

Merchants' giveaway under way!

More than 50 Twin Cities businesses will be participating in the seventh annual Border Town Days Merchants Giveaway program held in conjunction with the annual BTD celebration's park activities July 29.

This year's giveaway will take place throughout the afternoon of the Saturday festivities at Farwell City Park.

Cara Mirabella, chairman of this year's event, said, "Any merchant that wasn't contacted but who wants to participate in the giveaway should call me at 481-9027 immediately. There's still time to enter."

Each participating business has a box in which customers may register for the prize to be given away by the merchant. A person may sign up once each time he is in a store until July 29 when the boxes will be picked up and taken to the park for the drawing.

Drawings will be held from each individual merchant's box, and the person whose name is drawn will be allowed ample time to claim the prize. However, in the event that the person does not show up to claim the prize in the allotted time, another name will be drawn so that all prizes are awarded that afternoon. It is essential that a winner by at the park to hear when his name is called.

County asked to help fire departments

Help for the city volunteer fire departments from Parmer County was suggested by Friona officials at Monday's meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners.

Attending were Friona city manager Bailey Goodwin, fire chief Jim Taylor, mayor Clarence Monroe and four city firemen. The point they made was that since so many of their calls - plus calls by Bovina and Farwell firemen - are outside the cities' limits, the county ought to help out with funding.

This is particularly pressing for Friona since a new fire truck has to be purchased next year since the current one is considered too old by the state agency.

The consensus of the commissioners was that something needed to be done to help the city departments and this will be further discussed later.

The Friona officials presented a list of fire calls made this year through June 10:

- Friona responded to 29 fires - 26 calls of which were outside the city limits.
- On the outside calls, 1396 man hours and 317 equipment hours were spent.
- On the inside calls, 39 man hours and 9 equipment hours were spent.
- Farwell responded to 20 calls, 8 calls of which were outside the city limits.
- Bovina responded to 28

calls, 19 calls of which were outside the city limits.

The Friona officials also noted how nearby counties handled their funding situations:

Tulia - all equipment costs split 50-50, and all county fires charged to the county at the same rate as city fires.

Dimmitt - City and county split costs on a rescue truck and two suburbans, and training costs are split 50-50.

Muleshoe - Service swap - city runs the fire department and the county runs the ambulance service.

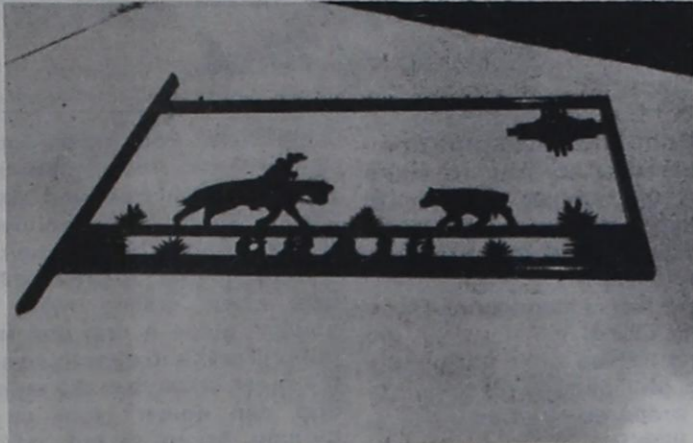
Hereford - Based on a percentage: If the year's total out of city calls were 35%, for example, the county would pay 35% of the total operational budget, including capital expenses.

In other business, Sheriff Bill Morgan and chief dispatcher Merlene Smith discussed the need to buy a computer program and printer, at an approximate cost of \$3,500, for record keeping

purposes. The commissioners okayed the request.

One bid was received on a packer for Bovina precinct, from Yellowhouse Machinery for \$13,650. It was accepted.

No bids were received for a truck for the Friona precinct.

Lazbuddie School Board approves salary raises

Tuesday, the Lazbuddie School Board voted to give its secretaries, aides, and custodians a 3 percent raise.

They also voted to grant the three administrators a flat \$1,140 raise which is equivalent to the same raise that teachers at the top of the 10 year scale received from the state this year.

"I've got two good principals. They deserve to get as much of a raise as teachers do," said Supt. Joe Hall.

"We always wait until the budget is done before we give administrative raises," said Hall. "The board does not want to vote in big raises, and then find out that it does not have the money in the budget to cover them."

The board discussed and reviewed the proposed budget for 1988-89, and offered amendments to it.

- Accept the resignation of school secretary Mary Autrey, who is moving.
- Hire Cindy Parrish Furr as an elementary teacher.

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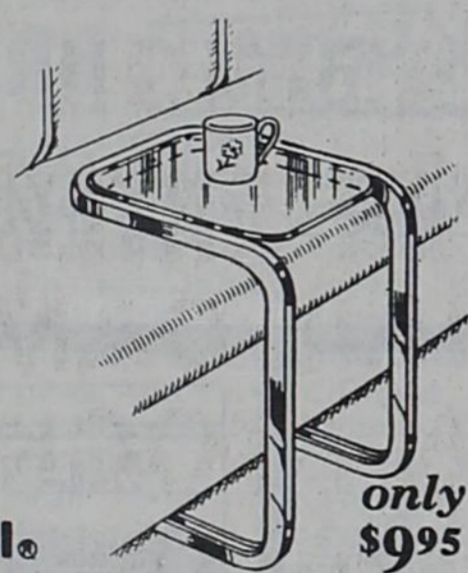

Some emergency loans available

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or agriculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) Weldon Rainey, FmHA County supervisor, said today.

Parmer County is one of two counties in Texas recently named by Administrator Vance L. Clark as eligible for loans to cover actual physical losses resulting from the adverse weather.

Rainey said that farmers may be eligible for loans up to their actual losses or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

Rainey asked that those who need farm credit as a result of adverse weather make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 207 Ave. D, Farwell.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken coun-

ties will be accepted by Farmers Home until Feb. 22, 1989 for physical losses only. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and (could) possibly (carry) over into the new farming season," Rainey said.

FmHA loans covering actual physical losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of

Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognize farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living.

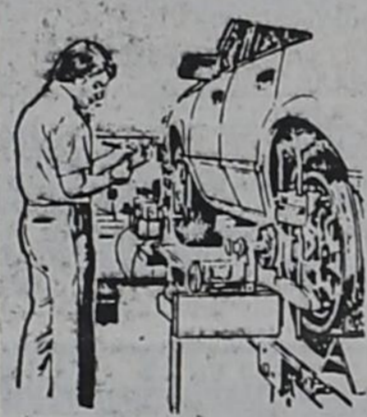

SPS decreases electric rate

Customers in Texas cities served by Southwestern Public Service soon should receive their second electric-rate decrease of the year.

Also, SPS's rural customers should have their rates lowered to match rates within city limits, SPS announced.

The decreases in effect and proposed total \$20.6 million, or 4.3%, and reflect lower SPS expenses resulting primarily from federal tax reform, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

The proposed decreases were agreed to July 8 by SPS, the staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, the state's Office of Public Utility Counsel, the Texas Industrial Energy Consumers and the U.S. Department of Energy.

Details of the agreement are being worked out, and once approved, the reduction would be considered effective as of July 8, Hunter said. Approval from city and state regulators is expected within 35 to 60 days. A customer's first bill on which the reduction is calculated would in-

clude a credit recognizing the effect of the lower rate since July 8.

"This timing allows our customers to, in effect, receive lower rates even before the regulatory process is complete," Hunter said. "We worked out this arrangement in order to extend lower rates to all of our customers as soon as possible."

Because of an earlier agreement between SPS and the Texas cities it serves, customers within city limits received a 3.1% decrease effective March 28. Upon approval from cities, these customers will receive an additional 1.2% decrease, Hunter said, to match the rural reduction of 4.3%.

In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates within their city limits. The PUCT regulates rates in rural areas. SPS will file with the PUCT for approval of the rural rate decrease and with 74 Texas cities it serves for approval of the rate decrease within city limits.

The percentage of rate decrease varies slightly among types of electric customers. Residential customers will receive a net 5.2% decrease compared to rates in effect at the first of the year.

A monthly electric bill for a rural residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours would drop \$4.09, from \$73.51 to \$69.42. The bill for a customer within the city limits using 1,00 kilowatt hours dropped \$3 on March 28 and should decline another \$1.09, resulting in a bill of \$69.42.

"These rate reductions represent a cooperative effort among all parties," Hunter said. "We believe these rate decreases can help stimulate economic development and enhance opportunities for growth in our service territory."

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



Pleasant Hill Fire Department pheasant hunt to be decided on

The Pleasant Hill Fire Department meet on July 19 at 7:30 p.m. MDT about its annual pheasant hunt.

The fire department must decide whether it is more beneficial for them to hold a pheasant hunt, or not.

The pheasant hunt has been a good money making project for the fire department and for the New Mexico Game and Fish Department which sells the hunting licenses. But, area corn growers

contend that the money raised through the pheasant hunt is much less than the amount of money that the New Mexico Game and Fish Department is costing farmers by keeping them from using a certain pesticide.

The Environmental Protection Agency banned the use of a pesticide, Azodrin, which is particularly effective in killing spider mites which attack corn. The New Mexico Game and Fish Department

granted farmers permission to use Azodrin for several years, but did not grant the permission last year. Luckily, last year local weather conditions did not promote the growth of spider mites.

Corn growers and members of the Pleasant Hill Fire Department met earlier this year with representatives of the New Mexico Game and Fish Department to inform them that they might not hold a pheasant hunt this year.


So far, there has been no response from the New Mexico Game and Fish Dept.

"We need farmers from this area to give us input. We want a consensus from a majority of the farmers before we go ahead with our plans," said Gary Singletary of the Pleasant Hill Fire Department.


"We see this as the start of a long battle with (governmental agencies) over other chemicals," said Singletary.

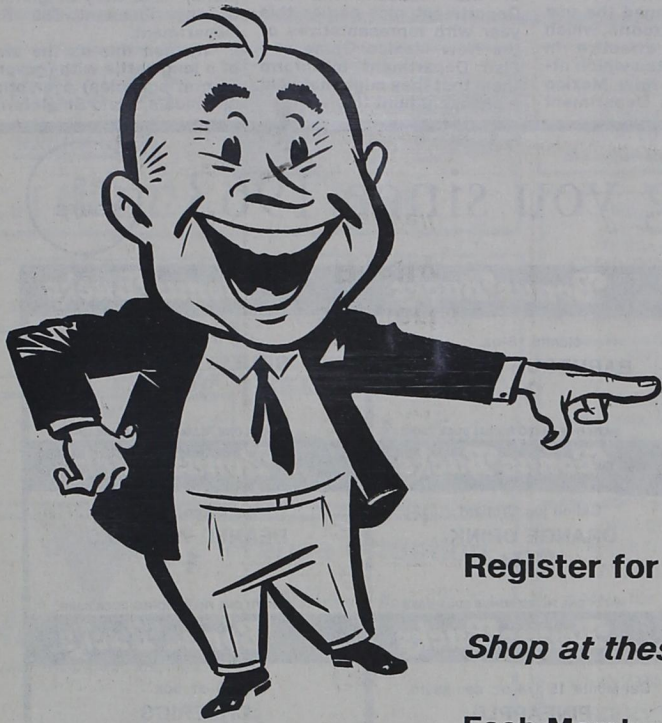
