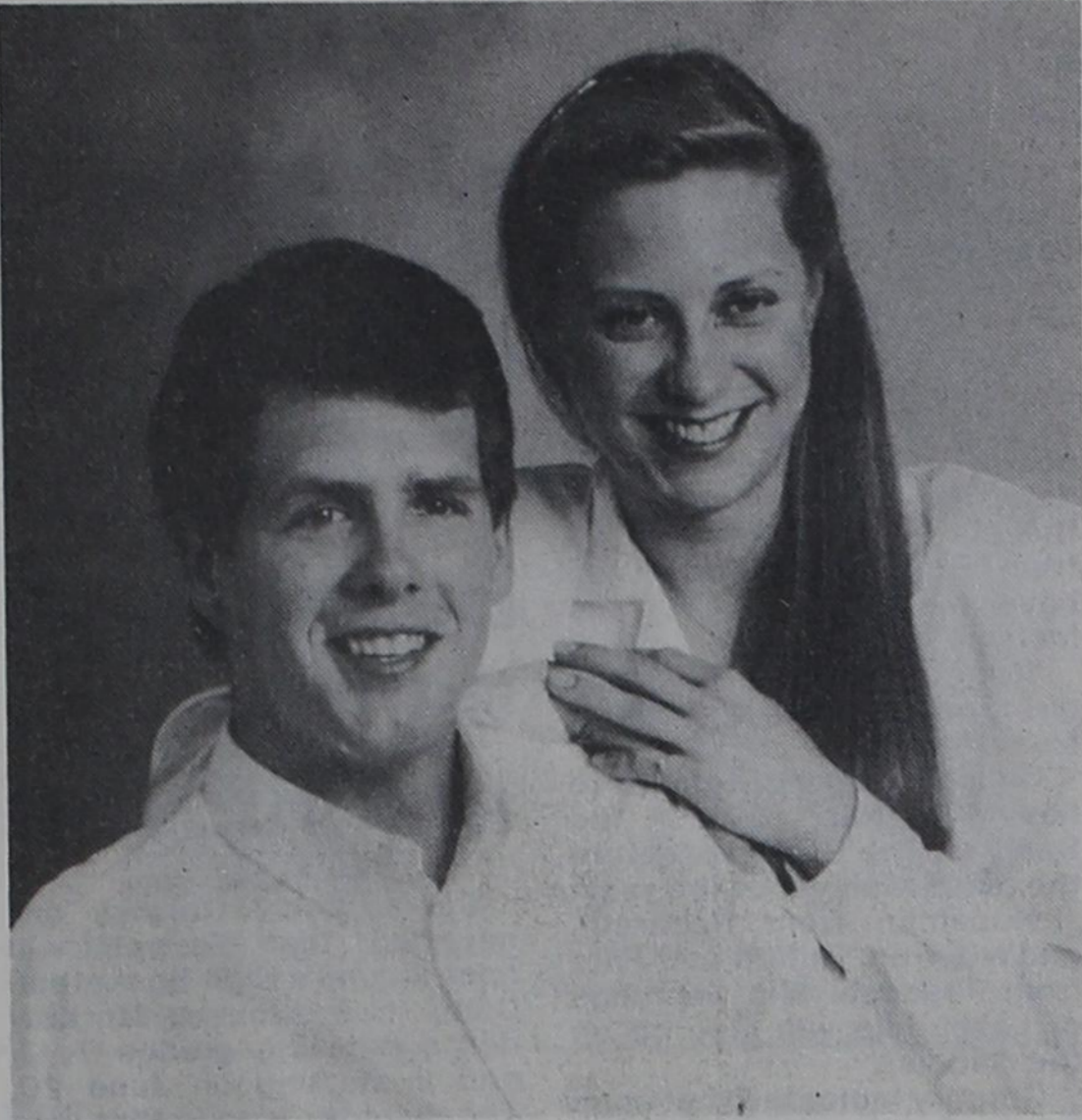

Recipe of Week

BEEF LOAF FLORENTINE

Preparation time: 15 minutes
Cooking time: 1 hour 15 minutes

- 2 pounds lean ground round steak
- 1/2 cup onion, minced
- 1/3 cup green pepper, minced
- 2 slices whole wheat bread, crumbled
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon Dijon-style mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon salt
- filling*
- fresh parsley
- cherry tomatoes
- ripe olives

Combine ground steak with onion, green pepper, crumbled bread, egg, worcestershire sauce, mustard, thyme, pepper and salt. Mix lightly. Press 1/2 mixture into an 8" X 5" rectangle. Spoon filling on top and spread leaving 1" border on all sides. Press remaining ground steak mixture into 8" X 5" rectangle. Place on top of filling. Pinch edges together to seal. Place loaf on a rack in baking pan. Cover lightly with foil. Bake at 375 degrees for

Sales tax change noted

Texas State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that sales tax will no longer be charged on feed normally eaten by farm and ranch animals that is also used to feed Texas game animals.

"It doesn't make sense to tax feed that farmers and ranchers use to support the native wildlife population when other farm animals get to eat the same stuff tax-free," Bullock said.

Bullock said removal of the sales tax on hay, corn, oats and other feeds that can be eaten by deer, turkey and other wild animals will promote progressive wildlife conservation practices.

According to Bullock, Texas farmers and ranchers who lease hunting acreage will benefit by being able to provide supplemental feed during drought conditions or when animal habitats have been reduced.

Land owners will find it easier to buy feed under the proposed rule, since they will no longer have to declare the type and location of the

animal eating the feed.

"We've had some confusing situations because of the current rule - for example, corn bought to feed deer is taxable, but corn to feed cows isn't," Bullock said.

Feed for domestic farm animals and work animals will remain exempt from the state sales tax, but feed bought for pets such as cats and dogs is still taxable, he added.

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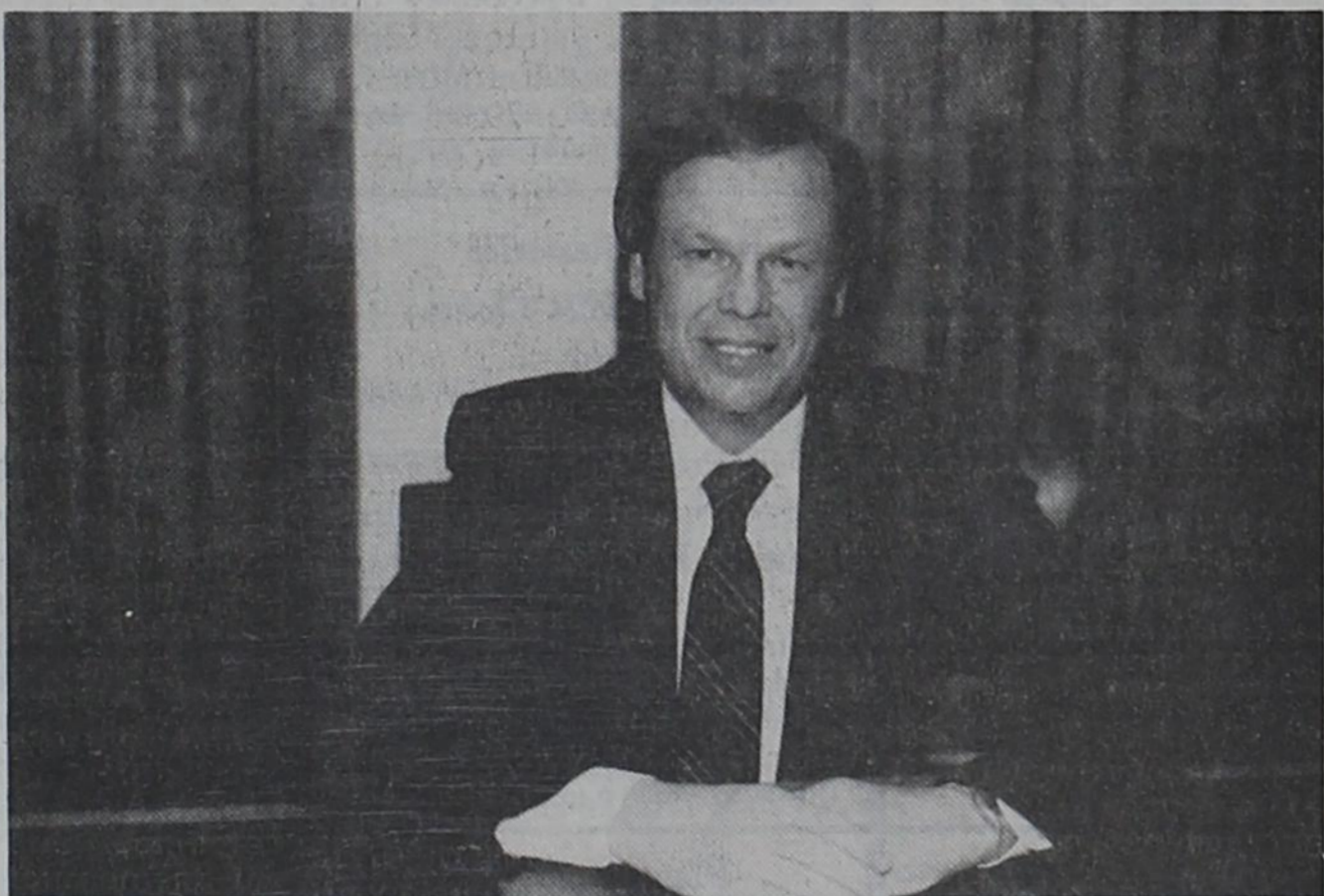

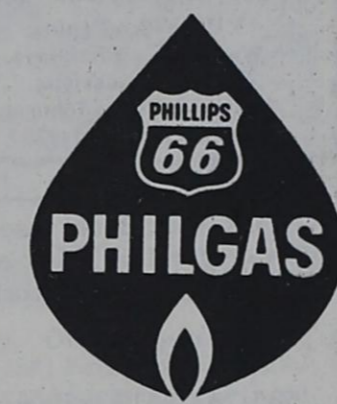

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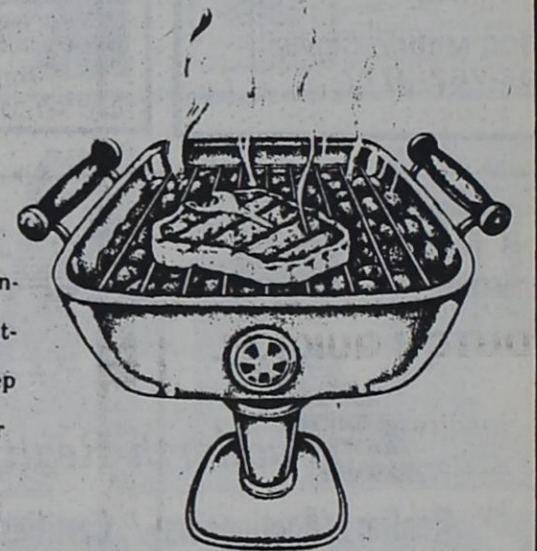

LEGAL NOTICE

TO: Water customers in City of Farwell

The United State Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The United State Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. If your home or water system has lead pipes, or
 2. If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- If the home is less than five years old, or

- If you have soft or acidic water, or
- If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

(a) The city immediately removes any lead pipes that they become aware of.

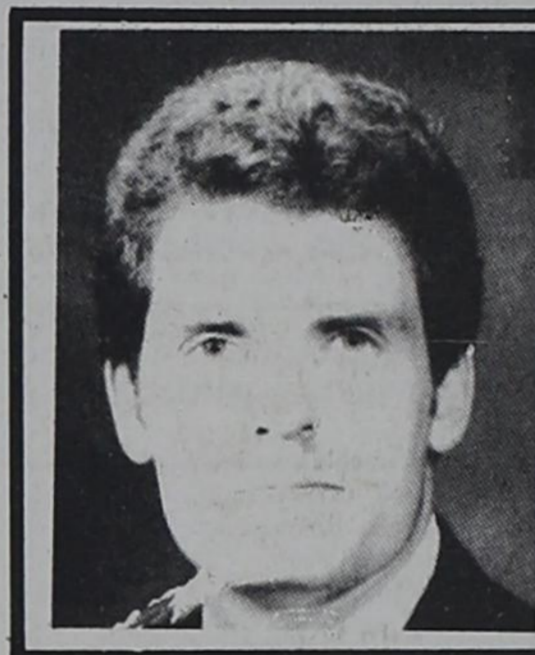
