Church is 1,000 years old



(Editor's note: This is the second of a two-part story about Helle Carstens, the Texico-Rotary Club foreign exchange student from Denmark.)

"We don't shop in malls much," says Helle of Christmas shopping. There are streets lined with small shops in most towns in Denmark. The traffic is halted on the commercial streets there.

On Christmas morning the Carstens family goes to church in Padborg. "About 90% of the people in Denmark are Protestant. They are Lutherans," explained Helle.

The church is about 1,000 years old. It has been restored so that one wooden wall, decorated with a scene of Jesus and his disciples, is as beautiful today as it was centuries ago. The church is decorated for Christmas with a manger scene with statues of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. "It is all decorated before Christmas," she explains.

Helle's sister sometimes sings in the choir at the church, so the family chooses the service in which she will sing. There are four services to choose from at this particular church.

The preacher always wears black robes with a big white collar for services. He does not change his garb for the holiday.

After church the family goes home. "We always eat small meals on Christmas Day after the big meal on Christmas Eve," says Helle. They snack on leftovers and hot punch and cookies during the day.

"We watch TV, and have a fire in the fireplace," she says. She notes that in Denmark as in the U.S., the best movies and special television shows are broadcast at this time of the year.

During the week between Christmas and New Year's, the family visits friends, and entertains.

"New Year's is almost bigger than Christmas," says Helle of the holidays in Denmark. Traditionally, the Carstens family and about 50 other people gather in the home of friends on the morning of New Year's Eve. They enjoy a big dinner together.

"We have a traditional meal with green cabbage, sausages, Danish ham, several kinds of potatoes - some with sugar on them, salads and desserts," said Helle. In some Danish homes it is traditional to serve a whole steamed fish, but "We never eat it," says Helle. Normally red wine is served with the dinner. "The only kind of tea we have is hot tea," she explains.

Following the dinner is a party with dancing and visiting. When the dinner party breaks up, partygoers go from house to house visiting friends during the early evening hours.

"We always walk or take taxis," says Helle. In Denmark, as in many European nations, there are very strict laws about driving while under the influence. A conviction means the loss of a license, and often a prison sentence. Children are allowed to drink a glass of wine with dinner in Denmark, but they are taught from little on that they must control their use of alcohol.

Just before midnight, everyone gathers to listen to the Queen's traditional speech. It is followed by the national anthem and traditional Danish music.

At midnight, the TV shows the hands of a special clock in Copenhagen moving to midnight. Everyone hugs and kisses and goes outside where they shoot off fireworks, and yell. After that, partygoers go back to their parties or they go to a disco for dancing.

"We don't go to bed at all," says Helle of the celebration.

On New Year's Day everyone sleeps late and eats leftovers. They relax and have fun at home.

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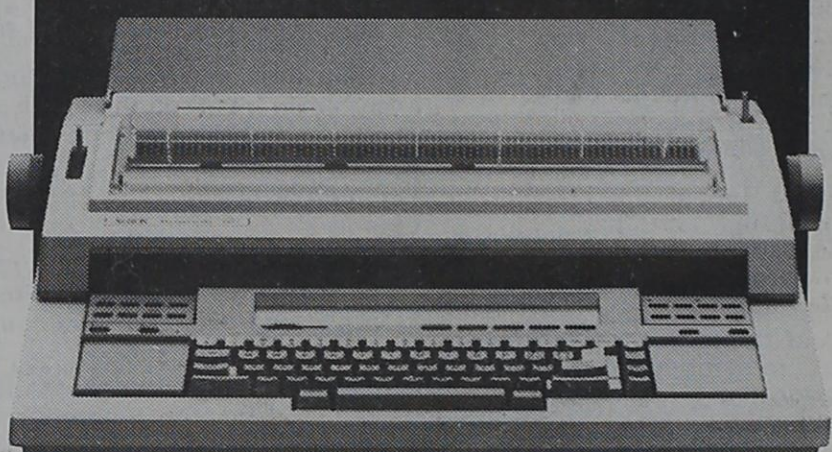

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Texico Council receives audit

City employee Glenda Mosier noted that paperwork for a 60/40 co-op program for road repairs must be sent to the state before Jan. 18. Tharp said he and city attorney Du-

ane Hamar would review the proposal before it is sent in. He said that a special meeting may be called if it is necessary.

The council adopted the 1989 holiday schedule for the city.

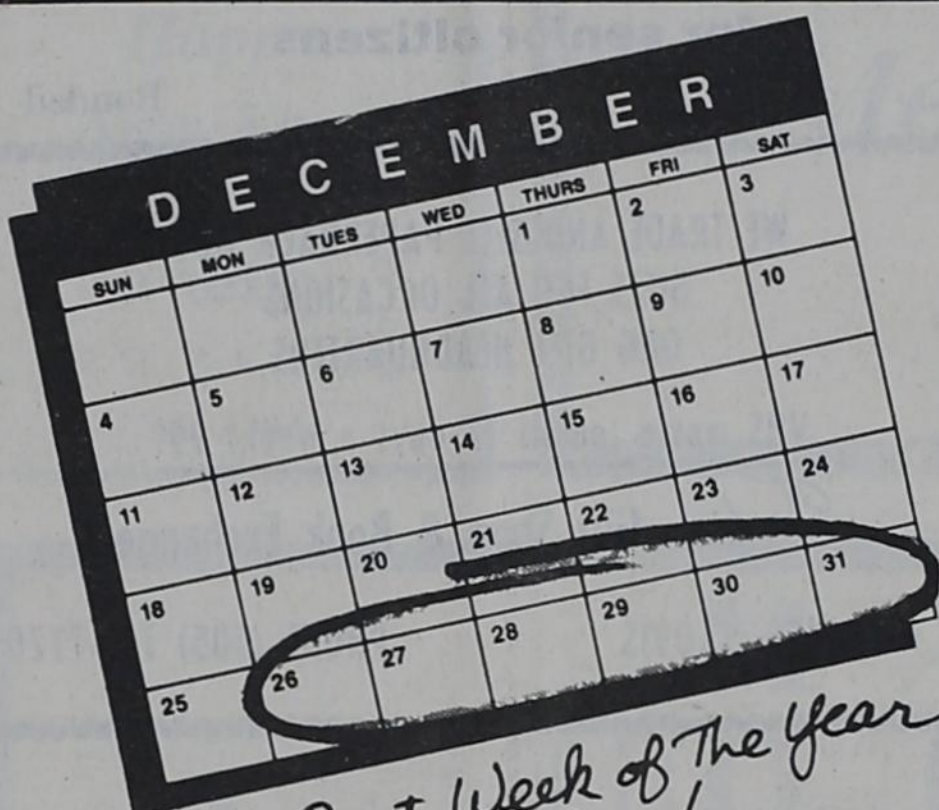

Note: Pecans or coconut may also be added to the topping. Refrigerate the cake after frosting. Store in refrigerator.



Cleanup bids rejected

The Parmer County Commissioners, due to the holiday, met Dec. 22 to open bids on cleaning up the former Lazbuddie dump ground. The dump was closed last month after state health officials threatened to file suit to get it closed. The commissioners received 13 bids, ranging from \$12,500 to \$160,000.

Due to the disparity in bids, and the fact that various bidders were bidding on different work, the commissioners rejected all bids. The commissioners will have an Amarillo contractor, knowledgeable in landfill matters, to draw up specific specifications, and the job will be rebid. Bids will be opened Feb. 13.

Crisis exemption OK'd

Last week, the Texas Department of Agriculture declared a Section 18 crisis exemption to allow the use of Lorsban 4E on wheat for control of Russian wheat aphids, said Mike Blanton, Parmer County extension agent - entomology. Restrictions are:
 - May be applied only by certified applicators or persons under their direct supervision.
 - May be applied by aerial, ground or sprinkler irrigation equipment. The latter must have anti-siphon devices.
 - Applications can be made at a maximum rate of 0.5 pounds ai/ac. Don't make more than 2 applications per season.
 - Don't apply product where runoff is likely to occur to aquatic habitats.

- Don't apply when weather conditions favor drift.
 - Don't allow livestock to graze or otherwise feed wheat forage to livestock for at least 14 days following an application.
 - Don't harvest wheat for grain within 28 days following application.
 - Don't feed wheat straw to livestock for at least 28 days following application.
 - Federal regulations require that crisis exemptions expire 15 days from the date of initiation. However, the TDA has submitted to EPA an application for a specific exemption to authorize the use of Lorsban 4E in winter wheat for the RWA. TDA expects EPA approval.

100% pass TEAMS test

One hundred percent of the 11th grade students at Lazbuddie High School passed the exit level of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS). The test, given in October to 11th graders state-wide, is an exit level examination that must be passed by students prior to receiving a Texas high school diploma. The Lazbuddie School Board, at its regular December meeting, heard the results reported by Anne Farris, elementary school principal and high school counselor. The report showed that all of the juniors passed both the English language arts and mathematics sections of the

test, while statewide, 77 percent passed the math portion and 90 percent passed the English language arts. "Reaching 100 percent mastery is a goal every school district strives for," said Mrs. Farris. "These results point to a quality instructional program at Lazbuddie ISD." Supt. Joe Hall cited a strong academic program and dedicated staff members as part of the reason for the district's success. Board president Bobby Redwine and other board members expressed pride and commendation to the Lazbuddie 11th graders for their overall success on TEAMS.

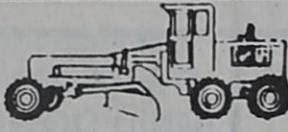
