We all understand the importance of a high school degree. Show me someone who drops out of high school, and I'll show you someone who will be a failure in life.

I feel it's all-important that girls, especially, get high school degrees. Some think they will get married and thus don't need a degree. But statistics show that nearly half of all marriages fail. So these women, now with one or two children, are left to fend for themselves. And without a degree, they are asking for poverty for the rest of their lives.

And don't kid yourself about welfare. It's a lousy system that breeds more poverty. Never think that someone on welfare is "getting away" with something. You wouldn't want to be in those pair of

It's getting to be that a college degree is almost mandatory for those who desire well-paying jobs.

The only degree I ever received was from high school.

I also never received a college degree. A conflict in Southeast Asia came along. In the old days when I was a manager back east, I made it a point to never concern myself over whether a job applicant had a college degree or not. It would have been hypocritical for me to demand one when I didn't have one.

Funny thing is, many of the best people I hired didn't have degrees either. But I was the exception rather than the rule. Virtually all the managers I knew required a college degree before an applicant could get his foot in the door.

It does worry me, though, about the ever-increasing cost of higher education. If my daughter, for example, who has completed three years of college, hadn't had jobs all the way through, hadn't availed herself of each and every scholarship and grant she could and hadn't gotten bank loans, I can't see how she could have gotten through college.

In five more years, my boy will be ready for that step. And I estimate the cost to be so high that he won't have any choice but to work his way through school.

I have a feeling that one of the big scandals to crop up within the next few years will deal with college costs. I believe the middle class in our country takes it for granted that its sons and daughters will have college opportunities.

But in a few short years, we are going to be talking of \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year for in-state students. I don't know about you, but I can't handle that with the money I earn. I look for a growing uproar in the middle class. Wait and see.

Anyway, graduation is a time to be festive. We need to congratulate our youths in successfuly completing their schooling. I have always been a firm believer in the importance of our public education system and how it helps mold

our future leaders. Thank you, educators, for your diligent work in preparing the future generations to the tasks before them.

ACS Were a new Army breed

Carrie Levins (now Mrs. Robert Anderson of Farwell) was studying business administration at the University of Oklahoma when Pearl Harbor was attacked

She did not even consider joining the military at that time because the only women who were allowed to join the military then were nurses. and she wasn't trained to do that.

Later, the U.S. government decided that women could be used to handle some jobs so that men could be moved from desks to combat. She entered the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps in April 1943, less than a year after it was founded.

"It wasn't part of the Army in those days; it was made part of the Army later," she

explains. "We were a new breed of dogs, and they didn't know what to do with us in those days."

Carrie was sent to basic training at Monticello, Ark. The camp had been built to house Japanese prisoners of war, but in 1943 there were none to house there. The ladies in her basic training class hopped off the bus in their high heels and uniforms complete with skirts to face barbed wire fences.

After basic training, she went to Officer's Candidate School in Des Moine, Iowa. She was part of a class of 118 women. She was selected the outstanding officer in her class.

From there Lt. Levins went to Boston, where she became

an assistant finance officer. She was at Fort Banks, one of 6 or 8 harbor forts which offerred defense to the port of Boston.

"In those days the military paid in cash. Twice a month once for the regular pay day at the end of the month, and once for the supplemental payments. W.we would get a foot locker full of cash, and distribute it to the men," she said.

On pay days the women officers wore their handguns, but they were not issued any ammunition, even though they were qualified to carry weapons. The male soldiers who escorted the money wore weapons with live ammunition.

"I had to learn to be pretty self sufficient in those days," says Mrs. Anderson today. "There were only two WAC officers on the post, and one of them had to be on post at all times. We were not supposed to socialize with enlisted men or women, so I had to learn to go places on my own."

She enjoyed the historical sights, museums, concerts, and restaurants Boston had to offer. "The northern people were much more friendly than I imagined them to be: I had a good time while I was there,"she said.

Boston has many Italian Americans in its population even today. At the start of World War II Italy was allied with Germany. After Italy surrendered, the Italian POWs became co-belligerants, not prisoners of war. The Sons of Italy turned out for lots of big parties at the former POW camps; "It was great fun," she added.

Ground water levels keep rising

tinue to rise in the Southern High Plains of Texas.

The average change in water levels in the 5.2 million acre service area of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District during 1987 was a rise of ninetenths of a foot. Depth to water measurements were made in a network of approximately 960 observation wells during January and February 1988 by District personnel. These measurements compared to measurements made in the same network of wells during the same months in 1987 revealed the rise in water lev-

This procedure is repeated each year to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer. The nine-

During the past three years, the changes in aquifer levels have reversed from a longterm, continuous decline to a leveling or zero change in 1985, to a arise of about onehalf of a foot in 1986, and in 1987, to a rise of nine-tenths

The ten-year change in water levels of 4.80 feet from 1978 to 1988 indicates an average decline of .48 of a foot per year. The past five-year average change of .07 of a foot indicates a significant reduction in the

rate of decline in the aquifer. Why a reduction in pumpage and increase in the recharge

to the aquifer? There are many factors. The principal factor has been the poor economic conditions of the farming industry. This has resulted in reduced amounts of water pumped for irrigation throughout most of the area.

Those who have continued to irrigate have made serious efforts to improve their irrigation efficiency. Furrow irrigators utilize such practices as pipelines to transport the water from the wells to the fields. Pipelines reduce losses from 10 to 30 percent per 1,000 feet as compared to open, unlined ditches.

Time controlled surge valves increase efficiency savings an additional 10 to 30 percent of water pumped. Elimination of irrigation tailwater through tailwater return systems has saved as much as 20 percent of water pumped. Water savings of 10 percent or more have been achieved by utilizing moisture sensors to determine when the field needs to be irrigated and how much water needs to be applied to wet the field to field capacity.

Using plant growth regula-tors on field crops results in more efficient use of water by crops, which in turn, results in more pounds of fruit per inch of water used by the plant. Using furrow dikes to harvest precipitation reduces irrigation requirements by as much as three inches per acre on farms with three percent slope.

Other irrigators have converted from furrow irrigation to center pivot drop line systems. In instances where open unlined earthen ditches were previously used, water savings of 50 percent or more have been achieved. Also, many older center pivot systems which operated under high pressure with water discharges above the center line have been converted to partial drops, reducing water losses by 20 percent or more. Those systems which have been converted to full drops have reduced losses by as much as 35 percent.

Some irrigators with center pivot systems maximize these water savings by minimum tillage farming which maximizes their utilization of precipitation and irrigation water by greatly reducing evaporation from the soil sur-

tion during the past few years not only has reduced irrigation water demand, but also provided an above average water supply source for natural recharge to the aquifer. Ninety-seven percent of the precipitation runoff which occurs on the High Plains is collected in playa basins. The construction of pits and sumps in the bottom of 65 percent or more of the 17,000 playa basins in the High Plains has increased the opportunity for natural recharge to the aquifer.

Above average precipita-

These modifications are carved through the almost impermeable clay beds which line most of these lakes into the more porous caliche material. Not only is the natural recharge potential increased, but the runoff water is confined to a smaller surface area which reduces the evaporation losses. Most of the natural recharge occurs through the sides of the modification, as the clays suspended in the runoff water seals the bottoms of the modified structures.

The sealed bottom prevents all the water from being recharged from the modification. However, on the plus side, the water remaining in the modifications provides a water supply for wildlife long after the majority of the unmodified basins have gone

What can we expect to happen to water levels in the future? Economic opportunities in the farming community undoubtedly will dictate how much water is pumped for irrigation in the future. Improvements in irrigation equipment and technology will continue to be made, because of cost effec-

A large amount of acreage has been enrolled in the 10year Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) which will eliminate the need to irrigate this acreage for at least the next 10 years. This will reduce the demand on the aquifer.

Future farm programs will also influence pumpage, as will the amounts and timeliness of precipitation occurring in the area in future years. The prospects look good for reduced demands on the aquifer. Therefore, water level changes in the aquifer in the forseeable future remain relatively stable.
